Dear Sir—I beg to submit herewith the third quarterly report of this Department for the three months ending September 30, 1902. In addition to the reports of the various offices and institutions, the following matters are of general interest:

Uniforms of Male Employees.

On August 20, 1902, a schedule of uniforms for male officers and employees of all institutions in the Department was adopted to take effect October 1, 1902. The officers and employees are divided into eight grades, for each of which a distinctive uniform is prescribed. Uniforms are provided by the Department at its own expense for employees receiving salaries not exceeding \$180 per annum and maintenance. These uniforms remain the property of the Department. Heads of Institutions are held responsible for the care of the uniforms, for requiring all employees to wear the uniform prescribed, and for seeing that all uniforms are kept in good condition. It is believed that the uniforms will materially assist in maintaining a proper standard of discipline by making it easier to detect any employee who is not doing his duty.

During the summer months nineteen excursions were given to the children and mothers and infants in the Randall's Island institutions. They were taken for a sail in one of the Department boats approximately ten miles up Long Island Sound and return. These trips had not only a beneficial effect upon the health of the inmates but contributed materially to the maintenance of good order and discipline.

Two separate rooms have been provided at the Municipal Lodging House for mothers and infants and for elderly women requiring special care. Heretofore there has been no accommodations for such persons except in a large open dormitory with all the other women lodgers. The individual rooms have been provided with more comfortable and attractive accommodations than are considered advisable for the ordinary lodgers.

By arrangement with the managers of the New York Catholic Protectory a band concert was provided every alternative Saturday afternoon during the months of July and August for the almshouse inmates on Blackwell's Island.

A thorough examination of all the farms and gardens under the control of this Department, including the County Poor farm in the Borough of Richmond, and also the dairy and herd kept on Randall's Island for the benefit of the Infants' Hospital, was made by Mr. George T. Powell, Director of the School of Agriculture and Practical Horticulture at Briarcliff, New York, in company with the Commissioner, on September 22, 1902. Mr. Powell made several valuable suggestions for improving both the quantity and quality of the milk produced on Randall's Island and also for utilizing more effectively the farms and gardens under the control of the Department. It is his opinion that the Richmond County Poor Farm, under proper cultivation, will produce all the vegetables required for a population of three thousand persons.

The number of applications for the commitment of children on account of the desertion or alleged desertion of the head of the family having increased to an alarming extent during the past few years, a plan has been instituted for dealing with this matter more effectively. It had been ascertained that in many cases the desertion was simply a prearranged plan between the husband and wife by which the husband would disappear from the neighborhood for a short time, only to return as soon as the children had safely been placed under the care of the City; in many instances the husband continued meanwhile to send money regularly to the wife and sometimes even visited the home regularly at unusual hours. A special list of families in which the husband was reported as having deserted was started in the Bureau of Dependent Children, and these families were visited from time to time at hours at which a visit would not naturally be expected, in the early evening or on Sundays or holidays. The result has been that in numerous instances the head of the family, who had been reported as having deserted and as having been absent for many weeks, was found by his own fireside, with every appearance of having been there regularly and of enjoying the additional luxuries made possible by escaping the burden of supporting his children. Out of seventy-one cases of desertion under observation during the quarter ending September 30, husbands have been found in twenty-two cases.

The annual distribution of money to the destitute adult blind was made in September. Last year the per capita amount was \$49.47 in Manhattan and the Bronx, \$41 in Brooklyn and Queens, and \$31.25 in Richmond. This year the uniform sum of \$50 per capita was given in all boroughs.

The increase of manufacture and distribution shown above is due to the fact that we are now regularly supplying the Kings County Hospitals in addition to those of Manhattan, The Bronx and Richmond.

The field of our Manufacturing Department has been so enlarged that at the present time we are manufacturing from the crude materials in our own laboratory about one-sixth of all of the pharmaceutical preparations which are supplied through the General Drug Department, with the result that we are enabled, in addition to reducing the cost, to supply articles of known strength and reliability.

The quality of supplies purchased has been carefully controlled, and the facilities of our Analytical Laboratory have been extended to and frequently been drawn on to decide upon the standard of general supplies outside of drugs.

