BOARD OF PUBLIC IMPROVEMENTS.

The Board of Public Improvements of The City of New York met at the office of the Board, No. 21 Park row, on Wednesday, July 17, 1901, at 2 o'clock P. M., pursuant to notice.

The roll was called and the following members were present and answered to their names:

The Comptroller (Deputy Comptroller Levy), the Commissioner of Water Supply, the Commissioner of Highways, the Commissioner of Sewers, the Commissioner of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies, the President of the Borough of The Bronx, the President of the Borough of Brooklyn and the President of the Borough of Richmond.

The President, Hon. Maurice F. Holahan, presided.

The minutes of the meeting of July 10, 1901, were approved as printed.

LAYING OUT PUBLIC PLACE AT ELDERT LANE, BROOKLYN.

In the matter of the proposed laying out as a public place the land bounded by Eldert lane, Liberty avenue, Enfield street and Glenmore avenue, Borough of Brooklyn, the report of the Secretary was read, showing that the matter had been duly advertised for a hearing, as required by law.

Nobody appearing in opposition to the proposed laying out, the following resolution was adopted:

Whereas, At a meeting of this Board, held on the 26th day of June, 1901, resolutions were adopted proposing to alter the map or plan of The City of New York by laying out as a public place the land bounded by Eldert lane, Liberty avenue, Enfield street and Glenmore avenue, in the Twenty-sixth Ward, Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, and for a meeting of this Board to be held in the office of this Board on the 17th day of July, 1901, at 2 o'clock P. M., at which meeting such proposed laying out would be considered by this Board, and for a notice to all persons affected thereby of the aforesaid time and place at which such proposed laying out would be considered, to be published in the CITY RECORD and the corporation newspapers for at least ten days continuously, exclusive of Sundays and legal holidays, prior to the 17th day of July, 1901; and

Whereas, It appears from the affidavit of the Supervisor of the City Record and of the publishers of the corporation newspapers that the aforesaid resolutions and notice have been published in the CITY RECORD and the corporation newspapers for ten days continuously, Sundays and legal holidays excepted, prior to the 17th day of July, 1901; and

Whereas, At the aforesaid time and place a public hearing was given to all persons affected by such proposed laying out, who have appeared, and such proposed laying out was duly considered by this Board; now therefore be it

Resolved, That the Board of Public Improvements of The City of New York, in pursuance of the provisions of section 436 of chapter 378, Laws of 1897, deeming it for the public interest to alter the map or plan of The City of New York by laying out as a public place the land bounded by Eldert lane, Liberty avenue, Enfield street and Glenmore avenue, in the Twenty-sixth Ward, Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, does hereby favor and approve of the same so as to lay out as a public place the aforesaid land as follows:

Beginning at the intersection of the western line of Enfield street with the northern line of Glenmore avenue, as laid down on the Town Survey Commissioners' Map of Kings County, filed in the office of the Register on the 13th day of November, 1874:

1st. Thence westerly along the northern line of Glenmore avenue to its intersection with the eastern line of road known as Eldert lane.

2d. Thence northerly along the eastern line of Eldert lane to its intersection with the southern line of Liberty avenue.

3d. Thence easterly along the southern line of Liberty avenue to its intersection with the western line of Enfield street.

4th. Thence southerly in a line 60 feet from and parallel to the eastern line of Enfield street to the point of beginning.

Resolved, That the foregoing resolution, approving of the above-named proposed change in the map or plan of The City of New York by laying out a public place, adopted by this Board, together with a statement of its reasons therefor, be transmitted to the Municipal Assembly for its action thereon.

Affirmative—Commissioner of Highways, Commissioner of Sewers, Commissioner of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies, President of the Borough of Brooklyn and President of the Board.

Negative—None.

In connection with the foregoing resolution, the following form of ordinance was approved for transmission to the Municipal Assembly:

Resolved, That the Board of Public Improvements of The City of New York, in pursuance of the provisions of section 436 of chapter 378, Laws of 1897, deeming it for the public interest to alter the map or plan of The City of New York by laying out as a public place the land bounded by Eldert lane, Liberty avenue, Enfield street and Glenmore avenue, in the Twenty-sixth Ward, Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, does hereby favor and approve of the same so as to lay out as a public place the aforesaid land as follows:

Beginning at the intersection of the western line of Enfield street with the northern line of Glenmore avenue, as laid down on the Town Survey Commissioners' Map of Kings County, filed in the office of the Register on the 13th day of November, 1874:

1st. Thence westerly along the northern line of Glenmore avenue to its intersection with the eastern line of road known as Eldert lane;

2d. Thence northerly along the eastern line of Eldert lane to its intersection with the southern line of Liberty avenue;

3d. Thence easterly along the southern line of Liberty avenue to its intersection with the western line of Enfield street;

4th. Thence southerly in a line 60 feet from and parallel to the eastern line of Enfield street to the point of beginning.

