MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.

Minutes of Meeting of the Municipal Civil Service Commission of New York
Held Thursday, Oct. 11, 1917, at 2 P. M.

Present—Darwin R. James, Jr., and Alexander Keogh, Commissioners. Com-
missioner James presided.

A public hearing was held on the proposed amendment of the classification of
positions in the Non-Competitive Class, Part I, under the heading "Positions in the
Department of Public Charities, at compensations not exceeding the amounts set forth
below (City Institutions)," by including therein the position of Assistant Pathologist
at a compensation not exceeding \$600 per annum with maintenance. B. T. Terry,
Director, Brooklyn Laboratories of Pathology, and Clifford J. Gordon, Clerk, Depart-
ment of Public Charities, appeared in behalf of the proposed amendment. There
were no other appearances and the Chair declared the hearing closed.

The Commission then went into regular session and the minutes of the meeting held Sept. 12, 1917, were approved.

On motion, the matter of the proposed amendment of the classification by including in the Non-Competitive Class for the Department of Public Charities the position of Assistant Pathologist was laid over.

Clifford J. Gordon, Clerk in the Department of Public Charities, appeared in connection with the request of that Department for approval of the services of Francis W. Ford's Sons as City Surveyors, under the provisions of Rule XII. On motion, it was

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of clause 6a of Rule XII of the Rules of the Municipal Civil Service Commission, the Department of Public Charities be and it hereby is authorized to employ Francis W. Ford's Sons as City Surveyors for a period of three months at a compensation not to exceed \$200.

Haven Emerson, Commissioner of the Department of Health, appeared in connection with his request for authority to employ Ernest C. Levy, of the Hotel McAlpin, as a Special Investigator in connection with the work of the Mayor's Committee on Milk, at a salary of \$500 a month, under the provisions of clause 6a of Rule XII. The matter was laid over.

Rosario Stavola, 562 Sackett st., Brooklyn, failed to appear as directed to show cause why his appointment as Driver in the Department of Street Cleaning on May 12, 1917, should not be revoked. It appearing that the said employee had resigned from the position of Driver, the papers were ordered filed.

Francis T. Moore, 434 Hopkins ave., Astoria, L. I., appeared as directed to show cause why his name should not be removed from the list of Engineer Inspector, Architectural, Grade C, under the provisions of clause 14 of Rule VII. The Commission directed that the candidate be given a medical re-examination and that the Examining Division be requested to report as to whether the candidate received a higher mark on experience than he was entitled to in view of the facts disclosed by the Bureau of Investigation.

William F. Wallace, 422 E. 80th st., appeared as directed to show cause why his name should not be removed from the eligible list of Patrolman under the provisions of clause 14 of Rule VII. On motion, it was

Resolved, That the disqualification appearing against the name of William F. Wallace, 422 E. 80th st., on the eligible list for Patrolman be and the same hereby is removed.

Thomas Maher appeared as directed to show cause why his name should not be removed from the eligible list of Patrolman under the provisions of clause 14 of Rule VII. In this connection, the Commission considered a report dated Oct. 4, 1917, from the Examiner in Charge of the Bureau of Investigation relative to thirty-two candidates on the eligible list. The Secretary was instructed to withhold certification of the names of Francesco Laureta and John Kegan; to summon John Eppler and Angelo Benedetto before the Commission; to mark the twenty-seven other candidates named in the report "qualified," and, on motion, it was

Resolved, That the name of Thomas Maher, 343 Fifty-sixth st., Brooklyn, be and the same hereby is marked "qualified" on the eligible list of Patrolman.

Certifications will be made from this list to the Health Department for public school work, baby health stations, communicable diseases and similar assignments.

The requirement of paragraph 12, Rule VII, that no person who has entered any examination for appointment to a competitive position and failed, or who has withdrawn from an examination, shall be admitted within nine months from the date of such examination to a new examination for the same position, is waived for this examination.

Candidates must be at least 21 years of age and not more than 50 years of age on or before the closing date for the receipt of applications.

A qualifying physical examination will be given.

Applications for this examination must be filed on a special blank, Form D.

Duties—The duties of the position are to carry on and supervise work in radiography, fluoroscopy and X-ray treatment.

Requirements—Candidates must have received the degree of M. D. from a medical school of recognized standing; and must be licensed to practice medicine in the State of New York prior to receiving appointment.

