SECOND—A STATEMENT OF THE ACTION OF THE BOARD FOR THE PAST YEAR.

REVENUES AND EXPENDITURES.

The total gross revenue of the Department from leased wharves and wharfage for the year ending April 30, 1896, amounted to \$2,021,698.47, not including the sum of \$342,685.09, collected by the Finance Department for the rent of ferries, etc., which amount properly constitutes a portion of the revenue derived by the City for the use of its water-front. The total annual expenditures during the same period were \$760,050.14. Of this amount \$410,314.34 was expended for the work of construction, and \$54,428.82 was paid for wharf property; the sum of \$223,998.61 was spent in repairs, while the general expenses of the Department amounted to \$71,308.37.

REPORT OF THE ENGINEER-IN-CHIEF.

OFFICE OF THE ENGINEER-IN-CHIEF, NEW YORK, May 1, 1896. *To the Board of Docks:*
GENTLEMEN—I have the honor to submit the following report of the work under my charge and supervision during the year ending April 30, 1896.

WORK OF CONSTRUCTION UNDER NEW PLAN.

NORTH RIVER.

Battery Section—Embracing the boat landing, Pier "A," Pier, new 1, North river, and about 80 feet of bulkhead north of Pier, new 1.

Some repairs and work of maintenance have been done on this section during the year.

A float for accommodation of small boats landing here, built under Contract No. 498, has been placed in use.

Dey Street Section Extended—Extending 20 feet southerly of the southerly end of the Dey Street Section.

Under resolution of the Board of June 20, 1895, a section of the bulkhead or river wall 20 feet in length immediately south of the Dey Street Section has been begun and finished. It is leased to Mr. John H. Starin.

Dey Street Section—Extending from the south end of West Washington Market Section at the middle of Dey street about 240 feet southerly.

This section has been built under the provisions of chapter 397 of the Laws of 1893, by the Department of Docks, at the cost and expense of Mr. John H. Starin, the owner of the old bulkhead on the westerly side of West street. The agreement was made with Mr. Starin by the city authorities on November 30, 1892, in conformity with resolutions passed by the Board of Aldermen on October 18, 1892, and by the Department of Docks on June 16, 1892, and by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund on September 14, 1892, which agreement was "ratified, confirmed and made valid" by said chapter 397 of the Laws of 1893. A further agreement, as to details, was made with the Department of Docks on March 3, 1894, so that the dredging has been done by Mr. Starin directly, and the wall has been built with the Department's force and material, at the cost and expense of Mr. Starin. The wall has been completed for the entire length of the section, 241.9 feet, and an iron shed is being erected upon it by Mr. Starin.

Pier, new 13, North river—This pier was built last year by Mr. John H. Starin, and an iron shed has been built upon it by him and is now nearly completed. The pier is about 723 feet long and 100 feet wide.

West Washington Market Section—Extending from about the middle of Pier, old 24, between Vesey and Barclay streets, on the North river, to about the middle of the foot of Dey street, North river, a distance of about 578.17 feet.

The wall on this section was practically completed last year and has now been finished. The International Navigation Company, lessees, have extended their shed on the bulkhead to a point 140 feet southerly of Pier, new 14, and Mr. Starin has built shed on part leased by him so that the sheds are continuous from Pier, new 13, to Pier, new 14.

Barclay Street Section—The Hoboken Land and Improvement Company, owners of the old bulkhead on the westerly side of West street, at the foot of Barclay street, are building the bulkhead or river wall in front of their property, and rebuilding their ferry-racks and ferry-house to accord with the New Plan. This work is being done under the provisions of chapter 397 of the Laws of 1893, and under a permit and an agreement made with the Department of Docks on January 25, 1894, and approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund on February 6, 1894.

The bulkhead or river wall is substantially completed and the new ferry-house, racks and other appurtenances, are also nearly finished.

Warren Street Section—Extending from the northerly side of Pier, old 28, North river, to the northerly side of Pier, old 29, North river, a distance of about 253 feet.

Length of piling for the year.....00.00 feet; to date, 237.00 feet.

But little work of construction has been done upon this section during the past year. An iron shed has been built upon it and upon Pier, new 19, by the Old Colony Steamboat Company, lessee.

Laight Street Section—The northerly end of the wall on this section has been completed under resolution of the Board of July 12, 1895, to the full length of the section—600 feet.

Desbrosses Street Section—The Pennsylvania Railroad Company, owners of the old bulkhead on the westerly side of West street, between Vestry and Watts streets, have begun building the bulkhead or river wall in the front of their property, under the provisions of chapter 397 of the Laws of 1893, and also under a permit and agreement made with the Department of Docks on October 30, 1894, and approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund December 18, 1894. At present about 77 feet northerly of the Laight Street Section has been completed.

Sections between Warren and Desbrosses Streets, inclusive.

