In pursuance of the authority contained in the 112th section of chapter 335, being an act entitled "An Act to reorganize the local government of the City of New York," passed April 30, 1873; and section 1 of chapter 779, being an act entitled "An Act in relation to raising money by taxation in the County of New York, for county purposes," passed June 14, 1873; and chapter 304, being an act entitled "An Act to consolidate the government of the City and County of New York, and further to regulate the same," passed April 30, 1874; and chapter 303, being an act entitled "An Act in relation to the Estimates and Apportionment for the support of the government of the County of New York," passed April 30, 1874; and chapter 308, being an act entitled "An Act in relation to the Estimates and Apportionment for the support of the government of the City of New York," passed May 1, 1874,—a meeting is hereby called of the Mayor, Comptroller, President of the Board of Aldermen, and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, constituting a Board of Estimate and Apportionment, to be held at the office of the Mayor, on Saturday, March 6, 1875, at 2 o'clock P.M., for the purposes specified in communication from the Comptroller, of March 3, 1875, and for the transaction of such other business as may come before the Board.

Affirmative—The Mayor of the City of New York (Chairman); the President of the Board of Aldermen, and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—3.

Negative—The Comptroller of the City of New York—1.

The Chairman presented the following communication from the Common Council:

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and is hereby requested to transfer from the appropriation for "Election Expenses" for years prior to 1873 (a sufficient balance thereof remaining unexpended), the sum of seventeen hundred dollars, to the appropriation for "Salaries—Common Council," it being necessary, for the proper transaction of the business of this Board that such transfer should be made.

Which was referred to the Comptroller to report upon.

The Chairman presented the following communication from the Commissioner of Public Works:

SIR—The Board of Estimate and Apportionment, on September 10, 1874, set apart, by transfer, the sum of fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000) to the appropriation "Paving the Ways of West Washington Market," and during the said year no authority for said work was granted by the Common Council.

It now appears that the Common Council of 1875, on February 6, passed the requisite authority, and in order that the contemplated work should be carried into effect, it is essential that your Honorable Board should transfer the said amount of \$15,000, from 1874 to the year 1875, to be devoted to the same purpose.

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and he is hereby authorized and directed to issue bonds of the City of New York, as provided in chapter 756 of the Laws of 1873, for the purpose of providing moneys for the payment of claims and judgments which have been or may be obtained against the said City, the amount of said bonds not to exceed the sum of Two Hundred Thousand Dollars; said bonds to be designated "New York City Bonds for Liquidation of Claims and Judgments," and bear interest not exceeding seven per cent. per annum, and payable at such time, within three years from the date thereof, as the Comptroller may determine.

The Chairman put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution.

Which was decided in the affirmative by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor of the City of New York (Chairman), the Comptroller of the City of New York, the President of the Board of Aldermen, and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—4.

The Comptroller called the attention of the Board to the communication from the "Commissioners for the Erection of the Court-house in the Third Judicial District of the City of New York," of December 17, 1874, presented at meeting of December 23, 1874, asking for an appropriation for salaries.

SIR—The following resolution was adopted on the 20th inst., by the Board governing this Department:

Resolved, That in pursuance of the provisions of section 3, chapter 534, Laws of 1871, and section 16, chapter 329, Laws of 1874, and for the purpose of providing for the expense of constructing a bridge over the Harlem river, in the City of New York, the Department of Public Parks of said City, and the Board of Commissioners thereof, hereby make requisition on the Comptroller of said City, to issue in the name of and on behalf of the Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of said City, bonds to the amount of (\$100,000) one hundred thousand dollars. Said bonds shall be issued in sums composed of even hundreds of dollars, shall be payable in twenty years from the date of issue, and shall bear such rate of interest not exceeding seven per cent. per annum, as shall be determined by said Comptroller.

Resolved, That the said Department and the said Commissioners thereof, hereby certify that said amount, namely (\$100,000) one hundred thousand dollars, is necessary to be raised for said purposes.

Commissioner Martin submitted a communication relative to public improvements in the City, which was ordered to be printed as a document.

The Board then adopted the following resolution:

"Resolved, That, in the opinion of this Board, the facts set forth in the communication presented by Commissioner Wm. R. Martin this day, and ordered to be printed as a document of the Board, are calculated not only to revive the recollection of the high estimation in which the work of the Department of Parks carried forward for a long course of years has been held, but also to reassure the public at large that the more recent expenditures have thus far been, and will, in their opinion, continue to be, largely beneficial to the great and important interests of the City in the general advance of the value of property and large increase of revenue.

"Resolved, That the works and improvements referred to in said document should be proceeded with at once, with a due regard to a wise economy."

The action of the Board in accepting the proposal of G. Fischer & Bro., for furnishing a bronze railing round Lincoln Monument, was reconsidered and the proposal rejected, on the advice of the Counsel to the Corporation, that said proposal did not comply with the statutes and ordinances. Thereupon the proposal (No. 1) of Messrs. Jones & Kirtland for said work was accepted, and the contract therefor awarded to them.

Mrs. Titus, widow of the late Draw-tender of bridge over the Bronx river, was appointed to that position, at a salary of \$300 per annum, as she had for many years discharged the duties herself, in consequence of the sickness of her husband. This appointment was recommended by the Supervisors of the town of Westchester, who pay one-half the above amount, and others resident in the vicinity.
