Division of Audit and Accounts—Orders Nos. 3567 to 3634, inclusive, were issued; 67 requisitions were received and acted upon; 4 requisitions, including 62 vouchers amounting to \$19,462.11, were drawn on the Comptroller.

Cashier's Office—Restoring and repaving special fund (water, sewer openings, etc.), \$3,646.45; shed permits, \$20; sewer connections, \$100; subpoena fees, \$1; prints, \$1.35; special security deposits, \$200; miscellaneous accounts receivable, \$19; vault permits, \$1,934.17; S-564, \$1,641.50.

Permits Issued—To place buildings material on streets, 9; to construct street vaults, 17; to construct sheds, 3; for curbs, 8; for subways, steam mains, electrical and various connections, 144; for railway construction and repairs, and to reset poles, 7; to repair sidewalks, 42; for sewer connections, 9; for water services, 41; for miscellaneous purposes, 17.