Candidates should have had training or experience of a character to fit them to perform the duties of the position as described above.

Candidates must be at least 21 years of age on or before the closing date for the receipt of applications.

There is one vacancy in the Department of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals at \$1,200 per annum.

The requirement of paragraph 12, Rule VII, that no person who has entered any examination for appointment to a competitive position and failed, or who has withdrawn from an examination, shall be admitted within nine months from the date of such examination to a new examination for the same position, is waived for this examination.

Candidates must be at least 21 years of age and not more than 50 years of age on or before the closing date for the receipt of applications.

The usual salary is \$75 per month.

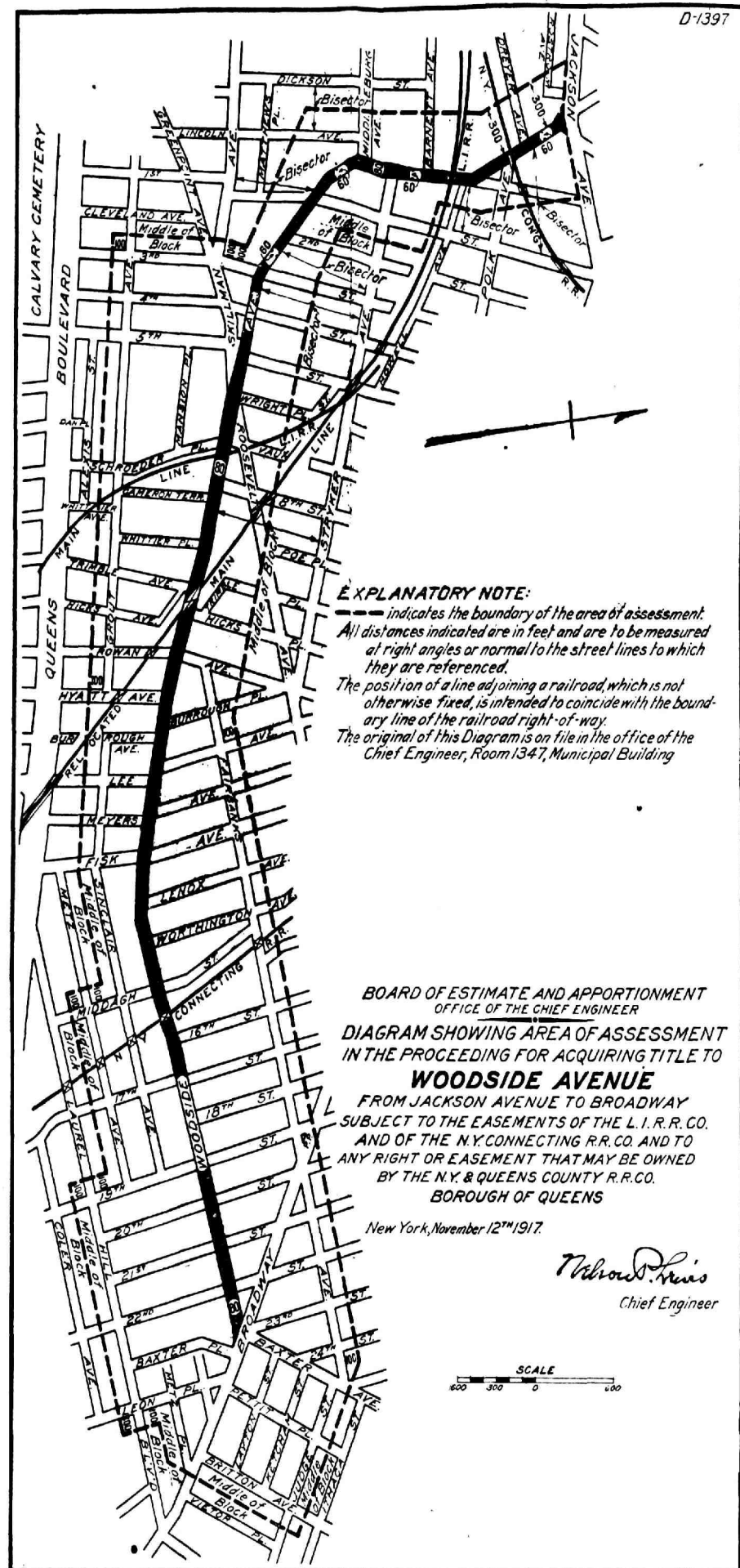

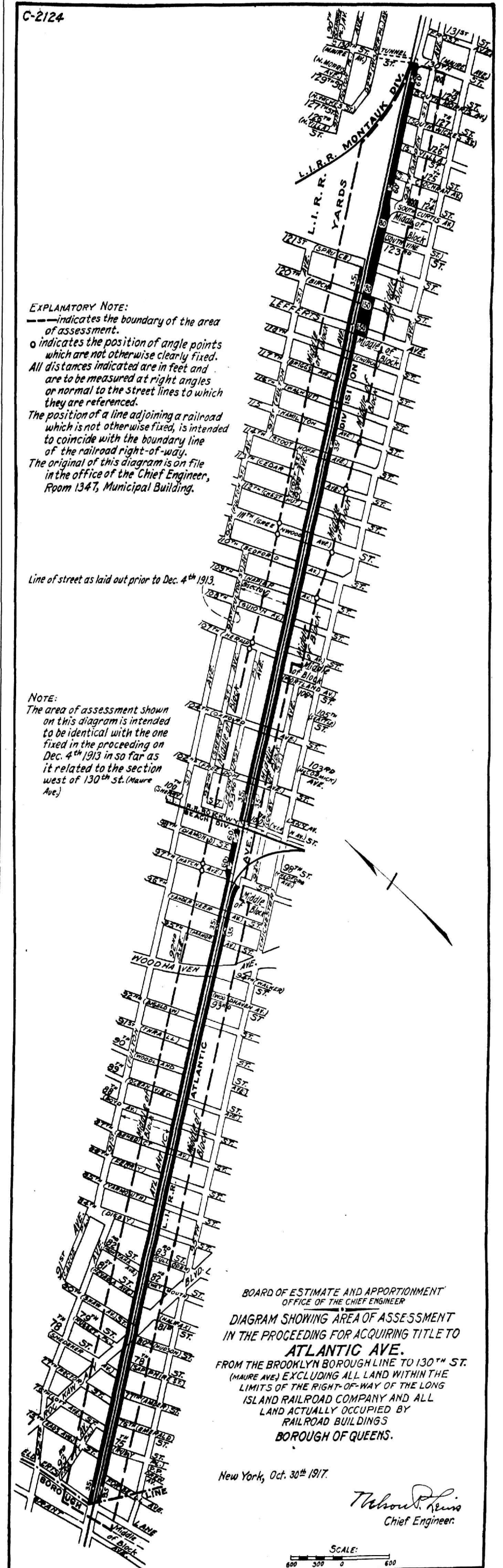

