The Budget is as follows:

No. 2605.

BUDGET FOR 1904.

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 226 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, by the unanimous vote of all of the members thereof, makes this the Budget of The City of New York for the year one thousand nine hundred and four, being, first, the amounts estimated to be required to pay the expenses of conducting the public business of said City for the said year, including State Taxes; and secondly, the amounts estimated to be required to pay the charges and expenses of the Counties of New York, Kings Queens and Richmond for the said year; amounting in the aggregate to the sum of one hundred and six million, six hundred and seventy-four thousand, nine hundred and fifty-five dollars and nine cents (\$106,674,955.09).

FOR CHARITABLE INSTITUTIONS.

All such appropriations being made subject to the following conditions:

1. The accounts of all charitable institutions receiving public moneys shall be so kept as to show the receipts of and disbursements from public money separately from the other funds of such institutions, and all institutions shall keep an exact record, to be corrected from time to time, in a form to be approved by the Comptroller, showing the addresses of the parents, guardians or nearest relatives of inmates, and other information designed to facilitate inquiry into their financial inability to provide for such inmates.
2. Moneys received from the City Treasury shall be used by such institutions only for recurring expenses of "care, support and maintenance."
3. All institutions receiving public moneys shall be at all reasonable times open to the visitation and inspection of duly authorized representatives of the Department of Public Charities and the Department of Finance.
4. Upon it appearing to the satisfaction of the Comptroller that it would be to the public interests to withhold payments to any charitable institution for which an appropriation has been made, he shall give written notice to such institution of his intention to apply to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for authority to so withhold such payments, and upon the determination of said Board that such payments should terminate, the right of any such institution to receive payment for services rendered thereafter shall thereupon cease.
5. Except where appropriations are made in bulk and not upon a per capita basis, no payment shall be made for inmates of private charitable institutions unless the same shall have been accepted by the proper Commissioner of the Department of Public Charities as a proper charge against the City, and, except in emergency cases, Commissioner of Charities shall not accept as proper charges against the City inmates capable of paying for their own support, or for whose care adequate provision can be made in public institutions. The City shall not become liable for any payment to a charitable institution in excess of the appropriation which may have been made to such institution, notwithstanding any per capita rates of payment that may have been fixed for the inmates thereof.
6. All institutions receiving money from the City are required to state specifically the amount so received, as from the City Treasury, in their printed annual reports.
7. "That no money be paid to any private charitable institution which pays any salary to or gives any consideration, financial or of any kind, for services to, or that has any business dealing with, or secures goods or merchandise, directly or indirectly, from any officer or trustee or member of its Board of Managers."

that they have held two conferences with his Honor the Mayor upon the subject. At the earlier conference, held last June, the Mayor was requested to ascertain from the various City Departments what were their views in regard to a suitable exhibit, how long it would take to prepare, and what the cost would be in each case. At the more recent meeting with the Mayor, held this month, the reports from the various Departments were laid before the Committee, and the matter was made the subject of careful discussion.

It is not easy to say in detail, even now, precisely what form such an exhibit should take. The New York State Commissioners have agreed to place a room in the New York State Building at the service of the City on certain days of the week and at specified hours, where stereopticon pictures, illustrating the City's life, may be regularly displayed. Such an exhibition, doubtless, would command widespread interest, and it can be made as extensive and illustrative as may be desired.

It seems, however, that certain at least of the great departments of the City should be represented at the Exposition in such a careful and thorough fashion as to be of value to students of municipal affairs from all parts of the world. The departments that appear to lend themselves best to such a purpose are the following:

It is evidently necessary, in order to perfect plans for a suitable exhibit, that a sufficient amount of money should be at command to promote the formation of definite plans and to start the preparation of suitable exhibits. It is also necessary that some competent person be secured to take charge of all the details connected with this matter, under the direction of the Mayor. Your committee therefore recommend the authorization of Special Revenue Bonds for this purpose, in the sum of ten thousand dollars, and that the Mayor be given authority to arrange with some one to take the matter in hand and to carry it forward to completion. A resolution should also be passed authorizing expenditures to be made under the authority of your committee, without public letting, in case of need.

MESSAGES FROM HIS HONOR THE MAYOR.

The President laid before the Board the following message from his Honor the Mayor:

No. 2660.

City of New York—Office of the Mayor.

The Honorable the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York:

It is my sorrowful duty to inform you officially of the death, on Friday, November 13, 1903, of the Hon. Andrew H. Green, formerly Comptroller of The City of New York. Neither his gray hairs, nor his eminent public services, nor his useful life, nor any human care availed to shield him from the fatal bullet. Words cannot express the sense of horror and of grief awakened by this pitiful tragedy. It becomes the city, however, to make such record as it can of its imperishable obligations to the great citizen whose death it is called upon to mourn.

No one can have read the outline of Mr. Green's public services, as it has appeared in the daily press, without being astonished both by the range and the fruitfulness of his activity. He was the man who did more than any other to secure for the City the beauties of Central Park, the unique development of the Riverside Drive and the Morningside Park, the Washington Bridge and other important features characteristic of the old City. And, as if this were not enough of achievement and of service, he also saved the City's credit in the days of financial crisis, and contributed importantly to the increase of its artistic and scientific and literary opportunities. These things illustrate the element of vision that entered into his achievements, so that it is easy to understand why he should have contributed so much to the creation of the greater city as to be popularly and affectionately called the "Father of Greater New York." It may truthfully be said that to no one man who has labored in and for the City during the last fifty years is the City under greater and more lasting obligations than to Andrew H. Green.

The City itself, in some of its most beautiful and most enduring features, is the monument of his love; and the City may well cherish his honored name with the undying gratitude that is due to a citizen who has made it both a greater and a better city than it was.

I have the honor to suggest that your Honorable Board appoint a committee, to serve in co-operation with the Mayor, in arranging for a memorial service to be held under the auspices of the City, at such time and place as may be acceptable to the members of Mr. Green's family.

Pre-eminent among all men in this vast metropolis was Andrew H. Green. His rugged, indomitable virility, maintained to a ripe old age; his unquenchable love of truth, honor and right for their own sake; his sturdy fortitude and unyielding patriotism stamped him as an American of the highest type. His affectionate solicitude and untiring and herculean efforts for the growth and development of The City of New York were equalled by those of no other man. The magnificent breathing spot of Central Park owes itself to his wise and far-reaching foresight. The park system of this City had its inception in his mighty intellect. He had the faculty in a supreme degree of seeing years ahead. His favorite project of a Greater New York he lived to see crystallized into an accomplished fact. His interest in the educational welfare of the children of this City was unrelaxing until his latest hour. Broad in his sympathies, unostentatious

in his charities, wise beyond his time and generation, Andrew H. Green commanded the respect, love and confidence of the leading men of this nation for fifty years. He gave his time gratuitously to New York City; his every thought was devoted to the amelioration, extension and progress of this municipal commonwealth. Hence it is fitting that New York City should appropriately lament his death and ever honor his memory; therefore be it

Resolved, That we, the members of the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, mindful of the irreparable loss to our citizens by the death of Hon. Andrew H. Green, herein and hereby record the solemn grief of a vast city at the sudden and tragic death of a beloved, useful and honored son. We deplore his departure, and, while realizing that he had won that highest of civic laurels—an abiding place in the hearts of the people—his loss will be mourned for many years to come; and be it further

Resolved, That a copy of these resolutions, suitably engrossed and duly authenticated by the City Clerk, be transmitted to the surviving members of his family; and be it further

Resolved, That, as a fitting mark of respect to the memory of Andrew H. Green, this Board do now adjourn.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.
