BUREAU OF BUILDINGS.

Amendments to Plumbing and Drainage Rules and Regulations, published as required by section 141 of the Building Code of The City of New York.

Amend rule for registration to read as follows:

"Once in each year, during the month of March, every employing or master plumber carrying on his trade, business or calling in The City of New York, shall register his name and address in the office of the Bureau of Buildings in the borough in which his place of business is located."

"A plumber proposing to do work in a borough other than that in which he is registered shall present his certificate at the office of the Bureau of Buildings in that borough before commencing work, so that the fact of his having been properly registered may be recorded."

Amend section 79 to read as follows:

"A fresh-air inlet must be connected with the house drain just inside of the house-trap; when under ground it will be of extra heavy cast iron. Where possible it will extend to the outer air, and finish with a return bend at least one foot above grade and at least ten feet away from any window or cold-air box. When this arrangement is not possible the fresh-air inlet must open into the side of a box not less than 18 inches square, placed below the sidewalk at the curb. The bottom of the box must be 18 inches below the under side of the fresh-air inlet pipe. The box may be of cast iron or it may be constructed with eight-inch walls of brick, or flagstone laid in hydraulic cement. The box must be covered by a flagstone fitted with removable metal grating, leaded into the stone, having openings equal in area to the area of the fresh-air inlet, and not less than one-half inch in their least dimension. The fresh-air inlet must be of the same size as the drain up to four inches; for five-inch and six-inch drains it must not be less than four inches in diameter; for seven-inch and eight-inch drains, not less than six inches in diameter, and for larger drains not less than eight inches in diameter; the removable portions of grate to be at least 8 by 12 inches in size."

"An automatic device, approved by the Superintendent of Buildings, may be used, when set in a manner satisfactory to the said Superintendent."

Amend section 97 to read as follows:

"No form of trap will be permitted to be used unless it has been approved by the Bureau of Buildings, and no masons' cesspool, bell, pot, bottle or D-trap will be permitted, nor any form of trap that is not self-cleaning or has interior chamber or mechanism, nor any trap, except earthenware ones, that depend upon interior partitions for a seal."

Amend section 112 to read as follows:

"The safe waste-pipe from a refrigerator cannot discharge upon the ground or floor. It must discharge over an ordinary portable pan, or some properly trapped, water supplied sink, as above. In no case shall the refrigerator waste-pipe discharge over a sink located in a room used for living purposes."

Amend section 117 to read as follows:

"Refrigerator waste-pipes and all safe waste-pipes must have brass flap valves at their lower end."

Amend section 118 to read as follows:

"In lodging houses, factories, workshops and all public buildings the entire water-closet apartment and side walls, to a height of six inches from the floor, except at the door, must be made waterproof with asphalt, cement, tile, metal or waterproof material, as approved by the Bureau of Buildings."

Amend section 119 to read as follows:

"In lodging houses the water-closet and urinal apartments must have a window opening to the outer air, except that lodging houses three stories or less in height may have such window opening on a ventilating shaft not less than ten square feet in area."

Amend section 121 to read as follows:

The general water-closet accommodations for a lodging house cannot be placed in cellar.

Amend section 131 to read as follows:

In lodging houses there must be one water-closet on each floor, and when there are more than fifteen persons on any floor there must be an additional water-closet on that floor for every fifteen additional persons or fraction thereof.

Section 132 omitted.

Amend section 134 to read as follows:

Water-closets and urinals must be flushed from separate cisterns on each floor, the water for which is used for no other purpose; where flushometers are used, they must be supplied from separate tanks provided for that purpose, and in no case are connections to be made direct with the water service pipe.

Amend section 143 to read as follows:

All sinks must be entirely open, on iron legs or brackets, without any inclosing wood work.

Insert new article and section as follows:

XV.

Plumbing in Tenement Houses.

160. All sections or parts of sections of the Tenement House Law relating to plumbing and drainage of tenement houses are to be observed, and are hereby made a part of these Rules and Regulations.

BUREAU OF BUILDINGS.

Plumbing and Drainage Rules, as heretofore published and enforced in the Department of Buildings, boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, have been adopted by the Bureau of Buildings, Borough of The Bronx, with the following exceptions:

Paragraph 11, subdivision 1, is hereby amended to read as follows:

"Once in each year every employing or master plumber carrying on his trade, business or calling in The City of New York shall register his name and address at the office of the Bureau of Buildings, in the borough in which his place of business is located, under such rules and regulations as the Superintendent of Buildings shall prescribe and as hereinbefore provided."

After subdivision 3 insert the following:

"A plumber proposing to do work in a borough other than that in which he is registered shall present his certificate at the office of the Bureau of Buildings in that borough before commencing work, so that the fact of his having been properly registered may be recorded."

