



LEGISLATIVE DEPARTMENT.

SPECIAL MEETING.

BOARD OF ALDERMEN.

MONDAY, November 21, 1887,
1 o'clock P. M.

The Board met in special session in their chamber, room No. 16, City Hall, for the consideration of the Provisional Estimate for the year 1888.

The President having called the Board to order, Alderman Mooney moved to dispense with the calling of the roll.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said motion.

Which was decided in the affirmative.

Alderman Mooney then moved that the Board take a recess until 2 o'clock P. M.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said motion.

Which was decided in the affirmative.

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On motion of Alderman Quinn, the Board went into Committee of the Whole, for the consideration of the Provisional Estimate for the year 1888, being number 632 on the list of General Orders, and the President designate the Chairman of the Committee.

The President called Alderman Quinn to the chair.

After some time spent therein, the Committee, on motion of Alderman Van Rensselaer, arose, and the President took the chair.

Alderman Quinn, Chairman of the Committee of the Whole, reported as follows:

The Committee of the Whole, having had under consideration the Provisional Estimate for conducting the public business of the City and County of New York for the year 1888, have made thereto the following amendments, which I am instructed to report to the Board for adoption, viz:

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS.

Sewers—Repairing and Cleaning, increase from \$150,000 to \$190,000.

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC CHARITIES AND CORRECTION.

Distribution of Coal to Out-door Poor, increase from \$20,000 to \$30,000.

HEALTH DEPARTMENT.

Health Fund—For Payment to Board of Police, increase from \$54,400 to \$54,800, in order to increase salary of Sergeant of Police.

POLICE DEPARTMENT.

Salaries—Sergeants of Police, strike out \$1,600 and insert \$2,000 for each, and increase total amount from \$254,400 to \$318,000.

Salaries—Detective Sergeants, increase from \$1,600 each to \$2,000 each, increasing total from \$64,000 to \$80,000.

Add For the Purchase of thirty Police Patrol Wagons, sixty Horses and Harness, and Stabling for one year (chapter 596, Laws of 1886), \$55,000.

DEPARTMENT OF STREET CLEANING.

Sweeping above Fourteenth Street, increase from \$225,000 to \$250,000.

FIRE DEPARTMENT.

Add For Placing Fire-alarm Electric Conductors Underground, \$100,000.
Add New Houses for Engine and Hook and Ladder Companies, \$100,000.

BOARD OF EDUCATION.

For Salaries of Janitors in Grammar and Primary Schools, including Additional Janitors, increase from \$131,000 to \$137,000.

Add For Additional Evening High School for Males in the Twelfth Ward (chapter 119, Laws of 1887), \$8,000.

BUREAU OF ELECTIONS.

Compensation of Clerks to Board of County Canvassers, increase from \$2,000 to \$3,000.

THE JUDICIARY—SALARIES—CITY COURTS.

Police Courts, increase salary of four Stenographers \$500 each, increasing amount from \$61,000 to \$63,000.

The President announced that the report of the Committee of the Whole was now before the Board for its action.

Whereupon Alderman Van Rensselaer, under the provisions of Rule VIII. of the Rules and Orders of the Board, as interpreted by the President, asked consent to amend the report of the Committee by reducing the appropriation for "Supplying Coal to the Out-door Poor," from \$30,000 to \$20,000, in the Department of Public Charities and Correction.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree to consent to consider the amendment.

Which was decided in the negative on a division called by Alderman Dowling, as follows:

Affirmative—Aldermen Conkling, Sanford, and Van Rensselaer—3.

Negative—The President, Vice-President Divver, Aldermen Cowie, Dowling, Farrell, Flynn, Long, Mooney, Joseph Murray, Oakley, Quinn, Tait, and Walker—13.

Alderman Van Rensselaer also asked consent to amend the report of the Committee of the Whole, by reducing the appropriation to the Department of Street Cleaning, "For Sweeping above Fourteenth Street," from \$250,000 to \$225,000.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree to grant the consent asked. Which was decided in the affirmative.

Whereupon Alderman Van Rensselaer then moved to amend the report of the Committee of the Whole, as stated above.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said amendment.

Which was decided in the affirmative.