A careful and intelligent control of the milk supply of the whole Department has been maintained by the Assistant Chemist, and during the course of his examination the milk has increased 4 to 8 per cent. in solids and about 20 per cent. in fat over the milk supplied previously.

The preparation of sterilized catgut has been continued as heretofore.

On the 30th of September there were 135 employees on the census of the New York City Training School, classified as follows:

1 Post-graduate and 7 Pupil Nurses at Fordham Hospital.

1 Post-graduate and 6 Pupil Nurses at Maternity Hospital.

4 Post-graduate and 38 Pupil Nurses at City Hospital.

1 Post-graduate at Fifty-first street House.

20 Probationers were scattered through City Hospital.

3 Hospital Helpers, paid, and 1 unpaid were stationed at Fifty-first street.

The remainder of help at Nurses' Home, B. I., in charge of Matron.

During the quarter there were nineteen vacations given to pupil nurses and three to head nurses; substitutes were furnished to Fordham and Harlem hospitals for supervisors' vacations. All the officers of the School had vacations due, also the help who were entitled to it.

It is gratifying to note that of the thirteen paid help on the Island, seven were entitled to vacations, showing that they had been on the roll at least nine months. Of the remaining six, three were appointed May 1 to fill places left vacant by illness and death. They are still here.

There were three resignations during the quarter of pupil nurses; one resigned after an attack of appendicitis, the other two for illness in own family.

Of the cases of illness there were few; minor illnesses covered twenty-two days in all, and two nurses fell ill with typhoid fever September 15 and 21 respectively.

There were received during the quarter twenty-three probationers, seven of whom were dropped as unsuitable. The rest are doing well. Fourteen of the seventeen probationers of the previous quarter have been appointed as Pupil Nurses, and two Pupil Nurses absent for illness have been restored to the roll.

In July and August the houses at Fifty-first street were put in good sanitary condition by the Department, and at the end of the month the remaining nurses were sent over to fill the house up. Thirty-three is now its capacity, leaving one room large enough for four beds as a general sitting room.

On September 1 the second floor of the male side of City Hospital was placed in charge of the female nurses, the male nurses having graduated or resigned, and a little earlier the male erysipelas floor was given up to the female nurses. The doctors have expressed themselves as much pleased with the improvement which has taken place.

The lessons were begun a month earlier this year on account of the size of the junior class. The work of teaching so many has been very heavy this quarter and will be still heavier before the year closes, but as our present system is arranged we can get through very nicely. There are at present six classes for the officers of the school, besides lectures on dietetics twice a week, lectures by visitings once a week and demonstrations of practical nursing of two hours twice a week. The teaching, reviewing and correcting and marking so many class books requires a great deal of time.

On September 22 the southwest corner of the frame annex was vacated to make room for the contractor, who wished to begin the work of the new south wing to be added to the Home.

The work has gone on smoothly in all Departments covered by the Training School. The wards at City Hospital have been much upset, owing to the painting and polishing of the floors on the female side and the installation of the new heating system, but nothing has been neglected, although necessarily the work could not all be accomplished with the same degree of speed and punctuality as when everything was in working order.

We are now well launched on our three years' course and so far it promises to be a success.

DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS AND FERRIES.

Transactions of the Department of Docks and Ferries for the Week ending Saturday, November 22, 1902.

The following communications were received and ordered on file, action being taken thereon as stated, to wit:

From the Mayor's Office—
First—Transmitting communication from the Assistant Secretary of War relative to the application of the Astoria Light, Heat and Power Company for extension of pierhead and bulkhead lines at Berrian's Island and Lawrence Point, East river, and requesting the views of this Department in relation thereto. Request the Secretary of War to transmit copy of application.

Second—Transmitting complaint of Jacob Miller as to the operation of ferry from Broadway, Borough of Brooklyn, to the foot of East Twenty-third street, Borough of Manhattan. Request Mr. Miller to call.

From the Comptroller—
First—Requesting information relative to the voucher in favor of James Cummings for sprinkling. Secretary to furnish.

Second—Stating that the sum of \$1,006,325 was deposited in the City Treasury to the credit of the Dock Fund on November 17, 1902; that the sum of \$368,872 was deposited November 15, 1902, and that the sum of \$85,271.13 was deposited on November 13, 1902.