After the adoption of the resolution, Mr. Fred. C. Cocheu appeared in opposition to the proposed laying out.

LAYING OUT WEST FOURTH STREET, BROOKLYN.

In the matter of the proposed laying out of West Fourth street, from Avenue U to Avenue T, Borough of Brooklyn, the report of the Secretary was read, showing that the matter had been duly advertised, as required by law.

Nobody appearing in opposition to the proposed laying out, the following resolution was adopted:

Whereas, At a meeting of this Board, held on the 26th day of June, 1901, resolutions were adopted proposing to alter the map or plan of The City of New York by laying out West Fourth street, from Avenue U to Avenue T, in the Thirty-first Ward, Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, and for a meeting of this Board to be held in the office of this Board on the 17th day of July, 1901, at 2 o'clock P. M., at which meeting such proposed laying out would be

considered by this Board, and for a notice to all persons affected thereby of the aforesaid time and place at which such proposed laying out would be considered, to be published in the CITY RECORD and the corporation newspapers for at least ten days continuously, exclusive of Sundays and legal holidays, prior to the 17th day of July, 1901; and

Beginning at a point in the northern side-line of Avenue U distant 200 feet easterly from the eastern side line of West Fifth street, as laid down on the Town Survey Commissioners' Map of Kings County, filed in the office of the Register June 17, 1874:

1. Thence northerly and parallel to the eastern side-line of West Fifth street to the southern side-line of Avenue T, as laid down on Town Survey Commissioners' Map of Kings County, filed in the office of the Register June 17, 1874;

2. The eastern side-line of West Fourth street is 60 feet from and parallel to the preceding course.

Resolved, That the foregoing resolution, approving of the above-named proposed change in the map or plan of The City of New York by laying out West Fourth street, adopted by this Board, together with a statement of its reasons therefor, be transmitted to the Municipal Assembly for its action thereon.

LAYING OUT, CLOSING, ETC., STREETS IN TWENTY-NINTH WARD, BROOKLYN.

In the matter of the proposed laying out, closing and extending of various streets in the Twenty-ninth Ward, Borough of Brooklyn, the report of the Secretary was read, showing that the matter had been duly advertised for a hearing, as required by law.

Nobody appearing in opposition, the following resolution was adopted:

Whereas, At a meeting of this Board, held on the 26th day of June, 1901, resolutions were adopted proposing to alter the map or plan of The City of New York by laying out Church avenue, from Thirty-sixth street to Ocean parkway, and the extension of Fourteenth avenue, from Thirty-fifth street to Church avenue, and of Beverley road, from East Second street to Church avenue, and of Chester avenue, from Story street to Church avenue, and of closing and discontinuing of Fourteenth avenue, from Thirty-fifth street to Beverley road, and of Story street, from Thirty-sixth street to West street; also the extension of Thirty-fifth street, from Fourteenth avenue to Church avenue, in the Twenty-ninth Ward, Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, and for a meeting of this Board to be held in the office of this Board on the 17th day of July, 1901, at 2 o'clock P. M., at which meeting such proposed laying out, closing and extending would be considered by this Board, and for a notice to all persons affected thereby of the aforesaid time and place at which such proposed laying out, closing and extending would be considered, to be published in the CITY RECORD and the corporation newspapers for at least ten days continuously, exclusive of Sundays and legal holidays, prior to the 17th day of July, 1901; and

Whereas, It appears from the affidavit of the Supervisor of the City Record and of the publishers of the corporation newspapers that the aforesaid resolutions and notice have been published in the CITY RECORD and the corporation newspapers for ten days continuously, Sundays and legal holidays excepted, prior to the 17th day of July, 1901; and

Whereas, At the aforesaid time and place a public hearing was given to all persons affected by such proposed laying out, closing and extending, who have appeared, and such proposed laying out, closing and extending was duly considered by this Board; now therefore be it

Resolved, That the Board of Public Improvements of The City of New York, in pursuance of the provisions of section 436 of chapter 378, Laws of 1897, deeming it for the public interest to alter the map or plan of The City of New York by laying out Church avenue, from Thirty-sixth street to Ocean parkway, and the extension of Fourteenth avenue, from Thirty-fifth street to Church avenue, and of Beverley road, from East Second street to Church avenue, and of Chester avenue, from Story street to Church avenue, and of closing and discontinuing of Fourteenth avenue, from Thirty-fifth street to Beverley road, and of Story street, from Thirty-sixth street to West street; also the extension of Thirty-fifth street, from Fourteenth avenue to Church avenue, in the Twenty-ninth Ward, Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, does hereby favor and approve of the same so as to lay out, close and extend the aforesaid streets as follows:

A. Church avenue locating and laying out consists of widening the present 60-foot Church avenue to 100 feet, 17 feet on each side, from the Ocean parkway to Thirty-fifth street, and by adding a strip of 17 feet on the northerly side, from Thirty-fifth street to Thirty-sixth street, making the avenue 83 feet wide for this block.

