"Captains—To be the same as for Inspectors, except that instead of the blue-black velvet band, the space between the two lower welts shall be covered by a band of lustrous black mohair braid."

"Sergeants—To be the same as for Captains, with the following exceptions: the lustrous mohair braid to be omitted; the chin strap to be of black patent leather, fitted with a leather keeper of the same material, secured at both ends by small gilt regulation buttons, one on each side, immediately back of the ends of the vizor."


