REPORT:

That, having examined the subject, they recommend that the annexed petition be granted and the following resolution be adopted:

Resolved, That, pursuant to the statute in such case made and provided, the Hebrew Benevolent and Orphan Asylum Society of the City of New York are hereby authorized and empowered to sell and convey, in fee simple absolute, the whole or any part of the several lots of land situate in the City of New York heretofore conveyed to said society by the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York, by conveyances recorded respectively in the office of the Register of the City and County of New York in Liber 833 of Conveyances, page 233, and in Liber 916 of Conveyances, page 232, anything in said several conveyances contained to the contrary notwithstanding, and the said grant is hereby modified and altered so as to authorize such sale; and the officers required by law to execute conveyances by the City are hereby requested and directed to execute such further and additional conveyances or instrument in writing as may be necessary to modify the said deeds hereinbefore referred to in accordance with this resolution.

It is further Resolved, That the said society shall, in case of any such sale, devote the proceeds of such sale to the maintenance and support of such society and to the orphans, half orphans and indigent children under its charge; but no purchaser of any such lots, or any part thereof, shall be charged with the proper application of said proceeds, nor shall any conveyance by said Hebrew Orphan Asylum Society be in any manner invalidated or affected by the misapplication of such proceeds or any part thereof.

It is further Resolved, That such lots and the improvements thereon, if used for any other purposes than for a Hebrew Benevolent Orphan Asylum, shall not be exempt from taxation.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen :

GENTLEMEN—For many years the Chief Clerk of this office has been obliged to advance from his own private purse large sums of money to pay the necessary contingent expenses of this office. DEAR SIR—As you are aware, an alternative writ of mandamus has been issued by the Supreme Court, upon the application of Charles R. Gleason, for a review of the action of your Honorable Board in making the division of the Thirteenth Senate District into Assembly Districts. The certificate filed by the Board in the County Clerk's office shows the total population of each of the three Assembly Districts as found by the Board. It does not show the figures by Election Districts, fixed upon by the Board as the basis for finding the total population for each Assembly District, as stated in the certificate.

I have made application to Mr. Ten Eyck, the Clerk of the Common Council, for these figures, and have been informed that they are not matters of public record and that he has no authority to show papers which are not public documents without the authority of the Board. A similar application to the Corporation Counsel has met with a similar refusal, based upon lack of information or authority from your Board to make public such figures.

I assume that the Board can have no motive for concealing or refusing to impart to any interested parties information of this character, which has formed the basis of its performance of a most important public duty, imposed upon it by the Constitution of the State, especially when the parties seeking the information are of the opinion that the totals certified to by the Board are erroneous, and are taking proper measures to have such errors, if any, corrected according to law.

I therefore desire to ask that these figures be furnished to me either directly by the Board, or indirectly through the office of the Corporation Counsel.

Will you kindly bring my request to the attention of the Board at its meeting to-day.

COMMUNICATIONS AGAIN RESUMED.

The President laid before the Board the following communication from the Retail Grocers' Union:

NEW YORK, July 24, 1895.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York:

At a special meeting of the New York Retail Grocers' Union, held this day, called expressly for the purpose of considering the question of the use of the streets and sidewalks of the city for the display and sale of fruits, vegetables, groceries, or any article of food or general merchandise, a full attendance of members being present, the following resolution was unanimously passed:

Resolved, That this organization of over nine hundred retail grocers, representing the substantial retail grocery trade of the City of New York, hereby declares itself heartily in favor of the vigorous enforcement of the laws and ordinances prohibiting the use of the streets or sidewalks within the stoop-line for the sale of fruits, vegetables, groceries, or any article of food or general merchandise; that articles of food which are thus exposed to the sun and the dust and dirt of the streets soon become decayed and unfit for consumption, and that such use of the streets and sidewalks should be prohibited as a menace to the public health.

Resolved, further, That we request your Honorable Board to revoke all permits for the use of the streets and sidewalks for such purposes, and that no further permits be issued, and we appeal to the proper Departments to see that the laws and ordinances affecting this matter are vigorously and impartially enforced.

The President laid before the Board the following communication from the fruit vendors of the City of New York:

NEW YORK, July 10, 1895.

