The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending December 9, 1882:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,643, as follows: I public building, 767 tenement-houses, 71 private dwellings, 51 other dwellings, 7 manufactories and work shops, 21 stores and warehouses, 42 stables, 25 slaughter-houses, I dangerous building, I public sewer, I lodging-house, 27 sunken and vacant lots, 70 yards, courts, and areas, 93 cellars and basements, 213 waste pipes and drains, 191 privies and water-closets, 26 streets, gutters and sidewalks, 16 dangerous stairways, 5 smoky chimneys, 2 cesspools, 2 increases. In other musances. piggenes, 10 other nuisances.

During the past week 113 complaints were received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

43 permits were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

48 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy sinks.

The disinfecting corps have visited 85 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 76 houses, 76 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

5 cases of contagious disease were removed to the hospital by the Ambulance Corps.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

The certificates of 600 births, 55 still-births, 263 marriages, and 578 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, December 9, 1882. This shows an increase of 85 births, 11 still-births, and 41 marriages and a decrease of 6 deaths, when compared with the number received during the preceding week; but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1881, there was an increase of 63 births, 16 still-births, and 79 marriages, and a decrease of 102 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from scarlatina decreased 9; diphtheria, 6; whooping cough, 4; erysipelas, 4; typhoid fever, 1; puerperal diseases, 4; diarrheal diseases, 3; inanition, 2; heart diseases, 7; marasmus, tabes mesenterica, and scrofula, 4; apoplexy, 1; Bright's disease and nephritis, 3; suicide, 3; drowning, 3; while the deaths from measles increased, 9; croup, 4; cerebro-spinal fever, 3; malarial diseases, 4; cancer, 3; bronchitis, 4; pneumonia, 13; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 2; meningitis and encephalitis, 1; convulsions, 1; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 2; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 7; gastritis, enteritis and peritonitis, 6; premature and preternatural births, 2. The number of deaths from alcoholism, phthisis pulmonalis, aneurism, cyanosis and atelectasis, and surgical operations was the same in the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 126 were in institutions, 308 in tenementhouses, 138 in houses containing three families or less, 3 in hotels and boarding-houses, 11 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 14 were on the basement floor, 98 on the first, 174 on the second, 91 on the third, 50 on the fourth, 21 on the fifth, 0 on the sixth; 567 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 11 non-resident; 69 were stated to be single, 173 married, 76 widowed, and the condition of 260 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The number of deaths from croup, inanition, rheumatism and gout, and cyanosis and atelectasis, was the same in the two successive weeks.
