Minutes of the meeting of March 19 approved.

Parks and Parkways.

Hearing on the petition, including printed report and map, of the Committee on Parks of the Staten Island Chamber of Commerce, recommending the establishment by The City of New York of an extensive system of parks and parkways, playgrounds and beach areas in the Borough of Richmond.

Colonel Charles H. Blair, Chairman of the Committee, referred to the importance of permanent playgrounds near schools, the preservation of extended park areas on the water front and the original plan of former Sheriff Benjamin Brown for a continuous parkway through the Island from north to south.

Robert W. Nelson urged the adoption of a comprehensive plan, and said that 10 per cent. of the acreage of the Borough of Richmond would not be too much to set aside for parks.

Cornelius G. Kolff, Secretary of the Chamber of Commerce, explained discrepancies between the report and the map, each being tentative and intended as a basis for definite action; and stated that the Staten Island Natural Science Association and other bodies were co-operating with the Chamber of Commerce.

E. P. Doyle, former Assemblyman Ferdinand C. Townsend, the Rev. Dr. Junor of Huguenot and Mr. A. K. Johnstone urged immediate action while land is comparatively cheap in many districts.

John De Morgan urged the inclusion of historic buildings and localities in the park system, and was supported in his contention by President Cromwell, who went over the map and report in detail.

President Cromwell read a resolution which he had prepared, and suggested that the hearing be adjourned for a week before action was taken.

Parks and Parkways System.

Adjourned hearing on the petition, report and map of the Committee on Parks of the Staten Island Chamber of Commerce.

Petition presented embracing a resolution of the Board of Directors of the Citizens' Improvement Association of the Fifth Ward of Richmond Borough, with a map, that a certain plot of land in Tottenville be included in the park system as a playground for Public School 1, with the approval of the Sub-Committee of Five for the Town of Westfield and of the Committee of Twenty-five of the Chamber of Commerce.

The special petition in connection with the advertised petition was supported by Colonel Charles H. Blair, Chairman of the Committee on Parks of the Staten Island Chamber of Commerce; Cornelius G. Kolff, Secretary of the Chamber of Commerce; Gilbert S. Barnes and Frank Joline, of the Citizens' Improvement Association, and John De Morgan.

President Cromwell laid before the Board the following resolution, which was moved and adopted:

Resolved, By the Local Board of the Staten Island District that this Board does hereby request the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to initiate proceedings for the said local improvement, to wit:

To change the map or plan of The City of New York by laying out thereon a system of parks, parkways and playgrounds in the Borough of Richmond, in accordance with a report and a tentative map prepared by the Committee on Parks of the Staten Island Chamber of Commerce and forming part of said petition, with such changes therein and such additions thereto as may, in the judgment of the President of the Borough, tend to harmonize and complete the tentative map submitted; and it is hereby

Resolved, That this Board recommends to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment that it initiate proceedings for proper surveys and maps and for the purchase and acquisition by The City of New York of the lands indicated by the petitioners in their report and the accompanying map, both of which are hereby attached and

submitted herewith, and of such other parcels of land as the President of the Borough may recommend for playgrounds; and that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment take such other steps as may be necessary in the premises; and it is hereby

Resolved, That this Board believes and recommends that the cost of acquiring this valuable addition to the park system of The City of New York should be borne by the City at large.

BOARD OF REVISION OF ASSESSMENTS.

A meeting of the Board of Revision of Assessments was held in the Council Chamber, City Hall, on Thursday, April 2, 1903, at 10.45 a. m.

Present, at Roll-Call—N. Taylor Phillips, Deputy and Acting Comptroller; George L. Rives, Corporation Counsel, and James L. Wells, President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments.

The reading of the minutes of the meetings not yet approved was dispensed with.

BOROUGH OF MANHATTAN.

The assessment list for repairing sidewalks opposite Nos. 182 and 183 West street and objections of August Zimmerman, by John C. Shaw, attorney, were presented by the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, having been received from the Board of Assessors under date of February 11, 1903.