B. Fourteenth avenue to be extended from the angle point south of Thirty-fifth street to Church avenue.

C. Beverley road to be extended from East Second street and Fourteenth avenue to Church avenue.

D. Chester avenue to be extended from Story street to Church avenue.

E. Fourteenth avenue to be discontinued and closed from the angle point south of Thirty-fifth street to Beverley road and East Second street.

F. Story street to be discontinued and closed from Thirty-sixth street to West street.

G. Thirty-fifth street to be extended from the south line of the discontinued Fourteenth avenue to the south line of Church avenue.

Resolved, That the foregoing resolution, approving of the above-named proposed change in the map or plan of The City of New York by laying out, closing and extending the above streets, adopted by this Board, together with a statement of the reasons therefor, be transmitted to the Municipal Assembly for its action thereon.

Resolved, That the Board of Public Improvements of The City of New York, in pursuance of the provisions of section 436 of chapter 378, Laws of 1897, deeming it for the public interest to alter the map or plan of The City of New York by laying out Church avenue, from Thirty-sixth street to Ocean parkway, and the extension of Fourteenth avenue, from Thirty-fifth street to Church avenue, and of Beverly road, from East Second street to Church avenue, and of closing and discontinuing of Fourteenth avenue, from Thirty-fifth street to Beverly road, and of Forty street, from Thirty-sixth street to West street, also the extension of Thirty-fifth street, from Fourteenth avenue to Church avenue, in the Twenty-fourth Ward, Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, does hereby favor and approve of the same as to be laid, closed and extend the aforesaid streets as follows:

A. Church avenue located and laying out consists of widening the present 66-foot Church avenue to 100 feet, 47 feet on each side, from the Ocean parkway to Thirty-fifth street, and by adding a strip of 17 feet on the northern side, from Thirty-fifth street to Thirty-sixth street, making the avenue 84 feet wide for this block.

B. Fourteenth avenue to be extended from the angle point south of Thirty-fifth street to Church avenue.

C. Beverly road to be extended from East Second street and Fourteenth avenue to Church avenue.

D. Chester avenue to be extended from Story street to Church avenue.

E. Fourteenth avenue to be discontinued and closed from the angle point south of Thirty-fifth street to Beverly road and East Second street.

F. Forty street to be discontinued and closed from Thirty-sixth street to West street.

G. Thirty-fifth street to be extended from the south line of the discontinued Fourteenth avenue to the south line of Church avenue.

CHANGE OF GRADE OF APPROACHES TO CHURCH STREET BRIDGE, BROOKLYN.

In the matter of the proposed change of grades of the approaches to the Union Street Bridge over Gowanus canal, Brooklyn, the report of the Secretary was read, showing that the matter had been duly advertised for a hearing, as required by law.

Notwithstanding in opposition to the proposed change of grades, the following resolution was adopted:

Whereas, At a meeting of this Board, held on the 26th day of June, 1901, resolutions were adopted regarding the matter of the map or plan of The City of New York by changing the grades of the approaches to the Union Street Bridge over the Gowanus canal, from Bond street to Nevins street, in the Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, and for a meeting of this Board to be held in the office of this Board on the 17th day of July, 1901, at 2 o'clock P. M., at which meeting such proposed change of grades could be considered by this Board, and for a notice to all persons affected thereby of the proposed change of grades to be published in the CITY RECORD and the corporation newspapers for ten days continuously, exclusive of Sundays and legal holidays, prior to the 7th day of August, 1901; and

Whereas, It appears from the affidavits of the Supervisor of the City Record and of the publishers of the corporation newspapers that the aforesaid resolutions and notice have been published in the CITY RECORD and the corporation newspapers for ten days continuously, Sundays and legal holidays excepted, prior to the 17th day of July, 1901; and

Whereas, At the aforesaid time and place a public hearing was given to all persons affected by such proposed change of grades, who have appeared, and such proposed change of grades was duly considered by this Board; now therefore be it