To the Honorable Board of Aldermen:

The undersigned petitioners, representing the wholesale and retail fruit trade in New York, the total number engaged in which business aggregate over 11,000 people, respectfully ask that there be convened, without delay, an extra session of the Board of Aldermen, for the following reasons:

The recent enforcement of a law which has long past been a dead letter results in a great hardship and suffering to the undersigned, and to all engaged in the business, and also is a very great detriment to the commerce of New York City in fruits.

The fruit-eating public, where they have exposed to their gaze—as has been the case in the past, by reason of the fruit being shown at almost every street corner—have bought more liberally than would otherwise be the case and it is a fact that they do not purchase fruit that is offered in stores and within buildings where it is not brought to their attention in passing the thoroughfares, and as a result a tremendous loss would follow to those engaged in the business as merchants in this city on account of the falling off in the consumption; and, as a result of the prospect, prices are lower to-day in New York for all kinds of fruits that are generally disposed of by the street corner merchants and those having stands on the streets. As a result of this the producers throughout the United States are suffering severely, while those engaged in the business in New York are losing custom, and their business is suffering severely in consequence; and the retail merchants thus deprived of any place of business from which to dispose of the fruit and transact their business, and are thrown out of visible means of support, which creates a great and unnecessary hardship.

Your petitioners recognize that the laws of the country must be obeyed; but in view of the fact that all classes of citizens, either as the consumers or merchants, are inconvenienced by the enforcement of this law, which cannot be in any way altered excepting by obtaining permits from your Honorable Board to allow them to do business until August 6, when you will convene in your regular meeting, and when your petitioners ask that an extra session of the Board of Aldermen should be called to authorize the reissuing of the necessary permits which will enable the fruit merchants to resume their business, acting under the laws regulating the issuing of these permits. We therefore request that this matter shall receive prompt attention.

In order to bring to the attention of your Honorable Body to the extent of the interests affected by the proposed action, your petitioners respectfully show that the magnitude of the fruit business in the City of New York is very large indeed, much larger than is ordinarily supposed by those who are not in it. The fruit imported into the United States through the City of New York for the last year will aggregate the sum of \$12,000,000. This fruit is distributed from New York over the whole of the United States, and is a large and only source of income to many citizens of this city. The class of fruit sold by the peddler and sidewalk merchant is usually fruit that must necessarily be disposed of quickly, and is not for distribution throughout the country, but it is of a class of fruit that must necessarily be in all cargoes, riper than the usual run of the cargo. If the market for this fruit is taken away by the stopping of the street-peddler's business, which is the only market therefor, it entails a loss upon the persons importing fruit into this country, and will cripple a trade which goes largely to swell the commercial interests of this city and to make it the greatest market of the United States. It is certain that if such a step were proposed it would have a strong tendency to divert fruit from this market and to cause it to be shipped to other cities in the United States for distribution from those points where such fruit as was only fit for the fruit peddler could be properly disposed of.

Whereas, The Boulevard and the Eighth avenue, from Fifty-ninth street to Thirteenth street, are paved with asphalt, but no street running south from Eighth avenue and Thirteenth street is so paved; and

Whereas, If there were a continuous asphalt route down town many thousands of our citizens living near the line of the Boulevard or Eighth avenue would ride between their homes and their places of business upon bicycles, to the great advantage of their health;

Resolved, That Eighth avenue, from Thirteenth street to Hudson street, and Hudson street, from Eighth avenue to Chambers street, should be paved with asphalt; and

Resolved, That the Commissioner of Public Works be and he hereby is respectfully requested and urged to take such measures and proceedings as will result in the speediest possible accomplishment of this object.

Alderman Noonan moved that the matter be laid over for one week.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said motion. Which was decided in the negative, and the President declared the motion lost.

Alderman Olcott then moved the adoption of the resolution.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said motion. Which was decided in the affirmative.

Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at a Meeting held at the Mayor's Office, at 11 o'clock A. M. on Tuesday, July 2, 1895.

The reading of the minutes of the meeting held on June 28, 1895, was dispensed with.

The following communications were received from the Commissioner of Public Works in relation to overpayment by Mr. John J. Astor, for a vault permit:

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS, NEW YORK, June 29, 1895.

Hon. ASHBEL P. FITCH, Comptroller:

DEAR SIR—For your information, I transmit herewith a copy of a letter I have addressed to the Mayor, as Chairman of the Sinking Fund Commission, asking that you be authorized to refund to Mr. John J. Astor, \$5,356.88, overpaid for a vault permit.