No one appearing in opposition, after notice, on motion, the objections filed were overruled and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members voting in the affirmative.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the assessment list for repairing sidewalks on the southeast corner of Macomb's Dam road and One Hundred and Fifty-first street, and objections of Thomas L. Watt, by John C. Shaw, attorney, which had been received from the Board of Assessors under date of February 11, 1903.

No one appearing in opposition, after notice, on motion, the objections filed were overruled and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members voting in the affirmative.

The Comptroller here entered the room and took his seat in the Board.

BOROUGH OF BROOKLYN.

Twenty-ninth Ward.

The assessment list for Flatbush avenue improvement, under chapter 161, Laws of 1889, and Chapter 356 of the Laws of 1894, in ten annual installments, laid over after hearing at the last meeting of the Board, on motion was taken up.

The Comptroller submitted the following statement in connection therewith, viz.: Statement with Reference to Flatbush Avenue Assessment.

As the assessment is now made up the aggregate of the ten installments, including interest, is..... \$407,165 04
The entire cost of the improvement, including interest paid and to be paid on the bonds to the date of their maturity is..... 345,055 38

Showing an excess of assessment over cost of..... \$62,109 66
In other words, the City, in order to reimburse itself, must lay an assessment so that the aggregate of the ten installments, with interest, will be..... 345,055 38
This may be done

First—By taking that sum and dividing it into ten equal annual installments, without interest, over the whole of the territory now included within the area of assessment, to produce..... 345,055 38
Or

Second—By placing on Section "A," as shown on map, the amount which it is now assessed, namely, \$246,032.31, which, with interest added on the installments, will produce the amount now assessed on it, namely..... 290,318 12
Place on Section "B," as shown on map, the sum of \$46,387.51, which, with interest on the installments, will produce..... 54,737 26

Making the total of..... \$345,055 38
This second plan would relieve Section "C," as shown on map, of the entire amount charged against it, viz..... 22,715 63
And would reduce the amount charged against Section "B" by about 43 per cent. or..... 39,394 03

Making the entire reduction of..... \$62,109 66

The first installment will be laid in 1903.

After consideration by the Board, on motion of the Comptroller, the said assessment list was referred back to the Board of Assessors for revision and reapportionment, as follows:

That the installments shall aggregate the amount actually expended and to be expended for account of the said improvement and the amount of the interest on the bonds issued therefor, to wit, \$345,055.38; and that the area of the assessment be reduced to the territory embraced within Sections "A" and "B" of the present area.

That the area embraced within the territory of Section "C" be entirely eliminated.

That the assessment as now laid upon the territory embraced in Section "A," amounting to \$290,318.12, be retained, and that the balance of the expense, amounting to \$54,737.26, be imposed upon the territory embraced in Section "B," and that the amount of the present assessment in the said section be reduced accordingly.

The Comptroller, the Corporation Counsel and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments voting in the affirmative.

The Comptroller, having another engagement at this time, was excused from further attendance at the meeting, and the Deputy Comptroller continued to act for him.

BOROUGH OF THE BRONX.

The assessment list for constructing sewers and appurtenances in East One Hundred and Eighty-seventh street, from Southern Boulevard to Lorillard place; and in Crotona avenue, from Grote street to East One Hundred and Eighty-ninth street; and in Belmont avenue, from East One Hundred and Eighty-seventh street to St. John's College; and in Arthur avenue, from East One Hundred and Eighty-seventh street to the summit south; and in Hoffman street, from Pelham avenue to the summit south of East One Hundred and Eighty-seventh street; and objections of John J. Brady, attorney and owner; Frank Vredenburg and others; St. John's College, by Joseph I. Berry, attorney; Richard Siegman, by E. S. Kaufman, attorney, which were referred back to the Board of Assessors at meeting of December 16, 1902, with instructions to add to the area of the assessment the portion of the Park shown in the list, and charging it with its pro rata share of the assessment, and by deducting such amount pro rata from the sums charged to the lots assessed for general benefit, were presented by the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, having been returned by the Board of Assessors, under date of January 15, 1903.

