#### Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending September 12, 1885:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors was 6,269.

The number of complaints returned by the Sanitary Inspectors was 477.

During the past week 309 complaints were received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

There were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port, 78 permits.

There were issued to consignees to discharge rags (in bulk, under bonds), 11 permits.

There were issued, under the Sanitary Code, 10 miscellaneous permits.

There were issued to scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-sinks, 137 permits.

At premises where contagious diseases were reported 64 visits were made, and 13 disinfections and 3 fumigations were performed.

The number of cases of contagious diseases removed to Riverside Hospital was 1.

The number of vaccinations performed was 163, of which 10 were primary, and 153 revaccinations.

There were seized and condemned 6,715 pounds of meat, and 3,150 pounds of fish.

The number of specimens of milk examined was 61; the number of quarts of adulterated milk destroyed was 6; the number of arrests made was 5.

The certificates of 587 births, 47 still-births, 182 marriages and 646 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, September 12, 1885. This shows a decrease of 5 births, 5 still-births, 137 marriages, and 19 deaths, when compared with the number received during the preceding week; but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1884, there was an increase of 45 births, and a decrease of 6 stillbirths, 36 marriages and 205 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from measles decreased 1; scarlatina, 1; diphtheria, 4; croup, 6; whooping cough, 6; erysipelas, 3; typhoid fever, 1; puerperal diseases, 4; diarrhoeal diseases, 19; rheumatism and gout, 2; cancer, 5; phthisis pulmonalis, 2; bronchitis, 7; pneumonia, 3; heart diseases, 5; aneurism, 1; meningitis and encephalitis, 2; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 2; cyanosis and atelectasis, 1; premature and pretermatural births, 3; drowning, 2; while the deaths from cerebro-spinal fever increased 3; malarial fevers, 5; inanition, 1; alcoholism, 5; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 17; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 2; convulsions, 7; apoplexy, 1; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 4; gastritis, enteritis and peritonitis, 10; Bright's disease and nephritis, 6; suicide, 4.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

The ages of 201 of the persons who died during the week were reported to be under one year; 247 under two years, 202 under five years, and 44 seventy years and over, which shows that the number of deaths of children under five years of age was 17 less than the number reported during the preceding week, and represent 45.20 per cent. of the total weekly mortality.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 129 were in institutions, 343 in tenement-houses, 154 in houses containing three families or less, 5 in hotels and boarding-houses, 13 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 8 were on the basement floor, 120 on the first, 170 on the second, 121 on the third, 56 on the fourth, 27 on the fifth, 0 on the sixth; 646 were stated to be residents of New York City and 0 non-resident, 69 were stated to be single, 145 married, 70 widowed, and the condition of 362 was not stated, these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 646; still-births, 47; bodies in transit, 14; of the total burial permits issued for city deaths and still-births 86 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 588 births, 182 marriages, 47 still-births, 646 deaths, 14 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed and tabulated; 85 searches of the registers of births, marriages and deaths were made, and 7 transcripts of the birth record, 5 of marriage and 53 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending September 12, 1885, was 63.1 degrees Fahrenheit, the mean reading of the barometer was 29.974; the mean humidity was 75, saturation being 100; the number of miles traveled by the wind was 799, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.26 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph. D., Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The disposition of 604 deaths and still-births, or 87.16 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 22; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 228; City pauper burial-ground (undenominational), 90; Greenwood (undenominational), 30; Lutheran (undenominational), 101; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 15; Evergreen (undenominational), 32; Woodlawn (undenominational), 26; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 17; Union (Methodist Protestant), 5; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 10; Macphelah, L.