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS, NEW YORK, June 29, 1895.

Hon. WILLIAM L. STRONG, Mayor, and Chairman, Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

DEAR SIR—A resolution of the Common Council approved December 26, 1894, granted permission to John J. Astor to extend a vault in front of the premises southwest corner of Fifth avenue and Thirty-fourth street, 14 feet beyond the curb.

A permit for the construction of the vault was issued in accordance with this resolution, January 5, 1895, and the measurement of the vault amounted to 21,505 square feet, for which the usual charge of 75 cents per foot was made, amounting to \$16,128.75. Subsequent thereto, this Department found it objectionable to allow the extension of the vault beyond the curb into the carriage-way on account of interference with water-mains, gas-mains, electric subways and other public structures. The permit of January 5 was, therefore, withdrawn, and a new permit was issued for the construction of the vault under the sidewalk only, the superficial measurement of which amounts to 14,362½ square feet, and the charge to \$10,771.87. As the charge under the first permit has been paid, there is now an overpayment of \$5,356.88.

It has been customary to adjust such matters only after the construction and completion of vaults, and after receiving the surveyor's certificate of the actual measurement, but the present case materially differs from the ordinary ones in that the original permit was withdrawn and canceled and a new permit issued.

Under these circumstances, Mr. Astor is evidently entitled to the refund of the \$5,356.88 overpaid, and I respectfully ask that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund will, by resolution, authorize the Comptroller to make the refund.

I inclose herewith the original permit, which has been withdrawn or cancelled, a duplicate of the second permit now in force, the original of which is in the hands of the person to whom it has been issued, and the City Surveyor's certificate of the measurement of the vault under the second permit, which is corroborated by the second permit itself.

DEAR SIR—By the direction of the Civil Service Commissioners, I have the honor to make requisition upon you for the use of this Commission, for all the rooms in the New Criminal Court Building now occupied by the Department of Street Cleaning, on the ground and third floors of said building, together with such partitions and furniture therein contained as may belong to the City and which may be available for our use.

Which were referred to the Recorder.

The Chamberlain called up the petition of the New York Mothers' Home of the Sisters of Misericorde, to have cancelled certain assessments on its property (Minutes, June 28, 1895, page 152), and offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That pursuant to the authority of chapter 906 of the Laws of 1895, the assessment for public parks, confirmed May 27, 1891, and entered June 18, 1891, against the property of the New York Mothers' Home, known as Ward Nos. 12, 13, 14, 15, 16, 17, 18 and 19 of Block No. 49, in the Twelfth Ward of the City of New York, be cancelled and annulled; and the Comptroller of the City of New York is authorized and directed to so mark such assessments upon the books in his office.

Mr. Herbert M. Grindal, attorney, was heard in support of the petition.

The Comptroller said: Before the vote is taken I desire to have placed on the records of the Board a statement that I am convinced this is a most deserving institution, and that it is doing a great work of charity, but that the reason why I am unable to vote to cancel the assessment is that I do not approve of the principle which underlies the bill and this resolution. I do not believe in relieving institutions not under control of the public authorities from payment of assessments.

The Mayor—From my investigation of the working of this institution, I think it is as good and as economically conducted as any institution in the city, and consequently I shall vote in favor of the resolution.

The Chamberlain—I am in favor of remitting this assessment because this institution in its charitable work saves the city a great deal of money.

The Recorder—This subject has caused me considerable anxiety, because my sympathies were all with the institution, and I conceived it to be my duty to vote against it. That is why I asked to have this matter to go over until to-day. I desire to go on record on this question.