Third—In relation to the establishment of ferries by the Hoboken Ferry Company and the Delaware, Lackawanna and Western Railroad Company in the vicinity of West Twenty-third street.

Fourth—Stating that his certificate has been attached to Contracts Nos. 754 and 757.

Fifth—Approving sureties on Contract No. 749.

Sixth—Requesting information relative to the claim filed by Edward E. McCarney for salary as Superintendent of Repairs.

From the Corporation Counsel—
First—Stating that the power to approve boats of the Staten Island Ferry Company as to capacity, safety and comfort is given to the present Mayor and Comptroller, and in case of breach of contract the City might apply for relief either by forfeiture of lease or by recovery of damages.

Second—Stating that the judgment in the action brought by Brown & Fleming restraining the City from removing the dump at Pier, old 12, East river, has been appealed.

Third—Transmitting bill of costs in favor of J. L. Stagg and William H. Harris. Auditor directed to draw requisition.

Fourth—Stating that he has been informed that the District-Attorney has taken the necessary action in regard to the claim against Benjamin T. Rhoads, Jr., & Co. Notified that the matter has been settled.

Fifth—In reference to the erection of dump on Pier, old 53, East river. Secretary directed to state that the intention to erect a dump on the pier in question has been abandoned.

Sixth—Stating that the injunction restraining the City from removing buildings at Willow lane, Pelham Bay, has been vacated. Engineer-in-Chief directed to remove the structures.

Seventh—Approving form of lease to the Consolidated Gas Company of the northerly half of Pier foot of East Twenty-first street.

Eighth—Transmitting bill of costs in condemnation proceedings between Little West Twelfth and Thirteenth streets. Chief Clerk to draw requisition.

Ninth—In relation to the proposition of W. J. Pollock for the improvement of property between Bloomfield and West Eighteenth streets. Said proposition ordered to be submitted to the Mayor.

Tenth—Advising that the Metropolitan Steamship Company cannot enjoin the City from building the new pier north of Pier, old 11, North river.

Eleventh—Approving form of order terminating the interest in the lease of Pier foot of West Seventy-ninth street of the New York Contracting and Trucking Company.

Twelfth—In relation to the construction of a new pier foot of West Forty-first street.

Thirteenth—Approving printer's proof of Contract No. 759 for paving with asphalt between Eighteenth and Twenty-first streets, East river, and with granite between Piers, old 20 and new, 16, East river.

From the Municipal Civil Service Commission—

First—In relation to promotion of employees and requesting a statement of their duties; also, advisability as to the wearing of service stripes. Secretary directed to furnish the information.

Second—Submitting list of persons eligible for appointment to the position of Topographical Draughtsman with an annual compensation of \$1,500. Requested an additional list of persons, eligible for appointment, at \$1,200.

From the Staten Island Rapid Transit Railroad Company, stating that the Rapid Congress approving channel between Staten Island and New Jersey. Requested them to advise this Department as to their wishes in the matter.

From the Staten Island Chamber of Commerce, in reference to the act of Transit Ferry Company is the same company as the New York Harbor and Staten Island Ferry Company, the company merely having changed its name.

From Alfred T. White, declining appointment as Appraiser in connection with Staten Island ferry matters.

From George Brown & Co., notice of application for grant of land under water westerly of Stevens street, Astoria.

From S. F. Rawson, in reference to establishment of ferry to Staten Island.

From the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, transmitting application of David Seigner for lease of premises between Sixtieth and Sixty-first streets, East river. Notified Seigner that the application has already been denied.

From A. E. Outerbridge & Co., requesting a reduction in rental of platform at approach to Pier, new 47, North river. Application denied.

From James McLaughlin, in relation to berthing of boats at bulkhead south of Seventy-ninth street, North river. Notified him that he will have the same rights as owners at the bulkhead in question.

From Hugh Lewis Fox, transmitting consent of sureties to extension of Contract No. 726.

From the Erie Railroad Company, accepting permit for berth for float at bulkhead between Twenty-first and Twenty-second streets, North river.

From Emil Calman & Co., requesting use of public dock at West avenue, Long Island City. Notified him to apply to the Dockmaster.

