The Secretary was instructed to advertise a public hearing in the matter:

An opinion dated Dec. 6 was presented from the Acting Corporation Counsel as follows:

"Municipal Civil Service Commission of The City of New York.

Sirs—I am in receipt of a communication from Mr. John F. Skelly, Assistant Secretary, bearing date Nov. 23, 1917, reading as follows:

"At a meeting held on Nov. 21, the Civil Service Commission considered a letter from the Secretary of the Board of Education requesting to be informed whether persons whose names appear upon eligible lists for promotion, but who are absent on military service, must be considered in making promotions or whether they may be passed over.

"It is the sense of the Commission that in accordance with chapter 435 of the Laws of 1917, persons whose names appear upon a promotion list must be considered as though they were actually present in the department when absent on military duty at the present time.

"I was instructed to refer the matter to the Corporation Counsel for a ruling."

Chapter 435 of the Laws of 1917 amending section 245 of the Military Law, at paragraph 1 provides for the absence of officers or employees of the City, members of the National Guard or Naval Militia, while performing ordered military or naval duty and reads in part thus:

"* * * * No such officer or employee shall be subjected by any person whatever, directly or indirectly, by reason of such absence, to any loss or diminution of vacation or holiday privileges or be prejudiced by reason of such absence with reference to promotion or continuance in office or employment or to a reappointment to office or to reemployment * * *"

Paragraph 2 refers to the absence of officers and employees of the City who may have obligated themselves to enter the Federal, Military, Naval or Marine service or who may be drafted or who may enter such Federal service with the consent of the proper superior officer and provides that such a person absent in the performance of such duty:

"* * * * shall not, during the period of the war and for two months thereafter, be deprived either directly or indirectly, by reason of such absence, of any privileges of such officer or employee, or be prejudiced in any way because of such absence with reference to promotion or continuance in office or employment or to reappointment to office or to re-employment."

It appears that the purpose of this act is to provide that where an officer or employee of the City is performing military or naval services as therein provided, he shall be treated as if actually present and shall not suffer any loss as provided in said act by reason of absence on such military or naval duty. In any case it seems to me the question would be as to what action the proper officials charged with the duty to perform in the premises, would take if the employee concerned were present and rendering service. In the case you suggest if the persons involved were here present you would certify their names as eligible for promotion. If this is so, I think it is your duty to certify the names of these people irrespective of the fact that they are absent in the performance of military or naval duty. On the other hand, if any of these persons were present, but for some reason other than absence on such military or naval duty, their names would not be certified, then, I think, it will not be necessary for you to certify such person's name and if the names are certified the proper official will be under obligation to promote these persons though so absent unless as above stated if, for some reason other than his absence on military duty, the said official did not desire to promote such person.

Respectfully yours, LOUIS H. HAHLO, Acting Corporation Counsel."

The Secretary was instructed to proceed accordingly.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 will be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The person or persons making a bid for any service, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or officers, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the bids will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also that it is made without any connection with any other person making a bid for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion, fraud and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer or employee of The City of New York is, shall be, or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the bid that the several matters stated therein are in all respects true.
