DEAR SIR—I have the honor to transmit herewith a report of the operations and condition of the City Treasury and the Sinking Funds for the year ending December 31, 1898. This report shows the receipts and expenditures during the year, and the sources and objects thereof.

It is accompanied by the following statements, viz.:

This report is submitted in advance of the annual report to be hereafter issued in the usual form adopted by the Department of Finance, which will be prepared and submitted to you at as early a date as possible, and will contain, in addition to the information given in the accompanying report, extensive statistical data in relation to receipts and expenditures and the City Debt.

The issuing of this report (which is not required by the Charter) has been unavoidably delayed by certain legal questions which have not yet been fully answered by the Law Department, affecting the proper disposition of certain items of City revenue.

Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at a Meeting held at the Mayor's Office on Monday, July 31, 1899, at 11.30 o'clock A. M.

Present—Robert A. Van Wyck, Mayor; Bird S. Coler, Comptroller; Patrick Keenan, Chamberlain; Randolph Guggenheimer, President of the Council, and Robert Muh, Chairman, Committee on Finance, Board of Aldermen.

The minutes of the meeting held July 13, 1899, were read and approved.

The Comptroller offered the following resolution approving bill of James Brown Lord, Architect of the Appellate Division Court-house, amounting to \$1,919.56.

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby approve of the bill of James Brown Lord, Architect of the new Court-house of the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court, First Department, amounting to nineteen hundred and nineteen dollars and fifty-six cents (\$1,919.56), being payment on account of professional services rendered, and that the Comptroller be and hereby is authorized to pay the same as provided by chapter 196 of the Laws of 1897.

Which resolution was unanimously adopted.

The following communication was received from the Fire Department relative to use of lands on Sedgwick avenue, Borough of The Bronx, owned by the City:

BOROUGH OF MANHATTAN, July 11, 1899.

Hon. ROBERT A. VAN WYCK, Mayor and Chairman of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, New York City:

SIR—The Chief of Department has submitted a report to me, under date of the 10th instant, recommending that application be made to your Honorable Board for the use and occupation of a plot of ground owned by the City on Sedgwick avenue, running through the Riverview terrace, Morris Heights, Borough of The Bronx, the dimensions of said plot being 100 by 200 feet, on which it is proposed to erect an apparatus house.

Numerous requests are on file at these headquarters asking for the establishment of a new company in that portion of said Borough, and as I have made a careful examination of the territory and am of the opinion that it would be to the best interests of the community to have a fire company located there, I respectfully request from your Honorable Board a favorable consideration of this application.

In connection therewith the Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution:

JULY 17, 1899.

Hon. BIRD S. COLER, Comptroller:

SIR—Hon. John J. Scannell, Fire Commissioner, in a communication under date of July 11th inst., makes application to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund "for the use and occupation of a plot of ground owned by the City, on Sedgwick avenue, running through to Riverview Terrace, Morris Heights, Borough of The Bronx, the dimensions of said plot being 100 by 200 feet, and on which it is proposed to erect an apparatus house." He further states that "numerous requests are on file at these Headquarters asking for the establishment of a new company in that portion of said Borough," and that he has made a careful examination of the territory and is of the opinion that it would be to the best interests of the community to have a fire company located there.

The plot of land in question was acquired by the City for the New Croton Aqueduct, and, on February 2, 1891, transferred by the Aqueduct Commissioners to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund. Since the acquisition of this property by the City two streets have been opened through it, viz.: Riverview terrace, now called Cedar avenue, and Cedar avenue, now called East One Hundred and Seventy-ninth street, and a third street, 30 feet in width, is shown on the final maps, to be called East One Hundred and Seventy-eighth street. I am informed by the Chief of the Fire Department that a plot of land, 50 feet by 100 feet, is required by the Department, upon which it is proposed to erect a three story and basement brick apparatus house, to contain a combination company, viz.: an engine, hose wagon and truck.

The location seems to be desirable for such a purpose, and I do not see any objection to granting the request of the Fire Commissioner.

I enclose a diagram of the property, and I would suggest that part of the same which is shown shaded, being about 50 feet by 100 feet, be allotted for the use of the Fire Department.

The Board of Estimate and Apportionment, by resolution adopted May 3, 1899, appropriated the sum of \$4,000 for a new site in the vicinity of Aqueduct avenue and Hampden street. The occupation of the City's property as above will take the place of the site for which an appropriation was made.

SIR—Mr. John T. Nagle, Chief of the Bureau of Municipal Statistics, in a communication of April 17, 1899, requests the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to authorize the lease of Room 1912 of the Park Row building, which contains 153 square feet, for the use of the Bureau, as the space now occupied by them is inadequate for properly performing the duties of the said Bureau.

Room 1912, on the nineteenth floor of the building Nos. 13 to 21 Park Row, immediately adjoins the present rooms occupied by the Bureau of Municipal Statistics, which rooms contain 1,100 square feet, and the lease of which was authorized by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund March 2, 1899, at the price provided for in the resolution of January 20, 1899. SIR—The Board of Education, by resolution dated July 19, 1899, resolved, "That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be and they are hereby requested to authorize the Comptroller to execute a lease of the premises No. 53 Canal street, Stapleton, Borough of Richmond, for use as a branch depository of the Board of Education, etc., for a period of two years, with the privilege of renewal, at an annual rental of \$500; the lessee to furnish heat, light and do the necessary cleaning. Owner, John L. Dery."

The premises are a three-story frame building with a store front. First floor, 24 feet by 40 feet, with an extension 11 feet by 18 feet. Second floor, 24 feet by 24 feet, with an extension 11 feet by 18 feet. Third floor, 24 feet by 24 feet; and a wood-shed in rear of yard 10 feet by 15 feet.

