

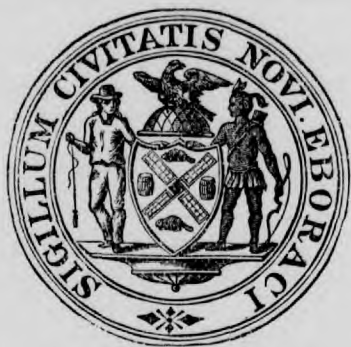

### POLICE DEPARTMENT.

The Board of Police met on the 31st day of July, 1878.

Present—Messrs. Smith, Wheeler, Erhardt, and Nichols, Commissioners.

Report of Sergeant Gay, Twenty-fifth Precinct, relative to street sprinkling ordinance, was referred to the Superintendent, and the Chief Clerk directed to transmit a copy to the Commissioner of Public Works.

Report of Captain Allaire, Sixteenth Precinct, on condition of Patrolman Philip Logue, was referred to the Board of Surgeons to report on the mental and physical condition of said Logue.

An injunction, to restrain the salary of Patrolman Ernest Linderman, Ninth Precinct, for the month of July, was referred to the Treasurer.

An application of Ancient Chapter, No. 1, R. A. M., for police service on excursion, was referred to the Superintendent to comply with the request.

An opinion of the Counsel to the Corporation on the powers and duties of the Board under the Police Pension Fund Law, was ordered on file.

Resolved, That the following transfers and details be, and are hereby ordered.

Patrolman Louis De Gau, from Ninth Precinct to Western Steamboat Squad, detailed at Inman Pier.

Patrolman Patrick Ryan, from Twentieth Precinct to Western Steamboat Squad.

“ Simon Adamsky, from Seventh Precinct to Western Steamboat Squad.

“ Timothy Grogan, from Eighth Precinct to Western Steamboat Squad.

“ Albert E. Robbins, from Tenth Precinct to Twenty-fifth Precinct.

“ Adam Corell, from Fifth Precinct to Twelfth Precinct.

“ James McQuade, Western Steamboat Squad to Eighteenth Precinct.

Resolved, That Patrolman Thomas Raywood, Special Service Squad, be and is hereby remanded to patrol duty, and transferred to Nineteenth Precinct.

Resolved, That the Superintendent be directed to select an old Patrolman for detail at Sixth avenue and Fifty-ninth street.

Resolved, That the Superintendent be directed to report the names of all members of the force who have been in service twenty years or more, and who are incapacitated for performing full patrol duty from any cause whatever; stating in each case the character, cause and duration of such disability.

Resolved, That the Treasurer be and is hereby authorized to pay the Western Steamboat Squad, through the agency of Sergeant George W. Gastlin, commanding said squad, and draw a check for the purpose, payable to his order.

#### Death Reported.

Patrolman John Potts, Eighteenth Precinct, at 8 P. M. 30th instant.

Whereas, It appears by the records of the Department that Jacob Moore of the Western Steamboat Squad has performed police duty as a member of the Police Force of the City of New York for a period of twenty years and upwards, and has by a written application requested to be retired from the service as such member, and placed on the Police Pension roll, and awarded a pension from the Police Pension Fund; it is therefore

Resolved, That the said Jacob Moore, in pursuance of section 5 of chapter 389 of the Laws of 1878, be and is hereby retired from service in said Police Force, and placed upon the pension roll, and awarded, granted, and paid from the said Police Pension Fund by the Trustees thereof, the annual sum during his life time, of six hundred dollars, payable in quarter yearly payments by the Treasurer of said Fund.

The question on the resolution was ordered taken by yeas and nays, and was adopted—all the Commissioners voting in the affirmative.

Whereas, It appears by the record of this Department, that Elisha Stokem is a member of the Police Force of the City of New York, assigned to duty in the Thirty-third Precinct; that he has performed police duty as a member of said Police Force for a period of twenty years and upwards, and that after examination of said Stokem, the Board of Surgeons have certified that he is permanently disabled so as to be unfit for police duty, and that the cause of such disability is general debility, old age, and consumption, and the nature and extent of the disability has existed for one year, and was incurred in the performance of police duty; it is therefore

Resolved, That the said Elisha Stokem, in pursuance of section 5 of chapter 389 of the Laws of 1878, be and is hereby retired from service in said Police Force and placed upon the pension roll, and awarded, granted, and paid from the said Police Pension Fund by the trustees thereof the annual sum, during his lifetime, of six hundred dollars, payable in quarter yearly payments by the treasurer of said fund.

The question on the resolution was ordered taken by yeas and nays, and was adopted—all the Commissioners voting in the affirmative.

