

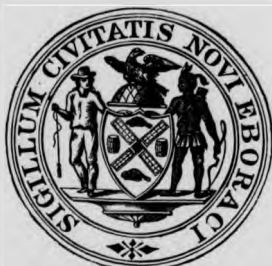

DEAR SIR—Annexed I beg leave to submit to your Honorable Board my report for the quarter ending March 31, 1887, the number of prisoners received and discharged, the labor on which they have been employed, and the result accomplished during the quarter.

Blacksmiths—Made 42 screw bedsteads, 3 circular ash-sifters, 1 flat cart, 6 hand trucks, 1 coffin stand for Morgue; 1 lattice work and desk frame, 6 feet 4 inches high, 9 feet 4 inches wide, with door, locks and keys; 1 iron gate, 6 feet high, 3 feet 5 inches wide, with spring lock; 2 bunk frames, 59 feet long, 6 feet wide, with cross-bars, legs, etc.; 5 double cot-frames, 33 single cot-frames, 57 stonecutters' steel drills, 48 steel points, 90 feathers, 108 plugs, 2 chisels, 146 wedges, 1 drag with 6 prongs, 3 ice hooks, 1 axe, 91 new tires on wheels, 108 hub bands, 48 hooks, 10 keys, 39 handles, 13 hawsps, 23 braces, 50 standards, 60 straps, 600 rivets, 16 spindles, 2 steel dressers, 2 steel calkers, 48 pick-axes, 4 shaft irons, 1 plate and clamp, 13 leaves in springs, 16 clips, 12 couplings, 2 ash pans, hoe blades, 1 slice bar, 1 tube rod, 4 iron shoes, 2 iron rakes, 110 spikes; also all necessary repairs to vehicles belonging to the Department, and sharpened all steel tools used in stone shed and quarry.

Carpenters—Made 12 flat cart, 8 hand-trucks, 6 hand-barrows, 22 wheelbarrows, 1 cart rung, 39 buckets, 225 pails, 1,464 coffins, 5 medicine chests, 2 refrigerators, 3 wardrobes, 32 tables, 6 head rests, 4 bed screens, 900 tallies, 1 mallet, 420 clothes pins, 14 snow shovels, 24 checker boards, 24 wisp-broom handles, 9 pail racks, 22 benches, 12 bed stands, 6 wash stands, 6 clothes horses, 1 bread-box, 13 salt-cells, 25 flower-boxes, 265 bed blocks, 20 pairs blinds; remade 12 dressing cases; repaired 10 ambulances, 22 wheels, 8 wagons, 4 trucks, 1 coach, 1 pair shafts, 4 vans, 14 wheelbarrows, 105 barrels; recovered 18 tubs, 9 buckets, 55 chairs, 47 shoe-lasts, 3 boats, 4 boxes, 3 stools, 13 pails, 42 iron bedsteads painted.

Harnessmakers—Made 12 surcingle, 12 saddle pads, 48 breeching straps, 7 restraining belts, 12 hame-straps, 3 bridles, 6 pairs reins, besides repairing a lot of miscellaneous articles of harness.

Tinsmiths—Made 1,587 mess-pans, 300 dish-pans, 53 coal hods, 111 tin pails, 2 bake-pans, 10 sprinkling-cans, 300 pint cups, 380 quart cups, 200 wash basins, 104 dippers, 100 dust-pans, 24 soup-cans, 18 feet stove-pipe, 3 elbows, 4 suction pumps, 24 kettles, 2 ice-boxes lined, 2 clothes boilers, 5 water coolers, 36 funnels, 3 coffee-pots, 3 strainers, 20 galvanized buckets, 60 feet ridge moulding, 12 dressing boxes, 36 tablets, 2 canisters, 9 cans, 2 ash shovels, 5 broilers, 7 saucepans, 23 shaving cups, 2 tea-kettles, 128 hooks; repaired 110 cups, 128 mess-pans, 80 watering-cans, 2 oil-cans, 20 coffee-cans, 3 tin pails, 1 dust-pan, 4 coal hods, 14 dippers, and repaired roof of prison, Warden's house, bake-house, Lunatic Asylum, Homoeopathic Hospital and Insane Asylum.

