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## BOROUGH OF BROOKLYN.

### LOCAL BOARD—WILLIAMSBURGH DISTRICT.

Borough of Brooklyn, Wednesday, May 18, 1904.

Meeting in Borough Hall 2.45 P. M.

The roll was called and the following members answered to their names: John C. Brackenridge, Commissioner of Public Works, presiding; Alderman Murphy, Fifty-eighth Aldermanic District; Alderman Keely, Fifty-ninth Aldermanic District; Alderman Brenner, Sixtieth Aldermanic District.

The Commissioner presented the following:

No. 4.

A resolution to flag with bluestone flagging five feet wide, sidewalks opposite lots lying on the southwest side of Metropolitan avenue, between Kent avenue and Wythe avenue, known as Nos. 9, 12 and 14, Block 2363, Fourteenth Ward Map, was adopted by unanimous vote.

Approved by the President of the Borough May 25, 1904.

No. 5.

Resolutions to flag with bluestone flagging five feet wide, sidewalks opposite lots lying on the northwest side of North Eighth street, between Roebling and Havemeyer streets; on the southeast side of Roebling street, between North Seventh street and North Eighth street; and on the northeast side of North Seventh street, between Roebling street and Havemeyer street, known as Nos. 1, 25 to 28, inclusive, Nos. 30, 31 and 32, Block 2322, Fourteenth Ward Map;

On the southeast side of Roebling street, between North Eighth street and North Ninth street; and on the northeast side of North Eighth street, between Roebling street and Havemeyer street, known as Nos. 1, 5 and 32, Block 2314, Fourteenth Ward Map;

On the northwest side of Roebling street, between North Eighth street and North Ninth street; and on the northeast side of North Eighth street, between Driggs avenue and Roebling street, known as Nos. 15 and 17, Block 2313, Fourteenth Ward Map; and

On the northeast side of North Ninth street, between Roebling street and Withers street; and on the north side of Withers street, between North Ninth street and Union avenue, known as Nos. 24, 25, 27, 28, 29 and 31, Block 2307, Fourteenth Ward Map, were adopted by unanimous vote.

## BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT.

### (PUBLIC IMPROVEMENTS.)

A meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York was held in Room 16, City Hall, on Friday, October 7, at 10.30 o'clock in the forenoon.

Present—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen (Vice-President Sullivan), the President of the Borough of Manhattan, the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, the President of the Borough of The Bronx, the President of the Borough of Queens and the President of the Borough of Richmond.

The Mayor, Hon. George B. McClellan, presided.

### OPENING SIXTIETH STREET, BROOKLYN.

The following communication from the office of the President of the Borough of Brooklyn was presented:

THE CITY OF NEW YORK,  
OFFICE OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE BOROUGH OF BROOKLYN,  
BROOKLYN, October 5, 1904.

To the Honorable the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

GENTLEMEN—There was referred to the President of the Borough on July 15, 1904, a petition addressed to your Board on May 2, 1904, by Susan W. Hopkins, of No. 252 Henry street, and others. The petitioners requested that the resolution adopted on March 6, 1903, providing for the opening of Sixtieth street, from the bulkhead-line to Third avenue, be rescinded. They were the owners of the property through which the proposed street was to be opened west of First avenue, and they objected to the opening proceedings on the ground that the extension of the street from First avenue to the bulkhead-line would serve no public purpose but would, by dividing the estate of H. A. Kent, in which they are interested, reduce its marketable value from \$500,000 to \$250,000. The President finds that these proceedings were initiated in order to provide for a sewer in Sixtieth street but that, for that purpose, it is not necessary to extend them beyond First avenue. He directs me to say that while he thinks it is, in the majority of cases, to the public interest to extend opening proceedings to the bulkhead-line, in this instance it would work an injustice to the owners of the water-front property which the circumstances do not warrant, particularly as the opening west of First avenue is not necessary to the sewer improvement, and, as he has been informed by the Topographical Bureau that Sixty-first street on the south is open to the Bay, that Sixty-second street and Sixty-third street on the north are open to the Bay and that Sixty-fifth street is open to the pier-head line. He asks me, therefore, to request that your Honorable Board amend the resolution of March 6, 1903, for the opening of Sixtieth street between Third avenue and the bulkhead-line so as to exclude from the proceedings that portion of Sixtieth street west of First avenue.