Sections between Warren and Desbrosses streets, inclusive, on which the bulkhead or river wall has been completed, are as follows:

The Warren Street, Chambers Street, Jay Street, Franklin Street, North Moore Street, Beach Street, Laight Street and Desbrosses Street Sections, upon which sections the wall is completed, make a continuous length of the bulkhead or river wall of 2,724 feet.

These sections embrace Piers, new 19, 20, 21, 22, 23, 24, 25, 26, 27, 28 and 29, all of which have been completed. Only Piers, new 20, 21, 27, 28 and 29, have not yet been extended to the pierhead-line of 1890.

Brick Pavement—Under permits of the Board an area of 40 feet by 30 feet of the new-made land directly opposite Pier, new 24, was paved with vitrified brick by the International Contracting Company as a sample and test. This area was laid in May, 1894, and, under permit of the Board, another area of the new-made land, 50 feet by 50 feet, was also paved with vitrified brick by Thornton N. Motley as a sample and experiment. This area was paved in November, 1894.

Under the conditions of a very heavy traffic, which prevails at these points, this experimental pavement will probably give very valuable information. At present it has been greatly worn, and will probably soon have to be replaced with granite.

Sections North of Canal Street.

The sections north of Canal street, on which the bulkhead or river wall has been completed, are as follows:

These sections embrace Piers, new 34 to new 47, inclusive of both.

Pier, new 43—This pier was built in 1875 for a length of 546.50 feet. In 1894 it was extended to the pierhead-line of 1890, and during the past year so much of it as was built in 1875 was removed and rebuilt.

Perry Street Section—Extending from the middle of Pier, old 54 at the foot of Perry street, North river, to the southerly side of West Eleventh street, a distance of about 210 feet.

Under unanimous resolution of the Board of February 17, 1896, work was begun upon this section and good progress has been made in building the bulkhead or river wall up to date.

Sections North of West Twenty-third Street.

The sections north of West Twenty-third street on which the bulkhead or river wall has been completed are as follows:

These sections have been completed and are in use, except the northerly end of the West Twenty-third street section. They include Piers, new 53, 54, 55, 56, 57, 58, 59, 60, 61, 62 and 63. The total continuous length of the bulkhead or river wall is 2,690.19 feet.

On account of the great depth of soft mud in the bottom on these sections, the filling behind the wall settles and requires additions from time to time.

Pier, new 53 and the bulkhead between Piers, new 53 and new 54, having been leased to the Pennsylvania Railroad Company, and that company having obtained from lessee of Pier, new 54 right to use its southerly side, and having also bought from Commissioners of Sinking Fund franchise to operate a ferry between Jersey City and this part of New York City, they have just begun the erection of ferry-racks, etc., and a platform has been built in rear of the wall to sustain the filling to be placed behind the wall and prevent the flowing of the soft mud to the southward.

West Forty-third Street Section—Extending from the northerly side of West Forty-third street to the northerly side of West Forty-fourth street, a distance of about 260.83 feet.

Length of base blocks to date..... 253.55 feet.

"E" course of granite to date..... 230.87 "

Equivalent length of completed wall to date..... 243.62 "

The wall on this section was completed in 1894 from the northerly side of West Forty-fourth street as far southerly as it can be until the Department is in possession of Pier at West Forty-third street, proceedings for which are in progress.

West Fifty-second Street Section (south end)—Extending from 83 feet 10 inches southerly of the southerly side of West Fiftieth street northerly to the north side of West Fifty-first street, a distance of 404 feet 8 inches.

Length of base blocks to date..... 404.66 feet.

"E" course of granite to date..... 404.66 "

Equivalent length of completed wall to date..... 406.66 "

On account of the small distance of the rock bottom of the river below mean low water mark on this section, there is no pile foundation for the bulkhead or river wall, but it will consist of concrete and masonry from the rock bottom to the top.

In constructing this wall the bottom was first cleaned of mud, etc., as well as practicable by dredging, which, however, does not remove the material which lies in holes and pockets in the surface of the rocks. The mud and rubbish that lay in these holes and pockets were then removed by an 8-inch pump which would pass brick, small stones, etc., until the whole surface of the rock bottom was cleaned. Concrete in bags of four bushels capacity and about three feet six inches long, eight inches thick and two feet wide, when filled, was then placed upon the bottom, and the bags so placed and built together as to form a seat or resting place to receive the base blocks.

The top of the bags being somewhat irregular a layer of fine concrete, made of one and one-half volumes of cement, two of sand and four of roofing gravel or pebbles not larger than one inch in their greatest dimensions, was placed thereon, in order to make a plane surface to receive the bottom of the base blocks. The base blocks were then set in place upon the bags, and the leveling-off layer of fine concrete and the granite and concrete backing built upon the top of the base blocks.

Each base block made six feet in length of the foundation wall.

The wall on this end of this section was completed and put in use in 1891, from 83 feet 10 inches south of West Fiftieth street to the northerly side of West Fifty-first street.

West Fifty-second Street Section (north end)—Extending from the northerly side of West Fifty-first street to the northerly line of West Fifty-fifth street, a distance of 1,043 feet 4 inches.

