

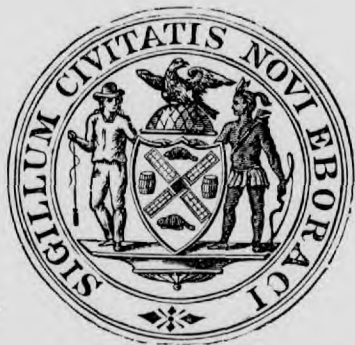

CONSTRUCTION BUREAU.

A large number of contracts were in active operation during the quarter, and the various quantities of work done will be found appended.

II.—Tax Maps.

Section A. Calculations, additions and corrections were made on work previously reported as completed for ten blocks, or 129 parcels, covering 15,169 city lots. New calculations were made for 19 parcels, covering 8,054 city lots, which completed Volume 9, Twenty-fourth Ward. Preliminary calculations for Volume 10, Twenty-fourth Ward, were commenced.

Section B.—Drafting. Two original pages for the office and two final sheets and additions and corrections upon 18 office and final sheets were made.

Section C. About 600 real estate transfers were recorded.

Section D. Volume 9 of the Twenty-fourth Ward was completed and submitted, containing title pages, index to volume, index to map pages, with explanatory remarks, and 25 map pages, covering 918.09 acres of ground.

In connection with the above work, about 850 cubic yards of stone and earth filling have been used. This material has been obtained from various contractors and from the new Aqueduct shaft, free of charge, except the expense of hauling.

The 799 deaths represent a death-rate of 24.87, against 24.20 for the previous week, and 21.20 for the corresponding week of 1890.

The increase of 22 deaths was mainly due to an increase of 12 in the deaths from diphtheria, of 24 from scarlet fever, and of 11 from Bright's disease, partly offset by a decrease of 5 in the deaths from phthisis, of 8 from heart disease, of 7 from bronchitis, and of 6 from pneumonia.

The deaths from diphtheria were most numerous in the Twelfth and Nineteenth Wards, from scarlet fever in the Seventeenth and Nineteenth, and from measles, in the Eighteenth Ward.

ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1889), which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water, from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets, shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and the expense thereof to be assessed on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and discharge such owner from any and every covenant and obligation as to paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property (who shall also be the owners of a majority of the property in frontage) on the line of the proposed improvement.

The Commissioner of Public Works desires to give the following explanation of the operation of this act: When notice, as above described, is given to the Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are forever released from all obligation under the grant in respect to paving, repaving or repairing the street in front of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assessment for such paving, repaving or repairs, as the Common Council may, by ordinance direct to be made thereafter.

No street or avenue within the limits of such grants can be paved, repaved or repaired until said work is authorized by ordinance of the Common Council, and when the owners of such lots desire their streets to be paved, repaved or repaired, they should state their desire and make their application to the Board of Aldermen and not to the Commissioner of Public Works, who has no authority in the matter until directed by ordinance of the Common Council to proceed with the pavement, repavement or repairs.