The following resolutions were then adopted:

Resolved, By the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, pursuant to the provisions of section 1,000 of the Greater New York Charter, that the proceedings for opening Sixtieth street, between Third avenue and the bulkhead-line, Borough of Brooklyn, instituted by this Board on March 6, 1903, be and the same are hereby discontinued, so far as the same apply to that part of Sixtieth street, between the westerly side of First avenue and the bulkhead-line; and be it further.

Resolved, That the Corporation Counsel be and he hereby is requested to take the necessary steps to discontinue the aforesaid proceedings for such part of Sixtieth street, between First avenue and the bulkhead-line.

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen, the President of the Borough of Manhattan, the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, the President of the Borough of The Bronx, the President of the Borough of Queens and the President of the Borough of Richmond—16.

### LAYING OUT WEST ONE HUNDRED AND SEVENTY-SEVENTH STREET, MANHATTAN.

The following report from the Chief Engineer was presented:

REPORT No. 2388.

OCTOBER 6, 1904.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—At the meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held on September 30, 1904, a public hearing was given on the plan to lay out West One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street, from St. Nicholas avenue to Broadway, in the Borough of Manhattan. The question was raised as to the necessity for this street in the location shown upon the map, which left a block between West One Hundred and Seventy-seventh and West One Hundred and Seventy-eighth streets, 189.84 feet in length, and the matter was laid over until the next meeting, with a request for further information.

As to the reasons for laying out the street on the proposed lines, it was stated in my previous report to the Board that the owners of the property were prepared to cede the land lying within the street to the City. This it would be impossible for them to do were its location to be changed, as the southerly limit of their property is coincident with the proposed southerly line of West One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street. This property was purchased in accordance with an old map known as the Randall map, upon which this street was laid down. It is expected that the property will be immediately developed as soon as the street is established. The two blocks through which the proposed street extends are 300 feet in length, and land in the Borough of Manhattan is so extremely valuable that property-owners feel that they cannot afford to lay out lots 150 feet in depth. As was stated in my report of June 29, 1904, the House of Reception of the New York Juvenile Asylum is located between St. Nicholas and Audubon avenues, near what would be the prolongation of West One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street eastward to Amsterdam avenue. I am advised that this institution is shortly to be removed to a site outside The City of New York, and the extension of West One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street to Amsterdam avenue will then undoubtedly be proposed. I am further advised that the property in the blocks between St. Nicholas and Amsterdam avenues has been also sold according to the old Randall map, and that unless the street is continued about on the lines proposed, interior lots will be left without means of access.

I believe, therefore, that the map as submitted is a proper one, and should be approved.

The following resolution was then adopted:

Whereas, At a meeting of this Board, held on the 1st day of July, 1904, resolutions were adopted proposing to change the map or plan of The City of New York so as to lay out West One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street, from St. Nicholas avenue to Broadway, in the Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, and appointing a hearing at a meeting of this Board to be held on the 30th day of September, 1904, at 10.30 o'clock A. M., at which meeting such proposed action would be considered by this Board, and requesting a notice to all persons affected thereby, of the aforesaid time and place at which such proposed action would be considered, to be published in the CITY RECORD for ten days prior to the 30th day of September, 1904; and

Whereas, It appears from the affidavit of the Supervisor of the City Record that the aforesaid resolutions and notice have been published in the CITY RECORD for ten days prior to the 30th day of September, 1904; and

Whereas, At the aforesaid time and place, a public hearing was given to all persons interested in such proposed change who have appeared, and such proposed change was duly considered by this Board; now therefore be it

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York, in pursuance of the provisions of section 442 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended, deeming it for the public interest to change the map or plan of The City of New York, by laying out West One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street, from St. Nicholas avenue to Broadway, in the Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, does hereby favor the same, so as to lay out the aforesaid street, as follows:

Beginning at a point in the westerly line of St. Nicholas avenue, distant 189.84 feet southerly from the southerly line of West One Hundred and Seventy-eighth street;



thence westerly and parallel to said street, distance 300 feet, to the easterly line of Wadsworth avenue; thence southerly along said easterly line, distance 60 feet; thence easterly and parallel to West One Hundred and Seventy-eighth street, distance 300 feet, to the westerly line of St. Nicholas avenue; thence northerly along said westerly line, distance 60 feet to point or place of beginning.