Length of dredging for the year..... 260.83 feet; to date, 1,043.30 feet.

The work upon this end of the section, which was suspended under chapter 478 of the Laws of 1894, has been resumed under resolution of the Board of June 20, 1895, and good progress made. The construction is the same as that on the south end of the section for the same reason. For some portions it has been found advisable to put the base blocks in three tiers, one above the other, on account of the depth of the rock below mean low water. Filling behind the wall has followed its construction.

West Fifty-seventh Street Section—Extending from the northerly side of West Fifty-fifth street to the southerly side of West Fifty-eighth street, a distance of 762 feet 6 inches.

The wall on this section was completed in 1893, and the Department Yard was extended southerly to Fifty-sixth street upon the filling placed behind it.

The total continuous length of the bulkhead or river wall on West Fifty-second Street Section, north end, and West Fifty-seventh Street Section, is 1,542.12 feet.

EAST RIVER.

Stanton Street Section—Extending from the south side of Rivington street to the north side of Stanton street, a distance of 557.21 feet, under unanimous resolution of the Board, March 1, 1893.

The Department having acquired the southerly half of Pier 62, at the foot of Stanton street, and the bulkhead adjoining, a section of the bulkhead or river wall was begun in 1893 at Stanton street, under unanimous resolution of the Board, passed on March 1, 1893. It is upon the East One Hundred and Second Street Section plan, and was substantially completed between Rivington and Stanton street last year. The filling in behind the wall has been completed and the section put into commercial use.

East Twenty-fourth Street Section—Extending from south side of East Twenty-fourth street to the northerly line of East Twenty-fifth street, a distance of 340.60 feet, under unanimous resolution of the Board, April 25, 1889, as amended June 18, 1891.

The Health Department having in 1892 obtained the transfer of the premises between East Sixteenth and East Seventeenth streets, to it for hospital purposes, the Department Yard on the East river was ordered to be transferred to the block between East Twenty-fourth and East Twenty-fifth streets, and work on this section was pushed in consequence. The wall and filling behind it were finished and the Yard removed to this section in 1894.

East Twenty-fifth Street Section—Extending from the northerly side of East Twenty-fifth street to the northerly side of East Twenty-sixth street, a distance of about 276 feet, under unanimous resolution of the Board, passed October 27, 1892.

Length of completed wall to date..... 276.24 feet.

This work is built upon the East One Hundred and Second street plan.

Work was completed on this section during last year and the property has been put in use for commercial purposes.

Bellevue Section—Extending from the northerly side of East Twenty-sixth street to the northerly side of East Twenty-eighth street, a distance of 543.81 feet, under unanimous resolution of the Board, passed April 25, 1889.

Length of completed wall to date..... 543.81 feet.

This section was substantially completed in 1892 and is in use by the Department of Public Charities in connection with Bellevue Hospital.

Pier at Sixty-second street—A new pier 259½ feet long and 60 feet wide was commenced at the foot of East Sixty-second street, under Contract No. 485, last year and has been completed.

East Ninety-first Street Section—Extending from the southerly side of East Ninety-first street to the northerly side of East Ninety-second street, a distance of about 376 feet.

Length of dredging for the year..... 141.48 feet; to date, 266.48 feet.

Work was begun upon this section in 1894 under resolution of the Board of May 25, 1893, and the wall built across the foot of East Ninety-first street last year, when it was suspended on account of chapter 478 of the Laws of 1894.

Work was resumed in July, 1895, under resolution of the Board of June 20, 1895.

On account of the nature of the bottom, the southerly end of the wall on this section was built on the plan of the West Fifty-second Street Section and a length of 165 feet on a specially modified plan of the wall of 1876 and again for 18 feet on the West Fifty-second street plan.

The wall is now built to the southerly of the Astoria Ferry at East Ninety-second street and the filling behind it will be begun immediately.

East Ninety-fourth Street Section—Extending from the southerly side of Ninety-fourth street to the northerly side of East Ninety-fifth street, a distance of 373.08 feet.

This section and the piers at East Ninety-fourth and East Ninety-fifth streets have been in commercial use.

East Ninety-sixth Street Section—Extending from the southerly side of East Ninety-sixth street to the middle of the block between East Ninety-sixth and East Ninety-seventh streets, a distance of about 200.92 feet.

The wall on this section has been completed and the filling behind it finished.

Rhineland's Reef—A contract (No. 528) has been let for increasing the depth of water on Rhineland's Reef, off East Ninety-second street, to a depth of 10 feet at mean low water and good progress in the work has been made by Mr. P. Sandford Ross, contractor.

East Ninety-ninth Street Section—Extending from the southerly side of East Ninety-ninth street to the northerly side of East One Hundredth street, a distance of about 365 feet.

Length of dredging for the year..... 150.00 feet; to date, 286.00 feet.

This section was begun in 1893 at the northerly side of East One Hundredth street, and the wall was built far enough to the southward to permit filling in and the building of a pier at the foot of East One Hundredth street, in 1894. The filling also was put in as far as practicable.

