Fetherston, Commissioner of Street Cleaning, in respect to the designs for the garage office building and dump on East 19th Street. On communications from the Mayor, Commissioners de Forest, Rives, Mitchell

and Lawrence, explaining their absences, they were excused.

Resolved, That the Art Commission hereby approves the designs for two stairway entrances with kiosks for the easterly end of the Bedford Avenue trolley station on the Williamsburg Bridge, represented by Exhibits "58-AI," "58-AI" and "58-AK," of record in this matter.

Submission 2016. John Jay Park Pergola. Certificate 1927. Resolved, That the Art Commission hereby approves the designs for a pergola in the John Jay Park, Manhattan, represented by Exhibits "843-C," "843-D" and "843-E," of record in this matter.

Submission 2018. Twenty-ninth Street Freight Shed. Certificate 1928. Resolved, That the Art Commission hereby approves the designs for a freight shed for the Department of Docks and Ferries on the pier at the foot of 29th Street.

Submission 2021. Aldermanic Anniversary Tablet. Certificate 1931. Resolved, That the Art Commission hereby approves the designs and location of a bronze tablet to be placed in the Aldermanic Chamber, City Hall, Manhattan, represented by Exhibits "856-A" and "856-B," of record in this matter.

Submission 2020. Public School 16, Brooklyn. The Committee recommended preliminary approval, with the suggestion that the

ornaments at the top of the piers be made less elaborate; that a certain amount of pattern be woven into the brick work and that doorway be restudied.

The report of the Committee was adopted and the following resolution passed: Certificate 1932.

Resolved, That the Art Commission hereby approves, but as preliminary drawings only, the designs and location of Public School 16, Brooklyn, represented by Exhibits "855-A," "855-B" and "855-C" of record in this matter.

Submission 2017. Garage, Office Building and Dump.

The Committee recommended that the designs be given preliminary approval with

the understanding that the elevations are to be restudied.

The report of the Committee was adopted, and the following resolutions passed: Certificate 1933.

Resolved, That the Art Commission hereby approves, but as preliminary drawings only, the designs and location of a garage office building and dump on the pier at the foot of East 19th Street, Manhattan, represented by Exhibits "852-A," "852-B," "852-C," "852-D," "852-E," "852-F," "852-G" and "852-H," of record in this matter. Submission 2019. Saugerties and New York Steamboat Shed.

The Committee recommended that the designs be approved, with the suggestion that the eaves should project fourteen inches.

The report of the Committee was adopted and the following resolution passed: Certificate 1934.

Resolved, That the Art Commission hereby approves the designs for a steel shed for the Saugerties and New York Steamboat Company, on Pier 43, North River, represented by Exhibits "854-A" and "854-B," of record in this matter. Submission 2023. Boat House, Hudson Boat Club.

The Committee recommended that the designs be approved, with the suggestion that a little wider projecting eave, not less than six inches, be put around the building. The report of the Committee was adopted and the following resolution passed: Certificate 1935.

Resolved, That the Art Commission hereby approves the designs and location of a boat house for the Hudson Boat Club, on North River between 200th and 201st Streets, represented by Exhibits "858-A," "858-B," "858-C" and "858-D," of

record in this matter. In the cases in which preliminary approval was given the Assistant Secretary was directed to notify the proper authorities that when working drawings have been completed, they should be submitted to the Commission for final approval, also to transmit

copies of the reports of the Committees to the proper authorities. Commissioner Boring reported that he had consulted with Mr. Sherry Fry, the sculptor of the Barrett Memorial Fountain, in regard to certain changes in the pedestal of the fountain in accordance with the suggestions made by the Commission at its

last meeting, and reported that these changes had been made. On motion the designs for the Barrett Memorial Fountain were given final approval.

The Acting Chairman presented some communications concerning letter boxes. The Assistant Secretary was directed to communicate with the Post Office Department and try to arrange for a conference between a committee of the Art Commission and a designer from the Post Office Department.

The Acting Chairman presented a communication from Mr. E. H. Hall, Secretary of the American Scenic and Historic Preservation Society, concerning the location of bronze tablets containing the Declaration of Independence in City Hall

The letter was ordered placed on file.