Also

Beginning at a point in the westerly line of Wadsworth avenue, distant 189.84 feet southerly from the southerly line of West One Hundred and Seventy-eighth street; thence westerly and parallel to said street, distance 270.19 feet, to the easterly line of Broadway; thence southerly along said line, distance 30.45 feet; thence still southerly along said easterly line and deflecting to the left 6 degrees 10 minutes and 31 seconds, distance 31.21 feet; thence easterly and parallel to West One Hundred and Seventy-eighth street, distance 256.39 feet, to the westerly line of Wadsworth avenue; thence northerly along said westerly line, distance 60 feet, to the point or place of beginning.

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen, the President of the Borough of Manhattan, the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, the President of the Borough of The Bronx, the President of the Borough of Queens and the President of the Borough of Richmond—16.

#### SMALL PARKS.

The following report from the Chief Engineer was presented:  
REPORT No. 2353.

SEPTEMBER 29, 1904.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—The Board of Estimate and Apportionment at its meeting held on the 16th inst., instructed me to prepare a statement showing the various park projects now before the Board, indicating the relation of the proposed parks to each other and to those already laid out or acquired, with the estimated cost of the proposed additional parks now under consideration.

Under date of September 20, I submitted a statement showing the parks now under consideration, with their acreage, the assessed valuation of the property, the estimated cost of acquiring them, and the present condition of the proceedings. In two cases, namely, the park reservations at both ends of the proposed Hudson Memorial Viaduct, I was unable to give either the assessed valuation or the estimated cost, as the project for laying out these parks is little more than a suggestion, and the lines which would form their boundaries have not yet been designated. In my report of September 20 it was said that a more extended statement dealing with the present area of parks in the different boroughs and other data was being prepared, which would be presented to the Board at the meeting to be held on the 30th inst. Such a statement is herewith submitted, the information being shown by two tables, one of which gives the area of park lands in each borough, the number of parks, their average size, the density of population, the population per acre of park area, the percentage of total area to that of park lands, the value of park lands and its ratio to the total value of real estate, and the per capita investment in parks for each borough. The other table contains a statement of the parks laid out or acquired since January 1, 1898.

It will be seen that the total number of parks at present laid out in the entire City is one hundred and sixty-four (164). This number, however, includes seventy-four (74) small areas of less than one acre, which are designated as public parks in the report of the Park Commissioners. In the Borough of Manhattan alone there are twenty-seven (27) of these small spaces, with a total area of 6.02 acres, while in the Borough of The Bronx there are thirty-one (31), having a total area of 9.23 acres. It is very evident that many of these are not worthy of the name of parks, but are public places at important street intersections, many of them doubtless being paved and not being treated as parks. While their inclusion makes the number of parks seem unduly large, it will have no appreciable effect upon the statement of total areas and valuations and their ratio to the value of private property and population. A separate column is given for the average area of all parks over one acre in extent. The estimated value of park lands is taken from the books of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, and represents, not the cost of acquisition and improvement, but the estimated value of the parks in their present condition. It is probable that these estimated values are not very accurate, as it will be seen that while the 1,061 acres of park lands in the Borough of Brooklyn are valued at \$42,800,000, the 3,876 acres of parks in the Borough of The Bronx are given a value of but \$24,600,000.

Forest Park, although purchased by the City of Brooklyn before consolidation, lies wholly within the Borough of Queens, and is credited to that borough in the accompanying statement.

Although the boroughs of Queens and Richmond have been included, it will be seen that the percentage of park reservations in these two boroughs is so small as to be almost negligible. This is inevitably the case, in view of the fact that neither of these boroughs has ever been mapped, and that it has been impossible to give to the subject of parks any serious consideration.

