DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS AND FERRIES.

At an adjourned meeting of the Board of Docks held Friday, July 19, 1901, at 2 o'clock P. M. Present—The full Board.

In accordance with the resolution adopted July 1, 1901, Philip A. Smyth, auctioneer, offered for sale, on behalf of the Board, the leases of the Hamilton, South, Wall, Fulton and Catharine ferry franchises at the upset price of 5 1/2 per cent. per annum on the gross receipts of said ferries, but no bid was received therefor. The President, Commissioner Cram, then submitted a report recommending that in view of the large decrease in the gross receipts of said ferries leases of the franchises therefor be offered for sale at public auction at an upset price of 3 1/2 per cent. per annum on the gross receipts, and further recommended that no change be made in the charges for foot passengers.

On motion, by the affirmative votes of Commissioners Cram and Meyer, Commissioner Murphy voting in the negative, the recommendation of the President was adopted and the Secretary directed to prepare terms and conditions of sale of the ferry franchises in accordance therewith, and to transmit same to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for their approval.

The Board then proceeded to open estimates on Contracts Nos. 711, 712 and 713, a representative of the Comptroller being present.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the contract opened this day for preparing for and repairing and extending the Pier, with appurtenances, at the foot of West Thirtieth street, North river, under Contract No. 713, be and hereby is awarded to William H. Jenks, he being the lowest bidder, subject to the approval of the sureties, United States Fidelity and Guaranty Company and the City Trust, Safe Deposit and Surety Company of Philadelphia, by the Comptroller.

On motion, the Secretary was directed to transmit to the Comptroller the security deposits submitted by the bidders under Contracts Nos. 711, 712 and 713.

The minutes of the meeting held July 11, 1901, were approved.

The communication from the International Navigation Company, requesting that the Department extend Piers, new 14 and new 15, North river, out to the existing pierhead-line and agreeing to pay as rental therefor five per cent. per annum on the cost of the work, and that the outer end of Pier, new 14, North river, as it now exists, be repaired at the cost of the City, was, with the report of the President recommending that the application be granted, tabled until August 5, 1901.

A representative of Charles Baxter and Son, architects for Willson, Adams & Co., appeared in relation to the refusal of the Engineer-in-Chief to approve of plans for the construction of a frame building, to be used for storage purposes, south of One Hundred and Forty-ninth street, Harlem river, the Engineer-in-Chief claiming that said structures are in violation of the Building Code, being located within the fire limits.

On motion, the matter was referred to the Corporation Counsel for advice.

The communication from George W. Stephens, attorney for Church E. Gates & Co., suggesting that the Corporation Counsel take proceedings to have the tax title of the Mott Haven Land Company to certain premises on the Harlem river, in the vicinity of One Hundred and Forty-sixth street, set aside, was also referred to the Corporation Counsel.

The following reports on Secretary's Orders were referred to the Treasurer for collection:

No. 19580, submitting additional cost of furnishing and setting concrete blocks for bulkhead-wall at the foot of Desbrosses street, North river, amounting to \$11,584.10, for collection from Henry D. Steers, Jr., contractor for the Pennsylvania Railroad Company.

No. 20511, submitting cost of replacing asphalt pavement taken up to permit repairs to water-pipe leading to Pier, new 37, North river, amounting to \$17.50, for collection from the Consolidated Gas Company.

No. 20549, submitting cost of repairing water-pipe leading to Pier, new 42, North river, and taking up and relaying pavement in connection therewith, amounting to \$71, for collection from the Compagnie Generale Transatlantique.

No. 20588, submitting cost of replacing pavement taken up to permit of placing new telephone poles along the North river, between Cortlandt and West Tenth streets, amounting to \$50.40, for collection from the New York Telephone Company.

The following communications were also referred to the Treasurer:

From the Consolidated Gas Company—Requesting permission to lay tracks on the bulkhead between Fourteenth and Fifteenth streets, East river, and to erect movable coal-handling apparatus thereat.

From J. Haberman—Requesting permission to run water-pipes through the bulkhead foot of Fortieth street, North river.

