MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.

Minutes of Meeting of the Municipal Civil Service Commission of New York Held Wednesday, June 14, 1916, at 10.30 o'clock A. M.

Present—Honorable Darwin R. James, Jr., and Alexander Keogh, Commissioners. Commissioner James presided.

The public hearing advertised on the proposed amendment of the Classification by including in the Non-Competitive Class for Bellevue and Allied Hospitals the position of Fire Drill Expert at \$900 per annum without maintenance was postponed for one week.

A public hearing was called on the proposed amendment of the Classification by including in the Non-Competitive Class for the Department of Public Charities the position of Overseer at \$780 per annum with maintenance. There were no appearances.

A public hearing was had on the proposed amendment of the Classification by including in the Labor Class, Part II, the title "Welder." Charles S. Demarest, Esq.,

Chief of Construction, Fire Department, appeared in favor of the proposed amendment. There were no other appearances and the Chair declared the hearing closed.

The Commission then went into regular session and the minutes of the meetings held May 26 and May 31 were approved.

On motion, it was Resolved, That the Municipal Civil Service Classification be and the same hereby is amended by including in the non-competitive class, under the heading "Positions in the Department of Public Charities, at compensations not exceeding the amounts set forth below (With Maintenance)," the following: Overseer, \$780 per annum.

On motion, it was Resolved, That the Municipal Civil Service Classification be and the same hereby is amended by including in the Labor Class, Part II, the title "Welder."

James McGinley, Esq., Chief of Staff of the office of the Commissioner of Accounts, appeared in connection with the request of the Commissioner of Accounts for authority to increase the compensation allowed William C. McKeon for services as Expert on Purchasing Methods in that department. Harry W. Marsh, Esq., Assistant Secretary of the Civil Service Reform Association, also appeared in connection with the matter. Resolved, That, subject to the approval of the Mayor and the State Civil Service Commission, the limitation of compensation (\$750) fixed by clause 6B of Rule XII. of the Rules of the Municipal Civil Service Commission be and the same hereby is waived in so far as it applies to the case of William C. 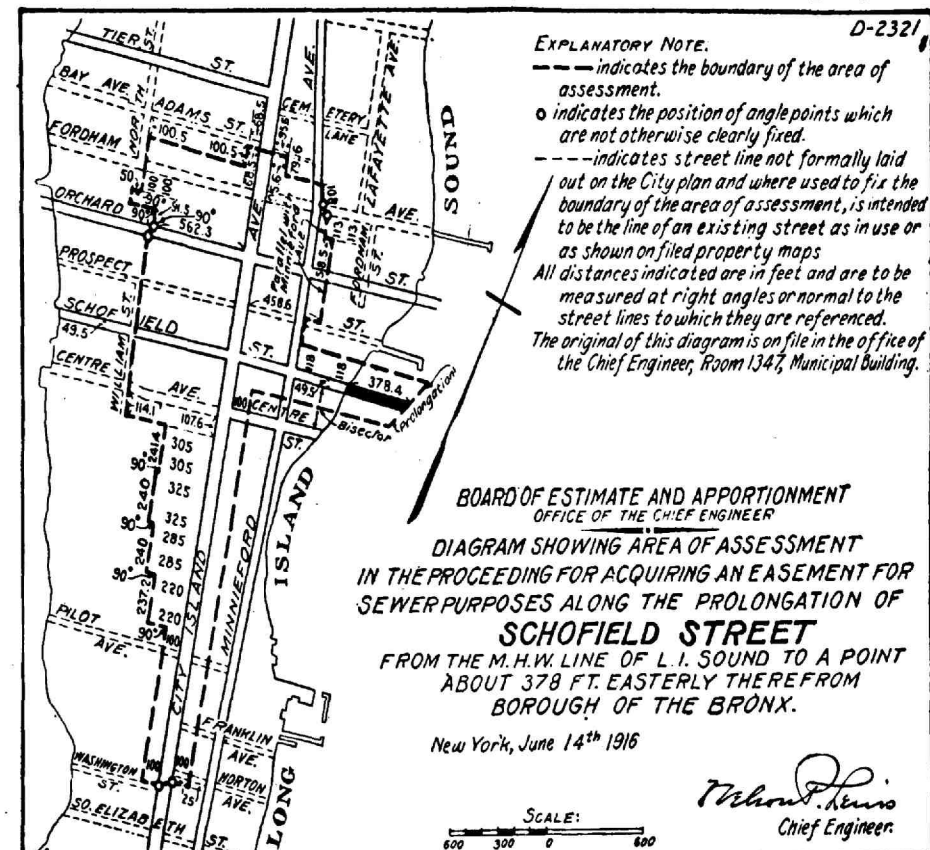