Among the three other boroughs it will be noticed that the percentage of park areas varies greatly, Manhattan having about 10 per cent., Brooklyn slightly over 2 per cent., and The Bronx nearly 15 per cent. A map of the Borough of Manhattan and a portion of the Borough of The Bronx is submitted, on which all of the parks now laid out are indicated, as well as those the laying out of which has been recently proposed. A similar map is submitted for the Borough of Brooklyn.

The unmapped condition of the boroughs of Queens and Richmond, and the very small area of park lands in these boroughs, render it impossible to give similar information as to these two boroughs. I believe that the laying out of a system of parks is properly a part of the mapping of these boroughs, and that, instead of covering the entire area with a system of streets and subsequently determining which of these streets should be wiped out to permit of the laying out of parks as the necessity for them develops, the reverse of this policy should be followed, the park areas being in many instances first located and the street system made to conform therewith. The great advantage of such a policy is being continually demonstrated by the demands which are made for the connection of parks laid out since the street system was adopted, by a series of adequate parkways or boulevards, which will weld the different park areas into a unit. This was done in the case of the Moshulu parkway and the Bronx and Pelham parkway, connecting Van Cortlandt Park, Bronx Park and Pelham Bay Park, and was of inestimable advantage. The table which accompanied my report of September 20, showing the new park projects now pending, is again submitted, as it has an important bearing upon the questions under consideration.

The Comptroller offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That it is the opinion of this Board that a sum not to exceed three million dollars for small parks and playgrounds be expended during the ensuing year.

The President of the Borough of Manhattan moved to lay the resolution on the table, which motion was carried by the following vote:

Affirmative—The President of the Board of Aldermen, the President of the Borough of Manhattan, the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, the President of the Borough of The Bronx, the President of the Borough of Queens and the President of the Borough of Richmond—10.

##### NEW YORK, NEW HAVEN AND HARTFORD RAILROAD IMPROVEMENTS.

In the matter of the proposed changes of grade, etc., connected with the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad improvements, in the Borough of The Bronx, an affidavit of publication was presented showing that the matter had been duly advertised. The following report of the Chief Engineer was placed on file:

REPORT No. 2393.

OCTOBER 10, 1904.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—Under date of September 20, 1904, the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company and the Harlem River and Port Chester Railroad Company, through their President, Mr. C. S. Mellen, have presented to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment a petition asking for certain changes in the map of The City of New York which will enable these companies to carry out an extensive improvement to what is known as their Harlem River Branch.

This road now traverses the entire Borough of The Bronx from the northerly side of Van Cortlandt Park to the Bronx river, and nearly all of the existing streets are crossed at grade. These crossings are exceedingly dangerous and are the source of much public inconvenience, as they are frequently obstructed by long freight trains. Now that the grade crossings on the lines of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad and the New York and Harlem Railroad have been, or are about to be, abolished, the conditions along the Harlem River Branch have attracted special attention and much unfavorable comment. The announcement by the railroad company, therefore, of its intention to convert what has heretofore been a freight line, with meagre facilities for passengers, into a modern six-track road, and at the same time to do away with all of the existing grade crossings and to do this work at its own expense, is a welcome one. In order to carry out its plans, however, several changes in grades and the closing of a portion of one street will be necessary.

In order to reach the Harlem River Yard from the elevated approach, it will be necessary to close a portion of Cypress avenue. This street has been opened by regular assessment proceedings to the bulkhead line, and the plan submitted by the railroad company provides for the closing of about 340 feet of the block which is next to the bulkhead line. A sewer has been built in Cypress avenue, and this sewer should be maintained for the drainage of the adjacent property, and in any agreement which may be made with the railroad company a perpetual easement for its maintenance should be assured to the City. The regulating and grading of Cypress avenue, between



the Bronx Kills and East One Hundred and Forty-first street, was also authorized by the Board, and the work has been practically completed north of the railroad property, but nothing has been done in that part of the street which it is proposed to discontinue. As to the compensation which should be paid to the City for the portion which it is proposed to close, I do not believe it is the intention of the Board to have me report at the present time. It is very evident that it will be necessary for the railroad company to acquire an absolute fee to the land, but in view of the fact that all of the important changes which it is proposed to make will be carried out without imposing any expense upon The City of New York, it would seem as if the sum to be demanded should be a reasonable one.

