

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending March 19, 1887 :

The tollowing is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending March 19, 1887: The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors was 6,225. The number of complaints returned by the Sanitary Inspectors was 1,054. During the past week 212 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report. There were issued to the consignees of vessels, to discharge cargoes on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port, 32 permits. The number of specimens of milk examined was 20, the number of analyses of same made was 1, the number of adulterated milk destroyed was 127, and the amount of fines imposed was \$20. \$20.

The certificates of 602 births, 61 still-births, 322 marriages, and 734 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, March 19, 1857. This shows an increase of 12 births, 112 marriages, and 3 deaths, and a decrease of still-births, when compared with the number received during the preceding week; but when com-pared with the corresponding week of the year 1886 there was an increase of 8 births, 10 still-births, and 99 marriages, and a decrease of 24 deaths.