Broommakers—Made 208 dozen brooms and 2 dozen wisp-brooms.
Shoemakers—Made 1,720 pairs men's and 2,260 pairs women's shoes; repaired 1,475 pairs men's and 70 pairs women's shoes.

Tailors and Cotmakers—Made 390 pairs woolen pants, 233 woolen jackets, 372 woolen caps, 417 pairs mittens, 150 cot-bottoms, 500 men's shirts cut; repaired 631 jackets, 960 pairs pants, 509 vests, 48 caps, 266 cot bottoms.

At the Sewing-room the female prisoners made 1,450 pillow-cases, 562 sheets, 1,002 towels, 350 wrappers, 6 overalls, 1,192 shirts, 400 chemises, 156 petticoats, 150 dresses, 516 shrouds, 950 night-gowns, 301 pillow-ticks, 12 bed-ticks, 50 pairs crib blankets, 318 aprons, 50 spreads, 100 sacques, 150 pairs drawers, 6 saddle pads, 2,290 pairs women's shoes bound; repaired 2,153 shirts, 1,117 sacks, 407 undershirts, 615 dresses, 524 chemises, 325 petticoats, 303 pillow-ticks, 25 pairs stockings.

By prisoners employed in the stone shed the following amount of stone was cut: 574 feet building stone, 220 feet corner stone, 314 feet water table, 89 feet window jambs, 358 feet curb-stone, 60 feet belt-stone, 65 feet pier-stone, 8 feet of steps.

By prisoners employed at out-door labor the roads and sea-wall have been kept in proper repair, 581 tons of coal have been unloaded from barges, 520 tons of coal loaded on barges and sent to Bellevue Hospital.

The average daily number of male convicts during the quarter has been 816, employed as follows:

52 men at Randall's Island unloading and loading barges of coal, digging a trench 100 feet long, 10 feet deep, 4 feet wide, repairing roads and walks and quarrying.
97 men stone-cutting.
52 " stone-breaking for macadamizing purposes.
125 " quarrying and hauling out stone.
45 " blacksmiths and helpers.
24 " tin-smiths and tin-roofers.
83 " shoemakers, tailors, broom and cot makers.
74 " carpenters, painters, coopers, upholsterers and harness makers.
46 " gardeners and cleaning buckets.
8 " whitewashing cells.
12 " cleaning dormitory.
8 " painting at Charity Hospital.
29 " carting manure and repairing roads.
15 " repairing roofs and digging sewers at Ward's Island.
20 " continually sick in hospital.
7 " disabled and locked in cells.
112 " in and about prison, cleaning, etc.
7 " cutting clothes for various institutions.

CITY PRISON, NEW YORK, April 1, 1887.

The following improvements and repairs have been made at City Prison from January 1 to March 31, 1887, by prison labor and without expense to the Department of Public Charities and Correction, except the cost of the material:

Painted 6 rooms, 3 halls and parts of cells and corridors in new prison; repaired roof of prison. Repaired water-pipes, bath-tubs, water-closets, tin boilers, stoves, etc., and placed new faucets in water-pipes.

Build several brick walls, pillars and doorways and plastered rooms.

Placed new floors in rooms, built several wooden doors, closets, etc.

Repaired iron doors, locks on cell doors and wire screens on cell doors.

Carpenters—Made 6 doors, 7 stands, 1 chair, 1 instrument case, 8 pairs of crutches, 1 operating table, 54 dozen swab sticks, 2 meat boxes, 3 meat boards, 1 bread box, 2 bread boards, 3 dozen splints, 1 table, 1 clothes box, 13 chair bottoms, 4 chair backs, 3 medical closets, 1 stepladder, 9 bed screens, 1 pair of boat davits, 1 gang plank, 1 wardrobe, 2 water-trap covers, 2 ironing boards, 1 medicine box, 60 feet flooring, 90 feet shelving, 1½ dozen clothes hooks, 5 window poles, 1 clothes rack, 2 towel rollers, 4 water-closet seats, 2 shelves, 1 partition, 1 coal-box screen, 1 tube drain, 1 bath-tub, 1 tray. Repaired 204 stools, 81 chairs, 28 windows, 40 blinds, 25 doors, 6 water-closets, 3 bed screens, 2 head rests, 3 tables, two ice boxes, 1 coal-box, 1 gate, 1 clothes box, 60 feet of dock, 1 wardrobe, 1 water-trap cover, 1 clothes horse, 1 ironing board, 1 bath-tub, 1 meat board, 1 operating chair; put on 60 sash cords, 6 locks, 8 knobs, 8 pairs hinges, 10 dozen brass corner plates; sharpened 25 knives and 12 pairs scissors.