If this were a new question, I would decidedly vote against it. If it were not a question the principle of which has been recognized by the laws of the State, I would vote against it. If it were not a question that has been decided by precedent of this Board, I would vote against it. But I have to bear in mind that the principle embodied in this proposition is not only recognized by the laws of the State, but it has been approved by this Board in preceding cases. Examining the subject very closely, I have come to the conclusion, so far as I am concerned, that this institution is an exceptional one. It is an institution started in New York some twelve years ago for the purpose of affording a home or asylum for unfortunate women who are pregnant and about to become mothers, and who would not go to public institutions. At that time there was a home here known as "Mother Irene's Home." It is a well known fact, from the criminal statistics of this city, that infanticide, prior to the establishment of these institutions, was far greater in volume and extent than it is to-day. At that time there was no place in this city where unfortunate women could go with safety to be delivered, and the result was that infanticide was increasing to an alarming extent; and because it was increasing to an alarming extent these institutions were founded; and since their foundation infanticide has decreased in a most remarkable degree. The reason is that women will not subject themselves to the shame and disgrace of going to the Commissioners of Charities and Correction for an asylum, where they have to disclose the paternity of the child. They go to this institution, where they are taken in and kept during the time of their travail, and are then let go, the child remaining to be nursed. And I find there is no discrimination as to patients there, on account of either color, creed or race. They are all taken in and carefully attended to. I regard—and this is the real motive that decides me on this motion—I regard it as a police measure of the State for the prevention of crime—the crime of infanticide.

I shall not be bound by my vote on this question touching any other institution. I regard this institution as non-sectarian and non-religious. I regard it as purely charitable. While in principle I am in accord with my fellow Commissioners and the Comptroller and the President of the Finance Committee, I repeat again, if it were a new question I would vote against it; yet under such circumstances, and on the special fact that I believe this institution is doing the work of the State, the police work of the State, for the prevention of crime, I will vote for the resolution. And I will add further, that this assessment was not made for immediate local purposes; it was made to establish a small park, and I regard the establishing of small parks in this city as a municipal measure, and not confined to any particular locality. The establishment of small parks in the river districts and down-town districts is mainly for the poor, and the City should bear the expense.

The Chairman of the Finance Committee of the Board of Aldermen—I have already expressed myself individually upon this subject. Since the matter was referred to at the last meeting of this Commission, I have had conversations with several persons; and I have said and now say that I feel that the remitting of assessments by special act, in almost every case, is bad policy. My investigation has led me to believe that the present application comes from a very wisely-conducted and highly charitable institution which is an aid and support to the Police and reformatory institutions of the City. And yet there are so many other institutions as to which this might as truly be said that I do feel as if such a precedent, as the action of this Board now proposed, would be dangerously established. Perhaps this Board would be met next year with a number of applications for exemption from assessment, made by institutions quite as charitable and deserving as the present applicant. The habit of remitting assessments, should such action become at all general, would lead to much uncertainty in the City's finances, and render a dangerous proportion of assessments uncollectable. I find myself compelled to vote no on this proposition.

The resolution was then adopted by the following vote: Affirmative—The Mayor, Recorder and Chamberlain—3. Negative—The Comptroller and the Chairman Committee on Finance, Board of Aldermen.

The following communications were received from Naval Post, G. A. R., the Farragut Association of Naval Veterans and the Seventy-third Regiment Veteran Association, relative to the transfer of the Essex Market Building to the Board of Education:

NEW YORK, June 28, 1895.

To the Honorable Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of the City of New York:

GENTLEMEN—The Honorable the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York requested that a committee be appointed from the Naval Post G. A. R. and the Farragut Veteran Associations, having meeting rooms in Essex Market Building, to appear before them in reference to the question involved by our occupancy of rooms in said building granted and leased to the said veteran organizations by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, February 25, 1890, as the question to be brought before the said Board was in regard to the said rooms occupied by the several associations being required for school purposes for the City of New York.

By an accompanying resolution the Board of Estimate and Apportionment were requested to appropriate a reasonable amount to reimburse the above associations for the expense they had incurred in fitting up, etc., and to enable them to fit up new quarters. It was also resolved that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be requested to provide temporary headquarters for the above associations, inasmuch that, if it is decided that the Hans Powell Post rooms are to remain intact, we are willing to hold our meetings in these rooms. In conclusion, we, the naval veterans, recognizing the imperative necessity that the children should have every facility for education, are willing to put up with any inconvenience to further the object in view as we were willing thirty years ago to make it possible that they should now be asking for an education, and inasmuch as we, the veterans of the above organization, are not endowed with much of this world's wealth, we trust that your Honorable Body will deal with us justly if not generously.

In conclusion, as Chairman of the Committee of the above associations, I respectfully request that I be allowed to appear before your Honorable Body at its next meeting in settlement of the question above mentioned, and I respectfully request that I be notified of any action by your Honorable Board in the premises.