The President then put the question whether the Board would agree to adopt the Provisional Estimate for the year 1888, as amended or rectified.

Which was decided in the affirmative on a division, as follows:

Affirmative—Vice-President Divver, Aldermen Conkling, Corcoran, Cowie, Dowling, Farrell, Flynn, Long, Mooney, Joseph Murray, Oakley, Quinn, Sanford, Tait, Van Rensselaer, and Walker—16.

At a meeting of the Board of Docks, held November 10, 1887.
Present—Commissioners Stark and Marshall.
Absent—Commissioner Matthews.
The minutes of the meetings held November 3 and 4, 1887, were read and approved.
A communication from General John Newton, Commissioner of Public Works, inclosing copy of report of the Engineer in Charge of Sewers, respecting the obstructions in the roadway in East Seventy-sixth street, between Avenue A and the East river, was,
On motion, laid on the table, and the Secretary directed to send a copy of said report to the Dock Master of the district for examination and report.
The following communications were received, read, and,
On motion, ordered to be placed on file, action being taken where necessary, as stated, to wit:
From Department of Street Cleaning—In reference to cleaning certain piers on the North river. Referred to Commissioner Marshall.
From Health Department—Requesting a conference. The action of Commissioner Marshall in requesting Commissioner James C. Hayes to call on Wednesday, November 9, 1887, was approved.
From Department of Public Works—Requesting permission to drive piles for foundation for new Dog Pound at One Hundred and Second street, Harlem river. The action of the President in issuing a permit, the work to be done under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department, was approved.
From Department of Public Charities and Correction—Requesting that the landing-place above Seventy-sixth street, East river, be provided as soon as possible. The action of the President in sending copy of said communication to the Engineer-in-Chief was approved.
From Comptroller of the City—Approving sureties of Ranald Gillies.
From New York, Lake Erie & Western R. R. Co.—Requesting permission to repair ferry racks at Chambers street, North river. The action of the President in issuing a permit, the work to be done under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief, was approved.
From Hoboken Land and Improvement Co.—Requesting permission to repair ferry racks at Fourteenth street, North river. The action of the President in issuing a permit, the work to be done under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief, was approved.
From John Gillies—Requesting use of Department bracing pile driver. The action of the President in granting said request was approved.
From W. H. Hand—Agreeing to the terms and conditions for the erection of a pile platform on the Harlem river, near One Hundred and Fortieth street, Mott Haven Canal.
From Central Railroad Company of New Jersey—Requesting permission to rebuild the dock back of the north ferry rack at Pier 15, North river. The action of the President in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report was approved.
From W. R. Grace & Co.—Acknowledging receipt of permit for tally-house on Pier 13, East river.
From United States Engineer's office—Acknowledging receipt of a copy of the Annual Report.
From Old Dominion Steamship Company—Requesting copy of communication sent by the Department, dated June 6, 1887. The Secretary directed to comply with said request.
From Maine Steamship Company—Reporting that they are about ready to commence the building of platform at Pier 38, East river.
From A. A. Hayes, general superintendent of the Standard Gas-light Company—Renewing application for lease of the bulkhead between One Hundred and Fourteenth and One Hundred and Fifteenth streets, Harlem river, with the right to collect wharfage. The President authorized to advise that, as the bulkhead thereat will not be completed before March 1, 1888, the Board do not desire to lease the premises so far in advance of its completion.
From New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company—Requesting permit to construct an extension to the northerly fender-rack of their freight transfer bridge now erected at foot of West Sixty-ninth street, North river. The action of the President in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report was approved.
From David W. Bogert, Dock Master—Reporting favorably on the application of James P. Nestor for permission to retain tally-house on bulkhead foot of Franklin street, North river. Permit granted, to be and remain during the will of the Board.

