

SANITARY BUREAU.

Summary of Work.

The following is a summary of the operations of the Sanitary Bureau, which is charged with the duty of inspecting and reporting in proper form all nuisances or causes of danger to the public health, with the execution of the orders of the Board, and with the care of contagious diseases, for the quarter ending June 30, 1887:

The number of inspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors was 80,430.

The number of causes of complaint returned was 7,939.

The number of complaints received from citizens was 4,802, all of which were referred to the

Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

The Sanitary Superintendent during the same period, under instruction and authority of the Board, granted 980 permits to discharge cargoes, upon proper vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port; 1,141 permits to scavengers to empty privies; 89 permits to land rags (in bulk) under bonds; 71 permits to remove manure from stables in the city; and 162 miscellaneous permits under the Sanitary Code.

During the three months ending June 30, 1887, nine thousand five hundred and ninety (9,590) permits were granted for burials. During the same period one hundred and eighty-nine (189) applications for transit permits were received and permits granted; seven hundred and seventy-six (776) permits were granted for the burial of still-born children; one thousand and seventy-eight (1,078) Coroners' certificates were received and recorded; one thousand seven hundred and ninety-seven (1,797) searches of the records of births, marriages and deaths were made; and one thousand one hundred and sixty-nine (1,169) transcripts of the records of deaths, one hundred and nine (109) of marriages, and one hundred and twenty-one (121) of births from said records were issued. There were six thousand nine hundred and thirty (6,930) persons registered as married during the quarter, and seven thousand five hundred and thirty-two (7,532) children were born during the same period.

OFFICE OF THE SECRETARY—NOTICES OF THE BOARD.

The notices of the Board for the abatement of nuisances are issued upon the facts and evidence contained in the written reports of the Sanitary Inspectors, the result of personal inspection of premises complained of. During the three months ending June 30, 1887, the number of notices issued by the Board was 4,667. These notices call the attention of owners, lessees and agents to violations of the Sanitary Code in each case, and require the necessary alteration, repair, cleaning, and improvement of the premises named within five days from the receipt of the notice. If, upon re-inspection, it is found that the requirements of the notice have not been complied with, a suit for penalty is commenced against the delinquents under section 82, chapter 335, Laws of 1873.

The subjects of the notices of the Board above referred to, are as follows:
