

THURSDAY, JULY 21, 1898—ADJOURNED MEETING 11 A.M.

Present-Commissioners Clausen (President), Moebus, Brower. A representative of the Comptroller being present and the meeting open to the public, the estimate box was opened and all the estimates or proposals received, in pursuance of duly published advertisements, were opened and read, as follows:

From the Corporation Counsel, advising the Department in regard to a proposed transfer from the Police Department appropriation to that of the Park Department of the amount necessary to maintain the Central Park ambulance service for the year 1898:

Commissioner Clausen offered the following:
Whereas, In the Departmental Estimate of the Department of Public Parks, approved at a meeting of the Board of Commissioners held September 7, 1897, a sum was set apart for the salaries of members of the Park Police force in The City of New York and employees connected therewith, including the sum of twelve hundred dollars for the salary of the Driver of the Central Park ambulance; and

Whereas, Under the provisions of the Greater New York Charter the Park Police force was merged into the Municipal Police force and the entire sum set apart for the uses of the Park Police force in the Borough of Manhattan was transferred to the Municipal Police Department; and Whereas, The Municipal Police Department has decided that it is not the province of that Department to maintain the Central Park ambulance service and has not maintained such service, notwithstanding the same is urgently needed and its continuance has been requested by many citizens through patition; citizens through petition ;

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be requested to transfer from the sum set aside for the said Police Department to the sum set aside for the uses of the Park Department in the Boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond the sum of twelve hundred dollars, the amount required for the said ambulance service in the year 1898.