The changes in the grades of the streets which are petitioned for are as follows:

- (1) Grade of East One Hundred and Forty-ninth, or Bungay, street to be raised 0.96 feet.
- (2) Grade of Longwood avenue at the railroad crossing to be raised 0.94 feet.
- (3) Grade of Lafayette avenue at the railroad crossing to be raised 0.73 feet.
- (4) Grade of Tiffany street at the railroad crossing to be raised 1.03 feet.
- (5) Grade of Bryant street at the railroad crossing to be raised 0.96 feet.
- (6) Grade of Longfellow street at railroad crossing to be raised 0.97 feet.
- (7) Grade of Whittier street at the railroad crossing to be raised 1.05 feet.
- (8) Grade of Westchester avenue at the railroad crossing to be raised 1.60 feet.
- (9) Grade of Main avenue at the railroad crossing to be raised 6.00 feet.

It will be noticed that all of the changes referred to, with the exception of Main avenue, are very slight, and I do not see that any of them are such, with one exception, as will cause any inconvenience to the public or impose any material damage upon the abutting property-owners. Main avenue, which is the same as Baychester avenue, is in a district where nothing has yet been established, except on the City map, and I see no reason why the change asked for should not be approved.

The exception above referred to is at Westchester avenue, and the situation here is complicated by the fact that immediately east of the railroad crossing the City has recently built a bridge across the Bronx river, the elevation of which is such that a grade of 5 per cent. is necessary between the bridge over the river and the bridge across the railroad tracks. The railroad company asks that the legal grades for this bridge be fixed at 33.30, instead of 31.70. I find, however, that the new bridge recently built across the railroad tracks has at its centre an elevation of 33.25, or almost exactly that which is desired by the company. To accommodate the additional tracks it will be necessary to lengthen this bridge 22 feet on the easterly side and about 14 feet on the westerly side, necessitating the construction of a new bridge. This extension to the east will shorten the distance between the Bronx river bridge and the railroad bridge, thereby increasing the rate of grade. The Chief Engineer of the Borough of The Bronx advises me that the borough authorities have under consideration a plan for dividing Edgewater road into low-level and high-level roadways, the former of which would follow the bulkhead line of the Bronx river, and the latter would connect with Westchester avenue. This would shorten the intersection platform for these two streets, and, although the central portion of the new railroad bridge might remain at its present elevation if the easterly end of the bridge were reduced to a grade of 32.5, it would be possible to have a grade not exceeding 3 per cent. on the intersection platform at the higher level of Edgewater road.

This plan will be worked out in its details and submitted by the borough authorities, and until this is done I do not think that any action should be taken looking to the change of the grade of Westchester avenue.

I would, therefore, recommend that the changes asked for by the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company for the closing of a portion of Cypress avenue and for the changing of the grades of various streets be approved, except as to Westchester avenue.

#### OPENING EAST ONE HUNDRED AND SIXTY-SEVENTH STREET, THE BRONX.

In the matter of the proposed opening of East One Hundred and Sixty-seventh street, across the tracks of the New York and Harlem Railroad Company, proof of service of notice on the railroad company was presented.

Mr. Luce, of counsel for the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, appeared for the company.

The hearing was closed and the matter laid over.

#### CLOSING PUBLIC PLACE AT THE SOUTHEASTERLY CORNER OF AVENUE N AND RALPH AVENUE, BROOKLYN.

The matter of closing the public place at the corner of Ralph avenue and Avenue N, which was laid over on September 30, was laid over.

#### CLOSING PUBLIC PLACE AT THE NORTHEASTERLY CORNER OF AVENUE N AND RALPH AVENUE, BROOKLYN.

The matter of the proposed striking from the map the public place located at the northeasterly corner of Avenue N and Ralph avenue, which was laid over on September 30, was laid over.

The Comptroller moved that owing to the lack of a sufficient number of votes to adopt resolutions, the Board adjourn, which motion was unanimously adopted.

