## AQUEDUCT COMMISSION.

*Minutes of Special Meeting of the Aqueduct Commissioners, held at their office, No. 209 Stewart Building, on Monday, July 30, 1888, at 2 o'clock P. M.*

Present—Commissioner Dowd, the Commissioner of Public Works, and Commissioners Baldwin, Barnes and Ridgway; also Chief Engineer Church, Deputy Chief Engineer Rice and Consulting Engineer Fiteley.

Vice-President Dowd in the chair.

The minutes of the stated meeting of July 18 and of the adjourned meeting of July 19, 1888, were read and approved.

The Committee of Finance and Audit reported their examination and audit of Voucher No. 3780, being estimate for work done by Smith & Brown, contractors, during the month of June; and, on motion of Commissioner Baldwin, the same was approved and ordered certified to the Comptroller for payment.

The Comptroller, under date of July 21, 1888, gave notice of the issue of warrants for the payment of vouchers not certified to by the Aqueduct Commissioners, for—

A communication was received from William F. Shunk, under date of July 18, 1888, and one from Joseph P. Davus, under date of July 21, 1888, two of the Engineers appointed by the Aqueduct Commissioners to take into consideration and report upon the advisability of constructing the Quaker Bridge Dam.

On motion of Commissioner Ridgway, the same were ordered placed on file.

A communication was received from the firm of Brown, Howard & Co., dated July 19, 1888, informing the Commissioners as to the persons who compose the members of said firm. On motion of Commissioner Ridgway, the communication was ordered filed.

The Secretary gave notice of the filing of a copy of a claim and lien by John W. Rodgers and Edward J. Farrell against Heman Clark and O'Brien & Clark, contractors on the New Aqueduct. On motion of Commissioner Barnes, the same was ordered filed.

The Commissioners then adjourned.

*Minutes of the First Meeting of the Aqueduct Commissioners Appointed Pursuant to the Provisions of Chapter 584 of the Laws of 1888, held at their Office, No. 209 Stewart Building, on Wednesday, August 1, 1888, at 3 o'clock P. M.*

Present—The Mayor, Honorable Abram S. Hewitt; the Comptroller, Honorable Theodore W. Myers; the Commissioner of Public Works, General John Newton, and Commissioners, General James C. Duane, Francis M. Scott and Walter Howe.

On motion of the Comptroller, the Mayor was elected temporary Chairman of the Commissioners.

The Secretary then read a communication received from the Mayor, transmitting the following certificate:

MAYOR'S OFFICE, NEW YORK, July 31, 1888.

I, Abram S. Hewitt, Mayor of the City of New York, do hereby certify that, pursuant to the provisions of chapter 584 of the Laws of 1888, I have appointed Gen. James C. Duane, John J. Tucker, Francis M. Scott and Walter Howe Aqueduct Commissioners, for the purposes mentioned in said act, and in chapter 490 of the Laws of 1883 and chapter 337 of the Laws of 1886.

ABRAM S. HEWITT, Mayor.

The communication and certificate were ordered filed.

The Mayor then stated that it was his opinion that the President of the Commission should be one of the members whose whole time and attention should be given to the construction of the Aqueduct, and who shall be entirely free from the pressure of other official duties.

On motion of Comptroller Myers, General James C. Duane was then unanimously elected President.

On motion of the Comptroller, John C. Sheehan was elected temporary Secretary.

The minutes of the special meeting of the late Aqueduct Commissioners, held on Monday, July 30, 1888, were then read and approved.

The following report, adopted by the Committee on Construction of the late Commissioners, was then read:

The Committee on Construction report that they have had under consideration the bids received for deepening and finishing Shaft No. 24 on Section A of the New Aqueduct, and, on motion of the Commissioner of Public Works, the following resolution is presented for adoption by the Aqueduct Commissioners:

Resolved, That the contract for deepening and finishing Shaft No. 24, on Section A of the New Aqueduct, be and the same is hereby awarded to the firm of O'Brien & Clark at their bid, it being the lowest received for said work, and below the estimate of the Chief Engineer for doing said work.

On motion of the Mayor, the report and the subject matter thereof was referred to the President, the Commissioner of Public Works and Commissioner Scott for their examination and report thereon.

The Committee also reported in favor of the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved, That upon the recommendation of the Chief Engineer, the additional leave of absence, with pay, granted to F. N. Speyer, Assistant Engineer on the Fifth Division, on account of sickness, for one month, from June 25 to July 28, 1888, is hereby approved.

