

LAW DEPARTMENT-OFFICE OF THE Counsel to the Corporation, New York, May 4, 1875.

Hon. ABRAHAM DISBECKER, Chairman of the Committee on Street Cleaning, Police Department :

SIR-I learn from your letter that John Lyons, SIR—I learn from your letter that John Lyons, a cartman formerly in the employ of the Street Cleaning Bureau, has presented a claim against the Board of Police for damages to his cart and horse through the carelessness of a driver of a Police Department cart, as follows: On Satur-day, November 7, 1874, at 9.30 P. M., while working in his business as ash cartman attached to the Fifteenth Ward, and while in the act of dummune load at the Soventeenth street dumping dumping a load at the Seventeenth street dumping ground, a Police Department cart, worked in the Ninth Ward, and marked 174, driven by one ground, a Police Department cart, worked in the Ninth Ward, and marked 174, driven by one Cunningham, was through carelessness backed against Lyons, thereby throwing him with horse and cart from the dumping platform into the scow floating on the surface of the river beneath, and so severely injuring the horse that it died within thirty-six hours. thirty-six hours. An investigation proved the charge of careless-ness against the driver of the Police Department cart, and the damages with regard to the horse amounted to \$60, and to the cart to \$10. The Committee on Street Cleaning request my opinion as to the right and duty of the Police Department to pay the damages to Lyons out of the appropriation for Street Cleaning. It is manifest that this is an exceedingly hard area for the poor man who has suffered the injury.