On motion made by Commissioner Montgomery and seconded by Commissioner Piser, it was

Resolved, That, in accordance with the provision of section 13, chapter 2, Part 6 of the Municipal Explosives Commission's Regulations, the Fire Commissioner be and is hereby authorized to grant a supplementary permit to McKesson & Robbins for the premises Nos. 91 to 97 Fulton street, Nos. 76 to 78 and 80 Ann street, thereby authorizing the said firm to carry the articles named in their supplementary application in the quantities therein stated, provided that all salts that are metallic or ammonium nitrates, chlorates, permanganates and peroxides in bulk be stored in the subcellar of Nos. 74 and 76 Ann street, and that no combustibles or acids be kept in said subcellar or cellar, and that the character of the occupancy and use of the other floors of said building be not changed without notice to the Bureau of Combustibles.

Carried. Commissioners Montgomery, Piser and Sherry voting in favor thereof.

On motion made by Commissioner Montgomery and seconded by Commissioner Sherry, it was

Resolved, That, in accordance with the provisions of section 13, chapter 2, Part 6 of the Municipal Explosives Commission's Regulations, the Fire Commissioner be and is hereby authorized to grant a supplementary permit to Eimer & Amend for the premises Nos. 205 to 211 Third avenue, thereby authorizing the said firm to carry all the articles named in their supplementary application in the quantities therein stated.

Carried. Commissioners Sherry, Piser and Montgomery voting in favor thereof.

On motion of Commissioner Piser, seconded by Commissioner Montgomery, it was

Resolved, That, in accordance with the provisions of section 13, chapter 2, Part 6 of the Municipal Explosives Commission's Regulations, the Fire Commissioner be and is hereby authorized to grant a supplementary permit to the Anthony Scovill Company for the premises occupied by them at Nos. 122 and 124 Fifth avenue, thereby authorizing them to carry all the articles named in their application in the quantities therein stated.

Carried. Commissioners Piser, Sherry and Montgomery voting in favor thereof.

The Secretary reported that, in accordance with the directions of the Commission, he had forwarded the resolution introduced by Commissioner Sherry and seconded by Commissioner Piser on the 16th day of June, to the Corporation Counsel for advice as to the power of the Commission in the premises. In reply to the same the Corporation Counsel wrote as follows under date of July 29:

"Hon. NICHOLAS J. HAYES, Chairman of Municipal Explosives Commission:

"Sir—I am in receipt of a communication dated June 24, 1904, and signed by Franz S. Wolf, Secretary, requesting my advice as to whether the Municipal Explosives Commission has power to add to its present Regulations a new section to be known as section 23, and to read as follows:

"Section 23. All explosives, explosive compounds or mixtures of explosive articles, fireworks, fireworks composition, signal composition, signals, or any article, the use, sale or keeping of which within The City of New York is prohibited by these Regulations specifically by name, found in violation of these Regulations, shall be forthwith seized and safely stored and sold upon three (3) days' notice to the owner or claimant and the proceeds of such sale after deducting such expenses, shall be forfeited and paid over to and for the use and benefit of the Relief Fund of the Fire Department of The City of New York; or, all said articles may be destroyed at the discretion of the Fire Commissioner if the public interest or safety should so demand."

"It is my opinion that the provisions of this proposed additional section to the Regulations of the Municipal Explosives Commission are within the scope of the power delegated to said Commission by an ordinance of the Board of Aldermen, approved by the Mayor May 19, 1902, and may properly be adopted and put in operation by said Commission.

By request the Inspector of Combustibles appeared before the Commission in reference to the proposed amendment, and upon motion of Commissioner Sherry, seconded by Commissioner Piser, the resolution was taken from the table and it was

Resolved, That Part I, Municipal Explosives Commission's Regulations, be amended by adding a new section, to be known as section 23 and to read as follows:

Section 23. All explosives, explosive compounds or mixtures of explosive articles, fireworks, fireworks composition, signal composition, signals, or any article, the use, sale or keeping of which within The City of New York is prohibited by these Regulations specifically by name, found in violation of these Regulations, shall be forthwith seized and safely stored and sold upon three (3) days' notice to the owner or claimant and the proceeds of such sale, after deducting all expenses, shall be forfeited and paid over to and for the use and benefit of the Relief Fund of the Fire Department of The City of New York; or, all said articles shall be destroyed if in the discretion of the Fire Commissioner the public interest or safety should so demand.