The following permits were granted, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief:

Baltimore and Ohio Railroad Company, to repair the shed on Pier, new 22, North river.

Empire City Subway Company (Limited), to construct a subsidiary connection to Pier, new 50, North river, all pavement to be taken up and relaid by the force of this Department at the cost and expense of said company.

Lehigh Valley Railroad Company, to place a protecting fender system in front of the bulkhead-wall north of Pier, new 56, North river.

Brown & Fleming, to dredge under the dumping-board foot of Fortieth street, East river. Central Vermont Railway Company, to drive additional fender piles at Pier, new 29, East river.

Mission of the Immaculate Virgin, to repair their pier at Pleasant Plains, Staten Island.

The following permits were granted, to continue during the pleasure of the Board, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief:

George Thompson, to place an awning in front of his oyster-boat at the oyster basin foot of Bloomfield street, North river.

Knickerbocker Steamboat Company, to maintain signs at the entrance to the piers foot of West Twentieth and West One Hundred and Twenty-ninth streets, North river.

New York Telephone Company, to place uprights for the suspension of telephone wires on the north side of the Pier foot of West Thirty-fifth street, North river, and at the New York Yacht Club's landing at the foot of East Twenty-third street, East river.

Hecker-Jones-Jewell Milling Company, to maintain their floating wheat elevator at the north half of the bulkhead between Piers, new 32 and new 33, East river, compensation therefor to be fixed by the Treasurer.

Amaringo Boat Club, to place a boat-house and life-saving station at the foot of Fifty-fifth street, East river.

Ryan & Parker, to erect a temporary pile platform on the westerly side of Blackwell's Island for the landing of materials to be used in the construction of bridge pier thereat.

Frederick F. Maynahan, to construct a runway and to place two floats in front of the Crocheron House at Little Neck Bay, Bayside, Borough of Queens.

The following communications were ordered on file:

From the Comptroller—

1st. Approving sureties on Contract No. 710.

2d. Advising that his certificates have been indorsed upon Contracts Nos. 706, 707, 708 and 710.

3d. In relation to substitution of surety on Contract No. 709.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That permission be and hereby is granted for the substitution of the United States Fidelity and Guaranty Company as surety in the place of Joseph A. Flynn, on the estimate of the John Gillies Company (Incorporated), for preparing for and building a new wooden pier, with appurtenances, near the foot of Burling slip, East river, Borough of Manhattan, to be known as Pier 16, East river, under Contract No. 709.

From the Corporation Counsel—

1st. Approving form of Contract No. 714, for building a new pier, to be known as Pier 12, at the foot of Wall street, East river.

2d. Transmitting approved forms of leases of the Pier foot of West Fortieth street to the Union Stockyard and Market Company, and of the filled-in land north of East Sixty-second street to the Farmers' Feed Company. Commissioners authorized to execute same.

3d. Transmitting approved form of agreement for the purchase of Pier, old 14, East river with adjoining bulkhead. Commissioners authorized to execute same and the Secretary directed to transmit said agreement when executed to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for their approval.

4th. Requesting information in relation to the maintenance of the fence by the Midland Railroad Terminal Company at the foot of Red lane, Midland Beach, Staten Island. Action of the Secretary in transmitting the desired information, together with a copy of the communication from Harry W. Putnam, protesting against the maintenance of said fence thereat, approved.

5th. Requesting information in relation to the claims of this Department against James Keese and S. Burrowe for the cost of repairs to the crib-bulkhead between Piers 47 and 48, East river; against the White Star Towing Company for the cost of repairs to the Pier foot of East Thirty-first street; against the Oceanic Steam Navigation Company for removing pile butts at the new-made land between Piers, new 44 and new 45, North river, and relaying the pavement thereat; against Isaac Goodstein's Sons for wharfage, and against Plunkitt & Smith for the cost of repairs to the Pier foot of West Fifty-first street. Action of the Secretary in furnishing the desired information approved.

From the Department of Health—Requesting that the landing at the foot of East One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street be set aside for the exclusive use of said Department.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the platform at the foot of East One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, Harlem river, be and is hereby set aside for the uses and purposes of the Department of Health.

