

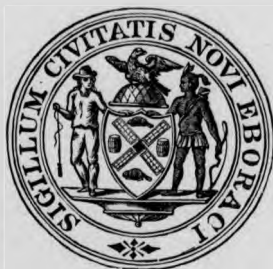

Resolved, That, pursuant to the statute in such case made and provided, the Hebrew Benevolent and Orphan Asylum Society of the City of New York be and it is hereby permitted and authorized at all times hereafter to sub-let or lease the whole or any part of the several lots of land situate in the City of New York, heretofore conveyed to the said Society by the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York, by conveyance recorded respectively in the office of the Register of the City and County of New York, in Liber 833 of Conveyances, page 233, and in Liber 916 of Conveyances, page 232, anything in the said several conveyances contained to the contrary notwithstanding; provided that the proceeds of the leases of such lots shall be applied to the uses and for the purposes specified in chapter 251, Laws 1874, and for no other, but no lessee or lessees of any or all of said lots or any part thereof, his or their heirs, executors, administrators or assigns shall be charged with the proper application of said proceeds, nor shall any of said leases be in any manner invalidated or affected by the misapplication of such proceeds or any part thereof; further provided that such lots and the improvements thereon, if used for any other purpose than for a Hebrew Benevolent and Orphan Asylum, shall not be exempted from taxation.

This amount, though apparently \$25,000 more than the present year's appropriation for the same general purposes, is in reality \$27,400 less, the items for increase of engine and hook and ladder companies, amounting to \$52,400 in the estimate for the year 1884, being entirely omitted in this estimate for 1885; and in this reduced amount is embraced the proposed purchase of apparatus, horses, hose, etc., required for the equipment of four additional companies, to wit: Engine No. 53, in East One Hundred and Fourth street (house now building and nearly completed); Engine No. 55, at No. 173 Elm street, on the outskirts and for service mainly in the most important section of the city, the so-called dry goods district (in which, during the last two years, the ratio of fires to buildings has annually been one to seventeen); Hook and Ladder No. 16, in East Sixty-seventh street, in a section of great importance, both by reason of its rapid growth and because of the large number of asylums, hospitals, schools, etc., with their helpless inmates, the house for which is shortly to be commenced; and Hook and Ladder No. 18, to be located at No. 84 Attorney street, a section in which fires have increased in greater ratio than in any other of the sub-divisions of the city established for purposes of comparison. And to this must finally be added the increased annual cost of maintenance of the plant, horses, buildings, etc., with the additions made thereto from time to time necessitating greater expenditures in fuel, gas, materials and general supplies.

The item for new houses is the same in amount as in the appropriation for the current year, and is in each case a necessity. The quarters of Engine No. 39, in East Sixty-seventh street; Engine No. 54, in West Forty-seventh street, and Engine No. 45, in West Farms, are each inadequate and in a condition requiring rebuilding. The houses now occupying the sites at No. 173 Elm street and No. 84 Attorney street, intended as locations, respectively, for Engine No. 55 and Hook and Ladder No. 18, new companies to be organized, as stated in the preceding paragraph, are both unsuited to the purpose, and must be entirely rebuilt.

The foregoing estimate, amounting to one million seven hundred and seventy-four thousand seven hundred and seventy-three (\$1,774,773) dollars, is adopted as the sum of money which will be required for expenses necessary to the administration and conduct of the Fire Department of the City of New York for the year 1885.

GENTLEMEN—In compliance with the provisions of section 189 of the Consolidation Act, I herewith present the Departmental Estimate of the amount which will be necessary to meet the expenditures of the Law Department for the ensuing year.

Annexed to this communication will be found the statement of the salaries of each of the officers, clerks, employees and subordinates of the Department which is required by law, and also communications to me from the bureau officers who transmit, through me, the requests for appropriations for their respective bureaus.

I regret that this communication has been somewhat delayed, but press of other business must stand as my excuse.

In presenting this estimate for the year 1885, it is proper that I should accompany it with a brief statement of the reasons which induce me to ask for an increase over the total appropriation of last year.

The expenditures of this Department may be divided into four separate classes:

- (1.) Office of the Counsel to the Corporation.
- (2.) Bureau of Public Administrator.
- (3.) Bureau for the Collection of Arrears of Personal Taxes.
- (4.) Bureau of the Corporation Attorney.

- (1.) Office of the Counsel to the Corporation:

The appropriation asked for, compared with that of the current year, is as follows:

I ask for the same appropriation as was made for the current year, to pay salaries and contingencies, because, in my opinion, the ordinary law business of the city cannot be efficiently done for less. This judgment is fortified by experience. The appropriations for the past six years have been:

The number of accident cases has largely increased in the past few years, and these are cases which involve in their trial a larger outlay than do actions sounding on contract, from the necessity of obtaining in nearly all of them models, photographs, surveys, and the testimony of medical experts.