Arrangements having been made with the New York and College Point Ferry Company to move their ferry racks, etc., work has been begun at the southerly end of this section under resolution of the Board of June 20, 1895, and good progress has been made.

The pierhead-line of 1890 has been modified by the Secretary of War on November 18, 1895, by extending it further outshore from East Ninety-fourth to East One Hundred and Fourth street, giving greater lengths to the piers on that section of the water front. The greatest additional length is at East Ninety-ninth street, where it is 131 feet.

HARLEM RIVER.

East One Hundred and Second Street Section—Extending from the southerly side of East One Hundred and First street to the northerly side of East One Hundred and Fourth street, a distance of 848.65 feet; south end 144.70 feet in length.

The wall of this section was begun at its northerly end, and it was built southerly from the northerly line of East One Hundred and Fourth street, upon the plan described in the Annual Report of 1892, to a point 85 feet northerly of the northerly line of East One Hundred and First street, where the nature of the river bottom changed so much that the wall south of this point has been built upon the plan of the wall of 1876.

East One Hundred and Second Street Section—Extending from the southerly side of East One Hundred and First street to the northerly side of East One Hundred and Fourth street, a distance of 848.65 feet; north end 703.95 feet in length.

The section is described under the preceding heading.

The filling-in behind the wall on this section has been finished, and it has been in commercial use since 1894.

East One Hundred and Tenth Street Section—Extending from the southerly side of East One Hundred and Seventh street to the northerly side of East One Hundred and Tenth street, a distance of 855.86 feet.

Length of "E" course of granite to date..... 750.85 feet.

Length of coping to date..... 698.06 "

Equivalent length of completed wall to date..... 750.85 "

The wall on this section was substantially completed in 1892, and has been in commercial use.

East One Hundred and Twenty-fifth Street Section—Extending from the southerly side of East One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street to a point 25 feet northerly of the northerly line of One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street and westerly to the angle of the bulkhead line northerly of East One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street, a distance of 367.27 feet.

Length of "E" course of granite to date..... 362.70 feet.

Length of coping to date..... 362.70 "

This section was substantially completed in 1893 (except final pavement), and has been in commercial use.

SHERMAN CREEK.

On the westerly or Manhattan Island side of the Harlem river, at about Two Hundredth street, there is a creek making into the island about 1,500 feet from the westerly channel line of the Harlem river as determined by the United States authorities.

A new plan for the improvement of this section of the water-front was determined by the Department of Docks on March 29, 1894, and approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund on November 20, 1895. This plan provides for a basin 345 feet wide and 1,400 feet long, with bulkhead and piers having 7,271 feet of wharfage room, and having a capacity as a basin for 250 canal boats.

Work will soon be begun upon this section to give about 700 feet of wharfage room, with the intention of extending it as may be required from time to time.

WORK OF CONSTRUCTION NOT UNDER THE NEW PLAN.

West One Hundred and Forty-second to West One Hundred and Forty-fourth Street, North River—An addition was built to the bulkhead at these streets by the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company.

East River—Bridge foundations are being placed at the foot of East Sixty-fourth street for the proposed New York and Long Island Bridge, and piers erected on Blackwell's Island for the bridge, at about opposite the foot of the same street.

Ward's Island—A small pier on the westerly side of Ward's Island, for the use of the Department of Public Charities and Correction, begun last year under Contract No. 495, has been finished.

Port Morris—A crib-bulkhead on the westerly side of the East river, between the southerly

side of One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street and the centre of One Hundred and Thirty-seventh street by the Port Morris Land and Improvement Company, under permit of the Board, which was begun last year has been completed.

Willis and Brook Avenues, Harlem River—The water-front from Willis to Brook avenue, on the Harlem river, owned by New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company, has been filled in.

Gerard Avenue, Harlem River—A dry wall or rip-rap embankment is being built at above premises by John Cromwell, under permit of the Board. Begun August 16, 1895; in progress.

Lenox Avenue, Harlem River—Filling was placed at above premises by Metropolitan Street Railway Company, under permit of the Board. Begun January 10, 1896, and finished January 21, 1896.

Willow Avenue, Bronx Kills—The filling is being extended at above premises by New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company, under permit of the Board. Begun September 16, 1895; in progress.

Oak Point and Bronx River—The water-front in this vicinity is being improved by filling-in, etc., thereat, by East Bay Land and Improvement Company, under permit of the Board. Begun September 15, 1891; in progress from time to time.

GENERAL REPAIRS.

The repairs to piers, bulkheads, etc., have cost somewhat more during the past year than in 1895. A detailed statement of them is given in the appendix.

Among the large items of repairs are the following:

Removal of a portion of Pier, new 43 and the structures thereon, and rebuilding the same—Contract No. 518.

Repairing Pier at foot of West Twentieth street—Contract No. 514.

Repairing Pier at the foot of West Thirty-fourth street—Contract No. 519.

Repairing Pier at the foot of West Forty-sixth street—Contract No. 505.