From the Fire Department—Requesting that a temporary berth be set aside for the Fire-boat "Zophar Mills" at the southerly pier of the oyster basin north of Gansevoort street, North river.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That a berth for the Fire-boat "Zophar Mills" be and hereby is temporarily set aside on the outer side of the "L" adjoining Pier, old 56 1/2, North river, and permission be and hereby is granted the Fire Department to locate the necessary offices, etc., on said pier, under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department, the privileges herein contained to continue only during the pleasure of the Board.

From the Department of Street Cleaning—

1st. Requesting the removal of sunken manure scow from the slip adjoining the dumping-board foot of East Thirty-eighth street. Engineer-in-Chief directed to remove said scow to the basin between Forty-third and Forty-fourth streets, South Brooklyn, the cost of the work to be collected from the owners of the scow in the event of their claiming the boat.

2d. Requesting that the capsized material be dredged from the slip adjoining the dumping-board at the foot of East Forty-sixth street, and that a statement as to the cost of the work be furnished said Department in order that the same may be collected if possible. Engineer-in-Chief directed to order said material dredged and to furnish the Department of Street Cleaning with a statement of the cost of the work, as requested.

From the Supervisor of the City Record—Requesting list of employees for publication in the CITY RECORD. Action of the Secretary in furnishing same approved.

From the United States Army Quartermaster at Fort Totten—Requesting information as to whether wharfage will be charged for the landing of a steamer running from Fort Schuyler to Whitestone Landing. Secretary directed to state that if the steamer is used exclusively for Government purposes no wharfage will be charged therefor.

From the Morse Iron Works and Dry Dock Company—Requesting permission to erect a building for use as a machine shop, offices, etc., on their property at the foot of Fifty-fifth street, Brooklyn. Secretary directed to state that before permit will be granted an agreement must be filed that no additional item of value shall be claimed beyond the actual cost of such buildings in the event of the City requiring the premises for the improvement of the water-front.

From the St. John's Guild—Requesting permission to berth the floating hospital at the Pier foot of East Twenty-fourth street instead of at the Pier foot of East Twenty-eighth street. Secretary directed to state that the berth at the Pier foot of East Twenty-fourth street is required for other purposes.

From Berriman Brothers—Calling attention to washout in front of the Pier foot of East Eighty-third street. Action of the Secretary, in stating that the pavement thereat is under the jurisdiction of the Department of Highways, approved.

From Captain John R. Halpin—Requesting that the charge for landing the steamer "Favorite" at the Battery Wharf be reduced to \$3 per day. Application granted.

From M. B. Martin—Requesting an extension of time in which to remove the dumping-board from the Pier foot of West One Hundred and Thirty-third street, North river. Application denied.

From R. H. Hood Company—Requesting an extension of time for the completion of Contract No. 697.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the time for the completion of the building of the freight shed on the Pier foot of West Fifty-ninth street, North river, under Contract No. 697, R. H. Hood Company, contractors, be and hereby is extended to and including August 15, 1901, provided the written consent of the sureties on said contract be filed in this Department.

From the New York Contracting and Trucking Company—Requesting a lease of the Pier foot of West Seventy-ninth street, North river.

On motion, the permit granted William I. Kidney to maintain a dumping-board on the Pier foot of West Seventy-ninth street was revoked, to take effect August 1, 1901, and the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That, by virtue of the power and authority vested in this Board by law, and in pursuance of the statutes in such case made and provided, this Board hereby agrees to lease, assign and to farm let unto the New York Contracting and Trucking Company all and singular the wharfage and cranes which may arise, accrue and become due for the use and occupation, in the manner and at the rates prescribed by law, of the Pier at the foot of West Seventy-ninth

street, North river, Borough of Manhattan, for a term of ten years, commencing from the 1st day of August, 1901, for the yearly rent or sum of twelve hundred dollars (\$1,200) per annum, payable quarterly in advance to the Treasurer of this Department; the lessee to have the privilege of two renewal terms of ten years each at an advance rental of five per cent. per annum on each renewal term, it being understood and agreed that this resolution shall be of no force or effect unless the said New York Contracting and Trucking Company shall, within ten days from receipt of a copy hereof, file in this Department its written acceptance of the terms and conditions hereof, and agree to execute a lease containing the usual covenants and conditions at present embodied in the leases of wharf property now used by this Department, except that the lessee shall do all the dredging.

