SECOND MEETING.

The Board of Police met on the 2d day of December, 1875.

Present—Messrs. Matsell, Disbecker, Voorhis, and Smith, Commissioners.

On motion of Commissioner Disbecker, the following preamble and resolution were adopted, and a copy thereof ordered to be forwarded to the Board of Aldermen:

Whereas, By the provisions of the statutes concerning street cleaning (chapter 677 of the Laws of 1872), the Board of Police is required to cause the streets of the city to be thoroughly cleaned, and kept cleaned, and to remove from said city daily all the materials gathered in the process of street cleaning, except such parts thereof as in the judgement of the Board of Health may be suitable to fill low and sunken lots; and

Whereas, There is no point adjacent to the City of New York, and outside thereof, either on land or water, where the materials in question can be placed without trespassing upon the independent jurisdiction of the State of New Jersey, Staten Island, Long Island, Westchester County, or the State of Connecticut.

To conform to the mandate of the law requiring the material to be removed daily out of the city, the Board of Police have been compelled during the summer to waste the material in the open ocean outside of Coney Island, at great expense to the Treasury of the city. Even this method will not be practicable during the winter season when storms and ice will render the towing of scows out to sea impossible; and

Whereas, Lying near to and southeast of Randall's Island is an extensive area called "Sunken Meadows," which is now valueless. The Board of Police is informed that this area could be reclaimed and utilized by depositing thereon the street cleaning materials. If raised above high tide it would add to the freehold estate of the city an area of valuable land equal to about one half the present extent of Randall's Island. With the approval of the Board of Health, this arrangement would afford to the Board of Police facilities for the lawful disposition of street cleaning materials during the winter, without which the business of street cleaning can only be done at great cost and risk; therefore

Resolved, That the Honorable the Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of New York be and are hereby respectfully requested to take such measures and action as shall seem to be appropriate and effective to enable the Board of Police (with the approval of the Board of Health) to bring into use for the purpose above mentioned, and to reclaim and fill up the area of land under water adjacent to Randall's Island, known as "Sunken Meadows."

BOARD OF EDUCATION.

WEDNESDAY, December 1, 1875.

The Board of Education held a stated session at the Hall of the Board, on Wednesday afternoon, December 1, at 4 o'clock P. M.

Present—Wm. H. Neilson, Esq., President, and Commissioners Baker, Beardslee, Dowd, Fuller, Halsted, Hazeltine, Jenkins, Kelly, Klamroth, Lewis, Man, Mathewson, Patterson, Schell, Traud, Vermilye, West, Wetmore, Wood, and Wilkins—21.

The President put the question on the adoption of the minutes, when they were amended and approved.

The President laid before the Board the following communication from Commissioner R. W. Townsend:

NEW YORK, November 18, 1875.

To the Members of the Board of Education:

I have to-day sent to the Mayor my resignation of the office of Commissioner of Common Schools, an office which I continued to hold to the detriment of my private affairs, amongst other reasons, because of the great pleasure I had in doing business and associating with the gentlemen of the Board.

The present illness of both my partners, and my private affairs, compel me to resign. Please accept from me for yourselves individually the assurance of my highest regard, and my best wishes for the success of the great interest of education in your hands.

EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT, CITY HALL,
NEW YORK, November 18, 1875.

To the Board of Education of the City of New York:

GENTLEMEN—I have to inform you that in accordance with chapter 112 of the Laws of 1873, I have this day appointed Jacob D. Vermilye to be a Commissioner of Common Schools of the City of New York, in place of Randolph W. Townsend, resigned, and for the unexpired term of said Randolph W. Townsend, which terminates on the first day of January, 1876.

The President announced that he had assigned Commissioner Vermilye to all the Committees of which Commissioner Townsend had been a member.

Commissioner Kelly asked to be excused from attendance at this session, which was granted.

The President called Commissioner Dowd to the chair and asked to be excused from attendance, which was granted.

The President pro tem. laid before the Board the following communications from Trustees of the several wards:

From the Eighth, Fourteenth, Fifteenth, Seventeenth, Nineteenth, and Twenty-fourth Wards, asking to excuse absence of teachers. Referred to Committee on Teachers, with power.

From the Eighth, Seventeenth, and Nineteenth Wards, nominating Evening School Teachers. Referred to the Committee on Evening Schools.