From the War Department, stating that no harbor lines have been established at Eastchester creek, from Lockwood to Pelham Bridge. Requested War Department to establish bulkhead and pierhead lines at once.

From T. A. S. Sheridan, requesting dredging at bulkhead south of West Ninety-seventh street. Ordered.

From Lone Star Boat Club, requesting permission to erect three-story boat house at One Hundred and Fifty-third street, Harlem river. Application denied.

From Harlem Transfer Company, requesting that the rental for bulkhead foot of Railroad avenue, Harlem river, commence July 1, 1902. So ordered.

From the Police Department, in relation to the arrest of James Oakley, Dockbuilder, for selling lumber at Wallabout basin. Requested the District Attorney to take action in the matter.

From the Central Railroad Company of New Jersey, in relation to the rental of Pier, old 12, North river. Notified them that the rental will cease from the day the property is turned over to the City.

From Frank Scherer, Jr., requesting permission to use and occupy bulkhead foot of Charles street, North river. Notified that the permit will be put up at auction.

From James Elwell & Co., requesting a lease of a pier on the North river. Notified that this Department is prepared to recommend to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund that a lease be granted them of the Pier foot of East Nineteenth street, at a rental of \$15,000 per annum, for steamship purposes, or the Pier foot of West Forty-eighth street, at an annual rental of \$12,500 either of above piers to be taken as it now stands.

From Fort George Coal and Lumber Company, requesting a lease of bulkhead at Sherman's creek. Notified that the Commissioner has agreed to lease, assign and to farm let unto said company 350 feet of bulkhead, 80 feet in width with a return of 80 feet at the outer end of Sherman's creek, Harlem river, for a term of ten years with the privilege of a renewal for a further term of ten years, the lessee to have the privilege of erecting hoisting and other apparatus for the handling of coal and lumber and shed for the protection of same, rental for the first term to be at the rate of \$800 per annum and for the second term to be fixed by appraisal, but to be not less than \$1,000 per annum, provided said company files in the Department within 30 days from receipt of this notification its written agreement to accept the terms of said lease and agrees to execute a lease, a copy of which might be examined at the office of the Secretary, Pier "A," Battery place; it being understood and agreed that this agreement shall be of no force or effect unless the terms thereof are approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

From O. B. Gould, attorney for Clark & Allen, stating that if the new pier foot of East Thirty-second street is built on the lines of the present pier, it will encroach on the lines of his clients. Notified that the pier will be confined strictly to the street lines.

From Bush Terminal Company, complaining of inadequate ferry facilities at South Brooklyn. Requested to have a representative call.

From Alexander S. Bacon, attorney for W. J. Pollock, stating that the Insurance Company is about to reconstruct buildings on three lots at Nos. 504, 506 and 508 West Fourteenth street, and suggesting that the City seize the property in order to avoid the necessity of paying for the buildings to be erected.

From William Ulmer, submitting affidavit of ownership of property at Gravesend Beach. Referred to the Corporation Counsel.

From the Southern Pacific Company, giving notice of its desire to renew lease of Pier 37, North river, and the half bulkheads adjoining; also renewal of lease of Pier, new 38, North river, with half bulkheads adjoining.

From Union Stockyard and Market Company, requesting the execution of lease of Pier foot of West Fortieth street. New lease ordered prepared with a clause providing that the dredging shall be done by the lessees.

From the American Ice Company, accepting terms of permit for use of bulkhead between Nineteenth and Twenty-first streets, North river, and for the use of 150 feet of bulkhead north of Bloomfield Street Pier, North river.

From James Douglas, notice of application for grant of land under water between Spuyten Duyvil creek and River avenue, North river. Referred to Corporation Counsel.

From F. H. Field, attorney for Wholesale Fish Exchange, requesting a hearing in the matter of the application for a lease of Pier and bulkheads north of Fulton street, North river.

From Gifford, Stearns & Hobbs, transmitting plans showing location desired for Pier, new 28, East river. Prepare offer to be submitted to them.

From New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company, reporting that repairs are required in front of Pier, new 25, East river. Said company directed to notify the President of the Borough.

From Eureka Cement Company, requesting permission to withdraw cement from Department Yard at West Fifty-seventh street. Application denied.