From the Hamburg-American Line—Requesting a lease of Pier, new 55, and of the northerly half of the bulkhead between Piers, new 54 and 55, North river; together with communication from Pim, Forwood & Kellock, agents for the Atlas Line of Mail Steamers, stating that the Hamburg-American Line has acquired control of the Atlas Line.

On motion, the following preamble and resolutions were adopted:

Whereas, Under date of June 14, 1901, a communication was received from Pim, Forwood & Kellock, the agents of the Atlas Line of Mail Steamers, stating that the Hamburg-Amerikanische Packetfahrt-Actien-Gesellschaft has acquired control of said Atlas Line of Mail Steamers; and

Whereas, Under date of July 18, 1901, a communication was received from said Hamburg-Amerikanische Packetfahrt-Actien-Gesellschaft, requesting lease of Pier, new 55, together with the northerly half of bulkhead between Piers, new 54 and new 55, North river, for a term of ten years, with the privilege of two renewal terms of ten years each:

Resolved, That the lease of Pier, new 55, North river, to the Atlas Steamship Company (Limited), dated December 28, 1893, be and hereby is canceled, to take effect July 31, 1901.

Resolved, That the permit granted the Union Ice Company April 28, 1899, to use and occupy the bulkhead between Piers, new 54 and 55, North river, be and hereby is revoked, to take effect August 1, 1901.

Resolved, That, by virtue of the power and authority vested in this Board and in pursuance of the statutes in such case made and provided, Pier, new 55, near the foot of West Twenty-fifth street, on the North river, be and hereby is designated and appropriated for the special kind of commerce carried on by steam transportation.

Resolved, That, by virtue of the power and authority vested in this Board by law, and in pursuance of the statutes in such case made and provided, this Board hereby agrees to lease, assign and to farm let unto the Hamburg-Amerikanische Packetfahrt-Actien-Gesellschaft, all and singular the wharfage and cramage which may arise, accrue or become due for the use and occupation, in the manner and at the rates prescribed by law, of the northerly half of the bulkhead between Piers, new 54 and 55, North river, near the foot of West Twenty-fifth street, for a period of ten years from August 1, 1901, at a rental of one thousand dollars per annum, payable quarterly in advance to the Treasurer of this Department; the lessees to have the privilege of two renewal terms of ten years each at an advance rental of five per cent. per annum on each renewal term, it being understood and agreed that this resolution shall be of no force or effect unless the said Hamburg-Amerikanische Packetfahrt-Actien-Gesellschaft shall, within ten days from receipt of a copy hereof, file in this Department its written acceptance of the terms and conditions herein contained, and agree to execute a lease containing the usual covenants and conditions at present embodied in the form of lease of wharf property now used by this Department.

Resolved, That, by virtue of the power and authority vested in this Board by law, and in pursuance of the statutes in such case made and provided, this Board hereby agrees to lease, assign and to farm let unto the Hamburg-Amerikanische Packetfahrt-Actien-Gesellschaft, all and singular the wharfage and cramage which may arise, accrue or become due for the use and occupation, in the manner and at the rates prescribed by law, of Pier, new 55, North river, at the foot of West Twenty-fifth street, together with the shed now on said pier, for a term of ten years from August 1, 1901, at a rental of twenty-five thousand dollars per annum, payable quarterly in advance to the Treasurer of this Department; the lessees to have the privilege of two renewal terms of ten years each, at an advance rental of five per cent. per annum on each renewal term. It being understood and agreed that this resolution shall be of no force or effect unless the said Hamburg-Amerikanische Packetfahrt-Actien-Gesellschaft shall, within ten days from receipt of a copy hereof, file in this Department its written acceptance of the terms and conditions herein contained, and agree to execute a lease containing the usual covenants and conditions at present embodied in the form of lease of wharf property now used by this Department, except that repairs to the understructure of said pier shall be made by the Department of Docks and Ferries at the cost and expense of said Department.