From the Fourth and Nineteenth Wards, nominating Principals and Vice Principals. Referred to the Committee on Teachers.

From the Seventeenth Ward, asking that a Teacher be paid for registration in Evening School. Referred to the Committee on Evening Schools.

From the Sixteenth Ward, to transfer a teacher. Referred to the Committee on Teachers.

From the Eighth Ward, relative to salary of Janitor of Grammar School No. 38. Referred to Committee on Buildings.

From the Eighteenth Ward, asking for a radiator and fixtures in Grammar School No. 50. Referred to the Committee on Warming and Ventilation.

From the Trustees of the Nineteenth Ward, asking for desks in the Primary Department of Grammar School No. 53; also, for platform in Grammar School No. 27. Referred to the Committee on School Furniture.

Also, for authority to advertise for proposals for erecting a new building in East Seventy-fifth street. Referred to the Committee on Buildings.

From the Twenty-second Ward, asking for authority to close Male Department Grammar School No. 9, temporarily. Referred to the Committee on By-Laws, etc.

From the Twenty-third Ward, asking for an appropriation to pay sundry bills, \$100.68. Referred to the Finance Committee.

From the Trustees of the Twenty-third Ward, making the award of contract for building a School-house in Mott Haven. Referred to the Finance Committee.

From the Twenty-fourth Ward, relative to premises lately occupied by Primary School No. 48. Referred to the Committee on Buildings.

The President pro tem. laid before the Board a communication from the City Superintendent, relative to a violation of the By-Laws, by a teacher. Referred to the Committee on By-Laws, etc.

Also, the monthly report of the City Superintendent. Referred to the appropriate committee, and entered in the minutes.

Also, the report of the Superintendent of Truancy. Entered in the minutes, and placed on file. From citizens of the Nineteenth Ward, recommending the re-appointment of Julius Katzenberg, for Trustee. On file.

From Wm. P. Rodgers, asking for a free reading room in the several wards. Referred to the Committee on By-Laws, etc.

From P. F. Maginn and others, offering lots for school purposes in West Fifty-sixth street. Referred to the Finance Committee.

From Geo. Savage and from F. McDermott, asking to have their globes furnished to the schools. Referred to the Committee on Course of Study and School Books.

Resolutions were offered by Commissioners Beardslee, West, Wood, and Wetmore, which were adopted or referred to the appropriate committees.

SPECIAL ORDER.

The special order, being the report of the Committee on Course of Study and School Books, relative to the proposed change in the system of Musical Instruction, was taken up, and, after discussion, was laid on the table.

Approving payment of Watchman on School Building at Fordham. Adopted.

Commissioner Beardslee presented a report from the Committee on Supplies, making the award of contract for printing to John B. McLean. Adopted.

Commissioner Wetmore presented a report from the Committee on Nomination of Trustees, recommending the following for appointment:

Commissioner Wetmore presented reports from the Committee on School Furniture, as follows:

Adverse to a class-room in the play-room of Primary School No. 21. Adopted.

Approving a bill for furniture. Adopted.

Commissioner Baker presented a report from the Committee on Warming and Ventilation, recommending the payment of sundry bills. Adopted.

Commissioner Patterson presented a report from the Committee on Sites and New Schools, adverse to the purchase of lots adjoining Grammar School No. 3, on Bedford street. Adopted.

Commissioner West presented a report from the Auditing Committee, recommending the payment of sundry bills for printing, advertising, postage, etc. Adopted.

Commissioner Halsted presented a report from the Committee on Teachers, relative to the violation of the By-Laws on Corporal Punishment by a teacher. Adopted.

Also, to appoint Miss M. Isabella Williams for Principal of Primary School No. 18. Adopted.

Also, to grant leave of absence to Miss Sarah C. Clark, Primary Department Grammar School No. 35. Adopted.

Commissioner Mathewson presented a report from the Committee on Evening Schools, adverse to paying female assistants the same as male assistants. Adopted.

Also, asking to be discharged from consideration of the communication of Philip Valentine, a teacher. Adopted.

Commissioner Klamroth presented a report from the Committee on Course of Study and School books, relative to the study of French and German by pupils, with the consent of parents or guardian. Adopted.

Also, asking to be discharged from the further consideration of the remonstrance of certain Trustees of the Sixth and Sixteenth Wards, relative to musical instruction. Adopted.

