An Ordinance for the Licensing of City Rail-road Passenger Cars.

road Passenger Cars.

The Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of New York do ordain as follows:
Sec. I. Each and every passenger railroad car, running in the City of New York shall pay into the City Treasury the sum of fifty dollars, annually, for a license; a certificate of such payment to be procured from the Mayor, except the one-horse passenger cars, and the cars of the Ninth Avenue Railroad Company, which shall each pay the sum of twenty-five dollars, annually, for said license as atoresaid, and except such as pay the sum of three per cent. or over on the gross receipts, or where the franchise has been sold at public sale to the highest bidder.

Sec. 2. Each certificate of payment of license shall be affixed to some conspicuous place in the

Sec. 2. Each certificate of payment of license shall be affixed to some conspicuous place in the car, that it may be inspected by the proper officer, to be designated and appointed by the Mayor.

Sec. 3. To every passenger car run upon any of the railroads without the proper certificate of license, the proprietor or proprietors thereof shall be subject to a penalty of fifty dollars, for each day every such car shall be so run, to be recovered by the Corporation Attorney, as in the case of other penalties, and for the benefit of the City Treasury.
