

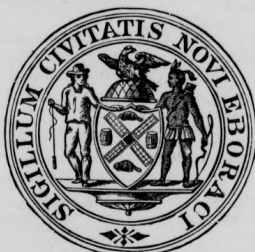

In compliance with the provisions of chapter 359,
of 1887, amending sections 350 and 391 of the New
York City Consolidation Act of 1882, passed June 9, 1887,
the following changes are made in charging and collect-
ing water rents:

1. All extra charges for water incurred from and after
June 9, 1887, shall be treated, collected and returned in
arrears in the same manner as regular rents have hereto-
fore been treated.

2. In every building where a water meter or meters
are now, or shall hereafter be in use, the charge for water
by meter measurement shall be the only charge against
the building, or such part thereof as is supplied through
meter.

3. The returns of arrears of water rents, including the
year 1887, shall be made as heretofore on the confir-
mation of the tax levy by the Board of Aldermen, and shall
include all charges and penalties of every nature.

4. A penalty of five dollars (\$5) is hereby established,
and will be imposed in each and every case where the
rules and regulations of the Department prohibiting the
use of water through hose, or in any other prohibited man-