Painters—Painted 20 rooms, 17 closets, 9 wardrobes, 9 medicine closets, 6 medicine boxes, 6 chests, 23 chairs, 6 stools, 33 signs, 19 tables, 15 doors, 19 windows, 103 steam-pipes, 29 heaters, 12 cans, 73 window blinds, 7 screens, 32 frames, 7 bedsteads, 5 water-closet seats, closet and two partitions in Maternity Pavilion, 2 offices, 2 kitchens, 1 alleyway, halls and stairways of central building; one female ward painted and calcimined; gas-pipes on first and second floors bronzed; stained 9 floors; put in 172 lights of glass.

Tinsmiths—Made 7 funnels, 12 wash-basins, 2 douche cups, 2 2-quart pails, 3 pans, 2 sauce pans, 4 bed-warmers, 6 wash-basins, 3 dippers, 2 glue pots, 2 graters, 1 ladle, 6 galvanized-iron coal hods, 1 coffee-pot, 1 8-quart pail, 1 splint, 1 galvanized-iron swivel top, 1 large galvanized-iron pan, 1 strainer, 1 4-quart pan, 1 pie plate, 6 galvanized-iron garbage pails, 6 pitchers, 4 evaporating pans, and marked and repaired a large quantity of miscellaneous tinware.

Carpenter work—Erecting 75 feet of fence, 9 feet high; repairing floors, 52 chairs, 30 bed-springs, 10 screens, 20 pairs inside blinds, floors in Bureau Out-Door Poor; making 22 pairs crutches, 6 water-bed frames; building bridge to Morgue.

Male Help—Employed as stretcher-carriers, also in Store-room, Drug Department and Cook-house.

Female Help—Employed in laundries and as scrubbers throughout the building.

The convalescent male patients have been employed in keeping the wards in good order, delivering bread to the several wards, delivering coal and removing ashes, etc.

The convalescent female patients have been employed in keeping their wards in order and making and repairing the clothing and bedding of the Institution, as per annexed statement.

The Workhouse help have been employed as follows, viz.: 1 as fireman, 1 as blacksmith, 2 as carpenters, 1 as helper to storekeeper, 1 as messenger, 1 in filling and trimming lamps, 1 as steam-fitter and plumber, and 1 as painter.

LABOR REPORT.

The male patients have been employed as follows: 17 in the kitchen, 1 as carpenter, 1 as painter, 3 to assist the Engineer, 2 in laundry (at work too laborious for female patients), and 36 at out-door labor. The latter have screened and delivered coal to the several pavilions and hospital wards, removed all ashes and garbage from same, making and repairing roads, conveying soiled clothing and bedding from pavilions and wards and returning same when laundered, removing snow and ice from the roads, removing freight from steamboat to store-room, trimming trees and preparing the grounds for cultivation during the coming season.

Of the female patients an average number of 190 have engaged at housework, sewing and knitting (as per appended list), 9 have been employed in scrubbing, daily, the offices, dining-room, store, drug-store, male employees' apartments and hospital wards; 3 as cook, chambermaid and waitress for the assistant physicians, and 27 in the laundry.

The number of pieces washed and ironed amounted to 51,416 for the Asylum, 16,487 for Hart's Island Hospital and 4,944 for the medical staff of Insane Asylum, Ward's Island, making a total of 72,847 articles.

The Carpenter, with his assistants, has been employed in making and putting up storm-doors and repairing the old ones, has removed partition in hall of Pavilion E, made new hand-rail for stoop of Pavilion 2, repaired large ice-box, made one large book-case for assistant physician's office and large document closet for the clerk's office, kept in good order the woodwork and all the furniture of both institutions.