On motion of the Mayor, the resolution was adopted.

The Committee also presented the resignation of Timothy Ryan, Inspector of Masonry.

On motion of Commissioner Newton, the same was accepted.

The Committee also reported in favor of the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved, That the following-named persons be and they are hereby appointed Inspectors of Masonry, they having passed the required Civil Service examination, as well as an examination conducted by an Engineer of this Commission under the direction of the Chief Engineer.

On motion of the Mayor, the resolution was adopted.

A communication was received from the Chief Engineer, recommending that John Gorman, now an Axeman upon the New Aqueduct, be promoted to a Rodman, subject to the examination prescribed by the rules of the Civil Service Commission.

On motion of Commissioner Scott the same was approved.

A communication was received from the Chief Engineer, recommending that an appropriation of \$1,080 be made for the purpose of purchasing eighteen iron top covers for shafts that are required on the New Aqueduct.

On motion of the Mayor, the Chief Engineer was directed to invite bids or proposals for furnishing the iron top covers referred to in said communication, and report to the Commissioners as soon as possible.

The Commissioner of Public Works, by D. Lowber Smith, Deputy Commissioner, under date of July 24, 1888, presented forms of contract, specifications and bonds for furnishing 48-inch stop-cock valves to be used on the New Aqueduct.

In connection therewith the Mayor moved the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved, That the form of contract, specifications and bond submitted by the Commissioner of Public Works on the 1st day of August, 1888, for furnishing and manufacturing, fitting, placing, etc., ten 48-inch stop-cock valves and gearing at the gate-house at One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street and Convent avenue, on Section 15, and four 48-inch stop-cock valves and gearing to be used at the blow-off at Shaft No. 25, on Section 12, and one 48-inch stop-cock valve and gearing to be used at the new gate-house on Section 1 of the New Aqueduct, be and the same are hereby approved and adopted, and the Secretary is hereby directed to have triplicate copies thereof prepared for certification by the Aqueduct Commissioners and by the Counsel to the Corporation as to form, and filed in accordance with section 25 of chapter 490 of the Laws of 1883.

Adopted.

By the Mayor—

Resolved, That the President and Secretary be and they are hereby directed to advertise in the CITY RECORD, New York "Star" and New York "Tribune" the notice and advertisement inviting sealed bids or proposals for furnishing 48-inch stop-cock valves, as provided for in the contract and specifications this day approved and adopted by the Aqueduct Commissioners. Adopted.

The Commissioner of Public Works, under date of August 1, 1888, presented forms of contract, specifications and bonds for building an iron-lined masonry aqueduct near Shaft 30 on Section 14 of the New Aqueduct.

In connection therewith, the Mayor moved the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved, That the forms of contract, specifications and bonds this day submitted by the Commissioner of Public Works for building an iron-lined masonry aqueduct near Shaft 30 on Section 14 of the New Aqueduct, be and the same are hereby approved and adopted, and the Secretary is hereby directed to have triplicate copies of said forms of contract, specifications and bonds prepared for certification by the Aqueduct Commissioners and by the Counsel to the Corporation as to form, and filed in accordance with section 25, chapter 490, Laws of 1883.

Adopted.

By Commissioner Newton—

Resolved, That the President and Secretary be and they are hereby authorized and directed to publish in the CITY RECORD and two daily papers published in the City of New York, a notice and advertisement inviting sealed bids or proposals for building an iron-lined masonry aqueduct near Shaft 30 on Section 14 of the New Aqueduct, as called for in the forms of contract approved by the Aqueduct Commissioners on the 1st day of August, 1888. Adopted.

The Secretary submitted a report showing that on August 1, 1888, the total amount credited to the Additional Water Fund, including bonds issued and premiums received thereon, amounted to \$19,444,881.20; and that of this amount there had been paid to contractors on their several contracts and agreements for the construction of the New Aqueduct the sum of \$15,517,993.33; and that after deducting the amount paid for land and land damages, salaries, supplies, etc., and the amount paid by the Commissioners of Appraisal for lands acquired for Aqueduct purposes, there remained to the credit of the Additional Water Fund the sum of \$1,561,372.72; and that the ten per cent. retained from the estimates for contract work certified to the Comptroller amounted to \$1,695,759.66.

The report was ordered filed.

The Comptroller presented the following resolution, and moved its adoption:

Resolved, That the Chief Engineer be and he is hereby requested to report to this Board at its next meeting the names of the Inspectors employed by the Aqueduct Commissioners, the places where they are employed in the actual work of inspection, the progress of the work done by the contractors at the various places where such Inspectors are at work, and whether by reason of the approaching completion of the work in many of the sections, the services of some of the Inspectors or other employees may not judiciously be dispensed with.