In response to a request from Honorable Henry H. Curran for advice as to the best place for displaying numerous bronze plaques on which shall be inscribed in various languages the Declaration of Independence, Commissioner Hermon A. MacNeil, who was appointed a Committee of One to investigate this matter, reported that after investigations, in his opinion, a good place would be on the promenade at the Manhattan end of the Williamsburgh Bridge, and suggested that a permanent structure be built in place of the present temporary shelter, and the plaques be incorporated as a part of the exteriors of the new building.

On motion it was resolved that the recommendation of the Committee be made

the recommendation of the Commission. Commissioner MacNeil reported that he would have a full sized model of his

Washington statute in place on the Washington Arch soon. The Acting Chairman appointed the following committee to examine this model in place: Commissioners Boring, Chairman, Breck and Crittenden.

perintendent, reported as follows:

Dr. Louis C. Schroeder, Resident Physician on the Children's Service, and Dr. Miller E. Trask, Admitting Physician at Gouverneur Hospital, have each resigned, to become effective June 30.

Dr. Norris, Director of Laboratories,

Whereas, The Marconi Telegraph-Cable Company, Inc., has, by a petition dated June 11, 1914, applied to this Board for the right to lay, construct, maintain and operate electric telegraph wires and the necessary branches therefrom under the streets, avenues and public places of The City of New York, for the purpose of conducting and maintaining a general telegraph business; and

Whereas, Sections 72, 73 and 74 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by Chapters 629 and 630 of the Laws of 1905, and Chapter 467 of the Laws of 1914, provide for the manner and procedure of making such grants; and

Whereas, In pursuance of such laws, this Board adopted a resolution on July 2, 1914, fix ing the date for public hearing thereon as September 18, 1914, at which citizens were entitled to appear and be heard, and by resolution adopted July 30, 1914, said hearing was continued to September 21, 1914, and publication was had for at least two (2) days in the "Morning Telegraph" and "The Globe," newspapers designated by the Mayor, and in the City Record for ten (10) days immediately prior to the date of hearing, and the public hearing was duly held on said last-named day; and

Whereas, The Corporation Counsel of the City has advised the Board that the Company, by its acceptance of the Post Roads Act of Congress. obtained a right to use the City's streets, subject to the right of the Board to regulate the use thereof and to demand reasonable compensation therefor; now. therefore, it is

Resolved, That the following form of the

resolution for the grant of the consent applied for by the Marconi Telegraph-Cable Company. Inc., containing the form of proposed contract for the grant of such consent, be hereby intro-duced and entered in the minutes of this Board as follows, to wit:

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby grants to the Marconi Telegraph-Cable Company, Inc., the consent of The City of New York as more fully set out and described in the following form of proposed contract for the grant thereof, upon and subject to the terms and conditions in said proposed form of contract contained, and that the Mayor of The City of New York be and he hereby is authorized to execute and deliver such contract in the name and on behalf of The City of New York, as follows,

PROPOSED FORM OF CONTRACT. This contract, made and executed in duplicate this day of , 19 , by and between THE CITY OF NEW YORK (hereinafter called the City), party of the first part, by the Mayor of said City, acting for and in the name of said City, under and in pursuance of the authority

of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City (hereinafter called the Board), and the MARCONI TELEGRAPH-CABLE COMPANY, INC., a corporation formed under and pursuant to the Laws of the State of New York (hereinafter called the Company), party of the second part, WITNESSETII:

Whereas, The Marconi Wireless Telegraph Company of America, a corporation formed under and pursuant to the Laws of the State of New Jersey, has constructed and proposes to operate certain wireless receiving and transmitting stations at Belmar and New Brunswick, in the State of New Jersey, and for the purpose of establishing offices in the City of New York obtained the incorporation of and controls the applicant Company, which is to act as its agent in the establishment of such offices in the City of New York and to receive and deliver from such offices messages intended for and received by wireless

communication; and Whereas, The said applicant Company on or about June 22, 1914, filed with the Postmaster-General of the United States of America a certificate of acceptance of the restrictions and obligations imposed on telegraph companies by an Act of Congress of the United States, approved July 24, 1866, entitled "An Act to aid in the construction of telegraph lines and to secure to the government the use of the same for postal,

military and other purposes;" and Whereas, The Company has now applied for authority to lay, construct, maintain and operate or use electric telegraph wires, with the necessary branches in connection therewith, under and along the streets, avenues and public places within the territory of the City of New York according to the terms and conditions which the Board may determine, for the purpose of conducting and maintaining a general telegraph business; and

