COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at a Meeting held at the Comptroller's office, at 12 o'clock M., Wednesday, February 12, 1890.

Present-Hugh J. Grant, Mayør ; Frederick Smyth, Recorder ; Theodore W. Myers, Comptroller; Thomas C. T. Crain, Chamberlain, and Walton Storm, Chairman Committee on Finance, Board of Aldermen.

The minutes of the meeting held January 27, 1890, were read and approved.

The Mayor stated that Mr. T. C. T. Crain had been appointed Chamberlain, in the place of Mr. Richard Croker, resigned, whereupon Mr. Crain took his seat as a member of the Board of Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

The Mayor stated the object of the meeting to be the opening of the proposals received for the work of erecting and completing the Criminal Court Building, under a resolution of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopted on January 10, 1889, which resolution fixed the time and place of opening the proposals, and directed the publication of the advertisement for the work for certain periods in the CITY RECORD and in certain designated newapapers in the City of New York.

The Secretary presented a form of the specifications and contract for the work, with the advertisement attached, approved by the Counsel to the Corporation, which was ordered to be placed on file.

The advertisement was publicly read, and the Secretary presented, also, affidavits of the Supervisor of the CITY RECORD, and of the Principal Clerks employed in the offices of the "New York News," "The World" and the "Tribune," public newspapers of the City of New York, that said advertisement was duly published therein, as required by section 5 of chapter 371 of the Laws of 1887. The Secretary stated also that the advertisement had been published as directed in all the newspapers designated for such publication, by a resolution adopted December 28, 1889.

The Secretary also presented a number of petitions addressed to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, protesting against the award of any contract being made to non-resident contractors, for the work of erecting the Criminal Court Building, as follows :

1. Petition of taxpayers and voters of the City of New York signed by and for many persons, with their respective addresses, against non-resident contractors and workmen. 2. Petition of Granite Cutters against having the stone for the building cut and dressed outside

of the City of New York.

The rent of all tenements which shall exceed in width fifty feet shall be the subject of special contract with the Commissioner of Public Works. The apportionment of the regular rents upon dwelling-houses are on the basis that but one family is to occupy the same, and for each additional family, one dollar per year shall be charged. METERS will be placed on all houses where waste of water is found, and theywill be charged at rates fixed by the Department for all the water passing through them. The extra and miscellaneous rates sha be as follows, to wit:

five dollars per annum shall be made for each bath-tub therein
BATHIKG TUBS in private houses, beyond one, shall be charged at three dollars per annum each, and five dollars per annum each in public houses, boarding-houses, and bathing establishments. Combination stationary wash-tubs, having a movable division in the centre and capable of use for bathing, shall be charged the same as bathing tubs.
BUILDING FURPORES.—For each one thousand bricks laid, or for stone-work—to be measured as brick—ten hundred yards.
COWS.—For each and every cow, one dollar per annum.
DINIKG SALOONS shall be charged an annual rate of from five to twenty dollars, in the discretion of the Com-missioner of Public Works.
Fish STANDS (retail) shall be charged five dolars per annum each.
For all stables not metered, the rates shall be as follows : HORSES, PRIVATE.—For two horses there shall be charged six dollars per annum; and for each additional horse, two dollars.
HORSES, LIVERY.—For each horse up to and not exceed-ing thirty in number, one dollar and fifty cents each per annum; and Lor each additional horse, one dollar HORSES, OMNIBUS AND CART.—For each horse, one dollar horse. TROUGHS.—For each trough, and for each half

per annum; and tor each additional horse, one dollar HoRSES, OMNIBUS AND CART.—For each horse, one dollar per annum.
HORSE TROUCHS.—For each trough, and for each half barrel or tub on sidewalk or street, twenty dollars per annum; each trough is to be fitted with a proper ball-cock to prevent waste.
HOTELS AND BOARDING HOUSES shall, in addition to the regular rate for private families, be charged for each lodging room, at the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.
LAUNDRIES shall be charged from eight to twenty dollars over annum, in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.
LIQUOR AND LAGER BEER SALOONS shall be charged an annual rate of ten dollars, each. An additional charge of five dollars per annum shall be made for each tap or wash-box.
PHOTOGRAPH GALLERIES shall be charged an annual rate of from five to twenty dollars, in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.
PRINTING OFFICES, when not metered, shall be charged at such rates as may be determined by the Commis-sioner of Public Works.
STEAM ENGINES, where not metered, shall be charged by the horse-power, as follows : For each horse-power up to and not exceeding ten, the sum of ten dollars per annum for each exceeding ten, and not over fifteen, the sum of seven dollars and fifty cents each and for each horse-power over fifteen, the sum of five dollars.
WATER-CLOSETS AND URINALS.—To each building on a lot one water-closet having sever connection is allowed without charge; each additional water-closet or urnal will be charged as hereinfare stated. All closets connected in any manner with sever shall be charged two dollars for each sece per annum, whether in a building or on any other portion of the premises. closets connected in any manner with sewer shall be charged two dollars for each seat per annum, whether in a building or on any other portion of the premises. Urinals shall be charged two dollars per annum each.
 WATER-CLOSET RATES.—For hoppers of any form, when water is supplied direct from the Croton supply, through any form of the so-called single or double valves, hopper-cocks, stop-cocks, self-closing cocks, or any valve or cock of any description attached to the closet, each, per year, twenty dollars.
 For any pan closet, or any of the forms of valve, plunger, or other water-closet not before mentioned, sup-plied with water as above described, per year, ten dollars