Repairing Pier at the foot of West Fifty-first street—Contract No. 506.

Repairing crib-bulkhead at the foot of East Seventeenth Street—Contract No. 510.

Repairing Pier at the foot of East Twenty-sixth street—Contract No. 503.

Repairing bulkhead-platform, between East Sixty-second and East Sixty-third streets—Contract No. 523.

FLOATING PROPERTY.

The floating property of the Department has been decreased by one old deck scow, condemned and broken up.

A full list of the floating property will be found in the appendix.

SURVEYING PROPERTY.

Base lines and bench marks have been verified, from time to time, in connection with the construction of the bulkhead-wall at the different sections on the North, East and Harlem rivers, and of the piers, and from these lines and levels have been given during the progress of the work.

Lines and levels have also been given on contract work for general repairs.

The quantities of sand, broken stone for concrete, rip-rap and cobble stones delivered at the various sections and piers, have been measured and calculated.

Surveys and examinations have been made over 989,542 linear feet of water-front. The surveys have been plotted and put on file in this office, and tracings have been prepared therefrom.

3,320 rod soundings, to ascertain the depth of soft mud, have been taken, of which 1,957 were on the North river and 1,363 on the East and Harlem rivers. 137,383 disk soundings, to ascertain the depth of water, have been taken on the North, East and Harlem rivers, in 942 slips, of which 73,883, in 448 slips, were on the North river, and 63,500, in 494 slips, were on the East and Harlem rivers.

Of the above, 10,999 disk soundings and 1,461 rod soundings were for construction, and 126,384 disk soundings and 1,859 rod soundings were for general repairs and examinations, etc., taken before and after dredging, all of which have been reduced, plotted and placed on file in this office.

All the dredging done by the Department has been supervised, as also the dredging done by private parties.

The accounts of all the dredging done by the Department have been kept, and from them monthly reports, statements for estimates, etc., have been made and receipts given, as required.

The automatic tide-gauges on the Harlem river, Pier "A," North river, at West Fifty-seventh Street Yard, North river, and East Twenty-fourth Street Yard, East river, have been attended to and the records preserved.

DEPARTMENT YARDS.

West Fifty-seventh Street Yard—This yard now extends from the northerly side of West Fifty-sixth street to the southerly side of West Fifty-eighth street, and also includes the Pier at the foot of West Fifty-seventh street.

3,000 barrels of Portland cement have been received at this yard for the work of the Department; 42 special base blocks for the bulkhead or river wall, containing nearly 1,316 cubic yards of concrete, and 1 base block for the bulkhead or river wall, containing about 34 cubic yards of concrete, have been built at this yard.

Various stores and supplies have been received and issued as usual, and a large number of tests have been made on the Department's testing machines.

The bins, platforms, etc., which were begun in this yard in 1893, were not entirely completed when chapter 478 of the Laws of 1894 took effect, and consequently work upon them was suspended and has since been resumed and finished.

East Twenty-fourth Street Yard—The area occupied by this newly-established yard lies between East Twenty-fourth and East Twenty-fifth streets and easterly of what was formerly Avenue A.

Its length on the northerly line of East Twenty-fourth street is 198.7 feet, on the southerly line of East Twenty-fifth street 122 feet, and it has a length on the bulkhead or river wall of 212 feet.

The newly made land and the top of the wall are occupied by the offices, the cement shed, the platforms for building base blocks and the various shops necessary for the work. The new Pier at foot of East Twenty-fifth street is also included in this yard and used for the reception, inspection and issue of granite stones for the wall.

The Department has now a very complete and well-appointed plant for carrying on its work at this yard.

29 base blocks for the wall, containing about 1,049 cubic yards of concrete, have been built at this yard and 1,000 barrels of Portland cement received and stored for Department use.

Timber basins—The timber furnished under the various contracts has been received, issued and inspected at the timber basins at West Fifty-seventh and West Seventy-fifth streets.

A table of the dredging done by lessees or owners during the year, by order or under permit of the Board of Docks.

A full statement of the work done by lessees and owners of piers and bulkheads and by others, by order or under permit of the Board of Docks and under my general supervision.

A table of wharfage room made by the Department during the year.

A table of wharfage room made during the year by private parties, under permit of the Board.

NEW BULKHEAD AND PIERHEAD LINES.

By Act of Congress of August 11, 1888 (section 12), the Secretary of War is authorized to cause bulkhead and pierhead lines to be established in harbors of the United States. Under this law, a Board of United States Engineers, consisting of General Henry L. Abbott, Colonel William P. Craighill, General C. B. Comstock, Colonel D. C. Houston, and Colonel G. L. Gillespie, was organized in October 1888, to fix the lines in the Harbor of New York and adjacent waters.

On April 15, 1890, this Board submitted a report to the Secretary of War, recommending among others the fixing of bulkhead and pierhead lines on both the North and East rivers on Manhattan Island, southerly from West Eighty-first street, on the North river, to the Battery, and around the Battery to the East river, and thence northerly to East Eighty-first street.