From Henry Bergh, protesting against the placing of dump at bulkhead east of Pier 52, East river. Filed.

From the Seaboard Contracting Company, stating that the work of rebuilding Pier foot of West Fifty-sixth street will be commenced November 15, 1902. Filed.

From Leon Edward Muller, requesting dredging in front of bulkhead south of Pier, old 42, North river. Ordered.

From J. Charles Hankinson, contractors for Hudson Improvement Company, requesting that action be taken in the matter of repairing the asphalt pavement at the foot of Morton street, North river. Permission granted to arrange with the asphalt company which laid the surrounding pavement to repair the asphalt pavement taken up by them.

From the Ocean and Bay Front Improvement Company, stating that if permit is granted them for rebuilding of Pier foot of Gaston avenue, Jamaica bay, Borough of Queens, said company will agree that nothing contained in the permit shall be construed to waive any rights the City may have in and to the premises and to the pier and land under water covered thereby. Company notified that permit would be granted upon their filing the agreement referred to.

From the Department of Street Cleaning, requesting three days' notice before any work is done toward removing the dumping board foot of East Eightieth street, East river, for the purpose of removing boulders under the dumping board. Engineer-in-Chief directed to dredge 150 cubic yards of material over the area complained of, and to give the Street Cleaning Department three days' notice before beginning work.

From the Engineer-in-Chief.

First—Submitting specifications and form of contract for furnishing about 10,000 barrels of Portland cement. Specifications and form of contract approved, subject to the approval of the Corporation Counsel, and Secretary directed to have a sufficient number of blank forms of proposal printed and the necessary advertisements inviting estimates published in the newspapers designated by law.

Second—Reporting the commencement of work under Contract No. 752, and the completion of Contracts Nos. 721 and 737, 742 and 726, Class II.

The sureties on Contracts Nos. 755 and 756 were approved.
The substitution of sureties on Contract No. 753 was approved.

An extension of time on Class III. of Contract No. 726, for furnishing supplies, was granted to Hugh L. Fox.

The Engineer-in-Chief returned Commissioner's Orders Nos. 468 and 708, and Secretary's Order No. 21205.

The names of James Quinn, Flagger, deceased, and John P. Monaghan, Laborer, deceased, were taken from the list of employees.

The resignation of Solomon Thomas, Laborer, was accepted.

The application of Patrick Griffin for change of title from Laborer to Watchman was filed.

All employees were directed to notify the Secretary of change of address within twenty-four hours after such change.

The material dumped on bulkhead at the southerly side of the Wallabout basin was ordered removed.

An order was issued to the Bridle Iron Works to remove structure within the lines of One Hundred and Thirty-second street, Harlem river, within ten days, and in default thereof work would be done by the force of the Department.

The Engineer-in-Chief reported that Joseph Stern & Sons placed pipe at the foot of West Fortieth street on October 17, 1902.

The attention of the American Malting Company was called to the fact that the ice-bridge on the bulkhead between East Sixty-third and Sixty-fourth streets, East river, had not been removed.

William Ulmer was directed to cease work of filling in between Bay Fortieth and Bay Forty-first streets, Gravesend bay, until a permit was obtained.

The Engineer-in-Chief was directed to remove the remains of the southerly Pier and replace Dockmaster's office on solid land at rear of bulkhead foot of East Eighty-sixth street, and report cost of same for collection from the Maine Steamship Company.

Repairs were ordered to bulkhead between Sixtieth and Sixty-first streets, East river; bulkhead foot Lincoln avenue, Harlem river, and dredging to a depth of 15 feet under Contract No. 754 in front of bulkhead between Ninety-sixth and Ninety-seventh streets, North river.

The Engineer-in-Chief was directed to plot out spaces for the sale of Christmas trees along the marginal street between Vesey and Canal streets, North river.

Catskill and New York Steamboat Company, to berth steamer "Kaaterskill" at Recreation Pier, foot of West Fiftieth street, at the rate of \$4 per day.

Robert Thedford, to occupy a berth, with coal hoist, on the northerly side of Pier foot of West Fifty-fourth street, North river, at the rate of \$50 per month.