The Assessors reported that the instructions of the Board of Revision of Assessments had been complied with, and that Mr. Kaufman, attorney, again objected for the reason that no reduction had been made in the case of Map No. 423.

In explanation, the Assessors stated that under the instructions of the Board of Revision of Assessments no reduction was to be made upon the property on the

line of the sewer, but upon the outlying section assessed for general benefit, and that the lot referred to faced the line of the sewer constructed under this contract.

Rev. Father Carroll, S. J., Treasurer of St. John's College, Fordham, was heard in opposition to the large amount assessed against the college property, and claimed that notwithstanding the reduction made the amount is largely in excess of the benefit derived by the property.

No others appearing in opposition, after notice, on motion of the Corporation Counsel the objections filed to the assessment were overruled and the assessment list was confirmed, the Deputy and Acting Comptroller and the Corporation Counsel voting in the affirmative; the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments not voting, being temporarily absent, and excused.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the assessment list for regulating, grading, setting curbstones, flagging, laying crosswalks and placing fences in Aqueduct avenue, from Lind avenue to Kingsbridge road, and objections of William D. Peck, owner; Frederick W. Devoe and others, by Elmer A. Allen, attorney; Estate of Lewis G. Morris and others, by Truman H. Baldwin, attorney; Estate of William B. Ogden and others, by John C. Shaw, attorney; Warwick E. Montgomery and others, by Fielding L. Marshall, attorney; Elizabeth D. Camp and others, by Joseph A. Flannery, attorney; Frank Jay Gould, by James A. Deering, attorney, having been received from the Board of Assessors under date of February 5, 1903.

Mr. William D. Peck was heard, and objected to the excessive cost of the work and to the expenses connected therewith.

Mr. Marshall, attorney, claimed that under chapter 468 of the Laws of 1836, which applied to condemnation of land for the Croton Aqueduct, these properties should be free from any additional cost by the grading of Aqueduct avenue, so far as the Croton Aqueduct is concerned, which passes through those properties, and that the City should furnish access across the strips of land acquired, at its own cost.

Mr. Marshall also objected to the heavy cost of the work by reason of the width of the avenue, and the expensive retaining wall.

Mr. Elmer A. Allen, attorney, objected to the amount of the assessments charged against the property of his clients, for the reason that it is not benefited to the extent thereof, and to the excessive cost of the work and the expenses, and also alleged that several items in the work were unnecessary and should not be assessed.

Mr. John C. Shaw, attorney, opposed the charge for paving the gutters four feet wide as being unauthorized, and also the charge of \$21,436 for rubble masonry laid in mortar at \$4 per cubic yard, as a dry rubble masonry would have been adequate. Mr. Shaw also objected to the heavy expenses for the work, the inequitable distribution of the assessment, and claimed that a considerable portion of the expense should be borne by the City.

Mr. Truman H. Baldwin, attorney, opposed the amount of the expenses as being excessive, and claimed that as the avenue is in effect a parkway a considerable portion of the assessment should be made a public charge.

Mr. Joseph A. Flannery, attorney, opposed the assessment as being excessive in the regulating and grading and in the expenses, and also objected to the method adopted in the apportionment, and claimed that the cost of the work on that portion of the avenue which is of extraordinary width should be borne in large part by the City.

On motion, decision in the matter was reserved, and the assessment list was laid over.

BOROUGH OF MANHATTAN.

The assessment list for sewers in Broadway, between Terrace View avenue (south) and Spuyten Duyvil creek; in Terrace View avenue (north), between Broadway and summit, elevation 46.50, with branches in Kingsbridge and Jansen avenues and Wicker place, and objections of H. R. Kretschmar, by Benjamin F. Gerding, attorney; John V. Lamarche and others, by Truman H. Baldwin, attorney, and Fred. E. Camp and others, by Jos. A. Flannery, attorney, referred back to the Board of Assessors at meeting of December 23, 1902, to take further proof as to the benefit derived by the property lying outside of the sewerage district and also in regard to the fair cost of the work were presented by the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, having been returned by the said Board under date of February 11, 1903.