The appropriations for the past six years for "procuring and presenting evidence relative to frauds on the City and County of New York prior to January 1, 1872," have been as follows:

It is to be hoped that the necessity for this specific appropriation must soon cease, but from a careful examination which I have made into the pending actions of the class known as "Ring" litigations, I am satisfied that they cannot be disposed of without such an appropriation for the coming year at least.

In the various unfinished actions of this kind the city is represented by eminent counsel, and the evidence which it is necessary to procure and present is of an expensive character. The deposit, progress through the Clearing House, and final payment of innumerable warrants and checks is an important element of proof, and my own personal experience as assistant in the department has satisfied me that it cannot be procured without the expenditure of considerable money.

I believe that a determined effort would terminate all outstanding litigation of this character in the course of the next one or two years, but without a specific appropriation to meet the expenses of the trial of those cases, which will have to be disposed of in court, I fear they must still continue on the unfinished docket. The expense of the trial of these actions cannot, in my opinion, be borne by the present appropriation for contingencies, in view of the many calls upon that fund, without crippling the department in its ability to handle the ordinary current litigation.

The appropriation for the expenses of street openings needs no particular comment. It is the same as has been made during the past few years since the present system was determined upon, and I know of no reason why it should be reduced.

I have asked for an additional appropriation of twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000) which calls for a more extended explanation. By chapter 522 of the Laws of 1884, the city was commanded by the Legislature to proceed forthwith to acquire title to several parks and parkways in the annexed district and in Westchester County, aggregating in all about 3,800 acres.

Of course, the proceedings in court for the appointment of commissioners under this act, and the future disposition thereof, should be attended to by the Law Department without any addition to its appropriations. There remains, however, the proceeding to be had before the Commissioners of estimate and appraisal involving the determination before those Commissioners of the proper amount of money to be paid by the city to the owners of the lands taken.

The mode of procedure provided for in this act is entirely anomalous and without parallel in former proceedings to acquire title to private property for streets, parks and public places in this city. Heretofore, the cost of the property taken has been borne, either in whole or in part, by the adjoining property which was deemed to be benefited by the improvement, and the Commissioners of Estimate who appraised the damage were also Commissioners of Assessment to distribute the amount of money required to pay that damage among the property-owners who derived some advantage from the improvement.

Of course, under these circumstances, there was in each case a conflict of private interests before the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment. The owners of the property taken introduced evidence to enhance its value in the eyes of the Commissioners, while the owners of the adjoining and benefited property, who were to pay the ultimate expense of the improvement, endeavored to persuade the Commissioners to adopt a low estimate, as well of the property taken as of the adjoining property, which was to be assessed in proportion to its present value at the date of the report. In such proceedings as these, the city authorities, therefore, had no occasion to search out and present to the Commissioners testimony of experts or any other evidence as to the true value of the property to be taken. All the attainable evidence had been presented by opposing private parties.

In the proceedings under this new park act however, the condition of affairs is entirely changed. On one side are grouped the owners of the 3,800 acres taken, each with a strong personal interest in having a high value set upon the property by the Commissioners; on the other side there remains only the Counsel to the Corporation as the representative of the city.

It admits of no doubt that these property-owners will unite their forces and will present to the Commissioners of Estimate a multitude of witnesses and a profusion of testimony tending to show the great value of their lands. Such evidence cannot be properly met by the City of New York without the expenditure of a considerable sum of money. No real estate expert whose opinion would be entitled to weight can be expected to thoroughly inform himself as to the location and character of the lands taken, and to give his evidence (subject to cross-examination) before the Commissioners of Estimate without being well paid for his time and trouble.

Examination will also have to be made into the actual transfers of real estate within the area of these parks, or in their immediate vicinity, and, in view of the expense of the area, and of the further fact that the land is not all contiguous, such an operation is a laborious and an expensive one.

The experience of this Department in the past in connection with the claims for damage which have been made by the property-owners who were affected by the real estate taken for the purposes of an increased water supply, and of which proceedings for the past six years I have personally had charge, has induced me to suggest the sum of \$20,000 as a proper appropriation for this purpose.

I do not suggest this as a yearly appropriation, but as one to be made for the specific object of procuring and presenting all the testimony required to meet the claims before the Commissioners of Estimate, whether such work extends over a period of months or of years. If thus made for a specific purpose, no part of the appropriation could be transferred until the specific purpose has been entirely accomplished, and if the case of the city were efficiently presented, I apprehend there would be little left by that time.

I have dealt with this subject at considerable length, for I fully appreciate its great importance to the City Treasury, and am averse to asking for any increase in the burden to be laid upon the taxpayers, except for good cause. I suppose there is no one who has had any experience with claims as to the value of property taken for public improvements who, upon an examination of the subject, will not be fully satisfied that the awards to be made for this particular property may be diminished hundreds of dollars per acre by a full, elaborate and careful presentation of such evidence as the officers of the city may be able to obtain. The total appropriation which I ask for this purpose is \$20,000. A reduction of only \$100 per acre on the property taken would be \$380,800. In my judgment, the proposed outlay is fully warranted by the probable results.

- (2.) Bureau of Public Administrator.