The building is in good clean condition, having recently been painted. Gas pipes are throughout the building except third floor, but no gas fixtures. There is no way to heat the building except by stoves, which are to be supplied by the City; the flues are arranged for stove-pipes. There are no sanitary arrangements in the building. A closet and urinal should be placed either on the first or second floor.

The rental, \$500 per annum, is high but not excessive, but for this rental the owner should put in a suitable sanitary apparatus at his own expense.

The premises have not been occupied by the Board of Education, therefore I would recommend that the lease date from August 1, 1899, for two years, with a privilege of renewal for two additional years.

In connection therewith the Comptroller presented the following report of the Engineer of the Department of Finance, and offered the following resolution :

JULY 28, 1899.

Hon. BIRD S. COLER, Comptroller :

SIR—The building for the Appellate Division Supreme Court, First Department, is now being erected by contract under the provisions of chapter 196, Laws of 1895. It is approaching completion, the time for such completion having been extended to October 1, 1899.

It becomes necessary now to provide for the furniture and equipment.

Section 3 of the law is as follows :

"The said Commissioners of the Sinking Fund shall also, without public letting, make such contracts or purchases from time to time as shall be necessary for the complete furnishing and equipment of said Court House, according to the designs and specifications of the said architect, approved by a majority of the Justices of said Appellate Division and the requirements of said Justices."

Under this section it becomes the duty of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to provide for this "complete furnishing and equipment" "without public letting."

The proper manner of doing this would be for the architect to make plans and specifications for the various articles needed, which, after receiving the approval of the Appellate Justices, should have been presented to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for their action, with all the information necessary to enable said Commissioners to act understandingly.

With such information the Commissioners would in all probability have called for estimates from leading firms, for the various classes of furniture or equipment needed, under the superintendence of the architect, within the scope of whose duties this work would properly come.

On the consideration of these estimates the Commissioners could enter into contracts or agreements directly with the parties, without the intervention of any middle man.

This outlines my idea of what ought to have been done.

What has been done, so far as I can find out, is this :

The contractor for the building, C. T. Wills, was called upon to obtain estimates from dealers for furnishing the articles needed, with the understanding that the contract for the whole work would be made with him at the prices named in the lowest, or accepted, estimates, with the addition of 5 per cent. thereon.

This information is obtained from Mr. Goodwillie, clerk of the work, and Mr. Tyson, the agent of the contractor. The architect, Mr. Lord, being absent on his way to Europe, and his representative, Mr. Vaux, being sick, I could secure no other information, but I believe what I have given is correct.

With this understanding, there were submitted the following estimates, all directed to Charles T. Wills :

In the three estimates for furniture it will be noticed there is a range of \$22,567 between the lowest and the highest.

For the other items there is only one estimate for each class.

Charles T. Wills, in a letter addressed to James Brown Lord, architect, June 28, 1899, agrees to furnish "all the furniture, cabinet work, filing cases, carpets, rugs, hangings and all the furnishing complete, necessary in the new Court House for the Appellate Division" "as per plans, specifications and samples furnished me, and under the same terms and conditions" "named in my contract with The City of New York, dated December 22, 1897, for the following prices, viz. :

"It is understood that this is the complete furnishing, ready for occupancy."

The form of contract submitted by the architect and approved by a majority of the judges names the sum of \$106,637, which is within a fraction of the amount of the bids, with 5 per cent. added, except in the item of extras in connection with filing cabinets, which is placed at \$1,813.16 instead of \$1,100.

Although the manner of making this contract is irregular, I believe the steps taken in the matter give the best results which can be obtained now without the loss of considerable time—so much, in fact, as would postpone the furnishing, etc., very considerably beyond the 1st of October, 1899, the date on which the lease for the present Court-rooms of the Appellate Division will expire.

The date fixed in the proposed contract for the completion of the work is October 1, 1899, which is also the date fixed for the completion of the building.

I have examined carefully the plans submitted by the architect, and find them very complete.

The furniture and all the appurtenances are of a costly style, but perhaps not more so than is necessary to conform to the general character and purposes of the building.

The contract and specification are full and satisfactory. In the specifications for filing cabinets, etc., there is a patented article called for, viz. : "A. Crane's Patent Steel Record Cases." I directed the attention of the Corporation Counsel to it, in view of the requirements of section 1554 of the Charter, and he inserted the words "or cases equal thereto." This may require some action of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

The Counsel has also introduced the words "as amended by chapter 567 of the Laws of 1899," to cover the requirement as to the hours constituting a legal day's work.

With these amendments the Counsel has approved the contract as to form.

Considering the time it would require to adopt and arrange for any other plan than that proposed, which would be at the least two months, on account of the absence of the architect and the uncertainty of obtaining the action of the justices during the vacation season, I think the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund would be justified in executing the contract as proposed and submitted.

Under the law the matter rests entirely with the Commissioners, the justices having complied with the law in approving "the designs and specifications."

DEAR SIR—The Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at a meeting held June 29, 1899, passed the following :

"Resolved, That the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized and directed to take the necessary steps to sell at public auction to the highest bidder, at minimum or upset prices to be hereafter fixed by this Board, the several pieces or parcels of property offered at public auction by The City or New York, on June 15, 1893, the purchasers of which have failed to comply with the terms and conditions of sale ; and

"Resolved, That the amounts deposited at that time by said purchasers be and the same are hereby forfeited to the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt."

