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## BOARD OF EDUCATION.

STATED MEETING, WEDNESDAY, JUNE 28, 1905.

A stated meeting of the Board of Education was held on Wednesday, June 28, 1905, at 4 o'clock p. m., at the hall of the Board, Park avenue and Fifty-ninth street, Borough of Manhattan.

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The following reports, preambles and resolutions were adopted:

Appropriating the sum of two hundred and twenty-nine thousand three hundred and eighty-nine and forty-four one-hundredths dollars (\$229,389.44) from the proceeds of Corporate Stock, to be issued by the Comptroller pursuant to sections 47 and 169 of the Revised Charter, application for the issue of which is hereby made; said sum to be applied in payment of the awards (and interest thereon), costs, charges, etc., as confirmed by the Court, in the proceeding for the acquisition of land on Boston road, Jackson avenue and Home street, in the Borough of The Bronx, as a school site; requisition for said sum being hereby made upon the Comptroller.

Appropriating the sum of thirty-six thousand dollars (\$36,000) from the proceeds of Corporate Stock, to be issued by the Comptroller pursuant to sections 47 and 169 of the Revised Charter, application for the issue of which is hereby made; said sum to be applied to the purchase, for school purposes, of the following lands:

No. 332 West Forty-eighth street, at the rear of Public School 17, Manhattan:

Beginning at a point on the southerly side of Forty-eighth street, distant three hundred and seventy-three (373) feet three (3) inches westerly from the southwesterly corner of Forty-eighth street and Eighth avenue; thence southerly and parallel with Eighth avenue and part of the distance through a party wall one hundred (100) feet five (5) inches; thence westerly along the centre line of the block between West Forty-seventh and West Forty-eighth streets, twenty-six (26) feet nine (9) inches; thence northerly and parallel with Eighth avenue one hundred (100) feet five (5) inches to the southerly side of West Forty-eighth street; thence easterly along the southerly side of West Forty-eighth street twenty-six (26) feet nine (9) inches to the point or place of beginning, together with all the right, title and interest of the owner of said premises of, in and to the streets in front thereof to the centre thereof, \$36,000.

The said sum to be paid by said Comptroller out of the proceeds of said Corporate Stock, requisition therefor being hereby made, for the said lots of lands and premises, upon the presentation to him of the deed or deeds therefor, together with a certificate of the Corporation Counsel that the title thereto is satisfactory and fully free from all incumbrances and is vested in The City of New York.

Requesting the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to authorize a renewal of the lease of the premises at No. 1191 Bedford avenue, occupied as an annex to the Commercial High School, Borough of Brooklyn, for a period of six months, from July 1, 1905, to January 1, 1906, at a rental of \$50 per month, and on the same terms and conditions as contained in the existing lease. Owner, R. C. Talbot-Perkins, Henry J. Green, Sr., Agent, No. 1161 Fulton street, Brooklyn.

Allowing the sum of ten hundred and eighty-seven dollars (\$1,087) to the William Horne Company in consideration of their agreeing to the cancellation of the contract awarded to them by the Board of Education on July 11, 1904, for Item 1 for improving the lot No. 208 East Eightieth street, adjoining Public School 53, Borough of Manhattan; authorizing the Auditor to prepare a voucher or vouchers for the amount above stated and transmit the same to the Comptroller for payment, and cancelling, in pursuance of the arrangement made with the said William Horne Company, as above stated, and upon the payment of the sum of \$1,087, as hereinbefore specified, the contract awarded to them by the Board of Education on July 11, 1904, for Item 1 for improving the lot No. 208 East Eightieth street, adjoining Public School 53, Borough of Manhattan.

Awarding contracts for furnishing all required material, repairing, transferring and erecting gymnastic apparatus, kindergarten tents, awnings, frames, carpenter work benches, work tables, Venetian iron work-benches, horses, shelves, connecting and facing in position gas stoves, gas burners, gas ranges, housekeeping goods, cooking tables, tables, etc., etc., and all other material included in the equipment of open air playgrounds, school playgrounds, and vacation schools, and taking down, removing, transferring and storing all gymnastic apparatus, kindergarten tents, awnings, frames, carpenter work-benches, work tables, Venetian iron work-benches, horses, shelves, gas stoves, gas burners, gas ranges and connections, housekeeping materials, cooking tables, tables, etc., etc., and all other material included in the equipment of open air playgrounds, school playgrounds and vacation schools in the boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Brooklyn, as follows:

Lands and premises on New York avenue and Herkimer street, in Local School Board District No. 29, Borough of Brooklyn, the assessed valuation of which, as shown by the books of record on file in the Department of Taxes and Assessments, is \$49,800.

