REPORTED MORTALITY\* for the week ending August 21, 1886, together with the ACTUAL MORTALITY for the week ending August 14, 1886.

W. De F. Day, M. D., Sanitary Superintendent and Register:

SIR—There were 736 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, August 21, 1886, which is an increase of 14, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 113 more than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1885. The actual mortality for the week ending August 14, 1886, was 775, which is 54.8 above the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 27.97 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,444,204.