Resolved, That permission be and hereby is granted the Anchor Line (Henderson Brothers, Limited) to use and occupy, during the pleasure of the Board, the southerly half of the bulkhead between Piers, new 54 and 55, North river, about one hundred and two feet six inches, until January 1, 1902, compensation to be paid therefor at the rate of one thousand dollars per annum, payable quarterly in advance to the Treasurer, commencing August 1, 1901.

Resolved, That, by virtue of the power and authority vested in this Board by law, and in pursuance of the statutes in such case made and provided, this Board hereby agrees to lease, assign and to farm let unto the Anchor Line (Henderson Brothers, Limited) all and singular the wharfage and cramage which may arise, accrue or become due for the use and occupation, in the manner and at the rates prescribed by law, of the southerly half of the bulkhead between Piers, new 54 and 55, North river, near the foot of West Twenty-fifth street, for a period of ten years from January 1, 1902, at a rental of one thousand dollars per annum, payable quarterly in advance to the Treasurer of this Department, the lessees to have the privilege of two renewal terms of ten years each at an advance rental of five per cent. per annum on each renewal term, it being understood and agreed that these resolutions shall be of no force or effect unless the said Anchor Line (Henderson Brothers, Limited) shall, within ten days from receipt of a copy hereof, file in this Department their written acceptance of the terms and conditions hereof, and agree to execute a lease containing the usual covenants and conditions as at present embodied in the leases of wharf property now in use by this Department.

From the President—Recommending that a rate of \$115,000 per annum be fixed as rental for the bulkhead extending from the north side of Pier, new 19, to the north side of Pier, new 21, North river, including Piers, new 20 and 21, North river.

On motion, the recommendation of the President was approved and the Secretary directed to request the Erie Railroad Company to consent, in writing, to such rate.

From the Treasurer—Recommending that the application of the Consolidated Gas Company for a modification of the lease of the bulkheads between Twentieth and Twenty-second streets, East river, to provide for the option of two renewal terms, be granted, the rental for the renewal terms to be at an advance of five per cent. per annum on each renewal.

On motion, by the affirmative votes of Commissioners Cram and Murphy, Commissioner Meyer voting in the negative, the following resolutions were adopted:

Resolved, That the lease of the bulkhead between Twentieth and Twenty-first streets, East river, and between Twenty-first and Twenty-second streets, East river, dated July 28, 1900, by and between The City of New York, by the Board of Docks, party of the first part, and the Consolidated Gas Company, party of the second part, be and hereby is canceled, to take effect July 19, 1901.

Resolved, That by virtue of the power and authority vested in this Board by law, and in pursuance of the statutes in such case made and provided, this Board hereby agrees to lease, assign and to farm let unto the Consolidated Gas Company of New York, all and singular the wharfage and cramage which may arise, accrue or become due for the use and occupation, in the manner and at the rates prescribed by law, of all that certain wharf property situated on the East river, in the Borough of Manhattan, and known and described as follows, to wit: The bulkhead to be built in accordance with the New Plan between the northerly side of East Twentieth street and the southerly side of East Twenty-first street, and between the northerly side of East Twenty-first street and the southerly side of East Twenty-second street. The lease to be for a term of ten years from the date said bulkhead is completed and ready for occupancy, at an annual rental of five per centum on the cost of the improvement of the premises in question, under the New Plan, as shown on the books of the Department of Docks and Ferries, said cost to include the amount paid for the property acquired, the building of the bulkhead-wall and marginal street, and all other expenses incidental to or connected with said work, said rental to be paid quarterly in advance to the Treasurer of this Department. The lessee shall have the privilege of two renewals of ten years each at an advanced rental of five per centum on the rental for the preceding term. The said lessee shall have the right to erect and maintain, during the term of said lease, such derricks, hoists or other structures as may be required for the transporting over, upon or under the said marginal street of supplies necessary for the carrying on of the business of the said gas company; and to place and maintain through the new bulkhead-wall and under the said marginal street to the property of said company such pipes as may be required in its business; and shall also have the right to erect and maintain a shed or sheds upon said marginal street, of such size and dimensions as shall be approved by the Board of Docks; all work done by said company under this resolution to be done in accordance with plans to be submitted to and approved by the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department, and under his direction and supervision. The work of filling in behind the bulkhead-wall shall be done by this Department. It is understood and agreed that this resolution shall be of no force or effect unless the said Consolidated Gas Company shall, within ten days after receipt of a copy of said resolution, file in this Department its written acceptance of the terms and conditions hereof, and shall agree to execute a lease containing the usual covenants and conditions as at present embodied in leases of wharf property now used by this Department.