From the records of this department I find that sales of Aqueduct property made June 15, 1893, remaining unsettled, the purchasers thereof having paid respectively ten per cent. of the amount for which the premises were sold to them, but having failed up to the present time to complete their purchase, are as follows, all in Westchester county :

In regard to property at Shaft No. 8, sold to Timothy Donovan, application was made by Mr. Donovan on May 22, 1896, to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for the return of \$37.50 paid by him on account of his purchase, and on June 30, 1896, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund referred his application to the Corporation Counsel for his advice, and requesting that steps be taken to enforce such claims as the City may possess against Mr. Donovan.

From information obtained it does not appear that the lands sold on June 15, 1893, at Shafts Nos. 1, 2, 3 and 8 were ever apportioned, and if such is the case the City has paid the taxes to date.

The following correspondence with the Factory Inspector relative to contract for the Appellate Division Court-house was laid before the Board :

ALBANY, July 26, 1899.

Sinking Fund Commission, Mr. E. J. LEVEY, Secretary, No. 280 Broadway, New York City :

DEAR SIR—Complaint has been filed with this Department to the effect that section 3, article 1, Laws of 1897, as amended (marked copy inclosed), is violated on contracts for work in the erection of the new Appellate Court Building, located on Madison avenue, in the Borough of Manhattan, Greater New York; specific complaint being that no stipulation is contained in said contract limiting the hours of labor of workmen and mechanics employed on building referred to to eight hours per day, as in section 3 provided.

It being the duty of the Factory Inspector to enforce the provisions of the statute referred to above, I beg to inclose you a blank form of report, which is to be filled out and returned to the undersigned.

Should I be misinformed as to the facts, or should you have any additional statements to make aside from those upon the return blank, I would be pleased to hear from you. I trust it is but necessary to call attention to this matter to have the law fully complied with.

DEAR SIR—I acknowledge receipt of your communication of the 26th inst., in regard to a complaint filed with your Department, alleging violation of the labor law in a contract for erecting the new Appellate Division Court-house, located on Madison avenue, in the Borough of Manhattan, the specific complaint being "that no stipulation is contained in said contract limiting the hours of labor of workmen and mechanics employed on the building referred to, to eight hours per day, as in section 3 provided."

Your communication will be presented to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, but in the meantime I call your attention to the fact that the complainant evidently misunderstands the condition of affairs relative to this contract which contains the following clause :

"It is further agreed by and between the parties hereto that the wages for such public work shall not be less than the prevailing rate for a legal day's work in the same trade or calling in the locality where the work is performed, and that this contract shall be void and of no effect unless such rate is paid by the contractor to his employees, under the provisions of section 3 of chapter 415 of the Laws of the State of New York, which became a law on the 13th of May, 1897."

This clause complied with the labor law at the time of the date of the contract—i.e., December 22, 1897. The amendment to section 3 of the labor law, requiring a reference in each contract to the provision limiting the hours of labor in such cases to eight hours per day, did not take effect until 1899, and could not, of course, affect the contractual relations existing between the City and this contractor.

NEW YORK, June 8, 1899.

To the Comptroller of The City of New York, Broadway and Chambers street, New York :

DEAR SIR—Herewith inclosed please find an original petition, addressed to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of The City of New York, by Charles L. Dimon and others, praying for a deed of confirmation from The City of New York of certain premises, formerly land under water, between Third and Fourth streets, at the East river, in The City of New York. We greatly desire to have the matter acted upon by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at the earliest possible day. We presume it will be necessary to refer the matter to the Corporation Counsel. If this may be done prior to the meeting of the Commissioners, so that upon the coming in of the report of the Corporation Counsel the whole matter may be disposed of by the Board, we should be very glad. Kindly advise us of the date of hearing before the Board, in order that, if it seems desirable, we may appear at that time.

To the Honorable Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of The City of New York :

The petition of Charles L. Dimon, Caleb A. Dyer, and Frederick D. Philips, as Trustees under a trust deed dated the 29th day of December, 1898, between John F. Dimon and others of the first part and the said Trustees of the second part; and John F. Dimon, Charles L. Dimon, Jacob S. Dimon, Charlotte H. Dyer and Frederick D. Philips individually, respectfully represents as follows :

First—Just prior to the execution and delivery of the said Trust Deed dated the 29th day of December, 1898, the said John F. Dimon, Charles L. Dimon, Jacob S. Dimon, Charlotte H. Dyer and Frederick D. Philips were in their own individual capacities the owners of the premises in this first article of this petition described. By the said trust deed the said premises were conveyed to Charles L. Dimon, Caleb A. Dyer and Frederick D. Philips in trust for the purposes and only for the purposes set forth in the said deed. The said deed was recorded in the office of the Register of the County of New York, on the 12th day of January, 1899, in Block Series Conveyances, section 2, Liber 66, page 293, and indexed under Blocks Nos. 320 and 358. Reference is hereby made to the said deed with the same effect as if the said deed were here incorporated. The said Trustees still remain the owners of the property so conveyed to them as aforesaid, in trust for the purposes set forth in the said trust deed.

The following is a description of the said premises :

All those certain lots and parcels of land, situate in The City of New York, which, taken together, are bounded and described as follows, to wit : Beginning at a point in the northerly line of Third street distant one hundred feet and ten inches easterly from the point of intersection of the easterly line of Lewis street, with the northerly line of Third street, running thence easterly along the northerly line of Third street projected, six hundred and seventy-four feet eight inches, to a line understood to be coincident with the line of solid filling upon the East river, as now fenced in, thence northerly along the said line of solid filling as now fenced one hundred and ninety-three feet six inches to the southerly line of Fourth street, projected; thence westerly along the southerly line of Fourth street, projected, six hundred and seventy-four feet eight inches, to a point therein distant one hundred feet and ten inches easterly from the point of intersection of the easterly line of Lewis street, with the southerly line of Fourth street, and thence southerly, parallel with Lewis street one hundred and ninety-three feet six inches to the northerly line of Third street, at the point of beginning.

