ways or other public places in The City of New York is a public nuisance dangerous to life and detrimental to health by reason of many persons being bitten by dogs and the prevalence of rabies, the said Board hereby enters in its records the same as a nuisance and hereby orders the abatement thereof; and all persons are hereby forbidden to allow dogs owned, harbored, possessed or controlled by them to be or run loose and at large in the streets, avenues, highways or other public places in The City of New York; and no dog shall be allowed to run loose and at large as aforesaid in any of the places aforesaid unless muzzled in such a manner as to protect persons from being bitten, or unless held by a leash or chain not more than four feet in length; and it is further hereby

Resolved, That any and all dogs loose and at large in any of the public streets, avenues, highways or other public places in The City of New York, unless muzzled or held as aforesaid, shall be destroyed by Inspectors or other duly authorized agents and officers of the Department designated and as directed by the Sanitary Superintendent; further be it

Resolved, That this order and regulation be and the same shall remain in force and effect until the 31st day of October, 1908, and that public notice of the requirements hereof and of this order be printed in the City Record and posted and kept posted in each of the offices of the Department of Health for two days in succession beginning June 22, 1908.