From the Dock Superintendent—

1st. Report for the week ending July 13, 1901.

2d. Reporting that Michael Marone discontinued the use of the dump at the foot of Sixtieth street, East river, on July 3, 1901, and recommending that the permit granted him be revoked as of that date. Recommendation adopted.

From the Engineer-in-Chief—

1st. Report for the week ending July 13, 1901.

2d. Reporting the completion of the work of dredging between the Battery and West One Hundred and Fifty-ninth street, North river, under Contract No. 694, June 30, 1901, and the commencement of the work of building a new steel tug, under Contract No. 705, July 12, 1901, and of building the crib-bulkheads between One Hundred and Thirty-first and One Hundred and Thirty-fifth streets, Harlem river, under Contract No. 710, July 18, 1901.

3d. Reporting the failure of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company to remove the bridge foundations outside of the channel line at the foot of One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street, Harlem river, and recommending that said company be requested to advise the Board as to when said foundations will be removed, and that the Secretary of War be requested to order the removal of such foundations. Recommendations adopted.

4th. Recommending that the owners and consignees be directed to remove the sunken canal-boat "Flannery Brothers," with cargo, from the slip at the north side outer end of the Pier foot of Seventeenth street, North river, and the sunken canal-boat "Kittie Madden," with cargo, from the slip north of the Pier foot of East Thirty-sixth street. Recommendations adopted.

5th. Recommending that repairs be made by the force of the Department to Pier, old 56½, North river; to the Pier foot of West Fifty-first street; to the bulkhead north of West Ninety-sixth street, North river, and to the platform north of Sixty-second street, East river. Recommendations adopted.

6th. Submitting amended plans for the improvement of the water-front between Bloomfield and West Twenty-third streets, North river.

On motion, the following resolutions were adopted:

Resolved, That this Board deems it advisable to discontinue the ferry slips, platform, "A" piers and ferry racks, and to change the lengths, widths and locations of piers adjacent thereto between Little West Twelfth and West Fourteenth streets, North river, in the Borough of Manhattan, from the lengths, widths and locations therefor determined by the Board of Docks January 14, 1898, and approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund March 11, 1898, as follows:

The Pier between Little West Twelfth and West Thirteenth streets will be parallel with the Pier at the foot of Bloomfield street determined by the Board of Docks May 20, 1897, and approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund June 14, 1897; its southerly side will be 184.62 feet northerly of the northerly side of said Pier at the foot of Bloomfield street; it will be 70 feet wide instead of 60 feet as approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund March 11, 1898, and will be 802.22 feet in length, extending from the bulkhead-line established by the Board of Docks May 20, 1897, and approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund June 14, 1897, to the pierhead-line as modified and established by the Secretary of War in 1897.

The Pier at the foot of West Fourteenth street will be parallel with the Pier at the foot of West Fifteenth street, determined by the Board of Docks January 14, 1898, and approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund March 11, 1898; its northerly side will be 200 feet from the southerly side of said Pier at the foot of West Fifteenth street; it will be 60 feet in width and 800 feet long, extending from the said bulkhead-line established in 1897 to the pierhead-line as modified and established by the Secretary of War in 1897.

A new pier is hereby interpolated between the two piers above described; it will be parallel with the first pier hereinbefore described; its southerly side will be 184.62 feet northerly from the northerly side of the first pier hereinbefore described; it will be 60 feet wide and 802.22 feet in length, extending from the said bulkhead-line established in 1897 to the pierhead-line, as modified and established by the Secretary of War in 1897.

