

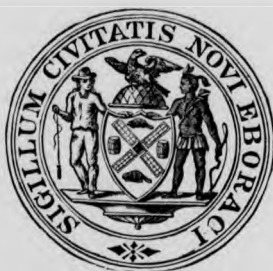

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending December 26, 1885:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors was 5,634.

The number of complaints returned by the Sanitary Inspectors was 412.

During the past week 137 complaints were received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

There were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port, 39 permits.

There were issued to consignees to discharge rags (in bulk, under bonds), 9 permits.

There was issued, under the Sanitary Code, 1 miscellaneous permit.

There were issued to scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy sinks, 46 permits.

At premises where contagious diseases were reported 117 visits were made, and 69 disinfections and 22 fumigations were performed.

The number of cases of contagious disease removed to Riverside Hospital was 8.

The number of vaccinations performed was 2,895, of which 540 were primary, and 2,355 re-vaccinations.

There were seized and condemned 7,745 pounds of meat, and 1,675 pounds of fish.

The number of specimens of milk examined was 99, the number of analyses of same made was 1, the number of quarts of adulterated milk destroyed was 20, the number of arrests made was 5, and the amount of fines imposed was \$10.

The certificates of 423 births, 75 still-births, 132 marriages, and 638 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, December 26, 1885. This shows a decrease of 187 births and 68 marriages, and an increase of 16 still-births and 27 deaths, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1884, there was a decrease of 41 births, 153 marriages and 26 deaths, and an increase of 26 still-births. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from scarlatina decreased 3; croup, 9; whooping cough, 3; rheumatism and gout, 1; heart diseases, 9; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 1; meningitis and encephalitis, 7; cyanosis and atelectasis, 5; suicide, 2; while the deaths from small-pox increased 1; measles, 2; diphtheria, 15; erysipelas, 2; typhoid fever, 2; cerebro spinal fever, 1; malarial fevers, 4; puerperal diseases, 2; diarrhoeal diseases, 7; inanition, 3; alcoholism, 1; cancer, 6; phthisis pulmonalis, 19; bronchitis, 10; aneurism, 1; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 1; convulsions, 2; apoplexy, 3; gastritis, enteritis and peritonitis, 1; Bright's disease and nephritis, 11; premature and preterm births, 8; drowning, 2. The number of deaths from pneumonia, all diseases of the brain and nervous system, cirrhosis and hepatitis and surgical operations, was the same in the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

The ages of 142 of the persons who died during the week were reported to be under one year, 182 under two years, 241 under five years, and 51 seventy years and over, which shows that the number of deaths of children under five years of age was 13 more than the number reported during the preceding week, and represent 37.77 per cent. of the total weekly mortality.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 128 were in institutions, 361 in tenement-houses, 138 in houses containing three families or less, 5 in hotels and boarding-houses, 1 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 11 were on the basement floor, 124 on the first, 167 on the second, 111 on the third, 66 on the fourth, 23 on the fifth, 2 on the sixth; 638 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 0 non-resident; 91 were stated to be single, 180 married, 93 widowed, and the condition of 274 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 638; still-births, 75; bodies in transitu, 15; of the total burial permits issued for city deaths and still-births, 79 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 423 births, 132 marriages, 75 still-births, 638 deaths; 15 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed and tabulated; 64 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 10 transcripts of the birth record, 6 of marriage, and 36 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending December 26, 1885, was 33.9 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 30.011; the mean humidity was 55, saturation being 100; the number of miles traveled by the wind was 2,046, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph. D., Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The disposition of 622 deaths and still-births, or 87.23 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 18; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 258; City pauper burial-ground (undenominational), 88; Greenwood (undenominational), 44; Lutheran (undenominational), 94; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 15; Evergreen (undenominational), 35; Woodlawn (undenominational), 25; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 9; Union (Methodist Protestant), 4; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 5; Macphelah, L. The actual mortality for the week ending December 19, 1885, was 620; this is 13 less than the number that occurred during the corresponding week of the year 1884, and 20.8 less than the average of the corresponding weeks of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 22.72 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,418,913.