Carried. Commissioners Sherry, Piser and Montgomery voting in favor thereof.

The resolution amending section 57, Part 5, of the Regulations, was taken up and discussed.

Laid over without taking action on same.

Meeting then adjourned to August 30, 1904.

### MUNICIPAL EXPLOSIVES COMMISSION.

Headquarters New York City Fire Department,

The drug and chemical schedules came up for consideration. Upon report of Chairman Montgomery of Committee and upon motion of Commissioner Piser, seconded by Commissioner Montgomery, it was

Resolved, That the Secretary of the Commission be hereby authorized and directed to make an investigation in reference to the inequalities and completeness of the present drug and chemical and of the combustible and volatile oil schedules of the Municipal Explosives Commission Regulations, to report all inequalities so found and to report all omissions from said schedule of substances usually found in trade and manufacture the sale or use of which is prohibited, except in accordance with the provisions of the said Regulations by the ordinances of the Board of Aldermen changing sections 763 and 769 of the Greater New York Charter, passed May 13, 1902, and to submit a typewritten copy of said report to each member of the Commission.

The resolution amending section 57, Part 5 of the Regulations was then taken from the table, and on motion of Commissioner Sherry, seconded by Commissioner Montgomery, it was

Resolved, That section 57, Part 5 of the Municipal Explosives Commission's Regulations be amended so as to extend the prohibition of the use or discharge of fireworks without a permit to the entire City, thereby including that portion of the City not within the fire limits in said prohibition; and to read as follows:

#### CHAPTER V.

##### Use of Fireworks.

Section 57. The use or discharge of fireworks and firecrackers in the City, excepting on Independence Day or the day celebrated as such, the twelve hours preceding and the six hours following, without a license or permit from the Fire Commissioner, is prohibited. No license or permit shall be issued for the discharge of fireworks within the City until the person, firm or corporation desiring to secure said license shall have made written application for same and deposited with the Fire Commissioner a bond in the penal sum of five thousand dollars, approved as to sufficiency by the Comptroller, and conditioned for the payment of any loss, damage, or injury resulting to persons or property by reason of the discharge or use of said fireworks, and for the strict observance of sections 731, 767, 771 and 773 of the Greater New York Charter, and the ordinances adopted by the Board of Aldermen May 13, 1902, and approved by the Mayor May 19, 1902, amending sections 763 and 769 of the Greater New York Charter and of these Regulations.

Carried. Commissioners Sherry, Montgomery and Piser voting in favor thereof.

Meeting then adjourned to meet at 9.30 A. M. September 13, 1904.

Perforated Pipes in Cellars and Sub-cellars. All perforated pipes are to be of wrought iron or steel, and capable of withstanding a pressure of 300 pounds to the square inch.

They shall be suspended with proper hangers, not less than 6 inches below the ceiling and parallel thereto, running full depth of building and placed 12½ feet apart on centres and 6 feet from side walls, to be securely fastened and properly braced to withstand vibration.

Pipe shall be 1½ inches internal diameter perforated with 1-16 inch holes; holes to be on the quarters 2 inches apart longitudinally and to be staggered, making 24 holes to the running foot of pipe. Holes must be drilled, not punched.

These 1½-inch pipes to be connected with a feed pipe 4 inches internal diameter, placed close to and parallel to front or side walls of building and connected by and with a 4-inch pipe terminating outside of said wall in a 3-inch Siamese connection, to be fitted with proper clapper valve or valves. One Siamese connection to furnish water to no more than a total of 400 feet of perforated pipe. No single line to be longer than 100 feet.

Sub-cellars require separate equipment.

Cast-iron fittings must not be used.

All unnecessary bends will be avoided, and where needed such bends or curves to be easy and of a radius not less than six times the diameter of the pipe.

A suitable iron plate on outside of building, with raised letters, must be fastened to the wall, or other approved place near cellar connection, to read: "THIS CONNECTION LEADS TO PERFORATED PIPES IN CELLAR."

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately.

The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures. Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