The four ferry slips, ferry platform, "A" piers and ferry racks between Little West Twelfth and West Fourteenth streets, as determined by the Board of Docks January 14, 1898, and approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund on March 11, 1898, are hereby discontinued.

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be and hereby are requested to consent to and approve of the discontinuance of the ferry slips and of the changes in the lengths, widths and locations of piers between Little West Twelfth and West Fourteenth streets, North river, in the Borough of Manhattan, as above set forth.

Resolved, That the Board deems it advisable to change the ferry slips and piers between West Twenty-second and West Twenty-third streets, North river, in the Borough of Manhattan, from the plans therefor determined by the Board of Docks May 20, 1897, and approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund June 14, 1897, as follows:

Pier at the foot of West Twenty-second street, North river, as determined by the Board of Docks May 20, 1897, and approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund June 14, 1897, is hereby discontinued. The ferry platform, the two ferry slips, "A" pier and ferry racks as determined by the Board of Docks May 20, 1897, and approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund June 14, 1897, are hereby amended, and four ferry slips with "A" piers, ferry racks and a platform 200 feet wide are hereby established between the southerly side of the Pier at the foot of West Twenty-third street and a line drawn parallel with and 129.91 feet northerly from the northerly side of the Pier immediately south of West Twenty-second street, established by the Board of Docks January 14, 1898, and approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund March 11, 1898; the outshore face of said platform will be 200 feet from and parallel with the bulkhead-line established by the Board of Docks May 20, 1897, and approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund June 14, 1897; said ferry racks to extend from the outshore face of said platform to the pierhead-line, as modified and established by the Secretary of War in 1897.

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be and hereby are requested to consent to and approve of the discontinuance of the Pier at the foot of West Twenty-second street, and of the establishment of the four ferry slips between West Twenty-second and West Twenty-third streets, in the Borough of Manhattan, as above set forth.

7th. Submitting amended plans for the improvement of the water-front between Forty-second and Forty-fourth streets, North river.

On motion, the following resolutions were adopted:

Resolved, That this Board deems it advisable to change the lengths, widths and locations of piers at the foot of West Forty-second, West Forty-third and West Forty-fourth streets, North river, in the Borough of Manhattan, from the plans therefor as determined by the Board of Docks, and approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund April 27, 1871, November 13, 1873, and December 3, 1884, as follows:

The Pier at the foot of West Forty-second street is hereby discontinued.

The location of the Pier at the foot of West Forty-third street is hereby changed, so that the southerly side of the new pier will be 200.42 feet northerly of the southerly side of West Forty-second street. It will be 80 feet wide and will extend at right angles with the bulkhead-line, established in 1871, for a length of 700 feet to the pierhead-line, as modified and established in 1897 by the Secretary of War.

The Pier at the foot of West Forty-fourth street is changed in width and length, so that its northerly side will be on the northerly side of West Forty-fourth street extended. It will be 100 feet wide and will extend at right angles with the bulkhead-line, established in 1871, for a length of 700 feet to the pierhead-line, as modified and established in 1897 by the Secretary of War.

Two ferry slips are hereby established between the southerly side of West Forty-second street and the southerly side of the first pier above described, with a platform 200 feet wide and "A" pier and ferry racks extending to the pierhead-line, as modified and established in 1897 by the Secretary of War.

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be and hereby are requested to consent to and approve of the discontinuance of the Pier at the foot of West Forty-second street, the establishment of two ferry slips and the change in length, width and location of the piers at the foot of West Forty-third and West Forty-fourth streets, in the Borough of Manhattan, as above set forth.

8th. Recommending that plans and specifications be prepared for laying a granite-block pavement between Piers 4 and 7, East river, the work to be done under Treasurer's Order.

On motion, the following resolution was unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That the Treasurer be and hereby is authorized to issue Treasurer's Order for the placing of a granite-block pavement between the southerly side of South street and the bulkhead for a distance along same from a point about sixty-nine feet westerly of the westerly side of Pier 4, East river, to the southerly side of Pier, new 7, East river.