Whereas. The Corporation Counsel of the City has advised the Board that the Company by its acceptance of the Post Roads Act obtained a right to use the City's streets, subject to the right of the Board to regulate the use thereof and to demand reasonable compensation therefor, New, therefore, in consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements herein contained, the parties hereto do hereby covenant and agree as follows:

Section 1. Subject to the conditions and provisions hereinafter set forth, the City hereby consents to the construction, maintenance and operation or use by the Company of suitable wires or other electrical conductors in the streets and avenues within the City of New York, for the purpose of electrically connecting various telegraph offices to be established by it in the said City with each other, and with the wireless stations of the Marconi Wireless Telegraph Company of America, located at Belmar and New Brunswick, in the State of New Jersey, or else-where, for the purpose of doing a telegraph business between the offices of the said Company and the offices of the said Marconi Wireless Telegraph Company of America.

Section 2. The consent hereby given is subject to the following conditions and regulations, which shall be complied with by the Company:

Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity.

Seventh—The plant, conduits, wires, con-

First-No wires or conductors laid, maintained or operated by the Company in the City, or any portion thereof, shall be used for the transmission of messenger call signals, telephonic conversations or for any other purpose than the transmission of messages by telegraph as con-templated by the Post Roads Act of Congress of the United States as interpreted by the Courts.

Second—The privilege of laying its wires underground and using the conduits in the City streets, herein consented to by the City, shall continue for the period of fifteen (15) years from the date of the signing of this contract by the Mayor, when the same and this contract shall cease and determine without any action or pro-

Third-The Company shall pay to the City for the expense of the examination of the application and all work in connection therewith, for the facilities afforded to it, and for local governmental supervision, the following sums of

money:
1. The sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000) in cash within thirty (30) days after the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor. 2. An annual sum which shall be equal to one hundred dollars (\$100) per mile for each and every metallic circuit used or operated by the Company in the City, but which sum shall not be less than one thousand dollars (\$1,000).

The metallic circuits referred to above and wherever used in this contract shall be deemed

to and shall include each and every two (2) wires between the same points used or operated by the Company, whether owned by it or otherwise. In arriving at the mileage in use or operated by the Company, the different circuits used or operated by it shall not be treated as separate items, but the total mileage of such circuits, when added together, shall be the basis for the payments to be made by the Company. The length of the various circuits used or operated shall be certified by the Company under oath, to the Comptroller, as hereinafter provided, but should the Company, for any reason, not have sufficient data to enable it to furnish such information, then and in that event it shall cer-tify under oath to the Comptroller, as hereinafter provided, the various offices of whatever description, connected by the circuits in use by it, and the mileage upon which it shall make the annual payments shall be calculated and based upon the distances between such offices by the most direct route through the streeets and avenues of the City. Should the mileage at any time exceed an exact number of miles, then and in that event the annual payment to be made by the Company for the excess over such exact number of miles shall be upon the basis of twenty-five dollars (\$25.) for each quarter of a mile (¼ mile) or fraction thereof.

The annual payments shall commence from the date on which this contract is signed by the

Any and all payments to be made by the terms of this contract to the City by the Company shall not be considered in any manner in the nature of a tax, but such payments shall be made in addition to any and all taxes of whatsoever kind or description now or hereafter required to be paid by any ordinance of the City, or resolution of the Board, or any law of the State of New York.