Commissioner Man presented a report from the Committee on By-Laws, Elections and Qualifications, relative to the By-Law on Sanitary Regulations. Laid over under the rule.

Commissioner Wood presented a report from the Committee on Normal Schools, making the award of contract for improving the grounds around the Normal College, and asking for an appropriation. Referred to the Finance Committee.

Also, to change the name of the committee to that of "Committee on Normal College." Referred to the Committee on By-Laws, Elections and Qualifications.

Commissioner Wetmore presented a report from the Committee on Nautical School, recommending an increase in the compensation of several of the officers. Adopted.

Commissioner Dowd presented a report from the Finance Committee, recommending the payment of bills for repairs, etc., of Guiry & Bro., amounting to \$147.70. Adopted.

Commissioner Wood offered a resolution relative to the Annual Reports of the City Superintendent and assistants. Laid on the table.

On motion, the Board then adjourned.

NOTICE

IN RELATION TO JURORS FOR STATE COURTS.

OFFICE OF THE COMMISSIONER OF JURORS,
NEW COUNTY COURT-HOUSE,
NEW YORK, JUNE 1, 1875.

APPLICATIONS FOR EXEMPTIONS WILL BE heard here, from 9 to 4 daily, from all persons hitherto liable or recently serving who have become exempt, and all needed information will be given.

Those who have not answered as to their liability, or proved permanent exemption, will receive a "jury enrollment notice," requiring them to appear before me this year. Whether liable or not, such notices must be answered (in person, if possible, and at this office only) under severe penalties. If exempt, the party must bring proof of exemption; if liable, he must also answer in person, giving full and correct name, residence, etc., etc. No attention paid to letters.

When possible and legal, serving jurors will be allowed to select a convenient season—if application be made in time.

Persons "enrolled" as liable must serve when called or pay their fines. No mere excuse will be allowed or interference permitted. The fines, received from those who, for business or other reasons, are unable to serve at the time selected, pay the expenses of this office, and if unpaid will be entered as judgments upon the property of delinquents.

The Commissioner will receive applications for relief from those jurors who have served continuously and promptly for several years, or have done excessive jury service in the State Courts.

All good citizens will aid the cause of justice, and secure reliable and respectable juries, and equalize their duty by serving promptly when summoned, allowing their clerks or subordinates to serve, reporting to me any attempt at bribery or evasion, and suggesting names for enrollment. Persons between sixty and seventy years of age, summer absentees, persons temporarily ill, and United States and District Court jurors are not exempt.

Every man must attend to his own notice. It is a misdemeanor to give any jury paper to another to answer. It is also punishable by fine or imprisonment to give or receive any present or bribe, directly or indirectly, in relation to a jury service, or to withhold any paper or make any false statement, and every case will be fully prosecuted. No fees of any kind exist or are allowed in regard to jury notices, and any one asking, receiving, or giving any such "fee" or "present" will be arrested, and, if possible, punished to the full extent of the law.

DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH,
HEALTH DEPARTMENT, No. 301 MOTT STREET,
NEW YORK, November 30, 1875.

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH of the Health Department of the City of New York, held at its office, on the 30th day of November, 1875, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That section 100 of the Sanitary Code be and is hereby amended, so as to read as follows:

Section 100. That every owner, lessee, tenant, and occupant of any stall, stable, or apartment in which any horse, cattle, or swine, or any other animal shall be kept, or of any place in which manure or any liquid discharge of such animals shall collect or accumulate, within the built-up portion of said city, shall cause said liquid and manure to be at once removed to some proper place, and shall at all times keep, or cause to be kept, such stalls, stables, and apartments, in a cleanly and wholesome condition, so that no offensive smell detrimental to health shall be allowed to escape therefrom; and when within three hundred feet of any occupied dwelling-house, or of any manufactory where more than five persons are employed, the removals from the stalls shall not be made, nor shall the manure or refuse from the stable be allowed to remain on any street or place near such stable, any time between 6 o'clock A. M. and 6 o'clock P. M., without a permit from this Board. Every such stall, stable, or apartment, where horses or cattle are kept, shall have an underground and properly covered manure vault of not less than sixty-four cubic feet capacity. But the Sanitary Superintendent is authorized to issue permits to be regularly reported to this Board regulating such removal within said hours.