Resolved, That the Board of Public Improvements of The City of New York, in pursuance of the provisions of section 436 of chapter 378, Laws of 1897, deeming it for the public interest to alter the map or plan of The City of New York by changing the grades of the approaches to the Union Street Bridge over the Gowanus canal, from Bond street to Nevins street, in the Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, does hereby favor and approve of the same as to change the grades of the aforesaid approaches as follows:

Beginning at the intersection of the easterly curb-line of Bond street with the center line of Union street, the elevation to be 9 feet above mean high-water datum, as heretofore;

Thence southerly in a grade of 1.45 feet, the grade to be 9.65 feet above mean high-water datum;

Thence southerly to the Union Street Bridge over Gowanus canal, the elevation to be 14 feet above mean high-water datum;

Thence southerly across said bridge, the elevation to be 14 feet above mean high-water datum;

Thence southerly to the center line of Nevins street, the elevation to be 8 feet above mean high-water datum, as heretofore.

Resolved, That the Secretary of this Board cause these resolutions, and a notice to all persons affected thereby that the proposed change of grades of the aforesaid approaches will be considered at a meeting of this Board to be held at the aforesaid time and place, to be published in the CITY RECORD and corporation newspapers for ten days continuously, Sundays and legal holidays excepted, prior to the 7th day of August, 1901.

CHANGE OF GRADE OF JAMAICA AVENUE, QUEENS.

The following report from the Chief Topographical Engineer was read:

SIR—In reply to the action taken by the Board of Public Improvements, referring for report a communication from the President of the Borough of Queens, recommending a change of grades to Jamaica avenue, between Blackwell and Kouwenhoven streets, and in Pomeroy street, between Broadway and Jamaica avenue, in the First Ward (formerly Long Island City), Borough of Queens, City of New York, I wish to state that, after a thorough investigation based on a survey, I have prepared and transmit herewith for a public hearing and adoption a map entitled "Plan and profile of Jamaica avenue, between Blackwell and Kouwenhoven streets, and Pomeroy street, between Broadway and Jamaica avenue, in the First Ward (formerly Long Island City), Borough of Queens, City of New York."

The technical description for the purpose of advertising the public hearing and papers in the matter are herewith returned.

The following resolution was then unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That the Board of Public Improvements of The City of New York, in pursuance of the provisions of section 436 of chapter 378, Laws of 1897, deeming it for the public interest to alter the map or plan of The City of New York by changing the grades of Jamaica avenue, between Blackwell and Kouwenhoven streets, and of Pomeroy street, between Broadway and Jamaica avenue, in the First Ward, Borough of Queens, City of New York, more particularly described as follows:

"A"—Jamaica Avenue.

Beginning at the intersection of Blackwell street and Jamaica avenue, the elevation to be 49.65 feet above mean high-water datum, as heretofore;

1. Thence southeasterly to the intersection of Pomeroy street, the elevation to be 57.0 feet above mean high-water datum;

2. Thence southeasterly to the intersection of Kouwenhoven street, the elevation to be 63.72 feet above mean high-water datum, as heretofore.

"B"—Pomeroy Street.

Beginning at the intersection of Jamaica avenue and Pomeroy street, the elevation to be 57.0 feet above mean high-water datum;

1. Thence southwesterly to a point distant 370 feet from the southwesterly curb-line of Jamaica avenue, the elevation to be 62.0 feet above mean high-water datum;

2. Thence southwesterly to a point distant 200 feet from the previous point, the elevation to be 61.0 feet above mean high-water datum;

3. Thence southwesterly to the intersection of Broadway, the elevation to be 53.0 feet above mean high-water datum, as heretofore.

All elevations refer to mean high water datum, as established in the Borough of Queens.

Resolved, That the President of this Board cause to be prepared, for submission to this Board, three similar maps or plans for certification and filing, in the manner required by law, showing as nearly as possible the nature and extent of the proposed change of grades of the above-named streets and the location of the immediate adjacent or of intersecting open or established public streets, avenues, roads, squares or places, sufficient for the identification and location thereof.

Resolved, That this Board consider the proposed change of grades of the above-named streets at a meeting of this Board to be held in the office of this Board on the 7th day of August, 1901, at 2 o'clock P. M.

Resolved, That the Secretary of this Board cause these resolutions, and a notice to all persons affected thereby that the proposed change of grades of the above-named streets will be

considered at a meeting of this Board to be held at the aforesaid time and place, to be published in the CITY RECORD for ten days continuously, Sundays and legal holidays excepted, prior to the 7th day of August, 1901.

APPROACH TO BRIDGE OVER BRONX RIVER AT TWO HUNDRED AND TWENTY-SECOND STREET.