Together with all wharfage, slippage and other emoluments, rights, hereditaments and appurtenances arising out of or appertaining to the premises above described, or any part thereof.

The individual petitioners John F. Dimon, Charles L. Dimon, Jacob S. Dimon, Charlotte H. Dyer and Frederick D. Philips, are beneficiaries named in and entitled under the said trust deed and have all right in the said premises not held by the said Trustees. The individual petitioners acquired the exclusive title to the said premises upon the partition of the estate of John Dimon, deceased, made under judgment of the Supreme Court of this State in 1898 in the suit of William H. Philips, plaintiff, against John F. Dimon and others, defendants, and thereupon executed the trust deed above mentioned. All of the premises above described were originally and anciently lands under the waters of the East river. Upon an investigation of their title the petitioners find that, while they are the lawful owners of the premises above described, the regular written grants of the said land under water to their predecessors in title extend to the eastward only, as far as the easterly line of a formerly proposed street, intended to be called "East street," which line would be within a few feet of the easterly line of the present Mangin street, if extended northward from Third street to Fourth street, as shown on the survey of F. W. Ford, annexed hereto, and that their title to land lying to the eastward of the said line depends upon certain acts of the Legislature of the State and ordinances of The City of New York, taken in connection with the fact of the filling-in of the said lands by the predecessors in title of your petitioners, under authority of the said acts and ordinances. These facts prove a serious embarrassment to the petitioners in the sale or mortgage of the premises, and especially in the mortgage thereof where mortgages are practically not concluded, by the fact that your petitioners have a lawful title, but are able to insist upon a paper and record title.

Second—The title of the said John Dimon, and, therefore, of your petitioners, to the land lying between the easterly line of the former intended East street and the present line of solid filling along the East river, was derived as follows :

The Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of The City of New York conveyed lands under

water, between Third street and Fourth street, and between the original line of highwater and the easterly line of the then proposed East street, as follows:

The plot next South of the southerly line of Fourth Street to David Reeve, June 5th, 1815; the plot next South of the Reeve parcel to G. H. Van Wagenen, May 1, 1819; the parcel still farther south to Robert Carnley, May 1, 1819; the most southerly parcel, being that abutting on Third Street, to Henry Simmons, December 31, 1821; and again, on the forfeiture of the Simmons' grant, to Robert Carnley, Jr., June 2, 1834.

Prior to 1850 Stephen Smith and John Dimon, by sundry conveyances, succeeded to all the estate and rights of the various grantees above mentioned.

By Laws of New York of 1801, Chapter 129, Sections 3 and 4, it was enacted that the City Corporation might lay out streets or wharves in front of those parts of the City which adjoin to the East River, and that the said streets should be made by and at the expense of the proprietors of land adjoining in proportion to the breadth of their lots by certain days appointed by the City Corporation, and that the respective proprietors of land not adjoining said streets or wharves should fill up and level at their own expense and according to the City plan and by the days so to be fixed the spaces lying between their lots and the said streets, and upon so filling up and levelling the same should be respectively entitled to become the owners of the said intermediate spaces of ground in fee simple.

By laws of New York of 1807, Chapter 115, Section 15, it was provided, among other things, that as to all land under water along the westerly shore of the East River at and from low-water mark and extending four hundred feet into the said river from the north side of Corlears Hook to the distance of two miles to the north, letters patent of the State should issue to the City Corporation conveying the said land under water "provided that proprietors of adjacent lands shall have the preemptive right in all grants made by the Corporation of any lands under water granted to the said Corporation under this act."

By Laws of New York of 1813, chapter 86, commonly known as the "Revised Laws," the said provisions of earlier statutes with respect to the right of proprietors to fill in and thereupon to become seized of the lots in front of their property were re-enacted.

By resolution of the Common Council of the City of New York, approved April 1, 1822, the City Corporation laid out upon the City plan a street of the width of sixty feet at a distance of two hundred feet from and parallel to Mangin street and extending from Grand street to the Market place and to be distinguished by the name of Tompkins street.

By Laws of New York of 1826, chapter 166, it was enacted that all grants to be made by the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York should be considered as rightfully made to extend to Tompkins street as laid out and approved by the said Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York. Tompkins street as so laid out was seventy feet wide and identical with Tompkins street sixty feet wide, as laid out under said resolutions of April 1, 1822, with the addition of ten feet to the eastward.

By resolution of the Common Council of the City, approved by the Mayor June 10, 1853, permission was given to the owners of the property between Third and Fourth streets, East river, to build at their own cost and expense a bulkhead on the exterior line of Tompkins street, between Third and Fourth streets, and a return bulkhead on the line of Fourth street and to fill in behind the same.

Between the date of the said resolution and 1858 the said Stephen Smith and John Dimon erected a bulkhead and a return bulkhead in accordance with the terms of the said resolutions and filled in the whole space between the said bulkhead and the land conveyed by the several grants from the City Corporation to Reeve, Van Wagenen, Carnley, Simmons and Carnley, Junior, above mentioned. All of these proceedings were at their own expense. Proof of such filling in by Smith and Dimon was given by the sworn testimony of witnesses in the partition suit of "Philips against Dimon," hereinbefore mentioned, but all of the said witnesses were men of great age, and in the course of nature it cannot be expected that their testimony will be available to the petitioners for any further considerable period. After the filling in and in the year 1869 Stephen Smith conveyed his half interest to John Dimon.