Whereas, It appears by the records of this Department that Abram G. Bertholf is a member of the Police Force of the City of New York, assigned to duty in the Twelfth Precinct. That he has performed police duty as a member of said Police Force for a period of twenty years and upwards, and that after examination of said Bertholf the Board of Surgeons have certified that he is permanently disabled so as to be unfit for police duty; that the cause of said disability is old age, debility, and loss of memory, and the extent of it completely unfitting him for the performance of any police duty, and was received in the performance of police duty; it is, therefore,

Resolved, That the said Abram G. Bertholf, in pursuance of section 5 of chapter 389 of the Laws of 1878, be and is hereby retired from service in said Police Force, and placed upon the pension roll, and awarded, granted, and paid from the said Police Pension Fund by the trustees thereof the annual sum, during his lifetime, of six hundred dollars, payable in quarter yearly payments by the treasurer of said fund.

The question on the resolution was ordered taken by yeas and nays, and was adopted—all the Commissioners voting in the affirmative.

Whereas, It appears by the records of this Department that Samuel Pabor is a member of the Police Force of the City of New York, assigned to duty in the Twelfth Precinct. That he has performed police duty as a member of said Police Force for a period of twenty years and upwards; that after examination of said Pabor the Board of Surgeons have certified that the said Samuel Pabor is permanently and entirely disabled so as to be unfit for police duty; that the cause of such disability is chronic rheumatism, rupture, defective hearing and sight, and the nature and extent chronic and complete, and that said disability was incurred in the performance of police duty; it is, therefore,

Resolved, That the said Samuel Pabor, in pursuance of section 5 of chapter 389 of the Laws of 1878, be and is hereby retired from service in said Police Force, and placed upon the pension roll, and awarded, granted, and paid from the said Police Pension Fund by the trustees thereof the annual sum, during his lifetime, of six hundred dollars, payable in quarter yearly payments by the treasurer of said fund.

The question on the resolution was ordered taken by yeas and nays, and was adopted—all the Commissioners voting in the affirmative.

#### Street Cleaning.

Communication from Charles H. Haswell relative to his claim for services as engineer, was referred to the Treasurer for report.

Communication from Wm. W. Webb relative to filling with street earth on his lots foot of West Thirty-seventh street, was referred to the Inspector of Street Cleaning, to take measures to apply the remedy.

#### Bureau of Elections.

Whereas, It is incumbent on the Board of Police, by sections 13 and 15, of chapter 675, of the Laws of 1872, annually, in the months of August and September, to select four persons, two of whom shall be of opposite political faith on State issues from their associates, to serve as Inspectors of Election, and two persons in like manner, of opposite political faith from each other, to serve as Poll Clerks, in each Election District in the City of New York; therefore be it

Resolved, That lists will be received and are hereby invited, until the fifteenth day of August next, of the names, ages, residence, occupation, and political faith on State issues, of proper persons for the positions above named, to the end that the Board may institute the necessary inquiries as to the character and qualifications of the persons so submitted.

Resolved, That all lists so submitted be referred to the Chief of the Bureau of Elections, to have, through the Police Department, a careful inquiry into and report upon the character and qualifications of the persons named on such lists.

Resolved, That the lists so submitted shall be open to public inspection, and when a full list is prepared for one or more Assembly Districts, the same shall be published in the CITY RECORD, and public scrutiny invited, and objections (if any exist) considered before a final selection is made.

Resolved, That in the preparation of such lists for publication, the Chief of the Bureau of Elections is hereby directed to omit therefrom the name of any person whose business or reputation is of an immoral or disreputable character, or who has employment under the Federal, State, or City Government, or any of the Departments thereof.

### COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND.

Abstract of the proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, at the meeting held August 2, 1878.

Present—Hon. Smith Ely, Jr., Mayor (Chairman); Hon. John Kelly, Comptroller; J. Nelson Tappan, Esq., Chamberlain; and Patrick Keenan, Esq., Chairman Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

The following communication was received from the Commissioners of Docks, viz.:

NEW YORK, July 31, 1878.

Hon. SMITH ELY, JR., Mayor and Chairman of Board of Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of the City of New York:

SIR—At a meeting of the Board governing this Department, held this date, the following resolution was adopted, to wit:

“Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, pursuant to the authority vested in them by subdivision 11, of section 6, chapter 574, Laws of 1871, be and are hereby respectfully requested to direct the Comptroller of the City of New York to prepare and issue Dock Bonds of the City of New York, for the amount of two hundred and fifty thousand dollars (\$250,000), for the uses and purposes of the Department of Docks.”

Whereupon the following resolution, submitted by the Comptroller, was, on motion, adopted, viz.: Resolved, That the Comptroller, in accordance with subdivision 11 of section 6 of the act, chapter 574 of the Laws of 1871, be and hereby is directed to prepare and issue from time to time, as he may deem necessary to meet the requirements of the Dock Department, two hundred and fifty thousand dollars (\$250,000) Dock Bonds of the City of New York, for the purpose of raising moneys necessary to carry out the provisions of said act, relating to the Department of Docks, its powers and duties; the said sum being the amount of the requisition by the Commissioners of Docks, dated July 31, 1878.

The Comptroller submitted a statement of claims for the refunding of moneys paid for lands sold on account of non-payment of assessments, said sales having been vacated by order of the court.