SIR—In reply to the action taken by the Board of Public Improvements, referring for report a communication from the Commissioner of the Bronx, relative to acquiring land for a bridge over the Bronx river, between Williamsbridge and Woodhull station, Borough of The Bronx, I transmit herewith, for a public hearing and adoption, a map entitled "Map or plan showing the lands required for an approach to a bridge over the Bronx river at Two Hundred and Twenty-second street (formerly Eighth street)," authorized by chapter 357, Laws of 1897, in the Twenty-fourth Ward, Borough of The Bronx.

Technical description for the purpose of advertising the public hearing and papers in the matter are herewith returned.

Resolved, That the Board of Public Improvements of The City of New York, in pursuance of the provisions of section 436 of chapter 378, Laws of 1897, deeming it for the public interest to alter the map or plan of The City of New York by laying out an approach to the bridge over the Bronx river at Two Hundred and Twenty-second street (formerly Eighth street), in the Twenty-fourth Ward, Borough of The Bronx, City of New York, more particularly described as follows:

Beginning at a point in the eastern line of Webster avenue distant 1,152.25 feet northerly from the intersection of said line with the northern line of Van Hill road;

1. Thence northerly along the eastern line of Webster avenue for 500 feet;

2. Thence southerly deflection of 91 degrees 44 minutes 41 seconds to the right for 99.68 feet;

3. Thence southerly deflection of 91 degrees 44 minutes 41 seconds to the right for 203.40 feet;

4. Thence southerly deflection of 85 degrees 45 minutes 44 seconds to the left for 104.64 feet;

5. Thence southerly deflection of 85 degrees 45 minutes 44 seconds to the right for 103.28 feet;

6. Thence southerly deflection of 91 degrees 44 minutes 41 seconds to the right for 103.60 feet;

7. Thence southerly deflection of 91 degrees 44 minutes 41 seconds to the left for 104.85 feet;

8. Thence southerly for 63 feet to the point of beginning.

REDUCTION OF ASSESSMENT ON ELTON AVENUE AND ONE HUNDRED AND SIXTY-THIRD STREET, BRONX.

SIR—In reply to the action taken by the Board of Public Improvements, referring for report a communication from the President of the Borough of The Bronx, recommending that the assessments on the lot for acquiring title to Elton avenue, from East One Hundred and Sixty-first street to East One Hundred and Sixty-third street, and to East One Hundred and Sixty-third street, from Brook avenue to Third avenue, in the Borough of The Bronx, be reduced for the reasons stated in the brief and resolution signed by Samuel Cook, John George Dantel and others, I wish to state as follows:

Elton avenue and East One Hundred Sixty-third street were laid out 100 feet wide by the Commissioner of Street Improvements of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards on section 6 of the Final Maps, filed August 7, 1895. Both streets were formerly 50 feet in width and legally opened at that width.

Elton avenue, between East One Hundred and Sixty-first and East One Hundred Sixty-third streets, and East One Hundred and Sixty-third street, from Brook avenue to Third avenue, form a connecting link of East One Hundred and Sixty-third street as of Third avenue with East One Hundred and Sixty-first street west of Elton avenue. Both these streets were legally opened, and reduction in assessment for acquiring title to the same was allowed, and it is now petitioned that the assessment for acquiring title to this connecting link be reduced.

In the opening of East One Hundred and Sixty-third street easterly of Third avenue to Westchester avenue, one-half the cost was placed on the City and one-half on the owners, and in the case of East One Hundred and Sixty-first street westerly of Elton avenue to Mott avenue, three-fourths of the cost was placed on the City and one-fourth on the property-owners, a special act, chapter 627 of 1897, having been passed for this purpose.

I recommend that a public hearing be given in this matter, and that the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment appointed in this proceeding be requested to be present at such hearing.

DEAR SIR—From petitions received through the Brooklyn office of this Department and from report made thereon by the Chief Engineer, I find that it is necessary to have water-mains laid in Warehouse avenue, from Surf avenue to Neptune avenue; thence along Neptune avenue to West Twenty-third street, and south along West Twenty-third street to the Surf avenue main, and on Mermaid avenue, between West Twenty-third street and Warehouse avenue, all in the Borough of Brooklyn. The total distance for which these mains are to be laid is 4,000 feet, on which there are twelve houses requiring water supply and fire protection, and the estimated cost is \$5,100, to be paid from the "Water Main Fund, Borough of Brooklyn," for 1901.

I herewith inclose draft of a resolution for adoption by your Board, authorizing the laying of these mains, and recommend that a corresponding resolution or ordinance be transmitted to the Municipal Assembly for adoption.