By resolution of the Common Council, approved December 31, 1856, so much of Tompkins street, laid out as above mentioned, as lay north of Houston street was discontinued and an attempt was made to establish a new street, to be called East street, some distance farther out in the East river.

Your petitioners annex hereto and make a part hereof a survey of the said premises between Third and Fourth streets, made by Francis W. Ford, City Surveyor, and bearing date day of , 1899. The said survey shows among other things the lines of the said former proposed East street, nearly equivalent to Mangin street, if extended to the northward from Third and Fourth streets, the existing bulkhead or line of solid filling along the East river, and the lines of said Tompkins street seventy feet wide, referred to in the said Act of 1826, the street as thus indicated being on a prolongation of the lines of Tompkins street as now opened just south of Third street.

Third—Your petitioners are informed that it is the present desire of the City authorities to open Tompkins street seventy feet wide, between Third and Fourth streets, on the lines indicated in said survey of F. W. Ford, and that in July, 1898, despite the discontinuance and abandonment of said street in 1856, as above set forth, the Commissioner of Highways threatened to take possession of the land lying within the lines of the said proposed Tompkins street, between Third and Fourth streets.

Thereupon, your individual petitioners brought suit in the Supreme Court of the State against The City of New York and the Commissioner of Highways for a permanent injunction to prevent the construction of the said proposed street and obtained a preliminary injunction which is still in full force.

Your petitioners respectfully insist that this petition shall not be deemed to dedicate Tompkins street or land lying within the lines thereof as a street or otherwise, or to recognize the said strip of land as a street.

Fourth—Your petitioners are desirous to obtain from The City of New York a deed in confirmation of their title to the land lying between the easterly limits of the said grants to Reeve, Van Wagenen, Carnley and Carnley, Jr., and including the present bulkhead or line of solid filling along the East river, together with the right to take wharfage, cranes and other emoluments from the bulkhead on the East river, and they hereby state that in consideration of such a deed of confirmation they would join in a release to The City of New York of all the lands lying within the said proposed Tompkins street, seventy feet wide, as indicated upon the said survey of F. W. Ford, annexed hereto.

Wherefore, your petitioners pray that a deed of confirmation be authorized and executed, running from The City of New York, to the said Charles L. Dimon, Caleb A. Dyer and Frederic D. Philips, as trustees under the said trust deed in like manner as if the estate and right transferred by the said deed of confirmation had been included in the said trust deed hereinbefore mentioned, confirming them as trustees as aforesaid in the title to the said premises, extending from the easterly end of the said grants from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York to David Reeve and others, above mentioned, to and including the present bulkhead or line of solid filling along the East river, and with the right to take wharfage, cranes and all other emoluments from said bulkhead, in consideration of a conveyance from all of your petitioners to The City of New York of the land lying within the lines of the said proposed Tompkins street, seventy feet wide, between Third and Fourth streets, as indicated upon the said survey of Francis W. Ford, hereto annexed, as and for a public street; or that, in the alternative, and without a deed of cession from your petitioners, a deed of confirmation be authorized and executed as aforesaid, from The City of New York to the said trustees as aforesaid, confirming them as such trustees, in the title to the premises extending from the easterly end of the said grants to David Reeve and others to and including the present bulkhead or line of solid filling along the East river, and with the right to take wharfage, cranes and all other emoluments from said bulkhead and reserving to The City of New York the land forming the site of Tompkins street, between Third and Fourth streets, as indicated upon the said survey of F. 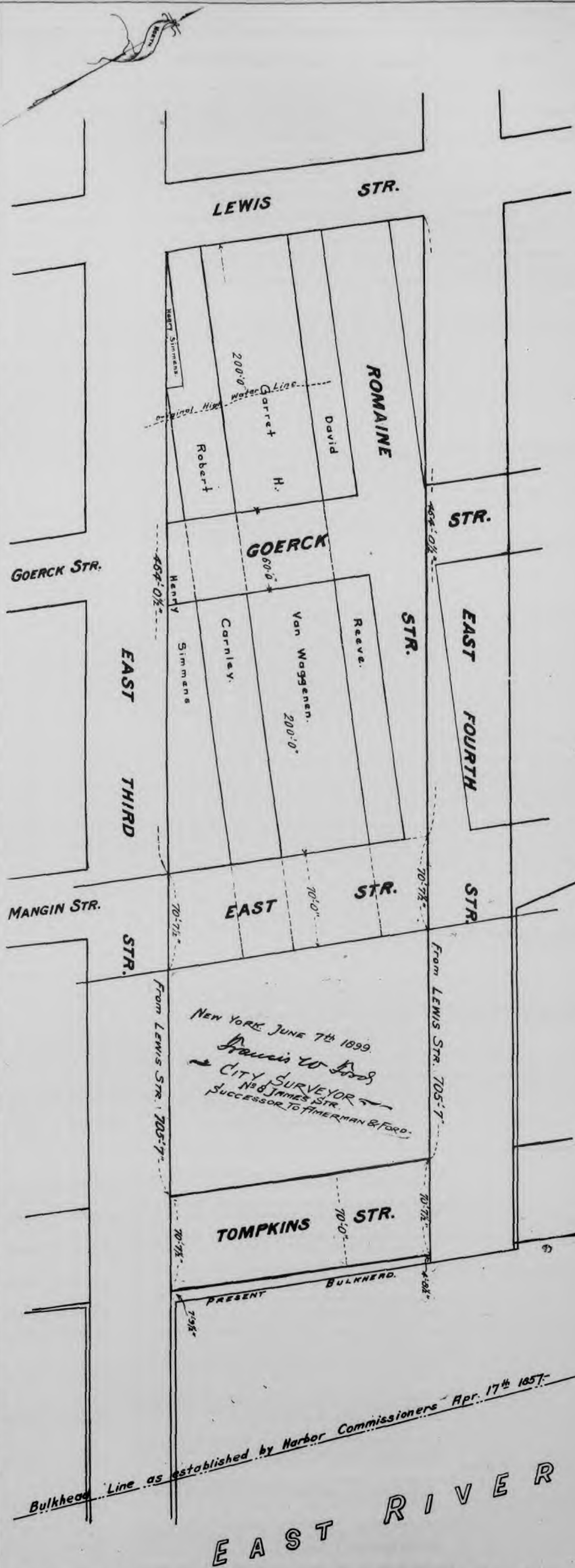

