

of the operations and action of the Department of Taxes and Assessments for the quarter ending June 30, 1887. During this quarter the revision of assessed valuations has been completed and the assessed valuations of real and personal property for the year 1887 have been determined. This report, therefore, embraces a summary of the action of the Department for the official year, which begins with the assessment of property for purposes of taxation on the first Monday of September, and terminates with the delivery of the assessment rolls, certified by the Commissioners, to the Board of Aldermen on the first Monday of July, as required by law. The following is a statement of the assessed valuations of the taxable real estate, by wards, and personal estate in the City of New York for the year 1887, as compared with the same for the year 1886:

This increase, as will be seen by the preceding statement, is mostly in the Twelfth, Nineteenth and Twenty-second Wards, and is chiefly attributable to the erection and completion of new buildings and appreciation in the value of real estate.

The increase for 1887 is \$3,822,107. This increase is due principally to the appreciation in the value of bank shares.

Since the last report was made, the Fulton Bank has reduced its capital \$300,000, the Home Bank has reduced its capital \$25,000, and the Wall Street Bank has gone out of existence. The Columbia Bank has increased its capital \$100,000, and one new bank, the Twelfth Ward, has been established. The Metropolitan National Bank, which was not assessed last year, owing to the fact that at the time the assessments were made the stock had no value beyond the value of the real estate owned by the bank, is assessed this year at a valuation of \$10 per share, exclusive of real estate.

During the time the books were open, from the second Monday in January to the 30th day of April, to receive applications from parties considering themselves aggrieved by assessments upon their real property, there were received, in 1881, 2,478 applications; and during the same period in 1882 there were received 1,262 applications; in 1883 there were received 1,133 applications; in 1884 there were received 910 applications; in 1885 there were received 1,511 applications; in 1886 there were received 907 applications, and in 1887 there were received 637 applications.

#### Santary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending August 6, 1887 :

August 6, 1887 : There were 5,664 inspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors and the Sanitary Police. There were 879 complaints returned by the Sanitary Inspectors and the Sanitary Police. There were 818 complaints received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors and the Sanitary Police for investigation and report. There were issued to the consignees of vessels, to discharge cargoes on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port, 86 permits. There were issued to consignees to discharge rags (in bulk, under bonds), 9 permits.

There were issued to scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy sinks, 68 permits. There were issued to scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy sinks, 68 permits. There were issued, under the Sanitary Code, 7 miscellaneous permits. I herewith forward reports from Chief Inspectors Tracy, Edson and Bullard of the work per-formed by themselves and their respective corps.

The certificates of 680 births, 54 still-births, 147 marriages and 928 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, August 6, 1887. This shows an increase of 76 births and 114 deaths, and a decrease of 8 still-births and 58 marriages when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when com-pared with the corresponding week of the year 1886 there was an increase of 47 births and 152 deaths, and a decrease of 9 still-births and 93 marriages. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from measles decreased 1; diphtheria, 2; croup, 4; erysipelas, 2; malarial fevers, 5; puerperal diseases, 3; diarrhoeal diseases, 9; rheumatism and gout, 2; bronchits, 9; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 1; meningitis and encephalitis, 1; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 3; gastritis, enteritis and peitonitis, 9; cyanosis and atelectasis, 4; premature and preternatural births, 2; suicide, 1; while the deaths from small-pox increased 1; scarlatina, 3; whooping cough, 1; typhoid fever, 6; inanition, 1; alcoholism, 1; cancer, 3; phthisis pulmonalis, 32; pneumonia, 6; heart diseases, 4; aneurism, 1; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 2; convulsions, 5; direct effect of solar heat, 88; apoplexy, 6; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 84; Bright's disease and nephritis, 15; surgical operations, 1; drowning, 10. The number of deaths from creator-spinal fever was the same in the two successive weeks.
