

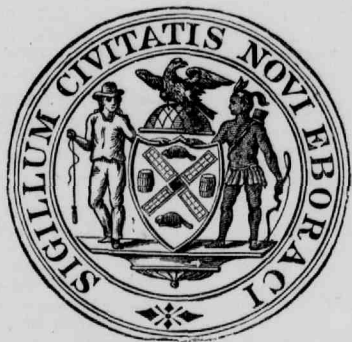

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC PARKS.

WEDNESDAY, January 12, 1881.

Adjourned meeting, 10 A. M.

Present—Commissioners Lane, Wales, MacLean, and Olliffe.

Commissioner Lane in the chair.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

Commissioner Lane offered the following:

Resolved, That until the next meeting of the Board either one of the Commissioners be and he is hereby invested with power to approve of all requisitions and orders for supplies, and to sign all permits issued by the Department.

The Chairman put the question whether the Board would agree to said resolution, and it was determined in the affirmative, a majority of all the members of the Board voting in favor thereof, as follows:

Ayes—Commissioners Lane, Wales, MacLean, and Olliffe—4.

Commissioner Lane offered the following:

Resolved, That Julius Munckwitz be continued as Acting Superintendent of Parks until the next meeting of the Board.

The Chairman put the question whether the Board would agree to said resolution, and it was determined in the affirmative, a majority of all the members of the Board voting in favor thereof, as follows:

Ayes—Commissioners Lane, Wales, MacLean, and Olliffe—4.

The following communications were received:

From the Department of Docks, protesting against the granting of permission to Gideon B. Massey and others to moor a floating pavilion at the Battery, and submitting a copy of an opinion of the Counsel to the Corporation in relation to the jurisdiction over the water and lands under the water in front of the Battery.

Laid on the table.

From the Engineer of Construction, submitting a plan, specifications, and estimate for the protection of the draw of the Madison avenue bridge, when open.

Referred to the Executive Committee.

From the Engineer of Construction, asking authority to allow time to Emil Blyer, Assistant Engineer, for four days lost on account of sickness.

Commissioner Lane moved that Emil Blyer be allowed four days' time lost on account of sickness.

The Chairman put the question whether the Board would agree to said motion, and it was determined in the negative, a majority of all the members of the Board not voting in favor thereof, as follows:

Ayes—Commissioners Lane and Wales—2.

Noes—Commissioners MacLean and Olliffe—2.

From Josiah A. Briggs, Assistant Engineer, asking for an increase of compensation.

Referred to the Committee appointed to inquire into and report upon the personnel of the Department.

From Benjamin F. Crane, applying for the position of Superintendent of Parks.

Ordered filed.

From Joseph J. Snow, applying for a renewal of his license for pony service in Central Park.

Referred to the Executive Committee.

From the Health Department, submitting a copy of a preamble and resolution relative to the drainage of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards.

Referred to the Topographical Engineer to report upon.

From the Supervisor of the CITY RECORD, making requisition for a list of subordinates of the Department, as required by section 3 of chapter 335 of the Laws of 1873.

Referred to the Secretary to prepare said list.

From the Superintending Gardener, reporting on the plants injured by the fire at Mount St. Vincent.

Ordered filed.

At the hour of ten and a half o'clock, and in accordance with the previous understanding, the application of Gideon B. Massey and others for permission to moor a floating palace at the Battery, was taken up and the consideration thereof proceeded with. Messrs. Gideon B. Massey, E. L. Parris, O. P. Buel, and Captain J. B. Parks appeared before the Board and made statements in favor of said application.

A communication was received from John H. Starin in opposition to said application, and Messrs. F. W. Vosburgh, on behalf of Schuyler's line of steamers, F. C. Cantine, on behalf of John H. Starin, and Isaac Hall, in his own behalf, appeared in opposition to said application.

The further consideration of said report was then laid over.

In accordance with the direction of the Board at the last meeting, a report was received from the Superintending Architect in relation to the water closets in the Arsenal building, recommending that they be placed outside of the building.

On motion of Commissioner Wales the Superintending Architect was directed to present a plan with an estimate of the cost, with the view of carrying out the recommendations as contained in the report.

From the Acting Superintendent of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, in relation to allowing time to one mason and four laborers for one day on which they worked before they were notified of their discharge.

Commissioner Wales moved that time be allowed the five men referred to for the 10th instant.

The Chairman put the question whether the Board would agree to said motion, and it was determined in the affirmative, a majority of all the members of the Board voting in favor thereof, as follows:

Ayes—Commissioners Lane, Wales, MacLean, and Olliffe—4.

From the Acting Superintendent of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, recommending that one mason, two laborers, and one skilled laborer be appointed for duty in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards.

Commissioner Olliffe offered the following:

Resolved, That the employment of one mason and six laborers, for work in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, be referred to Commissioner Olliffe, with power.