The report and the map accompanying it were approved by the Hon. Redfield Proctor, Secretary of War, on April 25, 1890, and the exterior lines for bulkheads and solid filling are thereby fixed by the highest authority for that portion of the water-front of this city south of Eighty-first street on both rivers.

September 17, 1890, this Board submitted a further report to the Secretary of War recommending among others the fixing of bulkhead and pierhead lines on the North, East and Harlem rivers on Manhattan Island, northerly, from West Eighty-first street, on the North river, to Spuyten Duyvil, and around the north end of Manhattan Island, and thence southerly to East Eighty-first

street; also on the easterly or continental side of the Harlem river, from the North river around Spuyten Duyvil, and thence southerly and easterly around Port Morris to Bungay street; also around Blackwell's, Randall's and Ward's Islands, and the sunken meadow east of Randall's Island.

This report and the map accompanying it were approved by L. A. Grant, Assistant Secretary of War, on October 18, 1890.

On December 23, 1890, this Board submitted a further report in this connection to the Secretary of War, recommending the fixing of bulkhead and pierhead lines on the westerly side of the East river, from Bungay street northerly around Hunt's Point to the mouth of the Bronx river at a point about opposite the prolongation of Lane avenue.

This report and the map accompanying it were approved by L. A. Grant, Assistant Secretary of War, on January 9, 1891.

On February 8, 1892, this Harbor Line Board submitted another report to the Secretary of War, relating to bulkhead and pierhead lines within the jurisdiction of the City of New York, recommending the fixing of a bulkhead and pierhead line around Great and Little Mill Rock and the Government Dike connecting them.

This report and the map accompanying it were approved by the Hon. S. B. Elkins, Secretary of War, March 9, 1892.

On May 20, 1892, the Harbor Line Board submitted a report to the Secretary of War recommending a change in the previously established bulkhead and pierhead lines around Barretto's and Hunt's Points.

This report and the map accompanying it were approved by L. A. Grant, Acting Secretary of War, on June 11, 1892.

On January 16, 1893, the Harbor Line Board submitted a report to the Secretary of War, recommending the fixing of a bulkhead and pierhead line at Riker's Island.

This report was approved by the Hon. S. B. Elkins, Secretary of War, on January 24, 1893.

On July 27, 1893, the Harbor Line Board submitted a report to the Secretary of War, recommending a modification of the previously established bulkhead and pierhead lines near Washington Bridge for the better construction of the Harlem River Driveway.

This recommendation was approved by the Hon. Daniel S. Lamont, Secretary of War, on October 2, 1893.

On October 3, 1894, the Harbor Line Board submitted a report to the Secretary of War recommending a modification of the bulkhead and pierhead line previously established at Riker's Island.

This report was approved by the Hon. Daniel S. Lamont, Secretary of War, on October 29, 1894.

On October 31, 1895, the Harbor Line Board submitted a report to the Chief of Engineers, U. S. A., recommending a modification in the pierhead line along the East and Harlem rivers, extending from the southerly side of East Ninety-fourth street, to the southerly side of East One Hundred and Fourth street.

This report and the map accompanying it were approved by the Hon. Daniel S. Lamont, Secretary of War, on November 18, 1895.

For the recently annexed portion of Westchester County, bulkhead and pierhead lines have been established as follows:

On December 23, 1890, the Harbor Line Board submitted a report to the Chief of Engineers, U. S. A., recommending the fixing of bulkhead and pierhead lines along the northerly shore of East river, extending from Port Morris to Throgg's Neck.

This report and the map accompanying it were approved by L. A. Grant, Acting Secretary of War, on January 9, 1891.

On June 23, 1894, Col. G. L. Gillespie submitted a report to the Chief of Engineers, U. S. A., recommending certain pierhead and bulkhead lines for Westchester creek, extending from the estuary at East river to Westchester.

This report and the map accompanying it were approved by the Hon. Daniel S. Lamont, Secretary of War, on June 29, 1894.

These lines are exterior lines only, and there is no objection to building bulkheads or piers within or shoreward of them or to excavating or removing bulkheads already built and building new bulkheads further inshore.

On the East river and the Harlem river the lines established conform substantially with lines fixed or proposed by this Department, except from East Ninety-fourth street to East One Hundredth street, where it will be necessary to obtain authorization from the Legislature to extend the piers to this new modified pierhead line.

On the North river the bulkhead line is substantially the same as that now established, and the pierhead line is also the same above West Twenty-third street. Below West Twenty-third street, however, the pierhead line is thrown out into the river so that the local authorities can extend the length of the piers various distances, in the maximum to about 155 feet beyond the line established at present.

From West Eleventh street to West Fourteenth street, North river, the distance between this new pierhead line and the established bulkhead line varies from 45 feet at West Fourteenth street to 160 feet at West Eleventh street.