The objections of Charles H. Dooley, No. 418 West Fifty-fifth street, owner, filed with the Chief Clerk of the Board of Revision on March 24, 1903, were also presented.

The Assessors reported that, after a further hearing and personal inspection, the Board at a meeting directed that a special reduction be made of the assessment on Lot No. 150, Block 3402, of 50 per cent., and that part of Lot No. 161 up to Lot No. 60, Block 3402, be reduced one-half, for the reason that this land is very much below the level of the present sewer; and that the list thus revised be again forwarded to the Board of Revision with the recommendation that such reduction be approved by that Board.

Mr. Joseph A. Flannery, attorney for Frederick E. Camp and others, who was heard at meeting of December 23, 1902, was again heard in opposition to the assessment on the ground that the cost of the work is excessive and also the expenses connected therewith; that the assessment exceeds the benefit derived by the property of his clients, and that the assessment is inequitably distributed.

Mr. Vreeland of the Board of Assessors was heard in explanation of the action of the said Board.

On motion of the Corporation Counsel, the assessment was laid over for further consideration, and the Assessors were requested to furnish a statement or report in the matter.

The assessment list for paving One Hundred and Thirty-ninth street from Lenox to Seventh avenue with asphalt block pavement and objections of Hannah Landman and others, by John C. Shaw, attorney, were presented by the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, having been received from the Board of Assessors under date of February 19, 1903.

Mr. Shaw, attorney, was heard, and objected to the amount included in the assessment for setting new curb and old curb, for the reason that said work is not authorized by the ordinance for the improvement.

On motion of the Corporation Counsel the matter was laid over and the Chief Clerk of the Board was directed to communicate with the Borough President, requesting that the Engineer of the Department attend the next meeting of the Board to make explanation in regard to the necessity for the work to which objection is made.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the assessment list for sewer in One Hundred and Thirty-sixth street, between Broadway and Amsterdam avenue, and objections of John O. Baker and the Hebrew Benevolent and Orphan Asylum, by Joseph A. Flannery, attorney, having been received from the Board of Assessors under date of February 19, 1903.

Mr. Flannery was heard in opposition to the assessment on the ground that it is excessive and greater than the benefit derived by the property of his clients, and also that the expenses for surveying, inspection and interest amount to more than twenty-six per cent. of the cost of the contract.

On motion of the Corporation Counsel the assessment list was referred back to the Board of Assessors, with instructions to make a reduction of 12 1-2 per cent. in the ratable cost of the assessment, all the members voting in the affirmative.

The assessment list for paving Thirty-third street, from a point distant about 21 feet 6 inches west of the west house line of First avenue to a point about 360 feet east of the east house line of First avenue, with asphalt pavement, and objections of L. Kaufman, by Mulqueen & Mulqueen, attorneys, and New York Steam Company and others, by John C. Shaw, attorney, referred back to the Board of Assessors at meeting of August 26, 1902, for further examination and consideration of the objections raised by John C. Shaw, attorney, and to obtain the opinion of the Corporation Counsel with reference thereto, were presented by the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, having been returned by the Board of Assessors, together with the opinion of the Corporation Counsel of November 21, 1902, under date of February 19, 1903.

Mr. Shaw was heard in opposition to the assessment on the ground that the property is assessed for paving the portion of the street between the rail tracks in the said street; that the work of taking up and regulating the old pavement and the setting of the

curb was not authorized by the ordinance, and also that the assessment is a repave-ment.

On motion of the Corporation Counsel the assessment list was laid over until the next meeting and Mr. Shaw and Mr. Mulqueen, attorneys, were requested to submit briefs in support of their objections.

BOROUGH OF THE BRONX.