In connection therewith the Comptroller presented the following report of the Engineer of the Department of Finance:

JULY 26, 1899.

Hon. BIRD S. COLER, Comptroller:

SIR—Messrs. Howland & Murray, in communication of June 8, 1899, to the Comptroller, present a petition of Charles L. Dimon and others to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for a deed of confirmation from The City of New York of certain premises, formerly land under water, between Third and Fourth streets, at the East river in The City of New York.

The petition itself says:

"The title of the said John Dimon, and therefore of your petitioners, to the land lying between the easterly line of the former intended East street and the present line of solid filling along the East river was derived as follows:

"The Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of The City of New York conveyed lands under water, between Third and Fourth streets, and between the original line of high water and the easterly line of the then proposed East street, as follows:

"The plot next south of the southerly line of Fourth street to David Reeve, June 5, 1815;

"the plot next south of the Reeve parcel to G. H. Van Wagenen, May 1, 1819; the parcel still farther south to Robert Carnley, May 1, 1819; the most southerly parcel, being that abutting on Third street, to Henry Simmons, December 31, 1821, and again, on the forfeiture of the Simmons grant, to Robert Carnley, Jr., June 2, 1834."

The petitioners "are desirous to obtain from The City of New York a deed in confirmation of their title to the land lying between the easterly limits of the said grants to Reeve, Van Wagenen, Carnley and Carnley, Jr., and including the present bulkhead or line of solid filling along the East river, together with the right to take wharfage, crange and other emoluments from the bulkhead on the East river, and they hereby state that in consideration of such a deed of confirmation they would join in a release to The City of New York of all the lands lying within the said proposed Tompkins street, seventy feet wide, as indicated upon the said survey of F. W. Ford, annexed hereto."

In considering this petition the following facts must be kept in mind:

1st. On April 1, 1822, the Common Council adopted a resolution laying out "a street 60 feet wide, 200 feet from, and parallel with, Mangin street, and extending from Grand street to the Market place, which street shall be known and distinguished by the name of Tompkins street."

2d. Chapter 166, Laws of 1826, enacts "That Tompkins street, along the East river, as laid out and approved by the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of The City of New York, shall be the permanent exterior street on the East river, between Rivington and Twenty-third streets, and that all grants made or to be made by the said Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty shall be construed as rightfully made to extend thereto."

3d. By resolution of Common Council, approved by the Mayor June 10, 1853, permission was given "to the owners of property between Third and Fourth streets, East river, to build at their own cost and expense a bulkhead on the exterior line of Tompkins street, between said Third and Fourth streets, and a return bulkhead on the line of Fourth street, and fill in behind the same under the direction of the Street Commissioners."

4th. By resolution of Common Council, approved by the Mayor December 31, 1856: "So much of Tompkins street as is now laid out and designated on the map or plan of the city north of Houston street, shall be, and hereby is, discontinued."

5th. The Commissioners of the Sinking Fund on December 19, 1888, adopted the following resolution, viz.:

"Resolved, That after due examination, the plan for the improvement of the water front on the westerly side of East river, between the southerly side of Grand street and the northerly side of East Eighth street, determined by the Department of Docks on the 17th day of December, 1888, be and hereby is approved and adopted by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund."

It will be seen by the map, herewith, that the bulkhead-line established by this resolution is considerably inside of the bulkhead-line of former Tompkins street, between Third and Fourth streets.

It will be observed, also, that this resolution approves and adopts an exterior street of 175 feet in width.