Fourth—The annual payments shall continue throughout the whole term of this contract, notwithstanding any clause in any statute or in the charter of any other company providing for payment for similar rights, facilities, franchises or supervision at a different rate, and no assignment, lease or sublease of the rights or privileges, the exercise of which is herein consented to or of the facilities for the exercise of the same, or of any part thereof, shall be valid or effectual for any purpose, unless the said assign. ment, lease or sublease shall contain a covenant on the part of the assignee or lessee that the same is subject to all the conditions of this contract; and that the assignee or lessee assumes and will be bound by all of said conditions, and especially said conditions as to payments, anything in any statute or in the charter of such assignee or lessee to the contrary notwithstanding, and that the said assignee or lessee waives any more favorable conditions created by such statute or its charter, and that it will not claim by reason thereof, or otherwise, exemption from liability to perform each and all of the conditions of this ontract.

Fifth-The rights and privileges, the exercise of which is herein consented to or the facilities for the exercise of the same, shall not be assigned, either in whole or in part, or leased or sublet in any manner, nor shall the title thereto, or right, interest or property therein, pass to or vest in any other person or corporation whatsoever, either by the act of the Company or by operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statutes relating to the consolidation or merger of corporations or otherwise without the consent of the City, acting by the Board, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything herein contained to the contrary thereof in any wise notwithstanding, and the granting, giving or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent consent or consents.

Sixth-The Company shall construct, maintain and operate its electric system subject to the supervision and control of all the authorities of the City who have jurisdiction in such matters, as provided by the Charter of the City, and in strict compliance with all laws or ordinances or departmental rules and regulations now in force, or which may be adopted, affecting companies

operating electrical conductors in the City.

No construction or repair of said electrical system shall be commenced until written permits have been obtained from the proper City officials. In any permit so issued, such officials may impose such conditions, as a condition of the granting of the same, as are necessary for the purpose of protecting any structures in the streets and avenues and the proper restoration of the surface of such streets and avenues over which such officials have jurisdiction, and the Company shall comply with such conditions.

Upon completion of any work of construc-tion, the Company shall furnish to the President of the Borough a plan of such character as he may direct, showing accurately and distinctly the location, size and type of construction and com-plete dimensions of the structures erected, installed or constructed under this contract, and the location and dimensions of all substructures encountered during the progress of the work; the depth below the street surface of the new structures and of the substructures encountered must be shown, also their location with reference to the nearest curb line and the nearest curb line intersection.

Upon failure on the part of the Company to comply with the directions of the Board within a reasonable time, this consent and contract shall cease and determine.

Tenth-The Company shall file with the Board on the first day of February in each year a map or plan upon which shall be plainly and separately indicated the number of wires which were in use by the Company on December 31 preceding and the streets in which the same are located, and also those which were put in use during the year preceding that date. It shall also file with the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, on or before the tenth day of each month, a map or plan of the locations in which wires have been placed by it during the preceding month.

Eleventh-The wires of the Company shall be employed for no other purpose than those explicitly set forth herein and the Company binds itself not to lay, use, lease or operate wires for illegal purposes or to illegal places.

Twelfth—The Company shall assume all li-

ability to persons or property by reason of the construction or operation of the system referred to in this contract, and it is a condition of this contract that the City shall assume no liability whatsoever to either persons or property on account of the same, and the Company hereby agrees to repay to the City any damage which the City shall be compelled to pay by reason of any acts or defaults of the Company.

Thirteenth—Nothing in this contract shall be deemed to affect in any ways the right of the

deemed to affect in any way the right of the City to grant to any individual or other corporation its consent to the exercise of a franchise or to grant a franchise right or privilege upon the same or other terms and conditions in the territory referred to in this contract, or any part thereof.

Fourteenth-If the Company shall fail to maintain its structures and equipment as herein provided in good condition throughout the whole term of this contract, the Board may give notice to the Company, specifying any default on the part of the Company, and requiring the Company to remedy the same within a reasonable time, and upon failure of the Company to remedy such default within a reasonable time, the Company shall, for each day thereafter during which the default or defect remains pay to the City the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100) as fixed or liquidated damages, or the Board, in case such structures or equipment which may affect the surface of the streets shall not be put in good condition within a reasonable time after notice by the Board as aforesaid, shall have the right to make all needed repairs at the expense of the Company, in which case the Company shall pay to the City the amount of the cost of such repairs, with legal interest thereon, all of which sums may be deducted from the fund herein-