The Chairman put the question whether the Board would agree to said resolution, and it was determined in the affirmative, a majority of all the members of the Board voting in favor thereof, as follows:

Ayes—Commissioners Lane, Wales, MacLean, and Olliffe—4.

From the Acting Superintendent of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards stating that he had received a complaint from Captain Yule, of the Thirty-fifth Police Precinct, in relation to piles of stones used in McAdamizing by the Department being left along Riverdale Avenue and Broadway at Kingsbridge, without proper lights to locate them at night; that he had directed a laborer to place lights upon the same and to attend to them at night; that he had placed a laborer in charge of the pumping engine and stone breaker, and recommending that Dennis Geoghegan, laborer, be employed to take care of the horses, and asking that the Board approve of his action.

On motion of Commissioner Wales the subjects referred to in said communication were referred to Commissioner Olliffe, with power.

From the Mayor in relation to the removal of snow and ice from the walks of the City Parks.

Ordered filed.

Resolved, That the Superintendent Architect be and he is hereby instructed to examine and report upon the condition of the cottages and bridges and other buildings on the City parks and the Central Park belonging to this Department, and to inform this Board what is necessary to put them in good repair, together with an estimate of the cost of the same.

Commissioner Wales offered the following:

Whereas, It appearing from communications addressed to this Board by William J. McAlpine, Engineer of Construction, under dates of April 6, 13 and 19, 1879, and more particularly of the date of January 7, 1881, that the wooden approaches to the Central or MacComb's Dam bridge are so badly decayed that the structure "is liable at any moment to break down under the excessive traffic which passes over it;" therefore,

Resolved, That the Engineer of Construction be and he hereby is authorized to proceed at once with such measures as he may deem necessary to strengthen the southern approach to said bridge, and to make requisition for such labor and material as may be required for that purpose, such expenditure not to exceed the sum of one thousand dollars.

The Chairman put the question whether the Board would agree to said preamble and resolution, and it was determined in the affirmative, a majority of all of the members of the Board voting in favor thereof, as follows:

Ayes—Commissioners Lane, Wales, MacLean, and Olliffe—4.

Commissioner Wales offered the following:

Whereas, For some years past there has existed in the minds of persons residing in the vicinity of the Arsenal Building, in the Central Park, apparently well grounded sanitary objection to the retention of the zoological collection as now established at that place, and for the purpose of determining whether or not such objections do exist; therefore,

Resolved, That the Board of Health of the City be requested to make a careful examination into the matter, and report the same to this Board at as early a date as possible.

The Chairman put the question whether the Board would agree to said preamble and resolution, and it was determined in the negative, a majority of all of the members of the Board not voting in favor thereof, as follows:

Aye—Commissioner Wales—1.

Noes—Commissioners Lane, MacLean, and Olliffe—3.

Commissioner Wales offered the following:

Resolved, That permission be and is hereby granted to Robert L. Stuart to erect bay-windows on the front and side of his proposed new dwelling, to be erected on his property at the corner of Fifth avenue and Sixty-eighth street, and according to the plans submitted to this Board, said projections not to exceed five feet on Fifth avenue, and four feet on Sixty-eighth street.

Commissioner Lane moved to amend said resolution by striking out the word "five" and inserting the word "four."

The Chairman put the question whether the Board would agree to said amendment, and it was determined in the negative, a majority of all of the members of the Board not voting in favor thereof, as follows:

Ayes—Commissioners Lane and MacLean—2.

Noes—Commissioners Wales and Olliffe—2.

The Chairman put the question whether the Board would agree to said resolution, and it was determined in the negative, a majority of all the members of the Board not voting in favor thereof, as follows:

Ayes—Commissioners Wales and Olliffe—2.

Noes—Commissioners Lane and MacLean—2.

On motion of Commissioner Olliffe, it was

Resolved, That the Counsel to the Corporation be requested to furnish this Department with his opinion as to the powers and jurisdiction of this Department over the water front and the lands under the water in front of the Battery.

On motion of Commissioner MacLean, it was

Resolved, That the Surgeon of the Department be directed to make forthwith a thorough physical examination of each member of the Police Force and report to the Board the age, weight, height, and chest measurements of each, with such remarks concerning the health of each member as may seem advisable for the information of the Board.

On motion of Commissioner Lane, it was

Resolved, That Commissioners Olliffe and Lane be and they are hereby appointed a committee, with power to confer with the Board of City Record, in relation to the printing, stationery, and supplies necessary for the use of the Department.

On motion of Commissioner MacLean, it was

Resolved, That Commissioner Lane, heretofore appointed a committee to audit the accounts of the late Treasurer down to the 14th December, 1880, be authorized to continue such audit to and including the 31st day of December, 1880, and requested to report thereon.

Commissioner Lane offered the following:

Resolved, That badges of office be purchased for the use of Commissioners MacLean and Olliffe.

