SIR—Pursuant to section 1544, chapter 176, Laws of 1897, the Police Board of the Police Department of the City of New York hereby submits the following report of the operations and transactions of the Police Department and Force for the three months ending December 31, 1900.

REPORT.

On the 31st day of December, 1900, the number of the Force, of all grades, including persons on probation (r), was 7,427.

SICK TIME.

The time lost by members of the Force by reason of sickness, disability and injuries received, for the quarter, and the details thereof, will be found in schedule annexed, marked "A," from which it will be seen that the sick time lost was 18,346 days. Sick time paid, 9,173 days; sick time unpaid, 9,173 days; total days' time of the Force was 682,392 days; per cent. of sick to full time, 2.68; for preceding quarter, 2.55; amount paid for sick time, \$35,292.93; an increase of \$5,858.75 over that paid for preceding quarter.

ARRESTS.

The total number of persons arrested by the Police Force during the quarter was: Males, 25,300; females, 5,882. Total, 31,182. Number arrested for principal felonies, 3,023; number discharged without trial, 901; number acquitted, 358; number convicted, 451; number sent to other authorities, 36; number died, 6; number pending, 1,181.

LOST CHILDREN (see Schedule "B").

Males, 351; females, 163. Total, 514. Restored to parents or guardians, 494; other dispositions, 20. Of this number there were disposed of from Central Office 328.

Schedule "B" contains a valuable collection of miscellaneous statistics, to which attention is respectfully called.

NOTE.—The discrepancy existing between the number of arrests for particular offenses in Felony Report and General Report (in Schedule "B") is accounted for by the fact that the General Report is made up from the daily returns from the station-houses and the Felony Report is made from the quarterly returns. An offense charged in the station-house at the time the arrest is made is liable to be, and often is, changed to a greater or less offense on evidence elicited before the magistrate.

DISCIPLINE OF THE FORCE.

The number of officers dismissed from the Force was 5.

The number of charges made against members of the Force and filed in the office of the Chief Clerk during the quarter was: October, 253; November, 204; December, 235. Total, 692.

The following is the number of charges disposed of during the quarter: Charges on which officers were dismissed, 18; fines, 392; reprimands, 159; complaints dismissed and withdrawn, 126. Total, 693.