Section 79. Substitute the following:

"Sec. 79. A fresh-air inlet must be connected with the house drain just inside of the house-trap; where under ground, it will be of extra heavy cast iron. It must extend to the outer air, and finish with a return bend at least one foot above the grade and ten feet away from any window or cold-air box. When this arrangement is not possible the fresh-air inlet must open into the side of a box not less than eighteen inches square, placed below the sidewalk at the curb. The bottom of the box must be eighteen inches below the under side of the fresh-air inlet pipe. The box may be of cast iron, or it may be constructed with eight-inch walls of brick, or flagstone laid in hydraulic cement. The box must be covered by a flagstone fitted with removable metal grating, leaded into the stone, having openings equal in area to the area of the fresh-air inlet, and not less than one-half inch in their least dimension. The fresh-air inlet must be of the same size as the drain up to four inches; for five-inch and six-inch drains it must not be less than four inches in diameter; for seven-inch and eight-inch drains, not less than six inches in diameter, and for larger drains not less than eight inches in diameter."

After section 97 insert the following and change the numbers of the sections which follow it:

"Sec. 98. No masons' cesspool, bell, pot, bottle or D-trap will be permitted, nor any form of trap that is not self-cleaning nor has interior chamber or mechanism, nor any trap, except earthenware ones, that depend upon interior partitions for a seal."

Section 112. Substitute the following:

"Sec. 113. Safe waste-pipe from refrigerator must discharge over a water supplied sink as above. Refrigerator waste-pipes should not be trapped. In no case shall the refrigerator waste-pipe discharge over a sink located in a room used for living purposes."

Section 118. Substitute the following:

"Sec. 119. In tenement houses, lodging houses, factories, workshops and all public buildings the entire water-closet apartments and side walls, to a height of six inches from the floor, except at the door, must be made waterproof with asphalt, cement, tile, metal, or other waterproof material, as approved by the Superintendent of Buildings."

Section 119. Substitute the following:

"Sec. 120. In tenement houses and lodging houses the water-closet and urinal apartments must have a window opening to the outer air, except that lodging houses three stories or less in height may have such window opening on a ventilating shaft not less than ten square feet in area."

Sections 131 and 132. Substitute the following:

"Sec. 132. In lodging houses there must be one water-closet on each floor, and where there are more than fifteen persons on any floor there must be an additional water-closet on that floor for every fifteen additional persons or fraction thereof."

After section 134 insert the following and change the numbers of the sections which follow it:

"Sec. 135. Where flushometers are used they must be supplied from separate tanks provided for that purpose, and in no case are connections to be made direct with the water service pipe."

Preamble and resolutions recommended to be adopted by the Board of Aldermen, February, 1902:

Whereas, The Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners, constituted pursuant to the provisions of chapter 4 of the Laws of 1894, and the acts amendatory thereof, has duly determined that the routes and general plans adopted by said Board on the fourteenth day of January, 1897, and the fourth day of February, 1897, should be modified by adding to the said routes or extending the same from a point under Lenox avenue, near One Hundred and Forty-second street, northerly to One Hundred and Fiftieth street; and thereafter did transmit to the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York a copy of said plans and conclusions as adopted, which plans and conclusions thus adopted were received by said Board of Aldermen on the thirtieth day of January, 1902, at 2 o'clock p. m., at a meeting of the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, duly convened on such day at such hour; and

Whereas, The said Board of Aldermen did, by resolution duly adopted at said meeting, fix a day not less than one week nor more than ten days after the receipt of such plans and conclusions, for the consideration thereof, to wit, this sixth day of February, 1902, at 2 o'clock p. m.; and

Whereas, The said Board of Aldermen on this sixth day of February, 1902, has proceeded with the consideration of such plans and conclusions; and

Whereas, The plans and conclusions and modifications are duly set forth in the resolutions of the said Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners, as follows:

"Resolved, That, subject to the consents and approvals to be first obtained as in these resolutions hereinafter mentioned, the said routes and general plan heretofore adopted by this Board be and they hereby are modified by adding to the said routes the following, to wit:

"And also extending from a point under Lenox avenue, near One Hundred and Forty-second street, northerly, under Lenox avenue to a point at or near its intersection with the street known as "Exterior street," including connections by necessary and suitable switches and tracks or otherwise, with abutting properties used as terminal or storage grounds.

"The general plan of construction of the portion of the route hereby added shall be by tunnel in the same manner as provided in the routes and general plan for the construction of the rapid transit railroad under the portion of Lenox avenue between One Hundred and Tenth street and One Hundred and Forty-second street. There shall be at least two parallel tracks, with the right at any time to add a third track, in the discretion of the Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners.

"A station and station approaches may also be built at the intersection of one of the streets intersecting Lenox avenue, between One Hundred and Forty-second and Exterior streets, as the Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners may decide."