The representatives of the Grand Army Posts and Veteran Associations occupying rooms in the building were heard in relation to vacating the premises and the providing of other quarters, etc. Hon. Robert Maclay, President of the Board of Education, on behalf of the Board, asked that the building be set apart for school purposes.

Whereupon the Recorder offered the following:

Resolved, That the building formerly occupied and known as Essex Market be and hereby is transferred to the Board of Education for school purposes; that the Grand Army Posts, Veteran Associations, and others, be requested to vacate the premises therein occupied by them, on or before August 1, 1895, and that the question of compensation to the Grand Army Posts and Veteran Associations, and the procuring of other quarters for them, be referred to a Committee consisting of the Mayor and the Comptroller.

Which was unanimously adopted.

The Recorder reported adversely on the applications for privileges to keep lunch counters in the Criminal Court Building, referred to him at the meeting of June 12, 1895. The Recorder said that he had talked with the Judges, Clerks and Jurymen, and that there is an almost universal feeling against it.

On motion of the Chamberlain, the report was accepted and the recommendation approved.

The following communication was received from the Commissioner of Street Cleaning for lease of a plot of ground between Avenues B and C and Seventeenth and Eighteenth streets:

DEPARTMENT OF STREET CLEANING, NEW YORK, June 12, 1895.

Hon. WILLIAM L. STRONG, Mayor, Chairman, Board of Commissioners of the Sinking Fund: SIR—I beg to recall my letter of May 1, 1895, concerning Incumbrance Yard in Eighteenth street, and to renew the application in the following manner:

I ask the consent and approval of your Board to hire, for the use of the Department as an incumbrance yard mainly to store carts of this Department now incumbering Avenue C and Sixteenth street, a plot of ground consisting of ten (10) lots, 125 feet by 200 feet, between Seventeenth and Eighteenth streets, between Avenues B and C, belonging to the Consolidated Gas Company, for the term of one year. The asking price is \$4,000 per annum.

Whereupon the Comptroller offered the following:

The Counsel to the Corporation is requested to prepare the said lease and indorse it with his approval as to form.

Which was unanimously adopted.

The Recorder called up the proposals received for safes and burglar proof file-case for the Criminal Court Building (Minutes, June 28, 1895, page 145).

Discussion followed, participated in by all the members of the Board.

Whereupon the Comptroller moved that the Commissioner of Public Works be instructed to prepare specifications for the work in question; that those specifications hereby are referred to the Recorder, and that, after they are approved by him, the work shall be advertised for according to law.

Which was carried unanimously.

DEAR SIR—On the report and requisition made by my predecessor on September 17, 1894, your Board authorized and directed the Comptroller to issue bonds to the amount of \$215,000, as provided in chapter 43 of the Laws of 1892, for the construction of a public building for the accommodation of the Seventh District Police Court and Prison, and of the District Court of the Eleventh Judicial District and other offices, the said amount to cover the contract for the erection of the building, architects' fees and other incidental expenses.

In the progress of the work, it has been found necessary to provide, by a supplementary contract, for work to make thoroughly water-tight the boiler-room, coal-room and cellars of the building, at an estimated expense of not exceeding \$10,000. I, therefore, respectfully ask that your Board authorize and direct a further issue of said bonds to the amount of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) to enable this Department to execute the supplementary contract.

CITY OF NEW YORK—COMMISSIONER OF STREET IMPROVEMENTS, TWENTY-THIRD AND TWENTY-FOURTH WARDS, August 3, 1895. Hon. WILLIAM L. STRONG, Mayor:

DEAR SIR—I beg to notify you that the condition of the streets and roads in Williamsbridge are, in many instances, dangerous to life and travel. The sewer contractors have left trenches open and have otherwise left many of the streets in a very unsafe condition. Some streets are impassable to travel, while others are next to impassable.

I take the liberty of informing you of these facts as I have no money at my disposal to put these streets in proper condition, so that the public may be both inconvenienced and protected. The situation is a very serious one, and I think it proper to urge upon you as Mayor and Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment the necessity of providing funds to meet the present exigency, as I requested in my letter to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on July 19 last. I desire in this connection to call your attention to the fact that while the former authorities of Williamsbridge negotiated a loan of something like two hundred thousand dollars for the construction of a sewer system in that village, the unexpended balance has not yet been made available for me to continue the work of sewer construction.