From Charles B. Husted, Dock Master:
1st. Reporting that Piers at Bogart and Bloomfield streets, North river, have not yet been cleaned. Referred to Commissioner Marshall.
2d. Reporting holes in deck of Pier foot of West Eighteenth street, North river. The action of the President in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and repair, if necessary, was approved.
From Engineer-in-Chief:
1st. Reporting assignment of employees to special duty.
2d. Reporting that he had relieved Watchman John McDougal from suspension and restored him to work, and recommending that his action be approved.
On motion, his action was approved.
3d. Reporting that he had directed that Laborers, Acting Watchmen, Francis Quinn and Alexander McVitty shall not be again assigned to duty as Acting Watchmen for having been found asleep while on duty, and recommending that his action be approved.
On motion, his action was approved.
4th. Reporting the amount of work done during the week ending November 5, 1887.
5th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 7041, that he had resheathed the north half (City's portion) of the deck of Pier, old 34, North river, and reporting cost of same. The Treasurer authorized to make a bill for \$450.16, and collect said amount from the lessees of the premises.
6th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 7066, in reference to the application of John A. Tieman for permission to retain boat-house berthed at One Hundred and Thirty-second street, North river. The President authorized to advise Mr. Tieman that the said boat-house stands on land under water belonging to the City, and that the compensation for the use of said premises must be paid to this Department and not to the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company.
7th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 7086, in reference to the request of Owens & Co. for dredging at the bulkhead foot of Forty-seventh street, East river. The action of the President, in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to make requisition for dredging to the extent of about four hundred cubic yards to obtain a depth of about ten feet at mean low water, as recommended in his report, was approved. The action of the President, in requesting the Department of Public Works to connect the gutters on each side of said street with the sewer, as recommended by the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department, was approved.
8th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 7089, condition of bulkhead west of Corlears street, East river. The action of the President in notifying the lessees to repair as recommended by the Engineer-in-Chief, and under his direction and supervision, was approved.
9th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 7113, repairs required to sheathing on deck of Pier 48, East river. The action of the President in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to repair as recommended in his report, at a cost of about \$75, was approved.
10th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 7095, dredging required in the half slip north of the pier at foot of Eighty-sixth street, East river. The action of the President in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to make requisition for dredging to the extent of about five hundred cubic yards, to obtain a depth of ten feet at mean low water, as recommended in his report, was approved.