The Engineer, and his fireman and assistants, have been employed in disconnecting and removing bath-tub from the first floor of Laundry, making hot and cold water connections with Engineer's apartments, repairing inspirator and pumps, repairing radiator in male patients' dormitory, putting up a new ventilator on Pavilion 2, keeping the sewers and service-pipes free from obstructions, making and fitting keys and repairing locks, repaired large wrench for steamer "Fidelity," and, at intervals, overhauled and cleaned the large and small boilers.

The Blacksmith has repaired stoves, stove-guards, coal-scuttles, hand-carts, wheelbarrows, tools, etc.

The Tinsmith has repaired stove-pipes, cans, kettles, coffee and tea pots, mess boxes and kitchen utensils generally, has kept in repair the tin roofs and leaders of both institutions, made new ventilator for Pavilion 2, made 2 large coffee strainers for kitchen and several street-lamps.

The Painter and his assistants have painted the seclusion cells of Pavilion 3, the brick work of stove platforms, stoops, storm-doors, water-tanks, small row-boat, bath and wash tubs, grained two large book-cases in the office, and put in window-glass, where required, throughout the institutions.

The Plasterer has been employed in repairing the ceilings and walls of the pavilions and preparing materials for the construction of asphalt walks.

IDIOT SCHOOL, RANDALL'S ISLAND, April 1, 1887.

Hon. H. H. PORTER, President Department Charities and Correction:

SIR—I respectfully inform your Honorable Board that for the quarter ending March 31, 1887, the following amount of work was performed by the male pupils of this school:

Fifty (50) door-mats were made and forwarded to the General Storekeeper, Blackwell's Island, besides they have made one extra size mat for the Randall's Island ferry-boat. Total, fifty-one (51) mats.

The female pupils have made forty-one (41) dresses which were returned to the Steward of Randall's Island Hospitals. In addition to the making of their dresses, they have worked two hundred and fifty (250) button-holes.

The materials for the Kindergarten which your Honorable Board so kindly sent, have been put in practice as a daily exercise of the school, with, I am pleased to say, encouraging results. As the initial step has just been taken in some of its objects, I will reserve, and give in detail how much they have accomplished in this direction, in my next quarterly report.

The placing of an experienced matron, Mrs. Quin, in charge of the Idiot Asylum, will, I am sure, result in a better order of things than in the past. The interest shown by Mrs. Quin in the changes I have proposed that the children be classified with special regard to their intelligence as to their sleeping and play-rooms, taking care to keep the epileptics entirely separated from the others and not permitting some of the better class of children to mingle with the epileptics and attend to their wants, as has been the custom heretofore, must necessarily bring about an improvement. I am happy to say that the proposed changes meet with the approval of the Medical Superintendent, Dr. Healy. The co-operation of all for the object in view, "the welfare of the children," cannot fail to promote a perfect discipline in the institution. In the near future I intend to extend the afternoon session of the industrial branches of the school to 3 o'clock each day.

On motion, ordered to be placed on file, action being taken where necessary, as stated, to wit:

From H. Yonge, Jr., Agent Ocean Steamship Company of Savannah—Requesting permission to make changes in the plans prepared for rebuilding Pier, new 35, North river. The action of the President in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report was approved.

From George De Forest Lord, attorney—In reference to lease for the Cunard Steamship Pier. From T. H. Thorn & Co.—Desiring to be informed if the Manhattan Railroad Company own or lease the bulkhead foot of Sixty-first street, East river. The President authorized to advise that the said railroad company are not the owners or lessees of the said bulkhead.

From The New York Floating Secondary Dry Dock Company—Requesting to be informed if any reservation was made in the sale of lease of Pier 43, East river, for the portion of Pier now occupied by them under permit.

From Cornell Steamboat Company—Requesting repairs to Pier, old 34, North river. The Engineer-in-Chief directed to examine and report the cost of making the necessary repairs to said pier.

From New York Steam Company:

ESTIMATES FOR THE ABOVE WILL BE RECEIVED at the office of the Commissioner of Public Works, No. 31 Chambers street, in the City of New York, until 12 o'clock M. of TUESDAY, APRIL 26, 1887, at which place and time they will be publicly opened by said Commissioner and estimate.

Any person desiring to submit the above shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed "Estimate for furnishing the illuminating material, for lighting and extinguishing, cleaning, repairing, and maintaining the public lamps," and also with the name of the person making the same, and the date of its presentation.

