

GENTLEMEN-I have examined the plot of ground 18 feet 10 by 44, adjoining the westerly side of Horatio street school, and find the property worth six thousand dollars. The same is 18 feet 10 by 44. The piece upon the easterly side, 168 by 88, is worth ten thousand five hundred dollars. Eightieth street, south side, 150 feet east of Third avenue (No. 3), 25 by 100, small two-story frame in front, and two-story brick stable on rear. Improvements of little value. Land, \$10,000; \$10,500 with building. Eightieth street, south side, 175 feet east of Third avenue (No. 4), 24 by 100, small one-story frame in front, and three-story brick stable on rear. Land, \$10,000; building \$2,500-\$12,500; sav. \$13.000.

say, \$13,000. South side, Forty-sixth street, 200 feet west of Sixth avenue. This plot contains about 17,127 square feet, and as a plot, with the improvements such as now used, I am of the opinion it would sell for about the price asked, but it must be well known that when the school is erected it will adjoin a livery stable on the east and west and on the south, fronting Forty-fifth street; also, that this particular block would not be desirable to locate a female school.

this particular block would not be desirable to locate a female school. Fifty-fourth street, 425 feet west of Sixth avenue, 25 by 1 00.5, \$24,000. To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment: Herewith I present a resolution adopted by the Board of Education on June 18, 1890, requesting this Board to transfer the sum of \$2,081.48 from an appropriation entitled "Public Instruction— For Salaries of Teachers and Janitors in Evening Schools," for 1889, and the sum of \$5,018.52, from the same entitled appropriation for 1890, or \$8,000 in all, to an appropriation to be entitled "Public Instruction—For an Evening High School in the Nineteenth Ward." Three evening high schools for males are established in other localities, viz. : One in One Hun-dred and Twenty-fifth street, between Second and Third avenues, with an average attendance of 700 ; one in Norfolk street, Tenth Ward, with an average attendance of 900. The young men who attend these schools are engaged in occupations during the day, which prevent them from attending school at any other time than in the evening, and it is extremely important that provision should be made to give them the opportunity of education in those studies which will make them intelligent and useful citizens. The location in the Nineteenth Ward in Sixty-third street, between Second and Third

The location in the Nineteenth Ward in Sixty-third street, between Second and Third avenues, where the proposed evening high school is to be established, is one where a school is much needed, being distant from all the schools above referred to as already established. It is important that it shall go into operation immediately, and if the Board of Estimate and Apportionment considers it advisable to provide for an evening high school in the Nineteenth Ward, to be established in the fall of 1890, there is an unexpended balance of \$2,081.48 in the appropriation entitled "Public



P. : DEAR SIR—Answering your favor 17th inst., will say that I cannot tell how long present Mac-Comb's Dam Bridge can be kept in service; so far as the new bridge over the river is concerned, certainly another year, since the surveys are yet to be made, the structure to be planned and work prepared for letting, which involves several months before any work can be commenced. So far as the present bridge interferes with viaduct much work can be done before working at that point; still, if the contractor demands possession of the grounds for working on the Mac-Comb's Dam lane abutment I cannot refuse (as he is working under a penalty contract), in which case the west span and abutment of present bridge will have to be torn away, probably within the next two or three months. I presume it would be possible to put in a temporary pile structure from the draw-span around the viaduct work on the south, which would not interfere with viaduct and make present bridge available until we get to work on the new bridge; I think under this arrangement all the masonry could be put in without breaking travel, which could be retained in that case for a couple of years. case for a couple of years.

It appearing therefrom that, in case a temporary structure can be built at the southerly end of the Seventh Avenue Bridge so as not to interfere with the contractors' work, that bridge can remain in service for about two years. If the new draw was not placed in position there would be no thoroughfare for the period during which the construction of the new bridge was being continued.

SIR—In considering the communication of the Department of Public Parks, of the 28th instant, inclosing a letter from Mr. A. P. Boller, Constructing Engineer, it is necessary to bear in mind that the One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street viaduct starts, at the easterly end, at or near the same point that will be the westerly end of the new bridge, and at the same grade, and that this point is also near the westerly end of the old bridge. The viaduct is now under contract, but the new bridge has not been exactly located, the surveys and plans not having yet been completed. As stated by Mr. Boller, the contractor for the viaduct may so arrange his work as to require a certain portion of the old bridge to be torn away, in which case a temporary pile structure could be erected so as to avoid breaking travel, and it could thus remain probably for two years. How much or when the old bridge may be interfered with by the building of the new one cannot now be exactly fixed. In the meantime it is necessary to complete the draw of the old bridge the time it is not be

In the meantime it is necessary to complete the draw of the old bridge, the old draw having been condemned as dangerous. This work is now well advanced.

The estimate submitted by the Board of Police of the amount which will be required for the purpose of carrying out the provisions of the new Election Law, passed May 2, 1890, at the ensuing election, amounts to the sum of \$370,481. An appropriation for "Election Expenses," in 1890 was included in the Final Estimate for 1890, of the sum of \$220,857, besides the sum of \$32,000 appropriated for Advertising Election Districts, Election Notices by the Clerk of the Common Council and the Sheriff and other Incidental Expenses of the Election in 1890.

Expenses of the Election in 1890. The appropriation of \$220,857 for "Election Expenses" in 1890, is applicable to the expenses for which the Board of Police has submitted an estimate of \$370,481, and the difference between these two sums is an additional amount required to carry out the provisions of the new Election Law, to wit : Chapter 262, Laws of 1890, entitled "An Act to promote the independence of voters at public elections, enforce the secrecy of the ballot, and provide for the printing and distribution of ballots at public expense." The difference between the amount of the appropriation for election expenses in 1890 and the amount of the estimate of the Board of Police is \$149,624, which is the additional sum required to be provided for carrying out the provisions of the new Election Law at the ensuing election. An act to provide for the expense of conducting public elections, passed May 14, 1890, pro-vides for the expense of elections by taxation or by the issue of revenue bonds, to be redeemed from taxes of the following year. For the payment of the additional amount of expenses of the ensuing election required by the

For the payment of the additional amount of expenses of the ensuing election required by the estimate of the Board of Police over and above the appropriation made for election expenses in 1890, applicable to that purpose, revenue bonds, redeemable in 1891, may be issued. In submitting, therefore, the resolution necessary to provide the amount asked for by the Board of Police, to enable them to carry out the provisions of the new Election Law, I desire to simply state that my previous objection to a passage of a similar resolution was based entirely on a belief that this Board had no right to hastily authorize such a large additional expenditure over the usual election expenses, especially when, through protracted delay, the usual and most desirable method of advertising for bids has been rendered impossible. There is no doubt that this Board must supply the amount needed to carry out the provisions of

There is no doubt that this Board must supply the amount needed to carry out the provisions of

the law. There is also no doubt that his board must supply the amount hereded to carry out the provisions of the law. There is also no doubt, from such cursory examination as I have been enabled to make in the last few hours, that the estimate of the Police Board is reasonable under the circumstances. While, therefore, I most strongly object to the delay in the submission of this estimate which has undoubtedly entailed an expense upon the City which might have been avoided, and which has substituted for desirable open competition the system of private awards, always to be con-demned, I offer the accompanying necessary resolution, believing its passage to be imperatively required.
