

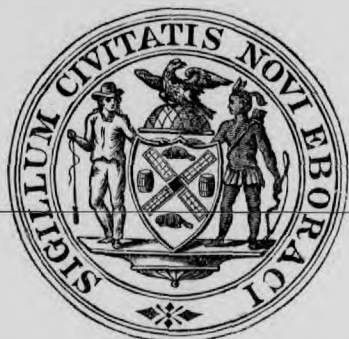

#### Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending December 9, 1882:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,643, as follows: 1 public building, 767 tenement-houses, 71 private dwellings, 51 other dwellings, 7 manufactories and work shops, 21 stores and warehouses, 42 stables, 25 slaughter-houses, 1 dangerous building, 1 public sewer, 1 lodging-house, 27 sunken and vacant lots, 70 yards, courts, and areas, 93 cellars and basements, 213 waste pipes and drains, 191 privies and water-closets, 26 streets, gutters and sidewalks, 16 dangerous stairways, 5 smoky chimneys, 2 cesspools, 2 piggeries, 10 other nuisances.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 442.

During the past week 96 complaints were received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

58 permits were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

49 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 75 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 74 houses, 74 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending December 16, 1882:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,505, as follows, viz.:

1 public building, 731 tenement-houses, 79 private dwellings, 53 other dwellings, 8 manufactories and work-shops, 17 stores and warehouses, 32 stables, 54 slaughter-houses, 1 public sewer and drain, 9 sunken and vacant lots, 63 yards, courts and areas, 80 cellars and basements, 167 waste-pipes and drains, 158 privies and water-closets, 25 streets, gutters and sidewalks, 5 dangerous stairways, 3 smoky chimneys, 15 cesspools, 4 other nuisances.

The number of reports thereon received from the inspectors was 395.

During the past week 113 complaints were received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

43 permits were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

48 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy sinks.

The disinfecting corps have visited 85 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 76 houses, 76 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

5 cases of contagious disease were removed to the hospital by the Ambulance Corps.

#### Bureau of Vital Statistics.

The certificates of 600 births, 55 still-births, 263 marriages, and 578 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, December 9, 1882. This shows an increase of 85 births, 11 still-births, and 41 marriages and a decrease of 6 deaths, when compared with the number received during the preceding week; but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1881, there was an increase of 63 births, 16 still-births, and 79 marriages, and a decrease of 102 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from scarlatina decreased 9; diphtheria, 6; whooping cough, 4; erysipelas, 4; typhoid fever, 1; puerperal diseases, 4; diarrhoeal diseases, 3; inanition, 2; heart diseases, 7; marasmus, tabes mesenterica, and scrofula, 4; apoplexy, 1; Bright's disease and nephritis, 3; suicide, 3; drowning, 3; while the deaths from measles increased, 9; croup, 4; cerebro-spinal fever, 3; malarial diseases, 4; cancer, 3; bronchitis, 4; pneumonia, 13; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 2; meningitis and encephalitis, 1; convulsions, 1; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 2; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 7; gastritis, enteritis and peritonitis, 6; premature and preterm births, 2. The number of deaths from alcoholism, phthisis pulmonalis, aneurism, cyanosis and atelectasis, and surgical operations was the same in the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

The ages of 108 of the persons who died during the week were reported to be under one year, 144 under two years, 200 under five years, and 56 seventy years and over, which shows that the deaths of children under five years of age was 13 less than the number reported during last week, and represent 34.60 per cent. of the total weekly mortality.

Persons "enrolled" as liable must serve when called or pay their fines. No mere excuse will be allowed or interference permitted. The fines if unpaid will be entered as judgments upon the property of the delinquents.

All good citizens will aid the course of justice, and secure reliable and respectable juries, and equalize their duty by serving promptly when summoned, allowing their clerks or subordinates to serve, reporting to me any attempt at bribery or evasion, and suggesting names for enrollment. Persons between sixty and seventy years of age, summer absentees, persons temporarily ill, and United States and District Court jurors are not exempt.

Every man must attend to his own notice. It is a misdemeanor to give any jury paper to another to answer. It is also punishable by fine or imprisonment to give or receive any present or bribe, directly or indirectly, in relation to a jury service, or to withhold any paper or make any false statement, and every case will be fully prosecuted.
