CITY PRISON, NEW YORK, October 1, 1885.

The following improvements and repairs have been made at the First and Fourth District Prisons from July 1 to September 30, 1885, by prison labor and without expense to the Department of Public Charities and Correction except the cost of the material:

FIRST DISTRICT PRISON.

Painted halls, corridors, cell doors and windows of male prison, closets and walls in Magdalen, office of female prison, and cell doors and casings under Court Special Sessions.

Built a wooden gutter, lined with tin; a chimney, and a wooden tank on roof of female prison.

Repaired roofs of male prison and female prison, and painted skylight.

Plastered walls in Magdalen.

Placed 85 feet of six-inch cast-iron pipe from cellar to Magdalen, 31 feet of six-inch galvanized iron pipe from roof to waste-pipe, 50 feet of three-quarter-inch galvanized iron waste-pipe from first floor to Magdalen, and 49 feet of three-inch galvanized iron waste-pipe on tank in male prison. Resolved, That section 206 of the Sanitary Code be and is hereby amended to read as follows:
Section 206. That no privy-vault, or cesspool, shall be allowed within thirty feet of any tenement or lodging-house, hotel or manufactory in the City of New York, of a greater depth than three feet; nor unless it be connected at the upper end with the Croton water and at the lower end with the street sewer, and provided with an outlet at the lowest point and on the bottom, so as to admit of the complete discharge of the contents whenever the outlet is opened and the vault or sink is flushed with water. The outlet shall be kept closed, except during the process of flushing, with a tight-fitting plug, so as to effectually prevent the escape of gases and offensive odors; and sufficient water shall at all times be kept in the vaults or sink to prevent solid matter adhering to the bottom. The sides and bottom of every privy-vault, cesspool, or school sink in the City of New York must be impermeable and secured against any saturation of the walls or the ground about the same.