This, of course, is no substantial advantage under the present established bulkhead line at this place. If, however, the plan for the improvement of this portion of the water-front recommended in the report of 1880 and modified so as to include and not disturb the New West Washington Market in the report of 1888, and which was approved and supported by the Board in the fall of 1888, and before the Legislature of 1889 should be carried out, this additional length to the piers therein proposed will be of substantial advantage and benefit.

I submit the following extract from the report of the Board of United States Engineers of April 15, 1890, above referred to, in relation to this section of the water-front:

"At West Fourteenth street, North river, the original width of the river has been materially impaired by artificial encroachments on both banks—the more to be regretted—as Castle Point, a rocky headland on the opposite shore, formed originally a marked gorge in the river which should not have been made worse by artificial shore extensions.

"From West Eleventh street north to West Seventeenth street, New York City, the existing legal pier and bulkhead lines coincide. The unfortunate extension of the bulkhead line to nearly the established limit for the pierhead line to the southward has had the effect of restricting very much the length of the piers, and in consequence of prohibiting the use of this front to all except small vessels.

"The Board thinks that if wharf room is needed in this locality for longer vessels it should be gained only by excavations in rear of the bulkhead line and not by extension of piers into the river beyond the line now recommended."

The Legislature, by the passage of chapter 158 of the Laws of 1892, has authorized and empowered the local authorities to make the necessary changes on this section of the plans of 1871, and the work can then be carried on.

A portion of the plan of 1880, above referred to from West Eleventh to Gansevoort street, was approved by Commissioners of the Sinking Fund on March 30, 1894, and proceeding for acquisition of the necessary private property are in progress, and I beg leave to urge the adoption of the plan for the remainder of the distance, viz.: from Gansevoort street to West Twenty-third street, at an early date:

Pierhead Lines of 1890.

Under chapter 482, Laws of 1890, the pierhead line from the Battery to West Seventieth street, on the North river, was altered and made to conform to the pierhead line, approved and established between those points by the Secretary of War, April 25, 1890; by the Department of Docks, on July 3, 1890, and its action was approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, on July 24, 1890.

The following piers have been extended to the new pierhead line to date:

The audited expenditures for Construction Account during the past year have been only \$410,314.34, which is smaller than for many years, and it is due, in part, to the lack of property upon which to make improvements, and in part to the lack of proper legislation for carrying on the work of the Department.

The audited expenditures for General Repairs, however, have been \$223,998.61, somewhat larger than for some years past, including dredging. And the distribution of these amounts between wages and salaries of the pay-roll, bills and claims, including cost of materials, and payments for dredging and for contracts is as follows:

The equivalent length completed of the City's bulkhead or river wall on the North river for the year is 83.32 feet, and on the East river 122 feet, making a total of 205.32 feet. Also an equivalent length of 274 feet of bulkhead or river wall has been completed on the North river at the cost and expense of private parties.

The total length of bulkhead or river wall completed on the granite course under the coping is as follows:

Of this amount, 677.58 feet, have been built by private parties.

Two new piers have been built on the East and Harlem rivers.

The total new wharfage room made during the year is 1,991.13 feet.

DEY STREET SECTION EXTENDED.

Under Resolution of the Board, June 20, 1895.

Bulkhead-wall Proper.

Dredging—February 10, 1896.—562 cubic yards of mud were dredged from in front of wall to allow rip-rap to be placed.

Pumping Mud—July 3 to August 24, 1895.—Mud was pumped from around foundation piles.

STONE-FILLING.

Cobble—August 24, 1895, to January 18, 1896.—Cobble was placed on wall foundation by contractor's forces under Treasurer's Order 18221 and Contract No. 508. Bulkhead of piles was built at the south end of section to retain cobble.

Rip-rap—November 26, 1895, to February 15, 1896.—Rip-rap was placed in rear of wall by contractor's forces under Contract No. 508.

PILING AND WOODWORK.

Vertical Piles—August 24 to September 28, 1895.—63 vertical piles were driven, regulated and stay-lathed. Piles were rafted at Twenty-fourth street, East river, for use at this section.

Test Piles—July 23, 1895.—2 test piles were driven for examination of river bottom.

Bracing Piles—September 11 to October 19, 1895.—9 bracing piles were driven, regulated and stay-lathed.

Binding Frames—September 4 to October 26, 1895.—Binding frame No. 1 was made and sunk, and chocks placed to hold it in position.

Sawing Piles—September 17 to October 19, 1895.—Vertical and bracing piles were sawed off to grade and pile butts rafted for removal, and vertical piles located by divers.

Longitudinal Capping—September 24 to October 26, 1895.—Longitudinal capping was fitted, placed and fastened in position.

Transverse Capping—October 8 to December 21, 1895.—Piles were regulated for cross caps.

Cap Decking—December 28, 1895, to January 11, 1896.—Decking was placed in rear of granite and fastened with one-inch treenails.

MASONRY.

Concrete Blocks—October 16 to 23, 1895.—2 concrete blocks were loaded on scow at Fifty-seventh Street Yard and set at section.