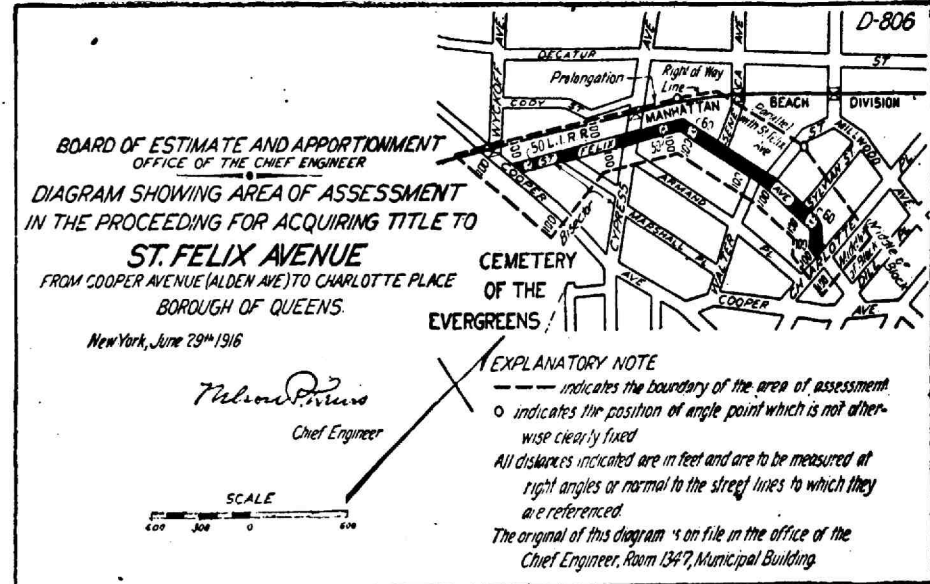

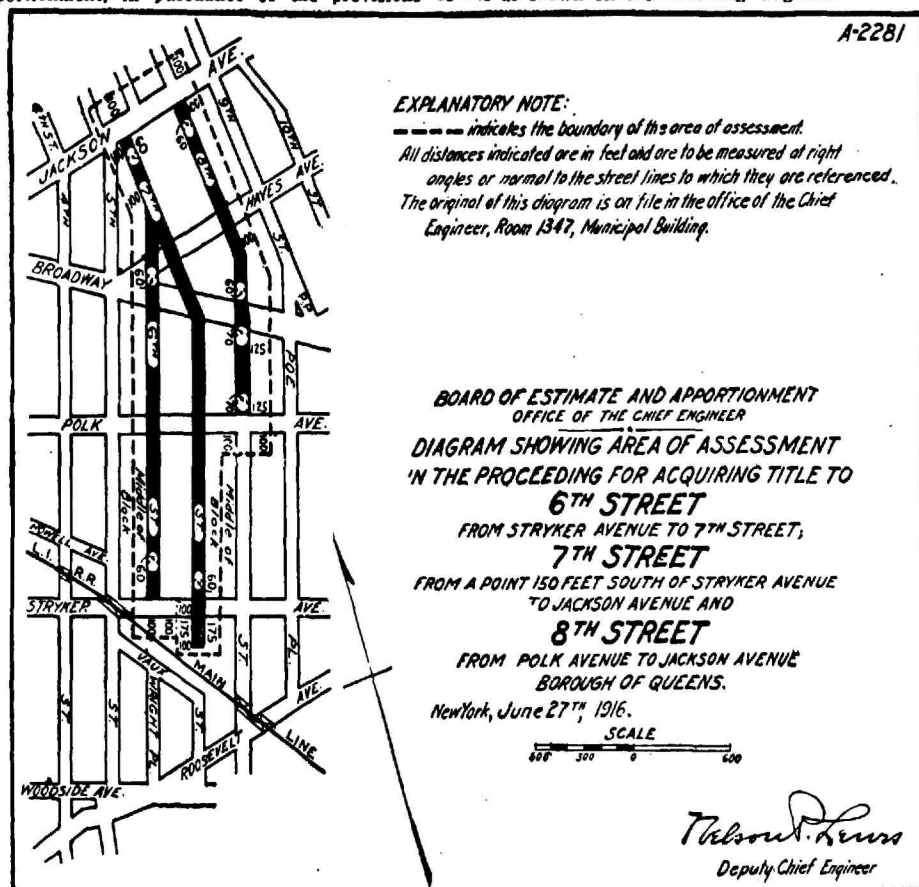

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.
