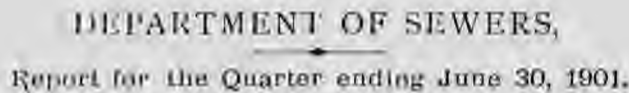

Report of Work Done in the Construction Bureau of the Department of Sewers, Borough of The Bronx, during the Quarter ending June 30, 1901.

The total length of sewers constructed in the Borough of The Bronx at the close of the quarter ending June 30, 1901, is 911,005.82 linear feet, or 172,539 miles, being divided as follows:

804,308.45 linear feet or 153.095 miles in the regular "Combined System," according to filed District Drainage Maps for the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, west of the Bronx river, and 106,697.37 linear feet or 8.844 miles in the "Separate System," specially designed for the district east of the Bronx river (or Williamsbridge) previous to annexation.

10,809.58 linear feet or 3.752 miles of sewers were constructed during the quarter (exclusive of district east of Bronx river), being divided into 3,515.62 linear feet or .666 mile of brick sewer, and 7,293.96 linear feet or 3.686 mile of pipe sewers.

The total number of receiving-basins (west of Bronx river) is 2,032, forty-two (42) having been constructed during the quarter.

1,039 linear feet or .307 mile of pipe sewers were constructed in the district east of Bronx river (or Williamsbridge) during the quarter.

One hundred and one (101) contracts were in force during the quarter.

Nineteen (19) having had final payments made during the quarter.

Twenty-seven (27) being under six months repairs throughout the quarter.

Eight (8) having been completed during the quarter.

Four (4) having been begun and completed during the quarter.

Thirty (30) being under construction throughout the quarter.

Thirteen (13) having been begun during the quarter.

Fifty-five (55) contracts were under construction during the quarter.

Thirty-nine (39) contracts under six months repairs.

Twelve (12) contracts were completed.

Seventeen (17) contracts were made.

#### MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.

AMENDMENTS TO THE RULES AND CLASSIFICATION OF POSITIONS IN THE MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

At a MEETING OF THE STATE CIVIL SERVICE Commission, held August 14, 1901, the amendments to Rules 38 and 41 of the Municipal Civil Service Rules of the City of New York, as contained in the following resolutions, adopted by the Municipal Civil Service Commission July 15, 1901, and approved by the Mayor July 31, 1901, were approved:

Resolved, That Rule 38 of the Municipal Civil Service Rules of the City of New York be amended by striking therefrom the entire fourth paragraph and substituting in lieu thereof the following:

"The test of actual service being the main factor for fitness in promotion, there shall be kept in every office continuous and comparative records of the efficiency, punctuality, attention and general good conduct of all persons employed therein. Such records shall at all times be open to inspection to the Municipal Commission for the purpose of verification, or otherwise, and if the same shall have been regularly and properly kept, they shall constitute one of the elements in such preliminary examination, with such relative weight as shall be assigned to them by the Examining Board, subject to the approval of the Municipal Commission. If such records have not been regularly and properly kept the Chief Examiner shall prescribe such tests as to him may seem best calculated to determine the relative merit and fitness of persons entitled to enter the promotion examination, subject to the approval of the Municipal Commission."

And further, that the 26th paragraph of said Rule 38 be amended to read as follows:

"It shall be the duty of the officer or officers constituting the appointing power in the Department in which a vacancy exists to make and forward to the Municipal Commission a certified copy of the record of the Department, showing the efficiency, character and conduct of every person in such inferior grade who desires to become an applicant for such promotion. The Municipal Commission shall not be bound to accept such certified copies as final, but may in their discretion call for the original records instead. The Municipal Commission or Examining Board shall have the right to call upon the appointing officer for further information upon any of the matters before them."

Resolved, That Rule 41 of said rules be amended so as to read as follows:

Rule 41, Promotion of Firemen and Policemen.

Promotions to all positions included in Schedule C shall be made from the next lower grade for ascertained merit, seniority in service and by competitive examination.

The relative weights to be given to the different elements shall be:

Twenty-five per cent. to the competitive mental examination;

Fifty per cent. to the permanent records of previous service, including efficiency, character and conduct.

Twenty-five



Steamer, or who hold a place upon the eligible list as Engineer or Steamer, shall be given special consideration in rating.

In rating for seniority 75 per cent. shall be allowed for three years' service in the grade. An additional 2 per cent. shall be allowed for each of the next five years' service (after the first two years) in the grade, and an additional 1 per cent. for each of the next twenty years' service in the grade after the first seven years.

No Fireman or Purser shall be eligible for examination for promotion who has not reached the rank of first grade in his respective position, as defined by chapter 274 of the Laws of 1897.

Wherever positions in Schedule C, for which promotion is sought, call for special or technical knowledge, not covered by the above requirements, the Examining Board may, subject to the approval of the Municipal Commission, fix such subjects as they deem appropriate and necessary, and such subjects shall conform as far as practicable to those fixed in examinations set for similar positions in other schedules.