Adopted.

On motion of the Comptroller, the President was requested to appoint a committee of three to report at the next meeting on the proper organization of the Commission and the different committees of the Commission.

The Mayor moved as an amendment that the Committee consist of the President and Commissioners Scott and Howe. Carried.

Commissioner Scott then moved that when the Commissioners adjourn they adjourn to meet on Friday next, 3d instant, at 11 o'clock A.M. Carried.

The Commissioners then adjourned.

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH of the Health Department of the City of New York, held at its office, No. 301 Mort street, January 27, 1888, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That section 13 of the Sanitary Code be and is hereby amended so as to read as follows:  
Sec. 13. That no owner or lessee of any building, or any part thereof, shall lease or let, or hire out the same or any portion thereof, to be occupied by any person, or allow the same to be occupied, as a place in which, or for any one, two or more lodges, except when said buildings or such parts thereof are sufficiently lighted, ventilated, provided and accommodated, and are in all respects in that condition of cleanliness and wholesomeness, for which the Code or any law of the State provides, or in which they or either of them require any such premises to be kept. Nor shall any such person rent, let, hire out, or allow, having power to prevent the same to be used, or for a place of sleeping or lodging, or any portion or apartment of any building, which apartment or portion has not at least one foot of its height and space above the level of every part of the sidewalk and curbstone of any adjacent street, nor of which the floor is damp by reason of water leaking from the roof, or which is impregnated or penetrated by any offensive gas, smell, or exhalation prejudicial to health. But this section shall not prevent the leasing, renting, or occupancy of cellars or rooms elevated above the ground, and as a part of any building rented or let, when they are not let or intended to be occupied or used by any person as a sleeping apartment, or as a principal or sole dwelling apartment.

## REGULATIONS ESTABLISHING A SCALE OF WATER RENTS AND RULES GOVERNING THE USE OF WATER, FOR THE CITY OF NEW YORK, BY ORDER OF JOHN NEWTON, COMMISSIONER OF PUBLIC WORKS.

### UNDER CHAPTER 410, LAWS 1882, SECTIONS 350, 351, 352 AND 353, and as amended by chapter 559, Laws 1887.

The Commissioner of public works shall, from time to time, establish scales of rents for the supplying of water, which rents shall be collected in the manner now provided by law, and the same shall be apportioned to different classes of buildings in said city in reference to their dimensions, values, exposure to fires, ordinary uses for dwellings, stores, shops, private stables and other common purposes, number of families or occupants, or consumption of water, as near as may be practicable, and modify, alter, amend and increase such scale from time to time, and extend it to other descriptions of buildings and establishments. All extra charges for water shall be included in the regular rents, and shall be paid by the owner or tenant of the buildings when they are respectively imposed, and, if not paid, shall be returned as arrears to the clerk of arrears. Such regular rents, including the extra charges above mentioned, shall be collected from the owners or occupants of all such buildings respectively, which shall be situated upon lots adjoining any street or avenue in said city in which the distributing water-pipes are or may be laid, and from which they can be supplied with water. Said rents, including the extra charges aforesaid, shall become a charge and lien upon such houses and lots, respectively, as herein provided, but no charge whatever shall be made against any building in which a water-main shall have been or shall be placed as provided in this act. In all such cases the charge for water shall be determined only by the quantity of water actually used as shown by said meters.

The said Commissioner of public works is hereby authorized to prescribe a penalty not exceeding the sum of five dollars for each offense, for permitting water to be wasted, and for any violation of such reasonable rules as he may, from time to time, prescribe for the prevention of the waste of water; such fines shall be added to the regular water rents.

The regular annual rents to be collected by the Department of Public Works shall be as follows, to wit:

The rent of all tenements which shall exceed in width fifty feet shall be the subject of special contract with the Commissioner of Public Works.

The apportionment of the regular rents upon dwelling-houses are on the basis that but one family is to occupy the same, and for each additional family, one dollar per year shall be charged.

METERS will be placed on all houses where waste of water is found, and they will be fixed at rates fixed by the Department for all the water passing through them.

The extra and miscellaneous rates shall be as follows, to wit:

BAKERIES.—For the average daily use of flour, for each barrel, three dollars per annum.

BARBER SHOPS shall be charged from five to twenty dollars per annum each in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works: an additional charge of five dollars per annum shall be made for each bathtub.

