

Section 180. Whenever a nuisance in any place at or upon any premises in the City of New York, shall have been found or declared by resolution of the Board of Health to exist, and an order shall have been made directing the owner or lessee of such premises to make suitable and necessary repairs or improvements, or to abate the said nuisance, such repairs or improvements shall be made, and such nuisance shall be fully abated in the manner directed by the Board of Health, within five days after notice thereof.

Section 190. All sinks, basins, and stationary tubs in every hotel, I dging, tenement, or boarding-house in the City of New York, shall be provided with proper stench traps directly under each sink, basin or stationary tubs, so connected with the waste or soil-pipe, and so constructed as directed or approved by the Board of Health, and with the traps so adjusted as to prevent the escape therefrom of foul odors and gases.

Section 191. All privy vaults in the yard of any house in the City of New York, within twenty feet of any dwelling, shall be ventilated by means of an eight-inch earthenware pipe, laid at least six inches below the surface of the yard, from the said vault to the nearest wall of the building.