From the Department of Public Charities and Correction—Requesting to be informed if the outer end of the Pier foot of East Twenty-sixth street is capable of sustaining the Morgue building now located on the grounds of Bellevue Hospital.

From the Secretary of State—Inclosing list of grants of land under water in the towns of Westchester, Eastchester and Pelham.

The following communications were referred to the Dock Superintendent:

From James M. Cogan—Requesting reduction of rental charged for float at the foot of West One Hundred and Sixteenth street.

From Dock Master Clark—Respecting compensation charged Edward McDonald for boat-house, float, etc., at the foot of West One Hundred and Seventh street.

The following permits were granted, to continue during the pleasure of the Board:

ARMORY BOARD COMMISSIONERS.

AUGUST 1, 1895.

A meeting of the Armory Board was held this day, at eleven o'clock, at the office of the Mayor. Present—The Mayor, President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the Commissioner of Public Works, Brigadier-General Fitzgerald and Colonel Seward.

The minutes of the meeting of June 11 were read and approved.

The following communication was received, transmitting the action of the Sinking Fund at its meeting June 12 :

At a meeting of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund held June 12, 1895, the following preamble and resolutions were adopted :

Whereas, The Armory Board, by a resolution adopted June 11, 1895, authorized the construction of an additional rifle range in the armory of the Ninth Regiment, N. G. S. N. Y., and directed the architects to prepare plans for the same, and requested the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to authorize the issue of bonds to the amount of six thousand dollars (\$6,000) to provide for such work ;

The system must, in brief, provide for a modern and complete telephone and electrical signal communication between the station-house and each part of the precinct. It must be simple in construction, capable of being readily understood and operated, yet strong and durable, and involving all modern improvements in the line of police signal systems.

Information for the use of the Board should first be submitted in written form, accompanied by such drawings and illustrations as may be necessary for a preliminary investigation of the merits of the various systems. Later, the Board expects to be able to afford opportunity for the practical operation and comparison, under the supervision of the officers of this Department, of such of the proposed systems as are deemed worthy thereof.

In extending this invitation, it is expressly understood that the Department has, at the present time, no fund available for the establishment of a system, or even for experimental purposes. All expense must, therefore, be borne by the parties offering their systems for investigation, and in no event can there be any liability upon the Police Department.

Promotions.

Hereafter the Commissioners shall select from the officers of one grade those whom they may consider best fit for promotion into the grade above, and shall arrange the names of these men on a list. So far as practicable the Commissioners shall draw up these lists so as to contain the names of the men who have done special service at the risk of their lives in saving life, in protecting life and property, in putting down disorder, and in arresting dangerous criminals. They shall also pay full heed to the efficient performance of duty, even where it has not been possible for an officer to do any deed of special heroism or note.

The list of names thus obtained shall be called the "Merit List," and all promotions shall be made from it ; but before any man is promoted he shall be put through a non-competitive examination by the Civil Service Board to test his mental qualifications.

Prior to making an appointment the man shall be assigned to duty as Acting Sergeant, Acting Captain, Acting Inspector or Acting Chief, as the case may be, for a period of six months, so that during this period his qualifications can be tested by actual work in the position which he hopes to fill. In the case of Roundsmen the assignment shall be but for one month.

All regulations inconsistent with these are hereby repealed.

Appointments.

In making appointments from the eligible register, the three highest names shall be certified for each vacancy.

The name of an eligible shall be dropped from the list after he has been certified three times without being chosen on any certification.

All regulations inconsistent with these are hereby repealed.

On reading and filing communication from the Chief of Police recommending that three new patrol wagons, when completed, be assigned one to each of the Sixth, Eleventh and Fifteenth Precincts, and that stable accommodations therefor can be found in such precincts,

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be and are hereby respectfully requested to authorize the Board of Police to acquire stabling accommodations for patrol wagon service in the Sixth, Eleventh and Fifteenth Precincts, as follows, viz. : Sixth Precinct, at Nos. 31 to 37 Mott street, stables of James J. Naughton, feed and care of horses and room for patrol wagon, \$60 per month ; Eleventh Precinct, at Nos. 39 and 39½ Forsyth street, stables of Rosenthal Bros., feed and care of two horses and room for patrol wagon, for \$60 per month ; Fifteenth Precinct, at Nos. 39 and 41 West Third street, Metropolitan Van Company Stables, feed and care of two horses and room for patrol wagon, for \$60 per month.
