An application was received from the President of the Borough of Manhattan for permission to occupy space for storage purposes, between Twenty-ninth and Thirtieth streets, North river, and between Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth streets, East river, and for permission to place a Foreman's shanty in the East Twenty-fourth Street Yard. On June 17, the application in so far as it asked for the privilege of placing a shanty in the Department yard and for the use of storage space between Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth streets, East river, was denied, but permission was granted to occupy space for the storage of sand and gravel, 100 by 100 feet, on the new-made land between Twenty-ninth and Thirtieth streets, North river, and for space, 50 by 100 feet, on the new-made land between Eighteenth and Nineteenth streets, East river.

On June 17 the assignment granted Albert G. Wurmstitch to furnish music on the Recreation Pier foot of Metropolitan avenue, Borough of Brooklyn, from October 22 until November 11, 1904, was rescinded, Wurmstitch having died, and the assignment was granted to William F. Kielgast for 14 pieces and leader, compensation of the men to be at the rate of \$21 per week, and of said Kielgast as leader, at the rate of \$42 per week.

On June 20 the Corporation Counsel was requested to advise whether the Department has authority to charge rental for use of land under water covered by floating dumping board maintained by Brown & Fleming in front of bulkhead between Piers, old 53 and old 54, East river.

On June 21 the request made on the Board of Estimate and Apportionment June 4, 1904, for authority for the institution of condemnation proceedings for the acquisition of Pier, old 36, East river, with adjoining 172 feet of bulkhead, was withdrawn pending negotiations with the owners looking toward the purchase of the property by agreement.

An application having been received from George W. Beebe for a lease of the Pier at Rossville, Staten Island, and for the privilege of occupying the Pier under a permit pending the granting of a lease, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund were, on June 22, requested to authorize a lease of the pier to said Beebe for a term of five years at a rental of \$300 per annum, and permission was granted Beebe to use and occupy the pier at a rental of \$25 per month, to commence July 1, 1904, and to terminate as soon as the lease approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund goes into effect.

To remove paving blocks and railroad ties from the area to be dredged between West Fifteenth and West Seventeenth streets, North river, it being understood that no payment will be demanded for the removal of the blocks, and that such blocks as were taken up by the Department of Highways will not be removed.

June 24. Estate of William Marshall—

To dredge in front of its dock in the vicinity of Ten Eyck street, Newtown Creek, Brooklyn, north of the Metropolitan Avenue Bridge.

June 24. Knickerbocker Steam Towage Company and United Fruit Company—

To place two scales on the deck of Pier, new 1, North river, it being understood that the deck of the pier will be restored to proper condition whenever required by the Department, the scales to remain only during the pleasure of the Commissioner.

June 25. Moquin-Offerman-Wells Coal Company—

To repair foundation of coal pocket foot of Sackett street, Gowanus canal, Brooklyn. (Permit granted also by Department of Buildings, of Brooklyn.)

June 27. John J. Farrell—

To unload sand on bulkhead north of the Gansevoort Street Pier, North river, and to store the material on the upland space in rear of said bulkhead; compensation to be at the rate of \$375 per annum, payable quarterly in advance to the Cashier, to commence July 1, 1904, and to continue during the pleasure of the Commissioner, but not later than April 30, 1905.

Asking that facilities be afforded for landing hay barges at the Pier foot of West Thirty-fifth street. Notified that the entire northerly side of the pier is to remain open for general wharfage purposes.

From Lawrence, Son & Gerrish—

Transmitting petition from ship owners, agents, importers and others engaged in the Oriental trade, relative to wharfage facilities on the East river, and rates of wharfage charged at Pier 33, East river. Application for cancellation of the rental denied, as such charge for the additional privileges is considered proper.

From the New York Association for Improving the Condition of the Poor—

Requesting that the Recreation Pier foot of East Twenty-fourth street be set aside one morning each week during the summer season to permit of medical examinations being made of mothers and children preparatory to leaving the City for the summer homes maintained by said association at West Coney Island. Denied June 27, as such use of the pier might be dangerous to those using the pier for recreation purposes.

From the Pennsylvania, New York and Long Island Railroad Company—

Requesting lease of the pier now being erected at the foot of Thirtieth street, East river, to be used in connection with the construction of tunnel under the North and East rivers. Denied June 27, the premises being required for general wharfage purposes.

From the American Ice Company—

Requesting lease of Pier foot of Thirtieth street, East river, or of some other pier in the immediate vicinity; also requesting lease of space for the storage of their trucks at Ninety-first street, East river. Applications denied, June 28 and June 30, respectively.

From the Dreamland Company—

Requesting permission to construct an additional landing rack on either side of the existing approach to the Old Iron Pier at Coney Island, Brooklyn. Denied June 29.

From the Engineer-in-Chief—

1st. Report for the week ending June 18, 1904, regarding progress and completion of work under his supervision. Filed.

2d. Recommending that the City acquire title to property in the vicinity of Jamaica avenue, Astoria, Borough of Queens, in order that adequate wharfage facilities may be provided thereat. Commissioners of the Sinking Fund requested June 28, to authorize the purchase of the necessary property for the sum of \$24,000.

3d. Recommending that the amount of cement to be delivered under Contract No. 827 be increased 50 per cent., pursuant to Article "K," of said contract. John P. No. 2401. Running of an electric light subsidiary connection at the foot of Forty-second street, at approach to West Shore Ferry Terminal, by the Consolidated Telegraph and Electrical Subway Company.

No. 2185. Placing of sheathing along the under side of the dump on the northerly side of the Pier foot of West Thirtieth street, by the Department of Street Cleaning.

No. 2074. Repairs to Pier, old 36, East river, from time to time as required, between January 30 and July 1, 1904.

No. 2432. Repairs to piers at Arthur Kills, southerly side of Kreischerville, Borough of Richmond, and the placing of a three-pile dolphin outshore of said pier, by O. H. Barnard.

Actions Taken July 7, Unless Otherwise Noted.

The following permits were granted:

Cuff for filling in without permit was withdrawn and the prisoner discharged. Filed.

2d. Approving forms of advertisements for the sale of the leases of ferries between Ninety-second street, East river, Manhattan, and Astoria, and between Howland's Hook, Borough of Richmond, and Elizabethport. Ordered advertised July 5.
