First—The appropriations for the expense of conducting the business of the City government has received the most careful consideration in making the Provisional Estimate for the year 1879. Wherever it has been deemed practicable, consistently with the public interests, to reduce the appropriations over which the law has conferred upon the Board of Estimate and Apportionment any discretionary recursivities been done. cretionary power, it has been done.

The aggregate of the Provisional Estimate is \$1,671,602.25 less than the amount of the Departmental Estimates for the year 1879, and \$819,606.55 less than the amount of the appropriations in the Final Estimate for the year 1878, as shown by the following comparative table:
