

September is National Preparedness Month: Leave a Lasting Legacy



National Preparedness Month serves as a reminder to take action to prepare, now and throughout the year, for the types of emergencies that could affect us where we live, work, learn, and worship. With all of the challenges New Yorkers have faced, the **2022**

theme is "A Lasting Legacy: The life you've built is worth protecting. Prepare for disasters to create a lasting legacy for you and your family."

Use the <u>National Preparedness Month Messaging Toolkit</u> to coordinate messaging for your community, house of worship or organization. Share the weekly themes, graphics, and links on your social media channels and with your contacts to spread the message of preparedness.

Leave a lasting legacy – prepare for emergencies today! Check out NYC.gov/npm for events, preparedness guides, and more.

The best way to ensure your lasting legacy is to prepare your family, and your community for emergencies.

Week 1: Make A Plan - Talk to your friends and family about how to communicate before, during and after emergencies. Utilize the Ready NY My Emergency Plan Guide: NYC.gov/myemergencyplan

Week 2: Gather Supplies - Ensure your lasting legacy for yourself and your family by gathering emergency supplies that can help you whether you stay or go.

Week 3: Plan for Hazards - Prepare to protect yourself and your family by planning for hazards that may affect you and your community.

 Prepare for Coastal Storms and Floods - Make sure you know your ZONE. Use the Hurricane Evacuation Zone Finder or call 311. Have the right **Flood Insurance** to protect your home. HURRICANE IDA ONE YEAR ANNIVERSARY

One year ago on September 1st, 2021, **Hurricane Ida** made landfall in New York as **Tropical Storm Ida**.

Are you feeling on edge or restless about hurricane Ida's anniversary? This is completely normal and can be

attributed to the "Anniversary Effect."

What is the "Anniversary Effect?"

It is a collection of disturbing feelings, thoughts or memories that occur on or around a date that marks a significant event. You could be feeling sad, irritable, anxious, emotionally shutdown, or unable to sleep.

Knowing what to expect on disasters' anniversaries and treating yourself with extra self-compassion is important.

Here are few coping tips...

- 1. Talk about it with loved ones, co-workers, friends or consider seeking mental health care professionals.
- 2. Commemorate the event as a celebration of survival.
- 3. Prepare and plan ahead for future storms and floods. Clickhere for more information.
- 4. Give yourself time. Loss affects each of us differently, and there is no set amount of time in which you should be over it.

HURRICANE IDA SUPPLEMENTAL FUNDING PROGRAM

NYC Mayor's Office of Housing Recovery Operations

Were you impacted by Post Tropical Storm Ida? We may be able to help!

- If you own a 1-4 family home that was uninhabitable because of damage from Ida; and
- You applied for FEMA or were not eligible for FEMA assistance because

you are a landlord; and

- Have either been denied or received less than the amount needed to complete repairs that would make the home habitable, then
- You may be eligible for assistance up to \$72,000* to cover the cost of the repairs to make the home habitable** and for mitigation measures to protect against future damage.

APPLICATION DEADLINE SEPTEMBER 12, 2022

*Subject to program policy guidelines.

**Program habitability is defined as having functioning heat, hot water, electricity, and gas (where applicable) with at least one running tap with potable water and one functioning toilet.