The assessment list for regulating, grading, curbing, flagging, laying cross-walks, building approaches and placing fences in St. Paul's place, from Fulton avenue to Webster avenue, and objections, referred back to the Board of Assessors at meeting of December 23, 1902, with instructions to reduce the entire assessment twenty-five per cent. of the ratable cost of the same, were presented by the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, having been returned by the Board of Assessors under date of March 5, 1903.

The Assessors stated that the only objection to the assessment, as revised, was made by E. S. Kaufmann, Attorney for S. & M. Mendelsohn, for the reason that no flagging had been laid in front of Lot No. 9, Block 2896, whereas the return of the Bureau of Highways showed that 406 square feet of flagging had been laid in front of said lot. In returning the assessment list the Board of Assessors transmitted a communication of the President of the Borough of The Bronx, dated February 16, 1903, enclosing copy of report made by the Engineer of Highways, in which he states that the flagging charged against the lot in question was laid, and that the quantities are correct.

No one appearing in opposition, after notice, on motion of the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, the objections filed to the assessment were overruled and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members voting in the affirmative.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the assessment list for regulating, grading, curbing and flagging East One Hundred and Seventy-eighth street, from Lafontaine avenue to Hughes avenue, and objections of H. Hoefer, owner, No. 1988 Arthur avenue, received from the Board of Assessors under date of March 12, 1903.

No one appearing in opposition, after notice, on motion of the Corporation Counsel, the objections filed were overruled and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members voting in the affirmative.

BOROUGH OF MANHATTAN.

The assessment list for alteration and improvement to sewer in One Hundred and Twenty-sixth street, between Seventh avenue and summit west of Lenox avenue, and objections of James M. Horton and others, by John C. Shaw, attorney; E. Y. Jacobus, Peter Miller, C. H. Meyer, J. M. Horton, Julia M. Jennings, A. B. Marshall and another; Charles F. Buxton, referred back to the Board of Assessors at meeting of December 30, 1902, with instructions to reduce the ratable cost of the assessment to the sum of \$1 per front foot on the lots embraced therein, excepting Map No. 40, Lot No. 8, in Block 190, and that the amount of the total reduction made be charged against the said described property, were presented by the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, having been returned by the said Board under date of March 19, 1903, together with the objections of Frederick Hollender to the assessment as revised, memorandum, etc., filed by Mulqueen & Mulqueen, attorneys. Transcript of testimony taken before the Board of Assessors; brief filed by John C. Shaw, attorney; exhibits, etc.

Mr. Mulqueen, attorney, was heard in opposition to the excessive sum of \$4,785.23 which had been charged against the property of Mr. Hollender, and claimed that the sewer in question had been built to take the place of the old one, which was in bad condition; and being small in size, was frequently obstructed, causing the backing up of water at times into the cellar of Mr. Hollender's property to his great injury, and also that the new sewer was not built solely for the benefit of the bathing establishment of Mr. Hollender, as had heretofore been stated, as the water used therein is discharged into the sewer in One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street.

Mr. Shaw, attorney, was heard, and stated that the complaints with regard to the inadequacy of the old sewer came from Mr. Hollender, and that no complaint could be traced to any of the other owners or occupants on the block; that the original sewer was entirely adequate for its purpose, and was not in bad condition, and also that whatever obstruction there was to the flow of the sewage was due to the grease and refuse from Mr. Hollender's restaurant.

On motion of the Corporation Counsel, decision was reserved and the assessment list was laid over, and Mr. Mulqueen and Mr. Shaw, attorneys, were requested to submit briefs in said matter.

At 1.05 o'clock p. m., on motion, the Board adjourned.

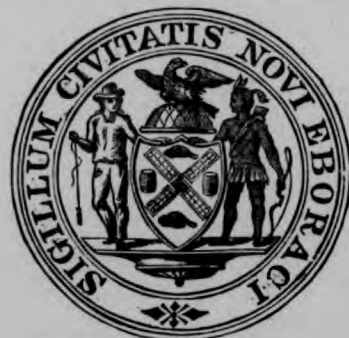

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department, and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be included in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either included in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