9th. Stating that plans and specifications have been prepared for laying an asphalt pavement over the concrete foundation on the marginal street between Twenty-first and Twenty-third streets, East river, and recommending that the work be done under Treasurer's Orders.

On motion, the following resolution was unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That the Treasurer be and is hereby authorized to issue an order for the placing of asphalt over the area of marginal street between East Twenty-first and East Twenty-third streets, on a concrete foundation, and that the work be done otherwise than by contract.

10th. Recommending that the Treasurer be authorized to issue orders for dredging on the North river, from time to time, when necessary, pending the awarding of a new contract for such work.

On motion, the following resolution was unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That the Treasurer be and is hereby authorized to issue orders for the necessary dredging, work to be done where called for, under the new plan, in the way of repairs, in order that the City may not become liable for any damage resulting from the shoaling of the slips on the North river, pending the execution of a new contract.

11th. Submitting specifications and form of contract for dredging between the Battery and West One Hundred and Fifty-ninth street, North river.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the specifications and form of contract submitted this day by the Engineer-in-Chief for dredging between the Battery and West One Hundred and Fifty-ninth street, North river, be and hereby are approved, subject to the approval of the Corporation Counsel as to form, and the Secretary be and hereby is directed to have a sufficient number of blank forms of contract printed and proper advertisements inviting estimates inserted in the newspapers designated by law.

12th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 20934, submitting plans, specifications and form of contract for building a new pier at the foot of Fifth street, East river.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the plans, specifications and form of contract submitted that day by the Engineer-in-Chief for building a new pier at the foot of Fifth street, East river, be and hereby are approved, subject to the approval of the Corporation Counsel as to form, and the Secretary be and hereby is directed to have a sufficient number of blank forms of contract printed and proper advertisements inviting estimates inserted in the newspapers designated by law.

1st. Stating that a stipulation has been entered into whereby the City is to take possession of the land between Little West Twelfth and West Thirteenth streets, extending from a point 100 feet westerly of the westerly line of Tenth avenue westerly to the bulkhead, on July 25, 1901.

On motion, the Secretary was directed to notify the occupants of all buildings situated between Little West Twelfth and West Thirteenth streets, westerly of a line 100 feet westerly of the westerly line of Tenth avenue, that the premises must be vacated on or before July 28, 1901, the Engineer-in-Chief was directed to prepare a description of the buildings on said property in order that the same may be sold at public auction, and the following resolution was unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That the Engineer-in-Chief be and hereby is directed to proceed with the work of excavating the land between Little West Twelfth and West Thirteenth streets, North river, westerly of the proposed new bulkhead-line thereat, the work to be done in accordance with the unanimous resolution adopted December 28, 1900.

2d. Advising that the Board has power, under sections 849 and 850 of the new Charter, to forcibly remove the oil-boat "John Ryan" from in front of the bulkhead between Thirty-seventh and Thirty-eighth streets, East river.

On motion, the Secretary was directed to notify the owners of the oil-boat "John Ryan" that unless said boat is removed from the slip in front of the bulkhead between Thirty-seventh and Thirty-eighth streets, East river, within five days, the boat will be removed therefrom by this Department.

1st. Reporting that Pier, new 29, East river, is now ready for use.

On motion, the Secretary was directed to notify the Central Vermont Railway Company that the rental for Pier, new 29, East river, under the lease of the pier to said Company, will commence August 1, 1901.

2d. Recommending that permission be granted William G. Burke to maintain a dancing pavilion near the foot of Main street, City Island, same to remain thereat only during the pleasure of the Board, and that Burke be directed to strengthen the structure. Recommendation adopted, the work of repairing and strengthening the pavilion to be done under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the resolution adopted by the Board of Docks June 28, 1901, authorizing the Corporation Counsel to accept the offer of compromise made by the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company with respect to the land along the Harlem river, between One Hundred and Thirty-second and One Hundred and Thirty-fifth streets, be and hereby is rescinded.

The Secretary reported that the pay-roll for the week ending July 19, 1901, amounting to \$18,274.06, had been approved, audited and transmitted to the Department of Finance for payment.