"In all other respects the provisions of the said general plan of construction adopted January 14 and February 4, 1897, shall be applicable to the portion of the route hereby substituted; and it is further

"Resolved, That, whereas, this Board has duly made the inquiries and investigation necessary or proper in the premises, and has determined that the modification aforesaid of the said routes and general plan are necessary for the interests of the public and of The City of New York, and should be established as herein provided, this Board does hereby determine and establish the said routes and general plan as hereby modified, subject to the consents and approvals to be first obtained as hereinafter mentioned; and it is further

"Resolved, That the said modifications of routes and general plans shall take effect only upon and after the following consents and approvals thereto shall be duly had, to wit:

"1. The consent of the Municipal Assembly of The City of New York.

"2. The consent of the Mayor of The City of New York.

"3. The consent of the owners of a majority in value of the property along streets or such portions of streets as are included in the portion of routes by these resolutions proposed to be substituted as aforesaid; or if such consent cannot be obtained, then in lieu thereof the determination of three Commissioners to be appointed by the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court, duly confirmed by the said Appellate Division.

"4. The consent of the said John B. McDonald, contractor, and of his sureties, as follows: Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company; The United States Fidelity and Guaranty Company; The City Trust Safe Deposit and Surety Company of Philadelphia; American Surety Company of New York; National Surety Company, and Perry Belmont.

"It is further

"Resolved, That this Board hereby adopts the drawing now produced and numbered 'one' as showing the modifications or extension hereby adopted."

Now, therefore, it is

Resolved, That the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York hereby does, by a majority vote of all its members, approve such plans and conclusion and modification, and does consent to the construction of a railway or railways, in accordance therewith; and that The City of New York does hereby approve of all such plans and conclusions and modification and consents to such construction.

BOARD OF CITY RECORD.

City Hall, Monday, 2 P. M., March 24, 1902.

A meeting of the Board of City Record was held this day. Present, the Mayor, Corporation Counsel and Comptroller.

The minutes of March 17, 1902, were submitted and approved.

The matter of the selection of official papers for the Borough of Queens was next taken up, and letters were read from Alderman Behrmann, the Queens Borough Press and the Newtown Register.

On motion of the Mayor it was resolved that for the Newtown and Long Island City District the Newtown Register and the Long Island City Star be selected, and for the districts of Flushing, Jamaica and the Rockaways, the Flushing Times and the Jamaica Standard be selected as the papers to contain the publication of the Local Board meetings. Unanimously carried.

A letter was read from Mr. Russell Bleeker, Secretary of the Department of Docks and Ferries, of which the following extract:

The Commissioner of this Department has directed me to state that he would be glad to receive suggestions from you as to the advisability and propriety of publishing short notices of advertisements of contracts in all papers designated by the Board of City Record. This has been the practice in this Department for the past six or seven years, and the cost has been about \$3,000 per annum.

It is, of course, desirable to have the public informed as completely as possible as to the work to be contracted for and the supplies to be furnished, but I am of the opinion that many of the readers of the papers designated are not interested in the fact that the Department is about to contract for its work and supplies.

In reference to this the Comptroller offered the following:

RESOLVED, That the Supervisor be directed to inform the Dock Department that it is the judgment of this Board that the different departments be allowed to judge for themselves as to the advisability of publishing these short notices, as to which papers should be used for that purpose and the number of times that they should be inserted; that this Board does nothing but designate the papers in which this advertising must be done, but it cannot be inserted outside of those papers.

Unanimously carried.

A letter from the Jordan Stationery Company was submitted in reference to the recent contract on which they bid. The following is an extract therefrom:

Upon examination we find that our manager made several mistakes in figuring the cost of the above articles, to wit: Item No. 199, 60 Gross Rubber Bands, No. 85, which would cost us \$108, our bid is \$10.20. Item No. 205, 8 Gross Rubber Bands, No. 109, cost to us \$54, our bid \$4.80. Item No. 562, 112 3 inch cut glass inkstands, we estimated 50 cents each, but the extension of figures for the lot shows only \$5.60, instead of \$56, as it should be.

As these mistakes were unintentional and will entail considerable loss to us should we be obliged to furnish the articles, we respectfully ask to be relieved from supplying any part of the contract awarded to us, as, except in a few unimportant items, the award is based upon the errors, as stated. That they occurred is principally due to the fact that the time allowed to examine the specifications and prepare a bid for submission to the Board of City Record was so short that we could not verify the figures and correct any mistakes that might be found in our bid.

The Supervisor reported that Item 199 was correctly extended and so was Item 205. Item 562 was an obvious error, which should be corrected in the contract.

On motion of Mr. Grout, it was resolved that the Supervisor be authorized in this case or any others to correct any obvious errors in extension, but not to make any other alteration or correction in the bids.