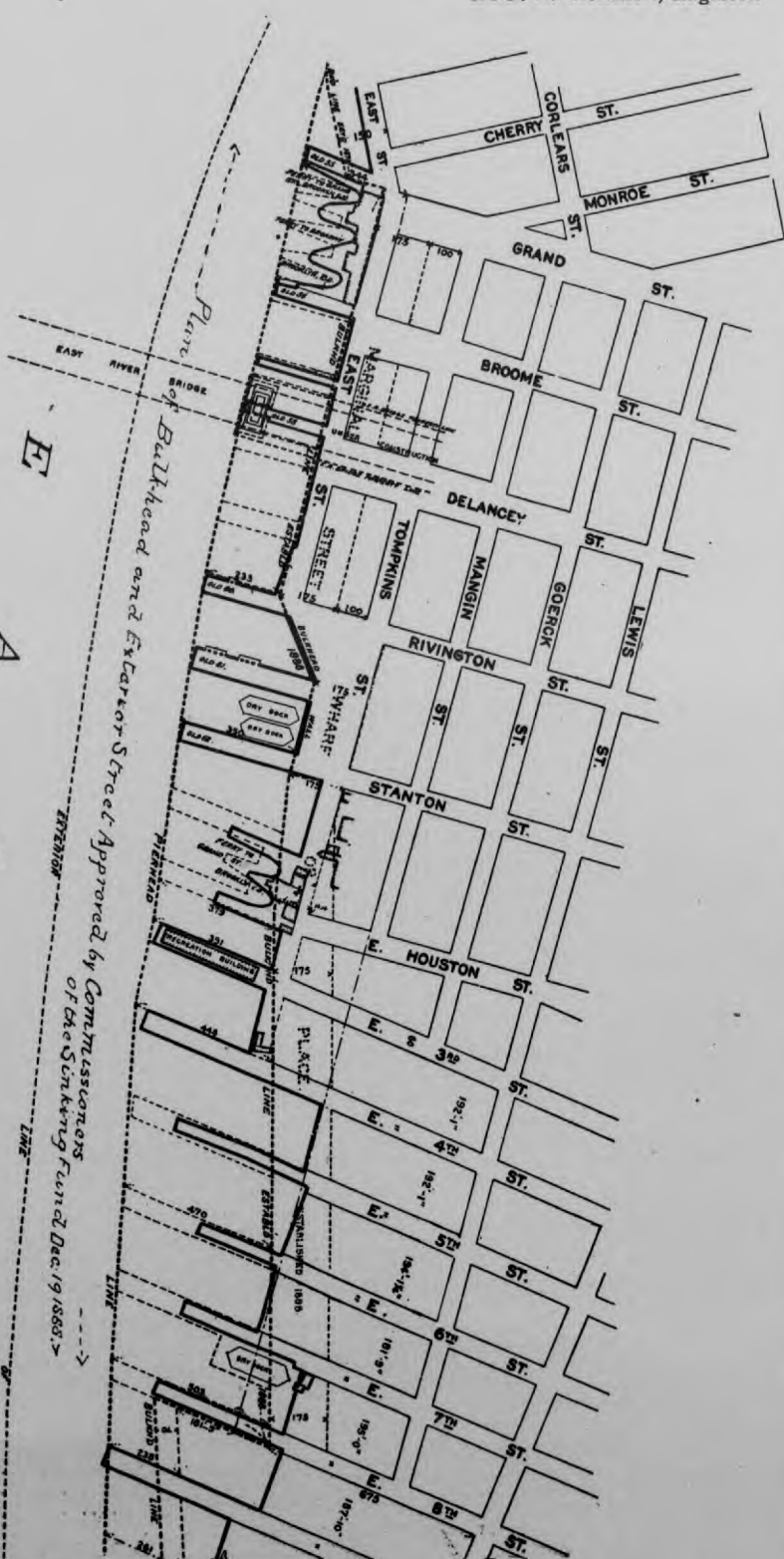
6th. Tompkins street being discontinued by the resolution of 1856, and a new bulkhead and street established by the action of the Department of Docks and the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund in 1888, the line for a confirmatory deed becomes uncertain.

7th. The City, by section 876 of the Charter, cannot grant any land under water beyond the exterior lines of The City of New York, as established by the law of 1857, as amended by subsequent act, unless expressly authorized by acts passed subsequent thereto.

In view of all the facts as stated in the petition and recited above, I believe that the applicants have a good claim to all the land between Third and Fourth streets, from the line of the various grants mentioned to a certain bulkhead-line, together with the rights of wharfage, etc., on that bulkhead-line between the streets named.

Tompkins street having been discontinued, and the bulkhead-line having been established by the Department of Docks and the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, this bulkhead-line, in my opinion, should be the limiting line of any confirmatory deed that may be granted.

SIR—I desire consent and approval of your Board, pursuant to section 541 of the Charter, for a lease by this Department from P. G. Kemp of the premises known as Nos. 790, 792 and 794 Greenwich street, in the Borough of Manhattan, distinguished on the tax maps by the Ward Numbers 809, 810 and 811, and taken together, described and bounded as follows: Beginning at a point on the westerly side of Greenwich street, distant 44 feet north of Bethune street, and running thence northerly along the said westerly side of Greenwich street, 72 feet; thence westerly, parallel with Bethune street, 83 feet; thence southerly 72 feet, and thence easterly 83 feet, to the place of beginning; excepting the space, 16 feet by 16 feet, occupied by the stable thereon, from the first day of August, 1899, to the first day of May, 1900, at a rental of \$75 per month, payable at the end of each and every month of the term.

SIR—In accordance with the action taken by the Board of Public Improvements directing to report on the necessity of establishing a branch office in the Borough of Brooklyn, I have to state that I have examined the Jefferson Building, Court place, Brooklyn, and find that Room No. 61, containing 220 square feet; Room No. 62, with 307 square feet; No. 63, with 216 square feet; No. 64, with 300 square feet; No. 68, with 200 square feet, and Room No. 69, with 310 square feet, are available for this purpose, and that the building, on account of its proximity to the other buildings in the Borough of Brooklyn, is most desirable for this purpose.

The rent of the six rooms, which have altogether an area of 1,553 square feet, is \$1,200 per year, as shown in the letter of Clarence E. McMahon, agent for said building. The office of Mr. McMahon is No. 172 Montague street, Borough of Brooklyn.

DEAR SIR—The Board of Public Improvements, by resolution adopted July 12, 1899, requests the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to authorize a "lease for three years, with the privilege of renewal, of Rooms 61, 62, 63, 64, 68 and 69 in the Jefferson Building, Court place, Brooklyn, at an annual rental of \$1,200 per year, repairs and alterations to be made by owner, to be used as a branch office for the Topographical Bureau of the Board of Public Improvements."

The repairs and alterations mentioned are as follows:

"1st. Replace stained glass transom window, in Room 62, with ordinary window glass transoms.

"2d. Replace whitened glass in windows of light shaft, and in those opening on hallways by window glass.

"3d. Change location of such radiators as may be directed.