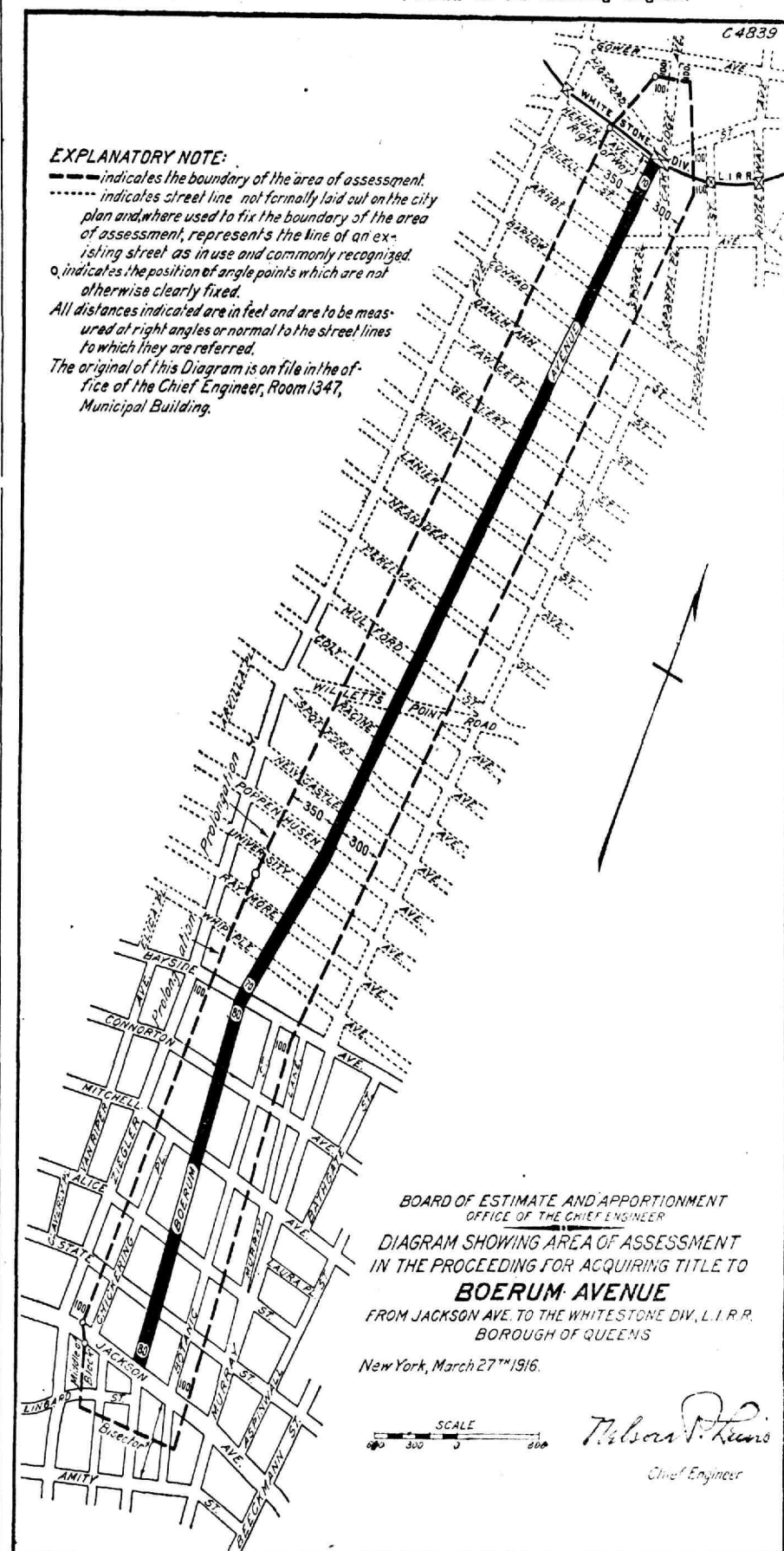

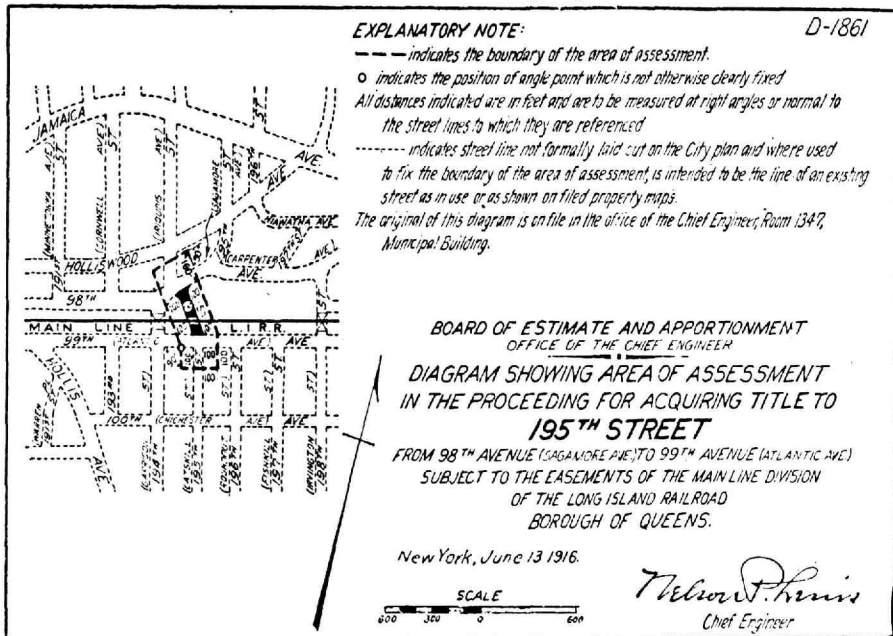

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 will be the amount of the security to be deposited. Each bid shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also that it is made without any connection with any other person making a bid for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer or employee of The City of New York is, shall be, or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof.