A communication from the Counsel to the Corporation in relation to the water-front on the East river, from Sixth to Thirteenth street, was
On motion, ordered to be placed on file, and the following preamble and resolution was adopted:
Whereas, a resolution of this Board was adopted on the sixth day of October, 1887, requiring the several persons possessing or occupying piers or other structures at the ends of Sixth, Seventh, Eighth, Ninth, Eleventh and Thirteenth streets, on the East river or adjacent thereto, and within the limit between Sixth and Thirteenth streets, or possessing or occupying land under water or made land adjacent to the water-front at the ends of the said streets or within the limits aforesaid belonging to the City of New York, to vacate the same and to remove the structures erected or occupied by them, of which resolution due notice has been given to the several persons aforesaid so far as they have been ascertained, but they have not complied with such requirement.
Resolved, That the Counsel to the Corporation be and he is hereby requested to take such legal proceedings as may be proper against any and all persons occupying, possessing or claiming City property on or near the East river, between the end of Sixth street and the end of Thirteenth street, for the recovery and placing the City in possession thereof and for the recovery of damages for detaining or using or occupying the same.
The report of the Engineer-in-Chief on Secretary's Order No. 7156, in reference to the application of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company for permission to construct an extension to the northerly fender-rack of their freight transfer bridge erected at the foot of West Sixty-ninth street, North river, for a distance of one hundred and twenty feet within the lines of the new pier, was,
On motion, ordered to be placed on file, and the following preambles and resolutions were adopted:
Whereas, A resolution was adopted at a meeting of the Board of Docks on the 4th day of May, 1887, which read as follows:
"Resolved, That permission be and hereby is granted to the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company to erect and maintain between West Sixty-eighth and Sixty-ninth streets, North river, that kind of a pier called a "Freight Transfer Bridge and Racks," in accordance with the plans submitted thereto, which are hereby approved; and all of the work to be done under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department, in accordance with the resolution adopted by the Board April 28, 1880"; and
Whereas, Application has been made by the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company for permission to construct an extension to the northerly fender-rack of said "Freight Transfer Bridge" for a distance of one hundred and twenty feet within the lines of the new pier, under plans and specifications submitted; and
Resolved, That permission be and hereby is granted to the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company to make the extension asked for, provided it be constructed within the lines of the pier, established by resolution of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund passed on the 27th of April, 1880, and in conformity with the plans which have been submitted to and approved by this Board; and further provided, that the work of said extension shall be done under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department; and that the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company shall, within ten days from date, file with the Department a written agreement to the terms and conditions of the foregoing resolution.
The following preamble and resolution was,
On motion, adopted:
Whereas, A resolution was adopted at a meeting of the Board of Docks on the 28th July, 1887, which read as follows:
"Resolved, That permission be and hereby is granted to the Maine Steamship Company to drive piles and to build a temporary platform about thirty-six feet along the bulkhead and about forty-five feet along the pier adjoining the westerly or lower side of Pier 38, East river, and to erect and construct a temporary shed thereon for the protection of property received and discharged thereat, all of the said work to be done under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department, and upon plans and specifications to be first submitted to and approved by the Board; provided, that the said Maine Steamship Company agree to pay as compensation for the use of the land under water occupied by said platform twenty-five cents per square foot per annum during the existence of said platform, to be paid monthly in advance to the Treasurer of this Department; and it is also specially provided and understood that this permit is for a temporary platform and shed only, and that it is revocable at any time by the Board governing the Department of Docks; and further provided, that this permit shall not take effect until the petitioners have filed a written agreement satisfactory as to form with the Board governing the Department of Docks, to the effect that they will assent to and comply in all particulars to the conditions aforesaid, and will at any time within twenty days from receiving written notice from the Board of Docks so to do, remove any and all structures of every kind that may be built and erected under this permit, and restore the premises to the same condition that they are in at date hereof."
And whereas, It appears that the Maine Steamship Company have failed to file a written agreement to remove any and all structures within twenty days after date of notice from this Department, as provided for in the foregoing resolution;
Resolved, Therefore, that the resolution above cited be and hereby is cancelled and revoked, to take effect on and after this date, November 10, 1887.
Resolved, That permission be and hereby is granted to the Maine Steamship Company, to drive piles and build a temporary platform about thirty-six feet along the bulkhead, and about forty-five feet along the pier adjoining the westerly or lower side of Pier 38, East river, for the reception and

delivery of property in charge of said company, all of the said work to be done under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department, and upon plans and specifications which have been submitted to and approved by the Board; provided that the said Maine Steamship Company agree to pay as compensation for the use of land under water occupied by said platform, the sum of twenty-five cents per square foot per annum, to be paid monthly at the end of each month to the Treasurer of this Department; and it is specially understood and provided that this permit is for a temporary platform only, and that it is revocable at any time by the Board governing the Department of Docks, and is to remain only during the will and pleasure of said Board; and further provided, that this permit shall not take effect until the petitioners shall, within ten days from the date of this resolution, file a written assent to the terms and conditions of the resolution, and an agreement in form satisfactory to the Board of this Department, that they will at any time and within twenty days after receiving written notice from the Board of Docks so to do, remove any and all structures of every kind that may be built and erected under this permit, and restore the premises to the same condition that they are in at date hereof.

If the appointing officer shall notify the Secretary of more than one vacancy at any one time, the Secretary shall certify to the appointing officer for appointment, the names of as many persons as there are vacancies to be filled, with the addition of two names for the first vacancy and one name for every two vacancies in addition to the first.

The main object of the use of water-meters is to enable this Department to detect and check the useless and unwarrantable waste of an element so valuable and essential to the health and comfort of all the citizens, and thereby to save the public money which is expended in the purchase of water.

Under the law all charges for water supplied through meters are a lien against the respective premises, and the law therefore holds the owner of the premises responsible for the amount of water used or wasted.

Notice is therefore given to all householders that, in all further applications for reduction of water rents, no allowance will be made on account of waste of water occurring through leaks, from defective service pipes or plumbing, or wasteful use of water by tenants or occupants of buildings, though such leakage or waste may have occurred without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the buildings.

House-owners are further notified that whenever their premises become vacant, and are likely to remain vacant, they must notify this Department in writing, and that unless this requirement is complied with no deduction of extra water rents will be allowed for any portion of one year.