American Ice Company, to use and occupy property now occupied by the said company south of Twentieth street, North river, at \$25 per month, the occupants to hold the City harmless for any accident occasioned by the negligence of said company or its employees.

The Engineer-in-Chief was directed to prepare specifications and form of contract for furnishing and delivering about 1,000 tons of soft coal.

The change of lines of Pier, new 10, North river, were approved by the Commissioner and ordered to be transmitted to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for their approval, with technical description thereof, as follows:

"The new location of Pier No. 10, North river, as changed from the location determined by the Board of Docks December 7, 1900, and adopted by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund December 27, 1900, is such that the northerly line of the new Pier will be parallel with and distant 142 feet southerly from the southerly line of Pier No. 11 as determined by the Board of Docks December 7, 1900, and adopted by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund December 27, 1900. The new Pier will be 80 feet wide and will extend from the bulkhead line established in 1871 to the Pierhead line as modified by the Secretary of War in 1897, with a length of 759.91 feet on the northerly side and a length of 749.70 feet on the southerly side, all as shown on the map submitted herewith in duplicate."

The Engineer-in-Chief submitted blue print showing property necessary to be acquired for ferry purposes at St. George, S. I.

The Engineer-in-Chief reported that the following work had been done by the force of the Department under Commissioner's Orders:

DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS AND FERRIES.

Transactions of the Department of Docks and Ferries for the Week Ending Saturday, November 29, 1902.

The following communications were received and ordered on file, action being taken thereon as stated, to wit:

From the Comptroller—

First—In relation to the voucher in favor of James Cummings for sprinkling between Cortlandt and West Thirtieth streets, North river. Secretary directed to advise that the Treasurer's Order for sprinkling issued to Cummings has been pronounced legal by Corporation Counsel.

Second—Stating that the sum of \$22 was deposited in the City Treasury to the credit of the Dock Fund on November 24, 1902, and that the sum of \$106,570 was deposited on November 18, 1902.

Third—Suggesting that telephones installed in the residences of Department officials be contracted for at message rates.

Fourth—Requesting information relative to the protest of James A. Deering, attorney for the Forty-second Street and Grand Street Ferry and Railroad Company, against the leasing of bulkhead north of Forty-second street, North river. Secretary directed to transmit copy of Department letter to James A. Deering.

From the Corporation Counsel—

First—Approving terms, conditions and form of advertisement for the sale of old material.

Second—Approving agreement to be executed by the Bradish Johnson Estate and the D. Grieme Coal Company in connection with the proposed construction of coal handling structure at Forty-eighth street, North river.

Third—Advising that the decision of Justice Steckler in the action concerning the property between Forty-second and Forty-third streets and at the foot of Forty-third street, North river, vacates the injunction restraining the Department from completing the bulkhead wall.

Fourth—Approving form of contract No. 759.

Fifth—Requesting map of property occupied by the Terry and Tench Construction Company south of One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street, Harlem river. Engineer-in-Chief directed to furnish.

From the Municipal Civil Service Commission—

MUNICIPAL EXPLOSIVES COMMISSION.

Proceedings of Municipal Explosives Commission at meeting held on Tuesday, August 5, 1902.

There were present Fire Commissioner Thomas Sturgis, presiding, and Commissioners Charlton and McKenna.

Minutes of meeting held July 11 read and approved.

Communication was read from the Secretary of the Treasury, Washington, D. C., respecting regulations governing transportation and storage of explosives on vessels in the harbor. Ordered that a copy of same be prepared for Commissioner Haskell.

Communications were read from Commissioners Eaton and McKenna relative to reports being prepared by them in connection with the work of this Commission, and same were ordered on file.

Commissioner Haskell presented a resolution, which was seconded and adopted, that correspondence be had with the authorities in the principal cities of this country and abroad with a view of ascertaining what regulations were in force in said cities bearing on the subjects which are under consideration by this Commission.

Report was read from Chief of Battalion Joseph B. Martin, of the Fire Department, on the subject of fixed ammunition, and upon motion, duly seconded, the Secretary was directed to prepare a copy for Commissioner Charlton for further consideration and report.

Communication read from Silas W. Driggs, bonded and free warehouses, requesting to be heard on the question of the storage of imported firecrackers. Secretary directed to advise that request will be granted.

