To the People of The City of New York:

Pursuant to the request of the Honorable the Board of Aldermen, as expressed in a resolution offered by the Hon. Reginald S. Doull, I hereby direct that none but patriotic airs be played by the bands of music in the public parks and on the public piers on July 4.

I further direct all heads of Departments of the City Government to display the national ensign on their respective buildings from sunrise to sunset of that day.

And I urge, as the most appropriate manner of celebrating the anniversary of the Declaration of Independence, that every citizen of New York display the national colors at his residence and his place of business.

To which I have set my hand and affixed my seal of office this 25th day of June, nineteen hundred and eight.

Whereas, The Springfield, L. I., Cemetery Society has applied to the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York for its consent to take by deed and set apart for cemetery purposes certain lands or grounds in the County of Queens, Borough of Queens, City of New York:

Beginning at the easterly side of the Springfield road and the northerly line of the cemetery of the Springfield Cemetery Association and running north along said road about 791.86 feet to lands of Van Nostrand; thence along said lands and almost in a straight line about 3,916.21 feet; thence south almost at right angles about 1,139.65 feet; thence west and nearly at right angles to the Springfield road about 1,144.85 feet; thence again south and almost parallel with Springfield road about 360.20 feet; thence west almost at right angles to said road about 2,113.33 feet; thence again south and almost parallel with said road about 58.52 feet; thence again west almost at right angles to said road about 544.83 feet to said road, and thence along the easterly side of said road northerly about 306.10 feet to said Springfield Cemetery; thence along the southerly line of said cemetery about 497.72 feet; thence north along the said cemetery about 143.97 feet; thence again east along said cemetery about 508.78 feet; thence north along said cemetery about 187.93 feet; and thence west along said cemetery about 906.50 feet to the place of beginning; and

Whereas, Notice of application for such consent has been published according to law;

Resolved, That the consent of the Board of Aldermen be and the same hereby is given and granted to the Springfield, L. I., Cemetery Society, its successors or assigns to take by deed, devise or otherwise, and set apart for cemetery purposes, so much of the above described lands or grounds in the County of Queens, Borough of Queens, City of New York, and State of New York, particularly designated as follows:

Beginning at a point on the easterly side of the Springfield road, formed by the intersection of the said line or side of the said road with the southerly boundary line

of the Springfield Cemetery, and shown by a tack in the post of the fence separating the said properties; running thence south 56 degrees 35 minutes 30 seconds east 497.72 feet to a tack in said fence; thence north 35 degrees 6 minutes 30 seconds east 143.97 feet to a tack in said fence; thence south 57 degrees 53 minutes 30 seconds east 438.77 feet to a stake; thence north 34 degrees 59 minutes east 187.93 feet; thence westerly along the northerly line of said cemetery 256.50 feet; thence north about 32 degrees 49 minutes east 163 feet; thence south about 58 degrees 55 minutes 17 seconds east 3,043.64 feet; thence south 32 degrees 09 minutes west 493 feet; thence north 58 degrees 59 minutes west 1,144.85 feet; thence south 31 degrees west 360.20 feet to a stake; thence north 58 degrees 39 minutes west 2,113.33 feet to a stake; thence south 58.52 feet to a stake; thence north 57 degrees 07 minutes 30 seconds west 544.83 feet to a stake on the easterly side of the Springfield road; thence north along the easterly side of the said Springfield road north 41 degrees 51 minutes 30 seconds east 306.10 feet to the point or place of beginning. Containing 49.866 acres.

DEAR SIR—In response to your request for more specific answers to certain questions asked at the last hearing before Mr. Ivins in reference to the number of cars available for service, I will state that in November, 1906, there were approximately 1403 surface cars available for winter service, and in the corresponding month of this year there were 1604 cars, an increase of 201 cars, 100 of which we have just completed and put in service, and the other 101 being large convertible cars, with an increased capacity over the ordinary longitudinal seat car of 33 1-3%. While there has been an increase of 201 cars, there has been an increase of 33 1-3% in the seating capacity of 101 of these cars, which would make the increase in cars 14.3% and in cars reduced to the seating capacity 16.8%.

We have available for service 827 elevated cars. There has been no increase in the number of cars, although we are now receiving 100 new cars, which we hope will be available for service at the rate of one per day beginning January 1st next.

In reference to the operation of the above cars, based on the month of November, there has been an increase in the car mileage of over 8% and a decrease in the passengers carried of about 1%.

The other matter referred to at this hearing was the question of heat regulations, and this is covered in the copy of our orders handed to you personally the other day.

BROOKLYN LOOP LINES—CHANGE OF GRADE, CENTRE STREET LOOP.

Abel E. Blackmar, Counsel, and Henry B. Seaman, Chief Engineer, entered the meeting at this point, and a general discussion took place as to changes in the plans of the Brooklyn Loop Lines. Henry B. Seaman, Chief Engineer, made a statement as to certain changes which he considered should be made in the Centre Street Loop, as follows:

That grade be reduced so as not to exceed 3% (present plans show as high as 5.5%).

That the Leonard-Franklin Street and the Howard-Grand Street Stations be merged into one large station at Canal Street. The Canal Street Station will then have all four tracks on a level whereas the abandoned stations were designed as double-deck stations.

The four tracks of the Centre Street loop will be placed on a level instead of the loop being double-deck, the steep grades to connect the upper and lower track elevation.

A line to be projected from the Manhattan Bridge, through Canal Street to Desbrosses Street Ferry at the North River. This line to be constructed at such elevation as to run beneath all north and south bound lines whether now constructed or proposed for the future, and to have points of transfer at every intersection with these north and south bound lines.

The connection from the Williamsburgh Bridge through Delancey Street, at present designed for Grand Street, to be changed to Spring Street, the elevation of which is sufficiently high to permit a large portion of the construction to be made above water line, and transfer could be made with the present subway station at Spring Street.

Advantages.

All grades exceeding 3% being eliminated, will permit of more rapid and safe operation. The traffic capacity of the loop will thereby be largely increased. It is expected that a modification of the depth of the Centre Street line will permit of its completion in considerably less time than by the present plans.

On the Centre Street loop the four tracks of Canal Street station will be on a level, thereby giving more convenient access to the street surface.

The crosstown line through Canal Street to the North River permitting of transfers to all north and southbound lines, is a general outline of policy which considers that the East River Bridges are streets and should be extended to the North River. This should permit transfers to all north and south bound lines, enabling passengers from Brooklyn to reach any point in Manhattan and not be confined to the distribution of any particular loop line. It is considered advisable that a general scheme of transportation should be laid out with consideration for its general usefulness between all points of the city, rather than favoring any particular locality or individual corporation. It might be mentioned that the Centre Street station of this Canal Street cross-town line would connect with the Centre Street subway, the Lafayette Street subway and the proposed subway on Broadway.

The extension of the Manhattan Bridge across Manhattan would complete a continuous street from Prospect Park to the North River.

Resolved, That the Counsel and the Chief Engineer be authorized to take up with the contractors of the Brooklyn Loop Lines the matter of changes and suggestions by the Chief Engineer, referred to the Commission.

Resolved, That any and all dogs loose and at large in any of the public streets, avenues, highways or other public places in The City of New York, unless muzzled or held as aforesaid, shall be destroyed by Inspectors or other duly authorized agents and officers of the Department designated and as directed by the Sanitary Superintendent; further be it

Resolved, That this order and regulation be and the same shall remain in force and effect until the 31st day of October, 1908, and that public notice of the requirements hereof and of this order be printed in the City Record and posted and kept posted in each of the borough offices of the Department of Health for two days in succession beginning June 22, 1908.