The Chairman put the question whether the Board would agree to said resolution, and it was determined in the affirmative, a majority of all the members of the Board voting in favor thereof, as follows:

Ayes—Commissioners Lane, Wales, and Olliffe—3.

No—Commissioner MacLean—1.

On motion of Commissioner Olliffe, at 1 o'clock and twenty minutes the Board adjourned.

ASSESSMENT COMMISSION.

MAYOR'S OFFICE—CITY HALL,
TUESDAY, December 21, 1880, 2 o'clock P. M.

The Commission created by chapter 550 of the Laws of 1880 to revise, vacate, or modify assessments for local improvements in the City of New York, met pursuant to adjournment.

Present—All the members, viz.:

Commissioners Edward Cooper (Chairman), John Kelly, Allan Campbell, George H. Andrews, and Daniel Lord, Jr.

The minutes of the meeting held December 7, 1880, were read and approved.

The Clerk presented copies of the CITY RECORD and Daily Register of the 20th and 21st December, 1880, showing due publication of notices of the present meeting.

The Chairman, Commissioner Cooper, inquired whether, under the rules, any notices of hearing had been served on the Counsel to the Corporation.

Mr. H. L. Sprague, of counsel for Hiram A. Crane, petitioner for the vacation or reduction of the assessment on his property for the Inwood and Dyckman street drains, confirmed December 23, 1875, stated that the notices required by the second section of the act, chapter 550 of the Laws of 1880, had been filed with the Comptroller and Counsel to the Corporation on or before November 1, 1880. Under the rules, a notice of hearing had been served on the Counsel to the Corporation on the 13th of December, 1880, and proof of the service of such notice had been filed with the clerk on the 17th of December, 1880.

The Chairman, Commissioner Cooper, said that the petition of Hiram A. Crane referred to (No. 26 on the Clerk's calendar), was properly before the Commission.

On motion of Mr. H. L. Sprague, counsel for petitioner, the Corporation Counsel not opposing, the further hearing of this case was set down for January 18, 1881.

The Chairman, Commissioner Cooper, inquired if there were any persons present who desired to bring any matter before the Commission.

None were present.

On motion of the Chairman, Commissioner Cooper, a recess of ten minutes was taken to enable the Commission to examine rooms in the City Hall building, for the use of the Commission.

Upon reassembling, Commissioner Lord offered the following resolution, which was adopted. Resolved, That the Clerk of the Commission be instructed to procure the assignment of suitable rooms for the use of the Commission.

Commissioner Kelly offered the following resolution, which was adopted.

Resolved, That if a suitable room is assigned, the clerk be authorized to request the Commissioner of Public Works to have the room fitted up for the use of the Commission.

On motion of Commissioner Andrews, the seventh rule, relating to meetings of the Commission, was suspended.

Commissioner Andrews then offered the following resolution, which was adopted.

Resolved, That when the Commission adjourns, it do so to meet on Tuesday, January 18, 1881, at 2 o'clock P. M., at the office of the Comptroller.

On motion of Commissioner Lord, the Commission then adjourned.

SECTION 3 OF CHAPTER 521 OF THE LAWS of 1880, requires that heads of departments shall reduce the aggregate expenses of their respective departments by a reduction of salaries, and confers upon them authority to consolidate bureaux and offices for that purpose, as follows, to wit:

CHAPTER 123.

AN ACT in relation to arrears of taxes in the City of New York, and to provide for the reissuing of revenue bonds in anticipation of such taxes.

Passed April 15, 1880; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. At any time after the passage of this act, and before the first day of October, eighteen hundred and eighty, any person may pay to the Comptroller of the City of New York the amount of any tax upon real property belonging to such person, heretofore laid or imposed and now remaining unpaid, together with interest thereon at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calculated from the time that such tax was imposed to the time of such payment, provided, also, that the time when such payment may be made on the amount of any such tax laid or imposed in the years eighteen hundred and seventy-seven, eighteen hundred and seventy-eight, and eighteen hundred and seventy-nine shall extend to the first day of April, eighteen hundred and eighty-one. The comptroller shall make and deliver to the person making any such payment a receipt therefor, and shall forthwith cancel the record of any such tax on the books of the finance department; and upon such payment being made such tax shall cease to be a lien upon the property and shall be deemed fully paid, satisfied and discharged, and there shall be no right to any further interest or penalty by reason of such tax not having been paid within the time heretofore required by law, or by reason of any statute passed requiring the payment heretofore of any penalty or interest over seven per centum per annum upon any unpaid tax.

Sec. 2. Any revenue bond heretofore issued in anticipation of the taxes in the first section specified which may fall due and become payable before said taxes are collected, may be reissued by the comptroller of said city, in whole or in part, for such period as he may determine, not exceeding one year.

Sec. 3. This act shall take effect immediately.