The following communications were also read:

From Pain Fireworks Company, requesting to be heard on matters affecting their interests. Secretary directed to reply that a hearing will be given.

From Charles H. Graham, Engineer in charge of Bureau of Sewers, Borough of The Bronx, requesting copy of regulations governing use, etc., of explosives for blasting. Secretary to reply.

From Inspector of Combustibles, respecting conditions under which certain explosives and combustible chemicals are kept in premises No. 60 Fulton street and No. 784 Washington street. Referred to Commissioner McKenna for report.

From Longmans, Green & Co., the Oxford University Press, Bangs & Co. and J. A. Hill & Co., occupants of premises Nos. 91 and 93 Fifth avenue, protesting against the storage of automobiles charged with gasoline and naphtha on the ground floor of said premises. Also, communication from Paul Walton, attorney for International Motor Car Company, No. 91 Fifth avenue, and from the Inspector of Combustibles on the same subject. Upon motion, duly seconded, consideration of the matter was laid over until the next meeting of the Commission.

Commissioners Charlton and Haskell reported that they were prepared to submit reports on the subject of explosives referred to them respectively. Consideration of same was laid over for subsequent meeting.

Upon motion, duly seconded, the Commission adjourned subject to the call of the Chair.

Present—Fire Commissioner Thomas Sturgis, presiding, and Commissioners Charlton and Eaton.

Minutes of meeting held August 5, 1902, read and approved.

Commissioner Sturgis reported having received four copies of pamphlet "Large Explosions and their Radii of Danger" for use of the Commission.

Communications read from Commissioners Haskell and McKenna advising of their inability to attend meeting.

Commissioner Eaton presented a request from Commissioner McKenna that he would like to be accompanied by some of the other members of the Commission in an inspection he was about to make of certain premises where drugs and chemicals were stored. Commissioner Charlton volunteered to accompany Commissioner McKenna.

Communication received from Commissioner McKenna respecting modification of permit for the storage of certain chemicals in premises No. 60 Fulton street and No. 784 Washington street. After discussion Commissioner Charlton offered a motion that the previous recommendation of this Commission of June 30, together with the report of the Inspector of Combustibles dated July 18 on this subject, be combined, and shall constitute the conditions under which certain drugs and chemicals can be stored in the above-named premises.

Communication was read from Prof. Charles F. Chandler requesting to be heard on the subject of regulations governing the manufacture, storage and sale of nitrates of cellulose. Secretary directed to reply, and also to communicate with Mr. J. E. H. Hyde, No. 120 Broadway, on the subject.

The Commission took up for consideration the matter of storage of automobiles containing gasoline and naphtha on first floor of premises Nos. 91 and 93 Fifth avenue. Report was read from Commissioner Charlton of the result of a personal inspection of said premises and also other communications on the subject. After discussion Commissioner Eaton offered a motion, which was seconded and carried, that the recommendations in the report submitted by Commissioner Charlton be and are hereby adopted as the sense of this Commission, and that they be communicated, by the Fire Commissioner, to the Inspector of Combustibles with directions to issue a permit revocable at the option of this Department and upon the conditions stated in said report.

Communication was read from the Acting Chief Clerk of the War Department, Washington D. C., transmitting copies of report of Board of Engineers of the United States Army relative to the storage of explosives in New York harbor, which was ordered on file.

Upon motion, duly seconded, the Commission adjourned until Monday, September 8, at 12 o'clock noon.

The storage of carbonic acid gas in tanks and the transporting of same through the streets of the city was considered, and on motion of Commissioner Charlton, duly seconded, the matter was referred to Commissioner McKenna for report.

Commissioner Eaton offered a resolution that the conditions under which automobiles may be stored in premises Nos. 91 and 93 Fifth avenue by the International Motor Company be amended by striking out the paragraph providing that the concrete floor be connected with sewer, and substituting therefor the following: That a sufficient quantity of sand be spread over the concrete floor for the purpose of absorbing drippings from the machines, said sand to be taken up and replaced with clean sand at frequent intervals.

Which was duly seconded and carried.