"4th. The interior walls of the rooms to be painted white.

"5th. Room 68 should be made available for a blue print room by replacing the double window frame by a single window frame, which can be done without interfering with the stone or iron work of the building."

The Jefferson Building is located on Court square, east of Fulton street, in the Borough of Brooklyn.

Rooms 61, 62, 63 and 64 are on the seventh floor, the first three being on the Court square side of the building, and Room 64 being in the rear.

Rooms 68 and 69 are on the eighth floor, Court square side, No. 69 being at present used as a workshop for the building.

Whereas, The President of the Borough of Queens, City of New York, did on this 14th day of July, 1899, at meeting of this the Local Board of Borough aforesaid, submit to said Board for its consideration and action, a petition for the construction of a city sewerage disposal plant, in connection with the sewer system in Jamaica, now Fourth Ward, this Borough; and

Whereas, In conformity with notice given, this Board did accord a public hearing thereon; and

Whereas, The importance of such undertaking has heretofore received the approval of the State Board of Health, and commanded action on the part of the Sewer Department, in anticipation of the favorable action of all the City authorities whose duties may relate thereto;

Now, in view of the foregoing premises, and after the consideration of same and all other matters in connection therewith, as brought to the attention of this Board, and in accord with the favorable conclusions of this Board therein, it is hereby

Resolved, That this Board does hereby specially recommend to the Board of Public Improvements, City of New York, the subject-matter as petitioned for and hereinbefore stated, and hereby respectfully urges upon said Board to extend to same its prompt consideration and favorable action, as called for by the manifest necessity that exists for the speedy construction of such sewerage disposal plant; also,

Whereas, The President of the Borough of Queens, City of New York, did submit to this the Local Board of the borough aforesaid, at its meeting held July 14, 1899, a petition for the legal opening of Blackwell street, from Broadway to Woolsey avenue, in the First Ward of said borough; and

Whereas, This Board did, in conformity with notice published, accord public hearing thereon, at which no person appeared in opposition thereto; and

Whereas, It is the opinion of this Board that a compliance with said petition would be for the best interests of this City; therefore

Resolved, That recommendation be and the same is hereby made to the Board of Public Improvements, City of New York, that it give the subject-matter of the petition its prompt and favorable consideration and action towards causing the necessary proceedings to be instituted, whereby The City of New York shall acquire title to said avenue for use by the public as a highway; also,

Whereas, Public hearing, after notice duly published, was accorded by this the Local Board of the Borough of Queens, at meeting held July 14, 1899, on submission by the President of aforesaid borough, of a petition of owners of real estate to have their property improved by the construction of public sewer along the line of same in Kouwenhoven street or Ninth avenue, from Flushing avenue to Grand avenue, in the First Ward of this borough; and

Whereas, No opposition was interposed against this Board giving its approval to the desires of the petitioners; and

Whereas, It appearing to the satisfaction of this Board that compliance with the said petition would be to the best interests of this City, it is accordingly

Resolved, That recommendation be and the same is hereby made to the Board of Public Improvements, City of New York, that it give the subject-matter above referred to its prompt and favorable action.

Petitions for the extensions of water-mains were favorably acted upon by the adoption of the following:

Whereas, Petition for the extension of public water-main in De Bevoise avenue, from Newtown avenue to Broadway, in the First Ward, Borough of Queens, City of New York, was submitted to this the Local Board of borough aforesaid, at meeting thereof, held this 14th day of July, 1899, for its favorable consideration and action; and

Whereas, Said Board did thereupon and hereby does indorse such aforesaid application;

Now, in accordance with the foregoing, it is hereby

Resolved, That recommendation thereof be and the same is hereby made to the Board of Public Improvements, City of New York, to the end that prompt compliance may be made with the requirements of the petitioners; also

Whereas, The petition of the taxpayers upon the lands and premises fronting on Pomeroy street, between Potter avenue and Flushing avenue, First Ward, Borough of Queens, City of New York, to extend therein the public water-mains, was submitted to this the Local Board of borough aforesaid; and

Whereas, This Board in meeting assembled this 14th day of July, 1899, determined in favor of said petition; therefore it is accordingly

Resolved, That recommendation be and hereby is made to the Board of Public Improvements, City of New York, that it extend to said petition its prompt and favorable consideration and action.

Whereas, This the Local Board of the Borough of Queens, City of New York, did, at its meeting on May 5, 1899, adopt preamble and resolution in favor of extending the public water, mains in and through Hulst street, from Greenpoint avenue to Jackson avenue, in First Ward of borough and city aforesaid, and so recommended same to the Board of Public Improvements, City of New York; and

Whereas, The President of the last-named Board did, at its meeting on May 17, 1899, refer the matter to the Commissioner of Water Supply for investigation and report, which report has not as yet been officially announced.

Now, in view of the fact that it is now over two months since said reference, it is

Resolved, That respectful request be and the same is hereby made upon all whom it may concern that the aforesaid subject-matter (of petition) be speedily progressed; also the following:

Whereas, This, the Local Board of the Borough of Queens, City of New York, at meeting held on July 14, 1899, did, in conformity with public notice given, afford hearing upon petition submitted by the President of this Borough for the construction of a public sewer in Pomeroy street, or Eighth avenue, from Flushing avenue to Grand avenue, First Ward, said borough; and

Whereas, no objections thereto were presented to this Board; and

Whereas, it appears to this Board that compliance with the desires of the petitioners would be to the best interests of this City, it is therefore

Resolved, That recommendation be and is hereby made to the Board of Public Improvements, City of New York, that it give the matter its favorable consideration and prompt action towards furthering same to full response to the requirements of the petitioners.