BATHING TUBS in private houses, beyond one, shall be charged at three dollars per annum each, and five dollars per annum each in public houses, boarding-houses, and bathing establishments. Combination sanitary wash-tubs, having a movable division in the center and capable of use for bathing, shall be charged the same as bathing tubs.

BUILDING PURPOSES.—For each one thousand bricks laid, or for stone-work—to be measured as brick-tens cents per thousand. For plastering, forty cents per hundred yards.

COWS.—For each and every cow, one dollar per annum.

DINING SALOONS shall be charged an annual rate of from five to twenty dollars, in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

FISH STANDS, retail shall be charged five dollars per annum.

For all stables not metered, the rates shall be as follows:

HORSES, PRIVATE.—For two horses there shall be charged six dollars per annum; and for each additional horse, two dollars.

HORSES, LIVERY.—For each horse up to and not exceeding fifty in number, one dollar and fifty cents each per annum; and for each additional horse, one dollar.

HORSES, OMNIBUS AND CART.—For each horse, one dollar per annum.

HORSE TROUGHS.—For each trough, and for each half barrel or tub on sidewalk or street, twenty dollars per annum; each trough is to be fitted with a proper ball-cock to prevent waste.

HOTELS AND BOARDING HOUSES shall, in addition to the regular rate for private families, be charged for each lodging room, at the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

LAUNDRIES shall be charged from eight to twenty dollars per annum, in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

LIQUOR AND LAGER BEER SALOONS shall be charged an annual rate of ten dollars each. An additional charge of five dollars per annum shall be made for each room or wash-box.

PHOTOGRAPH GALLERIES shall be charged an annual rate of from five to twenty dollars, in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

PRINTING OFFICES, when not metered, shall be charged at such rates as may be determined by the Commissioner of Public Works.

SODA, MINERAL WATER AND ROOT BEER FOUNTAINS shall be charged five dollars per annum each.

STREAM ENGINES, where not metered, shall be charged by the horse-power, as follows: For each horse-power up to and not exceeding ten, the sum of ten dollars per annum; for each exceeding ten, and not over fifteen, the sum of fifteen dollars and fifty cents; for each over fifteen and not over twenty, the sum of twenty dollars.

WATER-CLOSETS AND URINALS.—To each building on a lot one water-closet having sewer connection is allowed without charge; each additional water-closet or urinal will be charged as hereinafter stated. All closets connected in any manner with sewer shall be charged two dollars for each seat per annum, whether in a building or on any other portion of the premises. Urinals shall be charged two dollars per annum each.

WATER-CLOSET RATES.—For hoppers of any form, when water is supplied direct from the Croton supply, through any form of the so-called single or double valves, hopper-cocks, self-closing cocks, or any valve or cock of any description attached to the closet, each, per year, twenty dollars.

For any pan closet, or any of the forms of valve, plunger, or other water-closet not before mentioned, supplied with water as above described, per year, ten dollars.

For any form of hopper or water-closet, supplied from the ordinary style of cistern filled with ball-cock, and overflow pipe that communicates with the pipe to the water-closet, so that overflow will run into the hopper or water-closet, when ball-cock is defective, or from which an unlimited amount of water can be drawn by holding up the handle, per year, each, five dollars.

For any form of hopper or water-closet, supplied from any of the forms of waste-preventing cisterns, that are approved by the Engineer of the Croton Aqueduct, which are so constructed that no more than three gallons of water can be drawn at each lift of the handle, or depression of the seat, if such cisterns are provided with an overflow pipe, such overflow pipe must not connect with the water-closet, but be carried in a safe waste, as provided by the Board of Health regulations, per year, two dollars.

Cistern answering this description can be seen at this Department.

### METERS.

Under the provisions of section 352, Consolidated Act 1882, water-meters, of approved pattern, shall be hereafter placed on the pipes supplying all stores, workshops, hotels, manufactories, public edifices, at wharves, ferry-houses, stables, and in all places where water is furnished for business consumption, and private dwellings.

It is provided by section 352, Laws of 1882, that "all expenses of meters, their connections and setting, water rates, and other lawful charges for the supply of Croton water, shall be a lien upon the premises where such water is supplied as now provided by law."

All manufacturing and other business requiring a large supply of water will be fitted with a meter.

Water measured by meter, ten cents per one hundred cubic feet.

The rate charged for steam-vessels taking water daily or belonging to daily lines, is one-half cent per ton (Custom House measurement) for each time they take water.