Whereas, The Commissioners of Estimate and Appraisal have been appointed in the matter of the proceeding for the acquisition of title to certain lands and premises on Clifton avenue, Anderson and Clare streets, adjoining Public School 13, at Rosebank, Borough of Richmond, as a site for school purposes, and are to appear before the Supreme Court for examination as to their qualifications to act as such Commissioners, on July 7, 1905; and

Whereas, There are no buildings on said site, and the Board of Education is prepared to advertise for proposals for the erection of an addition to said school building; therefore be it

Whereas On October 19, 1904 (see Journal, page 2631), the Board of Education adopted a resolution requesting the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to authorize the execution of a lease of certain premises at the southwest corner of Crotona avenue and One Hundred and Eighty-third street, Borough of The Bronx, and on November 10, 1904, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund approved of the execution of such lease from November 15, 1904, to July 1, 1905; and

Whereas The Board of Education thereupon took possession of said premises, but, owing to legal complications, the appointment of a receiver for the property, etc., it was impracticable to proceed with the execution of the lease, and the Board of Education continued to occupy the premises without entering into a lease; and

Whereas, Under date of June 22, 1905, John T. E. Van Derveer, filed with the Board of Education a copy of an assignment or conveyance executed by the former owners of said property on May 23, 1905, whereby said former owners assigned to John T. E. Van Derveer the claim and demand for any and all rent due or to grow due from the use and occupation of the hereinbefore-mentioned premises; therefore be it

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be and they are hereby requested to authorize the payment by the Board of Education to John T. E. Van Derveer, No. 52 Broadway, New York City, of the sum of \$150 in full payment for the use and occupation of premises at the southwest corner of Crotona avenue and One Hundred and Eighty-third street, Borough of The Bronx, occupied by the Board of Education for school purposes from November 15, 1904, to July 1, 1905, at the rate of \$20 per month, as heretofore agreed upon between the Board of Education and the former owner or owners of said premises.

Resolved, That the Committee on Special Schools be and it hereby is authorized to appoint, transfer and discharge employees in the vacation schools, playgrounds, etc., when, in the judgment of the Committee, it is necessary, the names of those so appointed, transferred or discharged to be duly reported to the Board of Education or the Executive Committee.

Resolved, That the Committee on Special Schools be and it hereby is authorized to make all necessary arrangements for the successful conduct of the vacation schools, playgrounds, etc., and for that purpose be authorized to use the yards, classrooms, gymnasiums and roof playgrounds of the schools selected.

Whereas, The Board of Education on May 10, 1905 (see Journal, page 838), requested the President to act as the delegate of the Board of Education at the annual convention of the Department of School Administration of the National Educational Association to be held at Asbury Park, N. J., on July 5 and 6, 1905; and

Whereas, The Board of Education is enrolled as an active member in the National Educational Association, and is entitled to appoint a delegate to represent it at the annual convention of said association to be held on July 3-7, 1905; therefore be it

Resolved, That Hon. Henry N. Tift, President of the Board of Education, be and he is thereby requested to act as the delegate of the Board of Education at the convention of said association to be held as above mentioned.

Closing the offices of the Department of Education on Monday, July 3, 1905, provided that, in the opinion of the heads of the several bureaus, the work of their respective bureaus will permit such closing.

Whereas, A request has been received from the President of the Borough of Manhattan for the transfer of Mary C. Hurley, Cleaner in Public School 188, Borough of Manhattan; be it

Resolved, That consent is hereby given to the transfer of Mary C. Hurley, Cleaner in Public School 188, Borough of Manhattan, to the office of the President of the Borough of Manhattan.

Whereas, The Board of Education on June 21 passed resolutions to the effect that Spanish be introduced into the elementary school curriculum as an elective in lieu of Latin and stenography because of the great commercial importance of said language; and

Whereas, The Italian language, aside from the classical beauty and literary prestige, is of no less practical value owing to its widespread diffusion in South European and South American commerce; and

Whereas, The New York City population numbers more than a third of a million of Italians, whose children have no opportunity to acquire the slightest grammatical knowledge of their mother tongue except in the public schools; and

Whereas, On account of the compact mass of Italo-American citizens in this country, Italian has become a novel and momentous linguistic factor in local circles of all descriptions; it is therefore

Resolved, That Italian be introduced as an elective in the elementary school course, at least for the Italian districts of this City.

Report of a Special Committee.

Mr. Wingate presented the following:

To the Board of Education:

The Committee respectfully report that, in pursuance of the direction of the Board, they called upon the Mayor and Comptroller in reference to securing the appropriation of \$300,000 for four athletic fields as proposed in the resolution of the Board of Education (see Journal, pages 766-68). Having secured the promise of their support, the matter was presented to the Board of Estimate. In the discussion before that Board objection was made to that portion of the resolution which limited the use of the grounds to the boys in the high schools, and it was amended so as to provide that the appropriations should be for four athletic fields to be under the control of the Board of Education for the use of the school children, and as so amended it was carried, and the action of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment was confirmed by the Board of Aldermen. No opposition was made to the plan except as it was limited in the first instance for the benefit of the high schools; on the contrary, the scheme was strongly advocated by a large number of influential organizations interested in the schools and in philanthropic work.

While the Committee understands the purpose of its appointment was not merely to secure the appropriation for the fields, but also to arrange for their selection, purchase, equipment and management, and as the resolution of its appointment is ambiguous in this respect, it is proper that its authority should be specifically defined. It therefore submits the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Committee on Athletic Fields shall have charge of all matters relating to such fields. It shall, after conference with the Comptroller, select and recommend to the Board the acquisition of all grounds that may be required for such fields and shall have charge of the laying out and management of the same and shall make report to the Board of its proceedings.

The report was approved and the resolution adopted by a unanimous vote.

The President called attention to the fact that the next meeting of the Board will be held on Monday, July 10, 1905, and stated that at that meeting the Executive Committee for the ensuing year will be elected.

On motion, all absent members were excused for non-attendance at this meeting.

On motion, the Board adjourned at 5:35 o'clock p. m.

### NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

### GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or her name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 430 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done.