The Commission discussed the manner in which the reports of its several committees, covering the regulations to be adopted, should be presented for the action of the Commission, and it was decided that the report from each committee should be presented complete in itself, covering all details in treating of the respective subjects.

Minutes of meeting held September 23 were read and approved.

Dr. F. G. Bonnell, of No. 100 Beekman street, appeared before the Commission in regard to the proposed regulations for the handling and storage of nitrates of cellulose, said products being used by him in the manufacture of vaccination shields, and stated that he could see nothing objectionable in the regulations as tentatively adopted.

Commissioner Charlton presented a report on the storage and sale of matches in The City of New York, which was ordered on file, to be taken up for consideration when that subject shall have been reached by the Commission.

Commissioner Haskell presented the following resolution:

Resolved, That section 55 of the regulations now in effect governing the manufacture, storage, sale and use of combustibles and dangerous materials within the corporate limits of The City of New York be amended to read as follows: No license will be issued which will permit, after January 1, 1903, the keeping, storing or having of parlor matches or matches that have a chlorate mixture for the igniting material and will readily ignite on any but a specially prepared surface, except to manufacturers, their agents and wholesalers for shipping outside of the City. An annual fee of twenty dollars will be charged for such license.

Which was seconded by Commissioner Eaton, and carried.

Moved by Commissioner Charlton, that this Commission now take up the consideration of proposed rules and regulations for the transportation, storage, use, etc., of high explosives, as embodied in report of Committee, and presented, at meeting held September 23.

Which was seconded by Commissioner Haskell and carried.

The Commission thereupon proceeded with the consideration of said report, by paragraphs, to and including Article V.

Upon motion duly seconded, the Commission adjourned until Friday, September 26, at 11.30 a. m.

On motion duly seconded, the reading of minutes of meeting of September 24 was dispensed with.

The Commission proceeded with the further consideration of proposed rules and regulations governing the transportation, storage, use, etc., of high explosives, and the provisions of Article VI. were discussed. Further consideration of the report was deferred in order to grant the public hearing on the subject of regulations for the handling and storage of nitrates of cellulose, as previously arranged for, there being a number of gentlemen present who desired to be heard.

Commissioner Sturgis announced that the Commission was ready to hear the views of the gentlemen present. The Commission was addressed by Marshall C. Lefferts, J. E. Hindon Hyde, Professor Munroe, of the Columbian University, Washington, D. C.; Professor Chandler; E. N. Crane, Vice-President of the Arlington Company; Mr. Hafley, of W. C. Horn Bros. & Co., and a representative of the Fiberloid Company. A general discussion of the subject followed, and no other persons being present who desired to be heard the hearing was closed.

Upon motion duly seconded, the Commission adjourned subject to the call of the Chair.

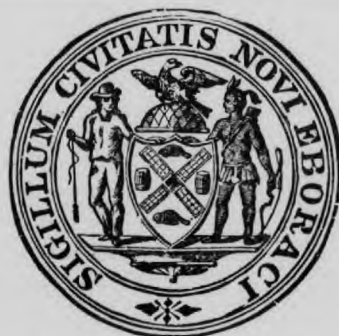

Second—That the abstract of our said estimate of assessment for benefit, together with our benefit maps, and also all the affidavits, estimates, proofs and other documents used by us in making our report, have been deposited in the Bureau of Street Openings in the Law Department of The City of New York, Nos. 90 and 92 West Broadway, in the Borough of Manhattan, in said City, there to remain until the 31st day of January, 1903.

Third—That pursuant to provisions of chapter 613 of the Laws of 1896, we have assessed to the extent of 50% only of the total awards, costs and expense of the acquisition of any land, property, rights, rents, easements and privileges, not the property of The Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of The City of New York, required for the widening and improvement of said street, upon each and every parcel of land in the Twenty-third Ward, Borough of The Bronx, of the said City, to an amount in each case which we have deemed said parcel or parcels of land benefited by said widening and improvement.

Fourth—That our last partial and separate report herein will be presented for confirmation to the Supreme Court of the State of New York, First Department, at a Special Term thereof, Part III., to be held in the County Court-house, in the Borough of Manhattan, in The City of New York, on the 10th day of May, 1903, at the opening of the Court on that day.

NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department, and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below. No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contracts must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application thereto at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