Chain-holes—October 23, 1895.—Chain-holes in concrete blocks were filled with concrete in oval bottom bags.

Granite—November 4, 1895, to February 8, 1896.—24 pieces of granite were set on "A B," "C," "D" and "E" courses of wall. Crew of 10-ton derrick unloading granite and stripping derrick at West Fifty-seventh Street Yard.

Concrete Backing—January 18 to February 1, 1896.—120 batches of concrete were made and placed in rear of granite.

Coping—January 30 to February 8, 1896.—9 pieces of coping were loaded on scow "L" and set on top of "E" course.

Backing-logs—February 6 to 8, 1896.—Backing-logs of 12 x 12 yellow-pine were placed and fastened on coping.

Pointing—February 1 to April 18, 1896.—125 linear feet of granite were pointed, and sand and cement were transferred from scow to shed at Cortlandt street for this purpose.

The wall at this section for the entire length of 20 feet was begun and completed within the year.

General Work.

Removing Old Work—June 29 to August 31, 1896.—The platform and old piles were taken up and rafted.

Earth-filling—October 29, 1895, to March 28, 1896.—10 piles were driven in close row to retain earth-filling. 384 loads of filling were placed and dry wall was built to retain same, and 100 cubic yards of rip-rap were placed by contractor under Contract No. 508.

DEY STREET SECTION.

On account of John H. Starin. Under Resolution of the Board, February 21, 1894.

Bulkhead-wall Proper.

Dredging—May 1 to July 20, 1895.—Mud was dredged and piles pulled over bulkhead-wall area by Morris & Cumings Dredging Company.

STONE-FILLING.

Cobble—May 3 to December 21, 1895.—Cobble was placed on wall foundation by contractor's force. The old platform was removed to make way for cobble.

Rip-rap—May 6, 1895, to February 15, 1896.—Rip-rap was placed in rear of wall by contractor's forces.

PILING AND WOODWORK.

Vertical Piles—May 13 to June 29, 1895.—123 piles were driven, regulated and stay-lathed.

Bracing Piles—May 28 to June 8, 1895.—21 piles were driven, regulated and stay-lathed.

Binding Frames—May 20 to July 20, 1895.—Binding frames were framed and sunk and chocks were fitted to hold same in position.

Sawing Off Piles—May 28 to June 22, 1895.—117 vertical piles and 32 bracing-piles were sawed off to grade, and pile butts were collected and rafted for removal.

Longitudinal Capping—June 6 to June 22, 1895.—14 longitudinal caps were fitted and placed in position and fastened with 2-inch treenails.

Transverse Capping—June 15 to July 6, 1895.—7 transverse caps were fitted and placed in position and fastened with 80 2-inch and 37 3-inch treenails.

Cap Decking—December 21, 1895, to January 4, 1896.—Decking was laid in rear of granite and fastened with 1-inch treenails.

MASONRY.

Concrete Blocks—June 17 to June 24, 1895.—Foundation piles were cleaned off by divers and 4 standard concrete blocks were placed in position by derrick "City of New York." Ferry rack at Cortlandt street was cut away to allow derrick to enter slip.

Chain-holes—June 24, 1895.—Chain-holes were filled with concrete in oval bottom bags.

General Work.

MAINTENANCE OF YARD.

STREET CLEANING DEPT.

PUBLIC NOTICE. DEPARTMENT OF STREET CLEANING, No. 32 CHAMBERS STREET.

IT IS PROVIDED BY CHAPTER 893, OF THE Laws of 1895, that the Commissioner of Street Cleaning shall have "the power to frame regulations controlling the use of sidewalks and gutters by abutting owners or occupants, for the deposit of sweepings, refuse, or garbage," and that "such regulations when so framed shall be published in like manner as City Ordinances and shall be enforced by the Police Department of the City of New York, in the same way and to the same extent as such ordinances." Section 83 of the New York City Consolidation Act, as amended by chapter 233 of the Laws of 1895, prescribes and limits as follows the penalties for violation of City Ordinances: "All persons offending against any ordinance passed by the Common Council shall be deemed guilty of misdemeanor, and be punished, on conviction, by a fine, or in default of payment of such fine, by imprisonment, not exceeding ten days."

In pursuance of the aforesaid chapter 893 of the Laws of 1895, I have framed regulations for the use of the sidewalks by abutting owners or occupants for the deposit of sweepings, refuse, or garbage, and notice is hereby given that these regulations, which apply to the entire width of the sidewalks, from the gutter to the house or lot line, take effect forthwith, as follows:

1. Dust from the sidewalks may, each morning before the first sweeping of the roadway by the Department of Street Cleaning, be swept into the gutter, if there piled, but not otherwise, and at no other time.

2. No person shall throw, cast, or put any fruit or portion of fruit, or paper, or refuse, or rubbish of any sort upon the sidewalks, including the stoops and areas, of the City of New York at any time; except garbage in proper receptacles.

3. The garbage receptacle shall be set out within the stoop-line, not more than one-half hour before the time designated for the arrival of the garbage cart.
