Dear Sir—This is an application to expend, without public letting, the sum of \$50,000 for the pumping of water along the line of the infiltration gallery being constructed between Amityville and Seaford, L. I. There will be pumped into the City conduit, from one to ten million gallons of water, as required.

The present condition of the water supply in the Borough of Brooklyn is very satisfactory. The water in the reservoirs is higher than for some time past, and it is my earnest desire to keep the same in its present condition. To do this, I deem it necessary to take advantage of this supply which can be secured at the above location, and which otherwise would go to waste.

With the approval of this application, I shall be able to obtain this additional supply of water at once.

Dear Sir—In order that this Department may operate and maintain the pumping stations and plant of the Crystal Water Company in the Borough of Richmond, which has recently been acquired by the City, it will be necessary to issue Special Revenue Bonds, as provided by section 188 of the Amended Greater New York Charter, to the amount of \$28,262.

This money will be required for the payment of salaries of Enginemen, Stokers, Oilers and Machinists, for the purchase of coal and supplies, and for repairs to engines, boilers, etc. The items of the estimate are as follows:

The appropriation allowed for the operation and maintenance of the Department's pumping station at Tottenville, with the present force of help employed and the amount of work required to maintain a steady and normal pressure of water for twenty-four hours, will show a deficit of \$1,000 to December 31, 1906. This additional sum of money should be appropriated by an issue of bonds, so that needed repairs to the engines may be made and the requisite supplies purchased.

In the Borough of Queens, I find that the salary appropriations made for pumping stations and the expenditures chargeable to the same, will be deficient in the sum of \$12,073.30. This is due to the insufficient appropriation allowed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and particularly to a provision of law which the City has recognized, whereby the salaries paid to several classes of mechanics have been increased to the prevailing rate of wages.

In this Department (Borough of Queens) the Stokers and Oilers ought to receive \$3 per day, instead of the annual rate of \$912 for Oilers and \$840 for Stokers. Their labors are identical with those performed by the employees under the same classification in the Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Brooklyn, who are at present receiving the increased rate of \$3 per day.

Pumping Station known as No. 2, which was destroyed by an explosion some years ago, has been reconstructed. To provide for its operation and maintenance, the Department will require money for the payment of wages and the purchase of coal and supplies, which is included in the above estimate.

To complete the reorganization of the Repair Force of the Department, having in charge the maintenance of mains and hydrants, I have concluded to appoint three additional gangs and will require, for the payment of salaries of men to be employed, for the remainder of the year the sum of \$12,500, as follows:

- 1 Foreman, at \$5 per day.
- 1 horse and wagon, at \$2.25 per day.
- 2 horses and carts, at \$3.50 per day.
- 4 Caulkers, at \$3.50 per day.
- 14 Laborers, at \$2 per day.

This money also should be obtained by an issue of Special Revenue Bonds.

First—The Inspectors of Election, either through carelessness or a lack of knowledge, did not properly fill out the official statement of canvass, evidently not comprehending the exact meaning of each question to be answered therein, and in many cases put other ballots than void, wholly blank and protested ballots in the envelope and failed to indorse them in the manner prescribed by law.

Second—The Poll Clerks failed to fill out the Poll Clerks' returns in the manner prescribed by law, either through carelessness or a lack of proper supervision by the Inspectors.

Third—The Ballot Clerks did not use proper care in completing the result of the ballots cast; and

Whereas, Such carelessness or lack of knowledge on the part of election officers at the past election necessitated the Board of County Canvassers summoning before them nearly 200 Boards of Election Inspectors to correct palpable clerical errors, which could have been avoided if proper instruction had been given them; and

Whereas, The giving to each Board of Election Inspectors a copy of the Election Law for their information and guidance has proven to be not sufficient, as they did not fully understand the meaning of the questions to be answered on the official blanks, upon which the result of the votes cast is declared.

Resolved, The Board of Aldermen, believing the citizens of this City are entitled to know the exact result of an election as early as possible, do most earnestly and respectfully request the Board of Elections of The City of New York to summons the Boards of Election Officers before them and give them full instructions in the manner of properly completing the official statement of canvass, the Poll Clerks' returns and the Ballot Clerks' statement, in accordance with the law, to the end that they will be able to make a complete and accurate statement of the votes cast at the approaching election, from which a rapid and correct tabulation can be made by the Boards of County Canvassers.

Resolved, That the Board of Aldermen respectfully recommends to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, that in the preparation of the Budget for 1907, instead of following the usual course of making general and unitemized allowances to the general accounts of the various Departments, that the Budget do allow specific appropriations, indicating which estimates are granted and which are denied, in the case of every item in every account as they appear in the Departmental Estimate, and that the expenditure of each allowance be confined to the purposes as so indicated, and to provide as far as possible, that no transfers be made, even for different items in the same account, without the authorization of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

Sec. 2. Each and every railroad company which shall neglect or refuse to comply with the provisions of section one of this ordinance shall thereby incur a penalty of one hundred dollars (\$100) for each such neglect or refusal, to be recoverable against

the company so offending in an action to be brought by the Corporation Counsel in the name of The City of New York.

Sec. 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

"Mr. J. Waldo Smith, Chief Engineer, Board of Water Supply:

"Dear Sir—You have submitted to us a report, dated August 27, 1906, relating to the investigations which have been made for the main dam of the Ashokan Reservoir at the Olive Bridge and the Tongore sties, and have given in this report your reasons for preferring the Olive Bridge location. In addition to carefully considering your report, we have examined personally upon the ground the two sites together with the slight modifications which may be made in the location of the dam at either; have studied the results of the very full surveys, borings and geological investigations which have been made during the past twelve months, and have received and compared the estimates of cost for several types of dams at each of the sites, and report as follows:

"The preliminary studies soon made it plain that there were only these two general locations at which the main dam could be built, one near Olive Bridge and the other at the Tongore site, about two miles farther downstream. We are satisfied that the surveys, borings and other studies have now been carried to a point which warrants the final choice of locations. From the studies made we are satisfied beyond a doubt that, while it is practicable to construct a safe dam at either site, the Olive Bridge site is decidedly preferable for the reasons set forth by you, principal among which are the following:

"1. The Olive Bridge site makes feasible, at small additional cost, the subdivision of the great reservoir into two separate basins of about equal size, so that water can be drawn from either in case of any noteworthy temporary difference in quality.

"2. The dam at the Olive Bridge site can be built up to a height sufficient for turning water into the aqueduct about two years earlier, by reason of the greater height of bedrock and smaller quantity of masonry required below the necessary level of the head of the aqueduct.

"3. The cost of the completed works for storing and delivering the water from the Ashokan Reservoir will be smaller with the main dam built at Olive Bridge, the quantity of water stored being in each case the same.

"4. The Olive Bridge site permits a dam of decidedly smaller total height above bedrock, and while we believe a dam at the Tongore site to be entirely feasible, the fact remains that the height above the natural bed of the stream would be greater than that of any similar dam as yet constructed.

"We therefore concur in your recommendations that further borings and explorations at the Tongore site be discontinued and that work be concentrated at the Olive Bridge site, in order to determine as soon as may be which of the several possible locations at this site is most advantageous.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