The same amounts are asked for as were appropriated last year. The Chief of the Bureau informs me that these amounts are necessary for the proper and efficient transaction of the business of his office.

- (3.) Bureau for the Collection of Arrears of Personal Taxes.

An increase on the appropriation for the current year is asked for in this bureau.

The reason why the two additional items are asked for I will be happy to explain to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment when this estimate is under advisement. It seems unnecessary that I should increase the length of this letter by further suggestion in regard thereto, especially in view of the fact that if the appropriation for these two items be made for this bureau, their aggregate amount (\$750), should be deducted from the usual appropriation for contingencies (\$37,500), leaving an appropriation for the latter purpose of \$36,750. I make this suggestion as I desire not to ask for any increase of appropriation, except for the specific purpose I have above indicated.

SIR—In answer to your communication requesting a detailed statement of the expenses of this office for the year 1885, I would say, that there are arrears of taxes against delinquents undisposed of, numbering as follows:

I have been unable to commence suits in such cases because I had no funds out of which to defray necessary expenses of the proceedings, such as service, jury fees and other incidental charges.

To the Honorable the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

GENTLEMEN—In pursuance of section 4 of chapter 530 of the Laws of 1884, I herewith submit an estimate of the amount of expenditure required in my office and court for the ensuing year.

This estimate provides for the appointment of five clerks in addition to those now employed in this office. Two of these are needed for recording clerks, at a salary of one thousand dollars a year, and two at a salary of eight hundred dollars a year, for the purpose of copying papers referred to in subdivision 2 of section 7 of the act above mentioned. Before the passage of that act this copying was done by persons employed at his own expense by the Clerk of the Court, who was entitled by law to retain the fees for his own use. All fees received since the said act went into operation have, of course, been paid, in accordance with its requirements, into the City Treasury. Sections 2498 and 2499 of the Code of Civil Procedure specify the nature of the work to be performed by the recording clerks. It has, within the last two years, increased about one-fifth. Besides the records expressly required to be made by these sections, I am having prepared an index in regard to Letters of Guardianship, which will consist of about 28,000 names, a general index to other records, likely to contain about 20,000 names, and one showing the names of all sureties upon bonds in this office. This last will probably embrace about 50,000 names. I need not explain the importance—indeed, the practical necessity—of these indices. The additional force for which I ask will be no more than sufficient to enable the office to keep fairly abreast of the labor it is called upon to perform.

The other clerk for whose appointment I seek to make provision is a Clerk of the Court. The duties of this place have been for several years discharged by the Accounting Clerk, whose compensation for the services rendered in this regard was, prior to the adoption of the act above mentioned, provided for, as already stated, from the fees received for copies of papers filed in the office. The increase of the business appertaining to that position, and the extent and variety of the services which its incumbent is obliged to perform, demand the appointment of a separate clerk. His salary should be at least at the rate of \$3,000 a year. In comparison with the salaries allowed for equivalent services in other departments, I think the amount suggested is extremely low.

In the salaries of the clerks now employed in this office I respectfully ask for an increase of \$2,000. Of this sum \$1,400 is needed as an addition to the salary of the Deputy Chief Clerk, and \$600 as an addition to that of my Law Assistant. The growth of the business has been such that many of the duties formerly discharged by the Chief Clerk must now be performed by his Deputy. There has been a great increase also in the laboriousness of the duties of my Law Assistant. The sums I ask your Honorable Board to appropriate for these gentlemen will scarcely afford adequate return for the fidelity and efficiency of their services.

I also, in accordance with chapter 57 of the Laws of 1853, make requisition for the appropriation by your Honorable Board of the sum of \$8,400 for salaries for the next year of the clerks engaged in performing the work provided for by said chapter. There are seven clerks so engaged. The amount asked is the same as that at present appropriated for this purpose.

**SUPREME COURT.**

In the matter of the application of the Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks for and on behalf of the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York, relative to acquiring title, wherever the same has not been heretofore acquired, to that part of Courtlandt avenue, although not yet named by proper authority, extending from the northerly side of East One Hundred and Sixty-first street to the southerly side of East One Hundred and Sixty-second street, in the Twenty-third Ward of the City of New York, as the same has been heretofore laid out and designated as a first-class street or road by said Department.

**PURSUANT TO THE STATUTES IN SUCH** cases made and provided, notice is hereby given that an application will be made to the Supreme Court of the State of New York, at a Special Term of said court, to be held at Chambers thereof, in the County Court-house, in the City of New York, on Friday, the 7th day of November, 1884, at the opening of the Court on that day, or as soon thereafter as counsel can be heard thereon, for the appointment of Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment in the above-entitled matter. Each bid must be verified by the oath of the party making the same, that the several matters therein stated are true, and must be accompanied by a certified check upon a National or State Bank of the City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of the City of New York, for an amount not less than five per cent of the amount of the security required for the faithful performance of the contract. Such check must not be included with the bid or proposal, but must be delivered to the Aqueduct Commissioners, or to their secretary, for delivery to the Comptroller.