Steamers taking water other than daily, one cent per ton (Custom House measurement).

Water supplied to sailing vessels and put on board, twenty-five cents per hundred gallons.

All matters not hereinbefore embraced are reserved for special contract by and with the Commissioner of Public Works.

HYDRANTS, HOSE, TROUGHS, FOUNTAINS, ETC., ETC.

No owner or tenant will be allowed to supply water to another person or persons.

All persons taking water from the City must keep their own service-pipes, street taps, and all fixtures connected therewith, in good repair, protected from frost, at their own risk and expense, and shall prevent all waste of water.

The use of hose to wash coaches, omnibuses, wagons, railway cars or other vehicles or horses, cannot be permitted.

No horse-troughs or horse-watering fixtures will be permitted in the street or on the sidewalk, except upon a license or permit taken out for that purpose. All licenses or permits must be annually renewed on the first of May. Such fixtures must be kept in good order and the water not allowed to drip or waste by overrunning the sidewalk or street, or to become dangerous in winter by freezing in and about such troughs or fixtures.

No hydrant will be permitted on the sidewalk or in the front area, and any hydrant standing in a yard or alley, or turned to any dwelling or other premises, shall not be left running when not in actual use, and if the drip or waste from such hydrant freezes and becomes dangerous in winter, the supply will be shut off in addition to the penalty of five dollars imposed.

Taps at wash-basins, water-closets, baths and urinals must not be left running, under the penalty of five dollars for each offense, which will be strictly enforced.

Fountains or jets in hotels, porter-houses, eating-places, confectioneries or other buildings are strictly prohibited.

The use of hose for washing sidewalks, stoops, areas, horse-fronts, yards, court-yards, gardens, and about stables, is prohibited. Where premises are provided with wells, special permits will be issued for the use of hose, in order that the police or inspectors of this department may understand that the permission is not for the use of Croton water.

Opening fire-hydrants to fill hand sprinklers or other vessels will not be allowed.

The penalty for a violation of any of the preceding rules and regulations will be five dollars for each offense, and if not paid when imposed will become a lien upon the premises in the manner as all other charges for unpaid water rates.

## PUBLIC NOTICE AS TO WATER RATES.

**PUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN** that in compliance with the provisions of chapter 559, Laws of 1887, amending sections 350 and 351 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, and chapter 559, Laws of 1887, the following changes are made in charging and collecting water rents:

1st. All extra charges for water incurred from and after June 9, 1887, shall be treated, collected and returned in arrears in the same manner as regular rents have heretofore been treated.

2d. In every building where a water meter or meters are now, or shall hereafter be in use, the charge for water by meter measurement shall be the only charge against such building, or such part thereof as is supplied through meter.

3d. The returns of arrears of water rents, including the year 1887, shall be made as heretofore on the confirmation of the tax levy by the Board of Aldermen, and shall include all charges and penalties of every nature.

4th. A penalty of five dollars (\$5) is hereby established, and will be imposed in each and every case where the rules and regulations of the Department prohibiting the use of water through hose, or in any other water-measuring device, are violated, and such penalty will be entered on the books of the Bureau against the respective buildings or property, and, if not collected, be returned in arrears in like manner as other charges for water.

5th. Charges for so-called "extra" water rents of every nature, imposed or incurred prior to June 9, 1887, will be canceled of record on the books of the Department.

## NOTICE TO CROTON WATER CONSUMERS.

**NUMEROUS APPLICATIONS HAVE BEEN** made to this Department by citizens claiming reductions or rebates on bills for water supplied through meters, on the alleged ground of leakage caused by defective plumbing and worn-out service pipes, or by willful waste of water by tenants allowing the faucets to be turned on full force in water-closets, sinks, etc., without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the premises.

The main object of the use of water-meters is to enable this Department to detect and check the useless and unnecessary waste of an element so valuable and essential to the health and comfort of all the citizens, and this object can only be accomplished by enforcing payment for the water wasted.

Under the law all charges for water supplied through meters are a lien against the respective premises, and the law therefore holds the owner of the premises responsible for the amount of water used or wasted.

Notice is therefore given to all householders that, in all further applications for reduction of water rents, no allowance will be made on account of waste of water occurring through leaks, from defective service pipes or plumbing, or wasteful use of water by tenants or occupants of buildings, though such leakage or waste may have occurred without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the buildings.

House-owners are further notified that whenever their premises become vacant, and are likely to remain vacant, they must notify this Department in writing, and that unless this requirement is complied with no deductions in extra water rents will be allowed for any portion of one year.