Bidders are required to state in their estimates their names and places of residence; the names of all persons interested with them, and, in no other person be so interested, to the effect that they shall execute the contract; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making any estimate for the same supplies and work; and that it is in all respects fair, and without collusion or fraud; and, also, that no member of the Common Council, head of a Department, Chief of a Bureau, Deputy thereof, or Clerk therein, or other officer of the Corporation, is directly or indirectly interested therein, or in the supplies or work to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof; which estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party making the same, that the several matters stated therein are in all respects true. Where more than one person is interested in the execution of the contract, the estimate must be subscribed by all the parties interested.

Each estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders of the City of New York, with their respective places of residence, to the effect that if the contract be awarded to the person or persons making the bid or estimate, they will, on its being so awarded, become bound as his or their sureties for its faithful performance; and that if he or they shall omit or refuse to execute the same, they will be liable to the Corporation any difference between the sum to which he or they would be entitled upon its completion, and that which the Corporation may be obliged to pay to the person to whom the contract may be awarded at the subsequent letting; the amount in each case to be calculated upon the estimated amount of the work by which the bids are tested. The consent above mentioned shall be accompanied by the oath or affirmation, in writing, of each of the persons signing the same, that he is a household or freeholder in the City of New York, and is worth the amount of security required for the completion of the contract, and stated in the proposals, over and above all his debts of every nature, and on any and all demands, as bail, surety, and otherwise; and that he has offered himself as a surety in good faith, and with an intention to execute the bond required by law.

Bidders are required to state in their estimates the district or several streets, avenues, piers, parks and places, or parts of streets, avenues, piers, parks and places in which they propose to perform the requirements herein contained, and also the illuminating or candle-power of the lights they propose to furnish, when tested at a distance of not less than one mile from the place of manufacture.

Bidders are also required to state the price per year for which they will furnish the lights for the period from May 1, 1887, to April 30, 1888, both days inclusive; stating the price, for the above-named period of one year, for each lamp.

Bidders proposing to furnish electric lights must state the kind or system of light they propose to furnish (whether the Voltaic Arc or Incandescent); also the candle power of the electric light by photometric test made in one direction, and which for arc lights shall be made at an angle of 30 degrees from the horizontal. They must also state whether the electric lamps are to be used on the ordinary lamp-posts of the lamps to be supplied, or on the lamp-posts fitted up by the bidder without cost to the city for such lamp-posts or their fittings. If the light is to be by the "Voltaic Arc," the bidder must state the number of such lamps to be used for lighting the streets or district in which the bid is made, and the diameter of the carbon electrodes to be used in such lamps.

The bidders are required to write out the amount of their bids in their estimates, in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Should any alteration or any attachment be required to any portion of the lamps for which estimates are made in consequence of the use of illuminating material other than that specified in the contract, the bidder must submit an attachment placed on the lamps without expense to the city.

The number of hours the lamps are to be kept burning during the contract is 3,850 hours.

NOTICE TO CROTON WATER CONSUMERS.

NUMEROUS APPLICATIONS HAVE BEEN made to this Department by citizens claiming reductions or rebates on bills for water supplied through meters, on the alleged ground of leakage caused by defective plumbing and worn-out service pipes, or by willful waste of water by tenants allowing the faucets to be turned on in full force in water-closers, sinks, etc., without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the premises.

The main object of the use of water-meters is to enable this Department to detect and check the useless and unwarrantable waste of an element so valuable and essential to the health and comfort of all the citizens, and this object can only be accomplished by enforcing payment for the water wasted.

Under the law all charges for water supplied through meters are a lien against the respective premises, and the law therefore holds the owner of the premises responsible for the amount of water used or wasted. Notice is therefore given to all householders that, in all further applications for reduction of water rents, no allowance will be made on account of waste of water occurring through leaks, from defective service pipes or plumbing, or wasteful use of water by tenants or occupants of buildings, through leakage or waste, unless such waste has occurred without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the buildings.

House-owners are further notified that whenever their premises become vacant, and are likely to remain vacant, they must notify this Department in writing, and that unless this requirement is complied with no deductions in extra water rents will be allowed for any portion of one year.