hotels, manufactories, public edifices, at wharves, terry-houses, stables, and in all places where water is furshed for business consumption, except private dwellings. It is provided by section 352, Laws of r882, that "all expenses of meters, their connections and setting, water rates, and other lawful charges for the supply of Croton water, shall be a lien upon the premises where such water is supplied, as now provided by law." * * All manufacturing and other business requiring a large supply of water will be fitted with a meter. NUMEROUS APPLICATIONS HAVE BEEN made to this Department by citizens claiming reductions or rebates on bills for water supplied through meters, on the alleged ground of leakage caused by de-fective plumbing and worn-out service pipes, or by willful waste of water by tenants allowing the faucets to be turned on in full force in water-closets, sinks, etc., with-out the knowledge or consent of the owners of the prem-ises.

REGULATIONS ESTABLISHING A SCALE OF WATER RENTS AND RULES GOVERNING THE USE OF WATER, FOR THE CITY OF NEW YORK, BY ORDER OF THOMAS F. GILROY, COM-MISSIONER OF PUBLIC WORKS.

UNDER CHAPTER 410, LAWS 1882, SECTIONS 350, 351, 352 and 353, and as amended by chapter

UNDER CHAPTER 410, LAWS 1882, SECTIONS 350, 351, 352 and 353, and as amended by chapter 559, Laws 1887, as follows: "The commissioner of public works shall, from time to time, establish scales of rents for the supplying of water, which rents shall be collected in the manner now provided by law, and which shall be apportioned to different classes of buildings in said city in reference to their dimensions, values, exposure to fires, ordinary uses for dwellings, stores, shops, private stables and other common purposes, number of families or occupants, or conswmption of water, as near as may be practicable, and modity, alter, amend and increase such scale from time to

dollars For any form of hopper or water-closet, supplied from the ordinary style of cistern filled with ball-cock, and overflow pipe that communicates with the pipe to the water-closet, so that overflow will run into the hopper or water-closet, when ball-cock is defective, or from which an unlimited amount of water can be drawn by holding up the handle, per year, each, five dollars.

dollars. For any form of hopper or water-closet, supplied from any of the forms of waste-preventing cisterns, that are approved by the Eugineer of the Croton Aque-duct, which are so constructed that not more than three gallons of water can be drawnat each lift of the handle, or depression of the seat, if such cisterns are provided with an overflow pipe, such overflow pipe must not connect with the water-closet, but be car-ried like a safe-waste, as provided by the Board of Health regulations, per year, two dollars. Cistern answering this description can be seen at this Department.

METERS.

Under the provisions of section 352, Consolidated Act 1882, water-meters, of approved pattern, shall be here-after placed on the pipes supplying all stores, workshops

The main object of the use of water-meters is to enable this Department to detect and check the useless and un-warrantable waste of an element so valuable and essential to the health and comfort of all the citizens, and this ob-ject can only be accomplished by enforcing payment for the water wasted.

to the nearth and comfort of an the entrens, and this out-ject can only be accomplished by enforcing payment for the water wasted. Under the law all charges for water supplied through meters are a lien against the respective premises, and the law therefore holds the owner of the premises re-sponsible for the amount of water used or wasted. Notice is therefore invent to all householders that, in all turther applications for reduction of water rents, no allowance will be made on account of waste of water occurring through leaks, from defective service pipes or plumbing, or wasteful use of water by tenants or occu-pants of buildings, though such leakage or waste may have o curred without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the buildings. House-owners are further notified that wheneve their premises become vacant, and are likely to reman vacant, they must notify this Department in writing, and that unless this requirement is complied with no deductions in extra water rents will he allowed for any portion of one year.
